**Alon's acquisition of Southwest Convenience Stores complete**

Alon USA has announced completion of its acquisition of Southwest Convenience Stores (SCS) and its 7-Eleven stores in the West

Texas region.

"This acquisition symbolizes a new phase of growth for SCS and we are excited about the possibilities ahead," said Jeff Morris, Alon USA president and chief executive officer.

The acquisition had been announced earlier this year and was finalized this week.

Alon USA was formed in August 2000 when Alon Israel Oil Company Ltd. purchased Fina Oil and Chemical's U.S. fuels mar-

keting and refining assets. In the purchase, Alon USA acquired Fina's 34.4 percent interest in SCS. Alon USA now becomes 100 percent owner of SCS and its 174 licensed 7-Eleven convenience stores.

SCS is the largest 7-Eleven licensee in the United States, with stores located in Big Spring, Wichita Falls, Midland, Odessa, El Paso and Albuquerque, N.M. The company was formed in 1993 with the pur-

chase of 152 stores from the Southland Corporation by Permian Basin Investments Inc., owned by Don and Jack Wood of Odessa.

"I am proud of the performance and growth of SCS and am confident the future will be bright," said Don Wood, president of SCS.

Bob Jenkins, executive director of licensing for 7-Eleven Inc., said, "We have valued our association with Don Wood and Southwest Convenience Stores and

look forward to the continued growth of the 7-Eleven brand in West Texas and New Mexico under Alon USA."

Alon Israel purchased Atofina Petrochemicals Inc.'s downstream business, including its domestic fuels marketing business, pipelines, terminals and the Big Spring refinery. Alon USA's marketing network includes 1,600 Fina branded units owned and operated by Fina distributors.

**Texas Rangers join deputies in homicide investigation here**

An investigation into the identity of the charred body of a man found in a car south of County Road 34 and County Road 669 early Friday morning continues with other

peace officers joining in.

The burned car was registered to 64-year-old Bob Counce of Midland. Investigators believe the body may be that of Counce, who has not been seen by relatives or friends in the past several days.

"The Texas Rangers, under the direction of Capt. Barry Caver of the Department of Public Safety (DPS) in Midland have joined in the investigation," said Howard County Sheriff Dale Walker. "We still do

not have a solid suspect lead at this time although we have talked to several acquaintances of Mr. Counce."

Walker said that the investigation is continuing. "We are sort of in a holding pattern as to the identity. We are about 90 percent sure the body was that of Counce but until we are 100 percent positive we will not say that to be fact."

**Relay**

*Community to take up battle against cancer in earnest this weekend*

Whether its rocking, cheering or walking, everyone can make a difference at the seventh annual Relay for Life event at Blankenship Field on Friday and Saturday.

"Cancer can make someone feel completely hopeless," said publicity chairperson Lisa Brooks. "Everyone can do something to help fight cancer whether it is walking in the Relay for Life event or working on a committee to help raise funds."

The American Cancer Society-sponsored event, held at Blankenship Field on the Big Spring High School campus, kicks off at 4 p.m. with registration of teams.

This year, 67 teams are expected to walk and all slots are filled for the rocking chair team that is back for another year, Brooks said.

"The rocking chair team was instituted three or four years ago at our local relay," she said. "Elrods Furniture brings out several rocking chairs. The team also collects money."

All tents, tarps and teepees will be pitched by 6:30 p.m. Friday. Currently, there are only 11 spaces left on the field for those wishing to camp out, Brooks said.

The survivor's lap is scheduled for 7 p.m. with 160 to 180 survivors expected to participate in the first lap of the relay. Balloons will be released as the lap ends, Brooks said.

At 10 that night, the field will be dotted with lights as luminarias will light the field and participants will spell out the word HOPE in the stadium.

"It is a huge event," Brooks said. "The luminarias are in memory of those we have lost to cancer and in honor of those fighting cancer and those who have won against the disease."

Luminarias are on sale for any monetary donation and can be purchased until the event begins.

**Effort to fund fountain project under way**

Longtime local resident Charles Beil enjoys the beauty of Comanche Lake. He thinks a fountain would enhance its appearance, and believes other people in the community will agree.

Beil is raising money to purchase a fountain from a Houston architectural firm, with plans to place it on the lake in front of the glass walls of the Dora Roberts Community Center. He has already been given a nod from the Big Spring City Council to go ahead with

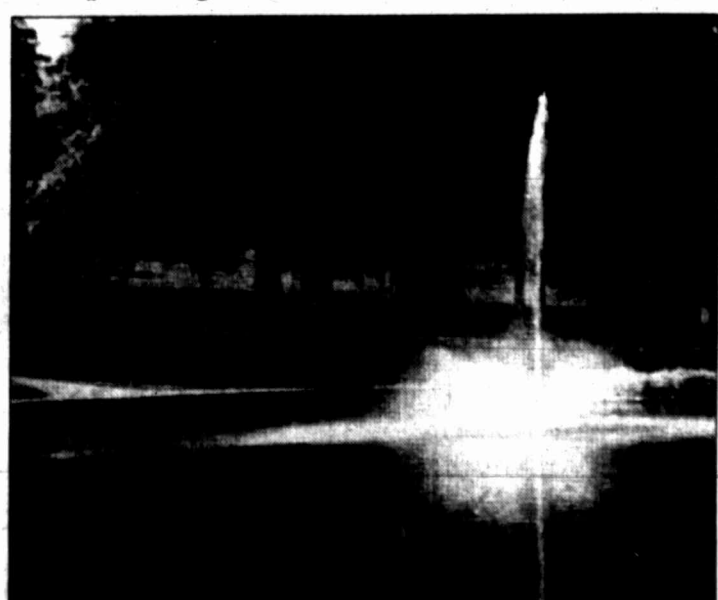
the project, along with the promise that, if he raises the money to have the fountain installed, the city will pay for its maintenance and utilities.

"We need to make the best of our bodies of water," Beil said. "I think this would enhance one of our beauty spots."

Beil said fountains are used in several other cities to which he travels, and they often become a focal point for the community and an attraction for tourists.

This fountain, which would float on the water's surface and be anchored to the bottom, would include a 35-foot geyser in the center of two 50-foot outward plumes. It will be lit at night, visible from both

additional medical records have been sent to the forensic pathologist in Lubbock in an attempt to make positive identification.

"We are hoping that the X-rays of Coonce that we sent to Lubbock will help the pathologist positively identify of the body but until then he will be listed as a "John Doe" (unidentified) body," said Walker.

The preliminary cause of death provided by Dr. Rodney Tucay, a forensic pathologist from Lubbock, is a blunt force trauma to the head. However, Walker would not speculate as to whether the man was dead before the car was burned or whether he was unconscious and died in the car fire.

Locally the investigation is being conducted by Walker, Chief Deputy Gary Pritchett, Howard County Sheriff's Office investigator Brad Ingram and investigator Ron Allen.

inside the community center and along South Highway 87, among other areas of the park and the nearby neighborhood. The project is estimated to cost about \$10,000.

Beil pointed out that the idea is not new. In fact, plans to install a fountain in the lake began 20 years ago when about \$10,000 was left in the fund from the local railroad centennial celebra-

tion. Committee members at the time were unanimous in their support of erecting a fountain, but the idea was scrapped due to technical difficulties. Beil said technology in fountains has improved sufficiently that today, a fountain could float on the lake and pump water for years to come.

"Some of the concerns that have surfaced about this project are, number one, evaporation, and two, corrosion of equipment due to the quality of our water," Beil said. But he has talked to experts on both counts, and doesn't believe either will be a problem. Reducing the hours the fountain operates during the summer months can reduce evaporation; Beil said a local expert has called the water in the lake "the best in the county," predicting corrosion would be minimal.

"The fountain would be a wonderful signature of our city," said Bob Lewis, otherwise known as radio personality Tumbleweed Smith. "People come here because it has water, trees and hills. This would go along with the scenic environment we have."

Lewis was part of the committee that supported a fountain two decades ago. "I've been wanting to have this for a long time," he said.

Others, however, don't want to change anything about Comanche Lake.

"Why ruin the natural beauty of the lake and its surroundings?" said Sammy Hunnicutt, a member of the local history and archeology society. "What we have in the lake is unique; Midland nor Odessa have anything like it. It would be a travesty to corrupt the natural setting we now enjoy."

Hunnicutt said the fountain would interfere with people who want to canoe on the lake, and would call a halt to the annual float-fly event sponsored by the Big Spring Model Aircraft Association. Perry Schulze, a member of the aircraft association, agreed.

"This is the perfect area for this event," said Schulze, describing the annual float-fly, during which planes land on the placid water. "(A fountain) will be an obstacle in the middle of the runway."

But Beil believes the community will get behind the fountain project. In fact, he has already had some success in fund-raising. Tax-deductible contributions for the fountain can be made out to the city of Big Spring (the fountain will be presented as a gift to the city) and sent to Beil at 502 Highland.

Identifiable contributions, such as checks that include a name and address, will be acknowledged in some way; contributors might even see their names on a plaque at the community center, or receive certificates noting their participation. Money will be returned in full if the project does not go forward, Beil said.

As for the lake, Beil said a fountain should improve it in more ways than one. Aeration from the pumps will put more oxygen into the water, supporting aquatic life such as plants and fish, he said.

But Hunnicutt said any project at the lake or in the spring area needs to honor its history.

"There is at least 12,000 years of human occupation

around the historic spring," he said, suggesting that perhaps a statue of a Native American would be more appropriate for the area.

Beil hopes to have much of the money for the fountain collected by May 22, when he is scheduled to go before the Big Spring City Council again. Until then, he says he will keep asking community members to support the project.

"This is something that's being done in so many other communities, not only in big cities, but also by our neighbors (Midland and Odessa)," he said. "I know it can work here."

own the microwave tower," said Moore. "That of course means that until the litigation is settled the folks in Big Spring and other cities that receive those stations will continue to do so."

Moore said that the residents of Big Spring responded in great numbers to protest against Cox Communications dropping the stations but he said the move was a result of the tower being condemned. Several hundred local residents had signed petitions in protest of losing the two stations.

Moore said Cox Communications is continuing to seek an alternate carrier in case the litigation fails.

## Feeling lazy, constantly fatigued? You might want to visit your doctor

Many of us who work, run a household and raise kids are familiar with not being able to concentrate, having chronic CRS (Can't Remember 'Something'), not getting enough sleep and having aches and pains in joints and muscles that we often think are due to stress, age or overwork.

Sometimes I think if I could just sleep uninterrupted for about 10 to 12 hours I would be able to leap tall buildings in a single bound. As it turns out I wasn't far from the truth. According to the Chronic Fatigue and Immune Dysfunction Syndrome (CFIDS) Association, if you have one or all of these symptoms you may be suffering from Chronic Fatigue and Immune Dysfunction Syndrome or Fibromyalgia Syndrome. Other conditions that overlap with these illnesses are Gulf War syndrome and multiple chemical sensitivities.

Many patients have reportedly been denied disability insurance benefits because doctors and

employers believe they are lazy or have a mental illness rather than a serious physical condition. However, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, CFS is a syndrome characterized by fatigue that is medically unexplained; has come on suddenly; has lasted for at least six months; is not because of exercise or physical activity; is not relieved very well by rest; and causes the patient to not be able to work or perform normal daily activities.

The effects of the condition varies leaving some bedridden and others able to work only part-time and to perform a limited amount of daily tasks.

Diagnosis must include fatigue accompanied by four or more of the following symptoms; impaired memory or concentration; sore throat, tender neck or armpit lymph nodes; muscle pain; headaches that are different what you're used to having, sleep disturbance (not sleeping soundly and waking up often during the night), not being able to recover from physical exertion (exercise) within 24 hours; and joint pain without swelling or redness.

These illnesses effect as many as 800,000 people of all races, ages and socioeconomic groups nationwide and effects more women than men.

The cause of

CFIDS/Fibromyalgia/Gulf War syndrome is not known, but it often triggered by an infection (viral or bacterial), an automobile accident or the development of another disorder such as rheumatoid arthritis, lupus or hypothyroidism (low thyroid function).

Traditional treatments are geared towards prescribing medications that improve the quality of sleep and reduce pain since the chemicals in our brains that control these functions are at abnormal levels in patients who suffer from these syndromes.

If you or anyone you know suffers from any of these symptoms it may not be because they are lazy or mentally ill, there may be an actual medical problem that they need to see their doctor about.

In recognition of International Awareness Day for persons suffering from Chronic Fatigue Syndrome/Fibromyalgia Syndrome a group called West Texas Living with Chronic Fatigue/Fibromyalgia Syndrome will host a free health seminar in Midland on Saturday from 1:30-3:30 p.m., at the Golf Course Road Church of Christ.

This seminar is free and open to anyone regardless of their medical condition.

## Texans now able to renew driver's licenses online

DALLAS (AP) — Long lines, fingerprint ink and flashbulbs are being traded for DSL, mouse clicks and dial-up connections from home.

Texans now have the option of renewing their driver's licenses online. "That's great," said George Blackman, of University Park, after waiting in line in downtown Dallas to get his license renewed. "I had no idea or I would have jumped on it. I sure wouldn't have driven all the way down here if I didn't have to."

Gov. Rick Perry unveiled the online license renewals Web site this week to help relieve notoriously long lines and hefty office workloads, said Department of Public Safety online project manager Jim Templeton.

"Our target is 41 percent of renewals going through the Internet, by telephone or mail," Templeton said. "We do about 300,000 renewals every year and right now, about 80,000 are done through the mail. We'd like to get close to 130,000 to 140,000 of the folks who renew to do it by an alternative method. That will take that many out of the office that month."

Templeton said 235 motorists renewed their licenses online Monday, followed by 1,009 on Tuesday.

Some motorists still are tentative about the department's newest feature, also available in Spanish, even in the face of lengthy waits in person.

"I don't think I would do it," said 30-year-old Michael Hall of DeSoto, while waiting to renew his license. "I don't want to give out my Social Security number and information like that online. I don't know who I'd be giving it to. I would just rather come up here."

Templeton said the DPS had taken several steps to lessen the danger of fraud, identity theft or hacking. Drivers are asked to provide only the last four digits of their Social Security numbers, and credit card numbers are protected by encryption technology.

A \$1 online service fee is added to the cost of the license.

# Gun-control stance generates distortions

Probably no subject generates more lies and deliberate distortions of the facts than gun control.

It's easy to understand, once you comprehend that the motivation is to disarm the common citizens of the United States. The talk might be about crime or safety or children, but the goal is to disarm the common citizens.

Thomas Jefferson explained that desire when he said people always fall into one of two categories, no matter what the age or what they call themselves. There are those who trust and cherish the people and those who hate and fear the people.

It is the elitists, who hate and fear the common people, who are behind the gun-control movement. Now let's look at some facts compared with lies.

Most Americans have been brainwashed into believing that we're the most violent and crime-ridden people on Earth. Not so. In fact, a new survey involving 34,000 people in 17 industrialized countries published by the Dutch Ministry of Justice shows the opposite. You can be sure America's anti-gun news media will not give this study much publicity.

The nations that report the highest percentage of crime victims are indeed those that have virtually banned private gun ownership. In descending order, they are Australia, England and Wales, Scotland, Finland, Northern Ireland, France and the Netherlands.

The United States ranks eighth out of 17. As legitimate scholars have shown time and again, there is no correlation between gun ownership and crime except often an inverse one — the fewer private guns, the more crime.

As for gun safety, the disarmers have grossly exaggerated that. The facts are that the National Safety Council has shown that in 1998, accidental firearm deaths for children from birth to 4 years old was 30; for children 5 to 14, there were 80 deaths. Accidental firearm deaths are at the bottom of the list of children's fatalities. The obvious answer is safety instruction, but you will notice that most of the gun-control crowd opposed gun-safety instruction. Ask yourself why they do that.

As for those numbers they cite, so many kids killed every day by guns, they get those by counting everybody 19 and under as a "child" and by including accidents, suicides and crimes. Gang-bangers who shoot each other are "children who are victims of guns."

Another huge lie is that they claim to be politically

powerful. No, they are the same elitists who have a lot of left-wing money from foundations, but if you will check the last presidential election, you will see that the National Rifle Association kicked their rear ends. No less an expert than Bill Clinton blamed Al Gore's defeat on the NRA.

He should have said America's gun owners. Many a Democrat in states like West Virginia, Tennessee and other rural areas would rather keep their firearms than their Democratic voting records. The NRA, so slandered by the elitist gun-control crowd, is, in fact, the nation's premier gun-owners' organization. It was founded by a group of National Guardsmen to promote marksmanship and over the years has been praised by presidents and generals alike.

It is pro-law and order, pro-police, pro-gun safety and pro-responsible gun ownership. Now 4 million strong, I can most heartily recommend it as an organization to join if you are concerned about retaining America's traditional freedom to keep and bear arms.

Our Founding Fathers were proud of the fact that Americans were trusted with arms because they knew that only when people are armed could they truly be thought of as free citizens.

And that's where the circle closes. Those who want to deprive you of your right to keep and bear arms are

intending to deprive you of your freedom, period. Like the criminals their policies encourage, these elitists know that it is always best to disarm victims before you enslave them. There are numerous examples in the 20th century of this practice.

I've seen this elitist fear among my own colleagues. Years ago, when Florida's right-to-carry law was only a bill in the Legislature, some of my journalistic colleagues were practically hysterical. Why, if you let people carry firearms, there will be shootouts on every street corner and in the supermarket checkout lines.

Having grown up with people who carried firearms without the government's permission, I was genuinely mystified. I had to wonder if they lived in total isolation. Do they not know the American people? Do they really think their fellow citizens are stupid and crazy? Unfortunately, for many elitists, the answers are yes.

Of course, the facts proved them wrong. Florida has had a right-to-carry law for years now, and the crime rate has gone down. People wielding their own firearms have saved many innocent lives.

In some cases, they have done so by also saving the taxpayers the expense of arrest, trial and imprisonment.

Defend your rights like a pit bull. Otherwise, you'll lose them.



# Fonda would have been tried for treason

Jane Fonda has been honored by the Film Society of Lincoln Center in New York City. Why should this matter to most of us? Isn't it simply another actress being honored with another award?

Jane Fonda is different. Her name conjures up the worst of a difficult era, and when she comes again into the public eye, whether through statement, event or award, she strikes a dissonant chord among many Americans, especially those who fought in Vietnam.

She was more than an anti-war activist. Dissent is a First Amendment right, but Fonda crossed the line between dissent and treason when she made her

infamous trip to North Vietnam in August 1972. She met with POWs and encouraged them to cooperate with their captors. She visited a North Vietnamese anti-aircraft battery, donned a helmet, and cheered as the NVA soldiers fired at U.S. aircraft. These were acts for which she paid no price. There was no prosecution, no penalty. So her public appearances evoke responses from pain to hatred, but also misguided support from people who opposed the war or believe she was merely exercising a constitutional right of free speech.

Here are the facts. The Constitution is clear: "Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort." In the summer of 1972, Jane Fonda paid a two-week visit to North Vietnam, against whom U.S. forces were fighting. On Aug. 22, 1972, on a

broadcast from Radio Hanoi she said this to the American troops, describing her experience in North Vietnam:

"This is Jane Fonda. ... I've had the opportunity to visit a great many places and speak to a large number of people from all walks of life. ...

"I cherish the memory of the blushing militia girls ... who are so gentle and poetic ... but who, when American planes are bombing their city, become such good fighters. ...

"It was on the road back from Nam Dinh, where I had witnessed the systematic destruction of civilian targets — schools, hospitals, pagodas, the factories, houses and the dike system. ...

"As I left the United States two weeks ago, Nixon was again telling the American people that he was winding down the war, but in the rubble-strewn streets of Nam Dinh, his words echoed with sinister (words indistinct) of a true killer. ...

"Nixon will never be able to break the spirit of these people; he'll never be able to turn Vietnam, north and south, into a neo-colony of the United States by bombing, by invading, by attacking in any way. ... Every bomb that is dropped only strengthens their determination to resist. ...

"But now, despite the bombs, despite the crimes being created — being committed against them by Richard Nixon, these people own their own land, build their own schools. ...

"I don't think that the people of Vietnam are about to compromise in any way, shape or form about the freedom and independence of their country, and I think Richard Nixon would do well to read Vietnamese history, particularly their poetry, and particularly the poetry written by Ho Chi Minh."

Imagine such a broadcast coming from an American citizen in Berlin or Tokyo during World War II. A trial for treason would have been certain.

## Hampton handles Mets with ease in subway series, 6-0 shutout

The New York Mets couldn't keep Mike Hampton. They couldn't hit him, either.

Hampton shut out the team he helped lead to the Subway Series, pitching the Colorado Rockies past the Mets 6-0 Wednesday night at Coors Field.

"It was an emotional game," Hampton admitted. "It's tough facing the team that you went to the World Series with last year."

Hampton, MVP of the NLCS in October, became a free agent after the season and signed a \$121 million, eight-year contract with Colorado.

"It was my decision to come here. The Mets did everything they could. It was my choice," he said.

Hampton (5-0) worked around seven hits and three walks. He struck out five and was backed by four double plays.

"I was a little hyped up early, but I was able to make a big pitch here and there to get me out of a couple of jams. And the defense picked me up and made some great plays behind me," he said.

In other NL games, Los Angeles beat Florida 3-2, Houston downed Philadelphia 7-6, Chicago defeated Milwaukee 6-3, St. Louis beat Pittsburgh 6-2,

Arizona topped Cincinnati 5-2, Atlanta blanked 3-0, and Montreal beat San Francisco 8-0.

Hampton pitched his eighth career shutout. Dating back to his days with Houston, he is 5-0 in his last eight starts against the Mets, including three shutouts.

Hampton also contributed a pair of hits, one of them an RBI infield single. His other single came ahead of Todd Walker's three-run homer off Rick Reed in the seventh.

#### Braves 3, Padres 0

John Burkett pitched seven scoreless innings and Atlanta ended San Diego's season-best five-game winning streak.

Padres outfielder Tony Gwynn was forced to leave with cramping in his right hamstring one day after coming off the disabled list. Gwynn, who turned 41 on Wednesday, had missed 15 games because of a strained right hamstring. He'll be re-evaluated Thursday.

Rickey Henderson doubled and singled to extend his hitting streak to 13 games, one short of his career high set in 1980.

#### Dodgers 3, Marlins 2

Chan Ho Park pitched seven shutout innings and

Mark Grudzielanek homered for the second straight night to lead Los Angeles over Florida.

Park, who made his big league debut in 1994, passed the 1,000-inning mark in the majors.

Shawn Green was thrown out at the plate trying for the Dodgers' first inside-the-park home run since Mitch Webster did it on June 21, 1994. The crowd of 27,301 at Dodger Stadium gave Green a standing ovation.

Philadelphia reliever Ricky Bottalico threw away a bunt in the bottom of the ninth inning, giving Houston the winning run at Enron Field.

Bottalico walked two batters to start the ninth. Chris Truby bunted, and Bottalico made a wild throw past third baseman Scott Rolen. The Phillies rallied in the ninth against Billy Wagner to tie it at 6. With two outs, Pat Burrell hit an RBI double off the glove of leaping right fielder Moises Alou.

## Iverson's 54 tops team record, knots playoff series, 1-1

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Wilt Chamberlain and Julius Erving never had a night in the playoffs for the 76ers like the one Allen Iverson had against Toronto.

Iverson scored a team playoff-record 54 points, leading Philadelphia to a 97-92 victory over the Toronto Raptors in Game 3 of the Eastern Conference semifinals Wednesday night.

The best-of-seven series, tied 1-1, resumes Friday night in Toronto.

"I've never seen anything like that, certainly not in a playoff atmosphere," Aaron McKie said. "How many times are you going to see a 6-foot guy dominate a playoff game like that?"

Iverson surpassed the 50 points scored by Billy Cunningham against Milwaukee in 1970. Former Sixers star Charles Barkley once scored 56 points in the playoffs, but he did it with Phoenix. Chamberlain also had 56, but it was with the Warriors.

"The kid is an MVP. What else can you say?" Dikembe Mutombo said.

Vince Carter had 28 points and Antonio Davis added 19 for the Raptors, who built a double-digit lead in the first half.

But Iverson was the story. He scored 19 straight points for the Sixers in the fourth before George Lynch made the last point on a free throw.

Iverson hit jumpers, scored off the fast break and displayed his entire arsenal. "He was incredible," Toronto coach Lenny Wilkens said. "He made very, very difficult shots at times. There were times when we wanted to double-team, but he turned the corner."

Iverson had 36 points on 11-of-34 shooting in the opener — a 96-93 loss that cost Philadelphia home-court advantage. He promised his teammates he'd do better.

"I told a couple guys I wouldn't play like I played last game, because I didn't play smart," Iverson said. "I didn't know if I'd make the shots, but I knew I'd play smarter."

Alvin Williams tried to guard Iverson most of the

night, but was helpless. Nobody can stop Iverson when he's on a roll.

"For my man to score 54 points, it is just ridiculous on my part," Williams said.

In Wednesday night's other playoff game, San Antonio took a 3-0 lead over Dallas with a 104-90 victory.

On Thursday night, Milwaukee takes a 2-0 lead into Game 3 at Charlotte.

With the Sixers leading 89-86, Iverson hit a running jumper, got fouled and completed the three-point play, giving the Sixers a 92-86 lead with 1:16 left.

After Dell Curry nailed a 3-pointer, Iverson drilled an 18-footer to make it 94-89. Following a miss by the Raptors, Iverson got fouled, cupped his ear, implored the crowd to make more noise and screamed toward the sky. He made both free throws.

"I always feel the only person who can stop me is myself," Iverson said. "The only thing I care about is getting a win. If I shoot terrible, and we win, that's all that matters."

Iverson had 20 points in the second quarter, made just one of his first eight shots in the third and finished 21-of-39, including 3-of-5 from 3-point range.

"In the third quarter he got a little hyper, but in the fourth he was phenomenal," Sixers coach Larry Brown said.

Iverson gave the Sixers breathing room by hitting a short bank shot, then making two free throws for an 89-84 lead with 3:49 left as the sellout crowd of 20,870 at the First Union Center chanted "MVP, MVP."

The first quarter looked a lot like the first three quarters of Game 1 for the 76ers, a 96-93 loss. Toronto went on a 10-0 run midway through the first and led 31-21 after one.

Carter had 10 points in the first quarter and the Sixers couldn't find an answer until "The Answer" went on a tear.

Iverson was 8-of-11 in the second as he brought the Sixers back from a 14-point deficit. He scored 20 of Philadelphia's 28 points in the quarter, including 17 of

## Tiger back on the tour in the Byron Nelson Classic

IRVING (AP) — The first clue that Tiger Woods had returned to the PGA Tour was the helicopter that circled above the TPC at Las Colinas, right about the time he was hitting a meaningless 2-iron off the first tee in the pro-am.

Another sign was when a radio reporter approached David Toms and asked a question that surely was on everyone's mind Wednesday.

"What do you think is Tiger's favorite board game?"

Toms, who won in New Orleans last week by playing the final 36 holes in 17 under par, walked away in disbelief.

The Byron Nelson Classic usually gets one of the strongest fields

among regular PGA Tour events because of its namesake. It usually gets a ton of attention because of Woods.

Such was the case in 1997 when Woods became the youngest Masters champion by shattering records at Augusta National, then took four weeks off and returned to competitive golf at the Nelson Classic.

Four years later, not much has changed — except for his game and the expectations.

Woods is playing for the first time since another historic Masters victory, this one giving him an unprecedented sweep of the four majors. Now, even the biggest wins and the most unfathomable records

are not as surprising.

Just listen to Toms, who won for the fifth time in his career at the Compaq Classic by making up a seven-stroke deficit against Phil Mickelson in the final round.

"To win golf tournaments out there, some strange things have to happen," he said. "Unless you're maybe a Tiger, which you're just obviously better than the rest of the guys."

No one is in position to debate that.

At 25 and having spent just under five years as a pro, Woods already has won as many PGA Tour events (27) as Lee Trevino in his 25-year career, and as many majors (6).

Woods comes to the Nelson

Classic having put together a three-tournament winning streak for the third year in a row, claiming Mickelson, Vijay Singh and David Duval as his latest victims.

He also has his work cut out for him.

"I haven't played hardly at all," Woods said. That much was evident by the 2-iron that drifted 20 yards right of his target into deep rough in his pro-am round, and a few other shots that he "skanked" around the Las Colinas course.

The Nelson Classic in some ways represents the second stage of the season, as players start turning their attention to Southern Hills in Tulsa, Okla., site of the U.S. Open just four weeks away.

Bream are good on worms, crickets and small jigs.

**BOB SANDLIN:** Water fairly clear; 68-72 degrees; Black bass are good on Texas-rigged lizards, shallow running crankbaits and Bass Assassins fished over the flats and the secondary points. Crappie are fair on minnows and jigs fished in 4 to 8 feet. White bass are good on jugging spoons and spinnerbaits fished along the deep drop-off in the creek. Channel catfish are good on nightcrawlers and Murphys catfish bait fished along the banks and in the creeks.

**BRIDGEPORT:** No report available.  
**CADDIS:** Water stained; 72 degrees; 3/4" high; Black bass are good on white buzzbaits or spinnerbaits, chrome Rat-L-Traps and Sluggos in 4 feet. Channel, blue and yellow catfish are fair on trotlines baited with live perch. Bream are excellent on red wigglers and crickets in the middle of the islands. Jackfish are slow.

**CEDAR CREEK:** Water stained to murky; 68-76 degrees; Black bass are very good on soft plastics, jigs and white or chartreuse spinnerbaits. Crappie are good on minnows and jigs. White bass and hybrid striped are good on TailHummers and slabs. Catfish are fair on cut bait.

**COOPER:** Water stained; 67-71 degrees; Black bass are good on spinnerbaits, Texas-rigged worms and jigs fished along the channels, and old roadsides. Crappie are good on minnows and jigs fished in 12 to 18 feet. White bass are good on Rat-L-Traps and Mepps inline spinners fished on the main lake points. Catfish are good on bloodbait and chicken hearts fished along the creek channels.

**FAIRFIELD:** Water stained to clear; 77 to 82 degrees; Black bass are good on tube jigs and spinnerbaits fished just off the edges of the reeds early and late. Hybrid striped are good on live shad fished in the mouths of all the major creeks. Redfish are good on slab spins and shad trolling the main lake in 20 feet. Catfish are good on shad fished along the dam in 10 feet and at night around sandy points close to creek channels.

**FOK:** Water lightly stained to clear; 73-79 degrees; Black bass are fair to good on white spinnerbaits, Scum Frogs and Carolina-rigged Mad Man crawfish tubes in 1 to 10 feet in and around vegetation and stumps. Rat-L-Traps and 1/3 oz. jigging spoons in 15 to 20 feet. Catfish are good on shrimp and cut baits fished along rocky shorelines in the creeks in 10 to 12 feet.

White bass are good on white RoadRunners and small shad fished early. Catfish are good on prepared baits, nightcrawlers and shrimp fished in the coves and backs of the creeks.

**LEWISVILLE:** No report available.  
**MARTIN CREEK:** Water clear; 76 degrees; Black bass are good on buzzbaits, Pop Rs and Carolina-rigged blue fleck french fries in 10 feet. Crappie are good at night on minnows and jigs under the bridge in 10-12 feet. Channel and blue catfish are good on nightcrawlers in 13 feet. Yellow catfish are good on bream in 15 feet. Bream are good on worms and crickets in 4 feet (on the beds).

**MONTICELLO:** No report available.  
**MURVAUJ:** Water stained; 69-72 degrees; Black bass are good on white/chartreuse or blue/white buzzbaits and finesse baits in 1 to 3 feet. Crappie are fair on minnows over brushpiles in 8-10 feet. Catfish are good on trotlines baited with minnows, nightcrawlers and perch set in 2 to 6 feet. Bream are good on crickets fished in the backs of the coves in 4 to 6 feet.

**PALESTINE:** Water fairly clear; 68-70 degrees; Black bass are good on spinnerbaits and topwaters fished early and late in midday and light Carolina-rigged fries. White bass and hybrid striped are good on Rat-L-Traps and TailHummers. Crappie are slow on minnows and jigs fished over brushpiles in 14 to 18 feet. Catfish are good on chicken livers fished in the shallows.

**RAY HUBBARD:** Water lightly stained; 68-70 degrees; Black bass are good on spinnerbaits and Carolina-rigged lizards or worms in 6 to 12 feet. Crappie are fair on minnows and jigs in 8 to 10 feet. White bass are fair on slabs and minnows. Hybrid striped are fair to good on slabs and white stinger jigs in 20 to 40 feet. Catfish are good on prepared and cutbaits.

White bass are excellent on slabs, TailHummers and Sassy Shad in 10-20 feet off main lake points and humps (fish are schooling early and late). Hybrid striped are fair to good on slabs and live shad in 25 to 30 feet. Catfish are excellent in the mouths of creeks and close to the dam. Crappie are fair up and around the creeks in the shallows.

**TEXOMA:** Water fairly clear; 66-71 degrees; 2 low; Black bass are fair on chartreuse/white spinnerbaits and Carolina-rigged soft plastics. Crappie are good on minnows and jigs in 10 to 15 feet. White bass are fair on purple/white jigs and small RoadRunners around the Little Mineral area, boat slips and Flowing Wells in 2 to 15 feet. White and striped bass are fair to good on chartreuse glow Sassy Shad, slabs and white stinger jigs. Catfish are good on shrimp and shad gizzards.

**TYLER:** Water off color; 68-70 degrees; Black bass are fair to good on watermelon seed Carolina-rigged soft plastics and spinnerbaits. Crappie are fair on minnows and jigs around the boathouses in 10 to 15 feet. Catfish are good on nightcrawlers and minnows. Bream are good on worms and crickets in 2 to 4 feet.

**CONROE:** Water clear; 68 degrees; Black bass are good on white spinnerbaits and Rat-L-Traps in 5-15 feet. Crappie are good on minnows and jigs along the shoreline.

**Animal Mammal Moms**

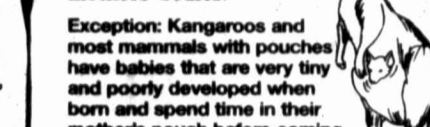

Most mammals are animals that:  
• give birth to live babies and feed them mother's milk.  
An exception: The platypus mom lays eggs. After the eggs hatch, she nurses the babies.

• have babies that can survive outside their mothers' bodies.  
Exception: Kangaroos and most mammals with pouches have babies that are very tiny and poorly developed when born and spend time in their mother's pouch before coming out on their own.

• have backbones.  
• are warm-blooded. Their body temperature is the same whatever the weather or water temperature is.  
• have hair somewhere on their body.  
• have bigger, more developed brains than other animals.  
• breathe air through their lungs.

Bats are the only mammals that fly.



**Sea mammal moms are different in that they:**

- spend all or some of the time in the water.
- have big babies and usually one at a time. The babies are especially big when you compare them with the size they will be when full grown. Their large size helps them survive.
- have very rich milk with a lot of fat. The fat helps the babies build a thick layer of blubber. The blubber protects them from the cold.



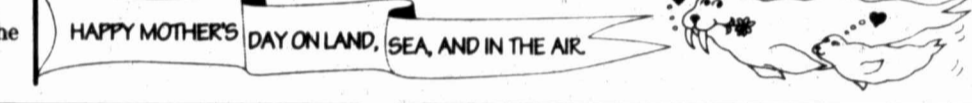

On land, seals move by humping along in a caterpillar-like motion. In the water, they often rest by floating straight up and down. Harbor seal pups are born on shore. They can swim right away, with their front flippers at their side and by moving their back flippers from side to side.

**Bottle-nosed dolphins**



Like all bottle-nosed dolphins, this mom (top) and her calf look as if they are smiling.

Bottle-nosed dolphins are smart and are the type that we usually see in shows in amusement parks and zoos. They are known to be friendly toward people. In the wild, they live in groups called pods. Some can jump as high as 16 feet.

**Manatees**



In the wild, a calf remains close to its mother for at least two years.

Manatees eat grasses and plants. They have molar teeth for grinding. The only enemy to these plant eaters is man. Many manatees are killed in boating accidents or trapped in nets.

**Walrus**



A walrus and her calf take time to bond.

Both males and females have tusks that keep growing all their lives. They spend about 75 percent of their lives in the water. They like the cold and prefer sea ice or snow-covered ice packs to land. Walrus use their whiskers to feel for food.

**Sea lions**

Sea lions are a type of seal; they get their name from their loud roar. They spend most of their time in the water but also gather in large groups called colonies on land. Pups are born with their eyes open. If a mother leaves her pup, she can find it by its call and smell.

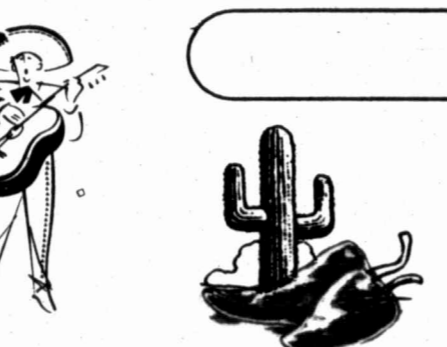

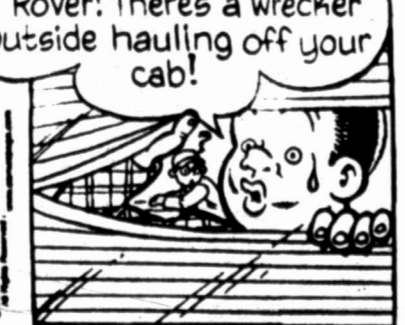
