

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Alon's acquisition of Southwest Convenience Stores complete

Alon USA announced completion of acquisi-Southwest Convenience Stores (SCS) Eleven stores in the West



Texas region.

"This acquisition symbolizes a new phase of growth for SCS and we are excited about the possibilities ahead," said Jeff Morris, Alon USA president and chief executive officer.

The acquisition had been announced earlier this year and was finalized this week. Alon USA was formed in August 2000 when Alon Israel Oil Company Ltd. purchased Fina Oil and Chemical's U.S. fuels mar-

keting and refining assets. In the purchase, Alon USA acquired Fina's 34.4 percent interest in SCS. Alon USA now becomes 100 percent owner of SCS and its 174 licensed 7-Eleven convenience stores.

SCS is the largest 7-Eleven licensee in the United States, with stores located in Big Spring, Wichita Falls, Midland, Odessa, El Paso and Albuquerque, N.M. The company was formed in 1993 with the pur-

BROOKS pletely hopeless," said publicity chairperson Lisa Brooks. Everyone can do something to help fight cancer whether it is walking in the Relay for Life event or working on a committee to

help raise funds. The American Cancer Society-sponsored event held at Blankenship Field on the Big Spring High School campus, kicks off at 4 p.m. with registration of teams.

This year, 67 teams are expected to walk and all slots are filled for the rocking chair team that is back for another year, Brooks

"The rocking chair team was instituted three or four years ago at our local relay," she said. "Elrods Furniture brings out several rocking chairs. The team also collects money."

All tents, tarps and teepees will be pitched by 6:30 p.m. Friday: Currently, there are only 11 spaces left on the field for those wishing to camp out, Brooks said.

The survivor's lap is scheduled for 7 p.m. with 160 to 180 survivors expected to participate in the first lap of the relay. Balloons will be released as the lap ends, Brooks said.

At 10 that night, the field will be dotted with lights as luminarias will light the field and participants will spell out the word HOPE in the stadium.

"The Texas Rangers, under the direction of Capt. Caver of the Department of Public Safety (DPS) in Midland have joined in the investigation,' said Howard County Sheriff Dale Walker. "We still do

not have a solid suspect lead at this time although we have talked to several acquaintances Coonce.'

Walker said that the investigation is continuing. "We are sort of in a holding pattern as to the identity. We are about 90 percent sure the body was that of Coonce but until we are 100 percent positive we will not say that to be fact.'

Effort to fund fountain project under way

Longtime local resident Charles Beil enjoys the beauty of Comanche Lake.

He thinks a fountain would enhance its appearance, and believes other people in the community will Beil is rais-



ing money topurchase a fountain from a Houston architectural firm, with plans to place it on the lake in front of the glass walls of the Dora Roberts Community Center. He has already been given a nod from the Big Spring City Council to go ahead with

the project, along with the promise that, if he raises the money to have the fountain installed, the city will pay for its maintenance and

We need to make the best of our bodies of water," Beil said. "I think this would enhance one of our beauty spots." Beil said fountains are

used in several other cities to which he travels, and they often become a focal point for the community and an attraction for tourists.

This fountain, which would float on the water's surface and be anchored to the bottom, would include a 35-foot geyser in the center of two 50-foot outward plumes. It will be lighted at night, visible from both

additional medical records have been sent to to the forensic pathologist in Lubbock in an attempt to make positive identifica-

"We are hoping that the Xrays of Coonce that we sent to Lubbock will help the pathologist positively identify of the body but until then he will be listed as a "John Doe" (unidentified) body," said Walker.

The preliminary cause of death provided by Dr. Rodney Tucay, a forensic pathologist from Lubbock, is a blunt force trauma to the head. However, Walker would not speculate as to whether the man was dead before the car was burned or whether he was unconscious and died in the car fire.

Locally the investigation is being conducted by Walker, Chief Deputy Gary Pritchett, Howard County Sheriff's Office investigator Brad Ingram and investigator Ron Allen.

inside the community center and along South Highway 87, among other areas of the park and the nearby neighborhood. The project is estimated to cost about \$10,000.

Beil pointed out that the idea is not new. In fact, plans to install a fountain in the lake began 20 years ago when about \$10,000 was left in the fund from the local railroad centennial celebra-

tion. Committee members at the time were unanimous in their support of erecting a fountain, but the idea was scrapped due to technical difficulties. Beil said technology in fountains has improved sufficiently that today, a fountain could float

on the lake and pump water for years to come. haps a statue of a Native "Some of the concerns American would be more appropriate for the area. that have surfaced about this project are, number one, evaporation, and two,

corrosion of equipment due to the quality of our water." Beil said. But he has talked to experts on both counts, and doesn't believe either will be a problem. Reducing the hours the fountain operates during the summer months can reduce evaporation; Beil said a local expert has called the water in the lake "the best in the county," predicting corrosion would be minimal.

"The fountain would be a wonderful signature of our city," said Bob Lewis, otherwise known as radio per-**Tumbleweed** sonality Smith. "People come here because it has water, trees and hills. This would go along with the scenic envi ronment we have.

Lewis was part of the committee that supported a fountain two decades ago. "I've been wanting to have this for a long time," he said.

Others, however, don't want to change anything about Comanche Lake.

"Why ruin the natural beauty of the lake and its surroundings?" said Sammy Hunnicutt, a member of the local history and archeology society. "What we have in the lake is unique; Midland nor Odessa have anything like it. It would be a travesty to corrupt the natural setting we now enjoy.

Hunnicutt said the fountain would interfere with people who want to canoe on the lake, and would call a halt to the annual float-fly event sponsored by the Big Spring Model Aircraft Assocation. Perry Schulze, a member of the aircraft association, agreed.

"This is the perfect area for this event," said Schulze, describing the annual float-fly, during which planes land on the placid water. "(A fountain) will be an obstacle in the middle of the runway.'

But Beil believes the community will get behind the fountain project. In fact, he has already had some success in fund-raising. Taxdeductible contributions for the fountain can be made out to the city of Big Spring (the fountain will be presented as a gift to the city) and sent to Beil at 502 Highland.

Identifiable contributions, such as checks that include a name and address, will be acknowledged in some way: contributors might even see their names on a plaque at the community center, or receive certificates noting their participation. Money will be returned in full if the project does not go forward, Beil said.

Texans now able to renew driver's licenses online

DALLAS (AP) — Long lines, fingerprint ink and flashbulbs are being traded for DSL, mouse clicks and dial-up connections from home.

Texans now have the option of renewing their driver's licenses online.

George Blackman of University Park, after waiting in line in downtown Dallas to get his license renewed. "I had no idea or I would have jumped on it. I sure wouldn't have driven all the way down here if I didn't have to."

Gov. Rick Perry unveiled the online license renewals Web site this week to help relieve notoriously long lines and hefty office workloads, said Department of Public Safety online project manager Jim Templeton.

"Our target is 41 percent of renewals going through the Internet, by telephone or mail," Templeton said. "We do about 300,000 renewals every year and right now, about 80,000 are done through the mail. We'd like to get close to 130,000 to 140,000 of the folks who renew to do it by an alternative method. That will take that many out of the office that month."

Templeton said 235 motorists renewed their licenses online Monday, followed by 1,009 on Tuesday.

Some motorists still are tentative about the department's newest feature, also available in Spanish, even in the face of lengthy waits in person.



tion).
Traditional treatments are geared towards prescribing medications that improve the quality of sleep and reduce pain since the chemicals in our brains that control these functions are at abnormal levels in patients who suffer from these syndromes.



Gun-control stance generates distortions

robably no subject generates more lies and deliberate distortions of the facts than gun control.

It's easy to understand, once you

comprehend that the motivation is to disarm the common citizens of the United States. The talk might be about crime or safety or children, but the goal is to

zens. **Thomas Jefferson** explained that desire when he said people always fall into one of two categories, no matter what the age or what they call themselves. There are those who trust and cherish the people and those who hate and fear the people.

It is the elitists, who hate and fear the common people, who are behind the gun-control movement. Now let's look at some facts compared with lies.

Most Americans have been brainwashed into believing that we're the most violent and crime-ridden people on Earth. Not so. In fact, a new survey involving 34,000 people in 17 industrialized countries published by the Dutch Ministry of Justice shows the opposite. You can be sure America's anti-gun news media will not give this study much publicity.

The nations that report the highest percentage of crime victims are indeed those that have virtually banned private gun ownership. In descending order, they are Australia, England and Wales, Scotland, Finland, Northern Ireland, France and the Netherlands. The United States ranks

eighth out of 17. As legitimate scholars have shown time and again, there is no correlation between gun ownership and crime except often an inverse one — the fewer private guns, the more crime.

As for gun safety, the disarmers have grossly exaggerated that. The facts are that the National Safety Council has shown that in 1998, accidental firearm deaths for children from birth to 4 years old was 30; for children 5 to 14, there were 80 deaths. Accidental firearm deaths are at the bottom of the list of children's fatalities. The obvious answer is safety instruction, but you will notice that most of the guncontrol crowd opposed gunsafety instruction. Ask yourself why they do that.

As for those numbers they cite, so many kids killed every day by guns, they get those by counting everybody 19 and under as a "child" and by including accidents, suicides and crimes. Gang-bangers who shoot each other are "children who are victims of guns.'

Another huge lie is that they claim to be politically

powerful. No, they are the same elitists who have a lot of left-wing money from foundations, but if you will check the last presidential election, you will see that the National Rifle Association kicked their rear ends. No less an expert than Bill Clinton blamed Al Gore's defeat on

the NRA. He should have said America's gun owners. Many a Democrat in states like West Virginia, Tennessee and other rural areas would rather keep their firearms than their Democratic voting records.

The NRA, so slandered by the elitist gun-control crowd, is, in fact, the nation's premier gun-owners' organization. It was founded by a group of National Guardsmen to promote marksmanship and over the years has been praised by presidents and generals alike.

It is pro-law and order, pro-police, pro-gun safety and pro-responsible gun ownership. Now 4 million strong, I can most heartily recommend it as an organization to join if you are concerned about retaining America's traditional freedom to keep and bear arms.

Years ago, when Florida's right-to-carry law was only a bill ir. the Legislature, some of my journalistic colleagues were practically hysterical: Why, if you let people carry firearms, there will be shootouts on every street corner and in the supermarket checkout lines.

Having grown up with people who carried firearms without the government's permission, I was genuinely mystified. I had to wonder if they lived in total isolation. 



Fonda would have been tried for treason

ane Fonda has been honored by the Film Society of Lincoln Center in New York City. Why should this matter to most of us? Isn't it simply

the public eye, whether through statement, event or award, she strikes a dissonant chord among many Americans, especially those who fought in Vietnam.

She was more than an anti-war activist. Dissent is a First Amendment right, but Fonda crossed the line between dissent and treason when she made her

infamous trip to North Vietnam in August 1972. She met with POWs and encouraged them to cooperate with their captors. She visited a North Vietnamese anti-aircraft battery. donned a helmet, and cheered as the NVA soldiers fired at U.S. aircraft. These were acts for which she paid no price. There was no prosecution, no penalty. So her public appearances evoke responses from pain to hatred, but also misguided support from people who opposed the war or believe she was merely exercising a constitutional right of free speech.

Here are the facts. The Constitution is clear: "Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort.

In the summer of 1972. Jane Fonda paid a twoweek visit to North Vietnam, against whom U.S. forces were fighting. On Aug. 22, 1972, on a

broadcast from Radio Hanoi she said this to the American troops, describing her experience in North Vietnam: "This is Jane Fonda. ...

I've had the opportunity to visit a great many places and speak to a large number of people from all walks of life. . "I cherish the memory of the blushing militia girls . .

. who are so gentle and poetic . . . but who, when American planes are bombing their city, become such good fighters. "It was on the road back from Nam Dinh, where I

had witnessed the systematic destruction of civilian targets - schools, hospitals, pagodas, the factories, houses and the dike sys-"As I left the United

States two weeks ago, Nixon was again telling the American people that he was winding down the war, but in the rubble-strewn streets of Nam Dinh, his words echoed with sinister (words indistinct) of a true killer. . . .


"Nixon will never be able to break the spirit of these people; he'll never be able to turn Vietnam, north and south, into a neo-colony of the United States by bombing, by invading, by attacking in any way. . . . Every bomb that is dropped only strengthens their determination to resist.

"But now, despite the bombs, despite the crimes being created — being committed against them by Richard Nixon, these people own their own land, build their own schools...

"I don't think that the people of Vietnam are about to compromise in any way, shape or form about the freedom and independence of their country, and I think Richard Nixon would do well to read Vietnamese history, particularly their poetry, and particularly the poetry written by Ho Chi Minh.'

Imagine such a broadcast coming from an American citizen in Berlin or Tokyo during World War II. A trial for treason would have been certain.



Hampton shut out the team he helped lead to the Subway Series, pitching the Colorado Rockies past the Mets 6-0 Wednesday night at Coors Field.

"It was an emotional game," Hampton admitted. 'It's tough facing the team that you went to the World Series with last year."

Hampton, MVP of the NLCS in October, became a free agent after the season and signed a \$121 million, eight-year contract with Colorado.

"It was my decision to come here. The Mets did everything they could. It was my choice," he said.

Hampton (5-0) worked around seven hits and three walks. He struck out five and was backed by four double plays.

"I was a little hyped up early, but I was able to make a big pitch here and there to get me out of a couple of jams. And the defense picked me up and made some great plays behind me," he said.

Toms, who won in New Orleans last week by playing the final 36 holes in 17 under par, walked away in disbelief.

The Byron Nelson Classic usually gets one of the strongest fields

among regular PGA Tour events because of its namesake. It usually gets a ton of attention because of Woods.

Such was the case in 1997 when Woods became the youngest Masters champion by shattering records at Augusta National, then took four weeks off and returned to competitive golf at the Nelson
