

Traffic Toll 3, More Injured

Tragedy struck surely and quickly on Parmer County highways this week-end, leaving a traffic toll of three dead, at least five injured two automobiles demolished, two trucks partially damaged, and nine children left fatherless.

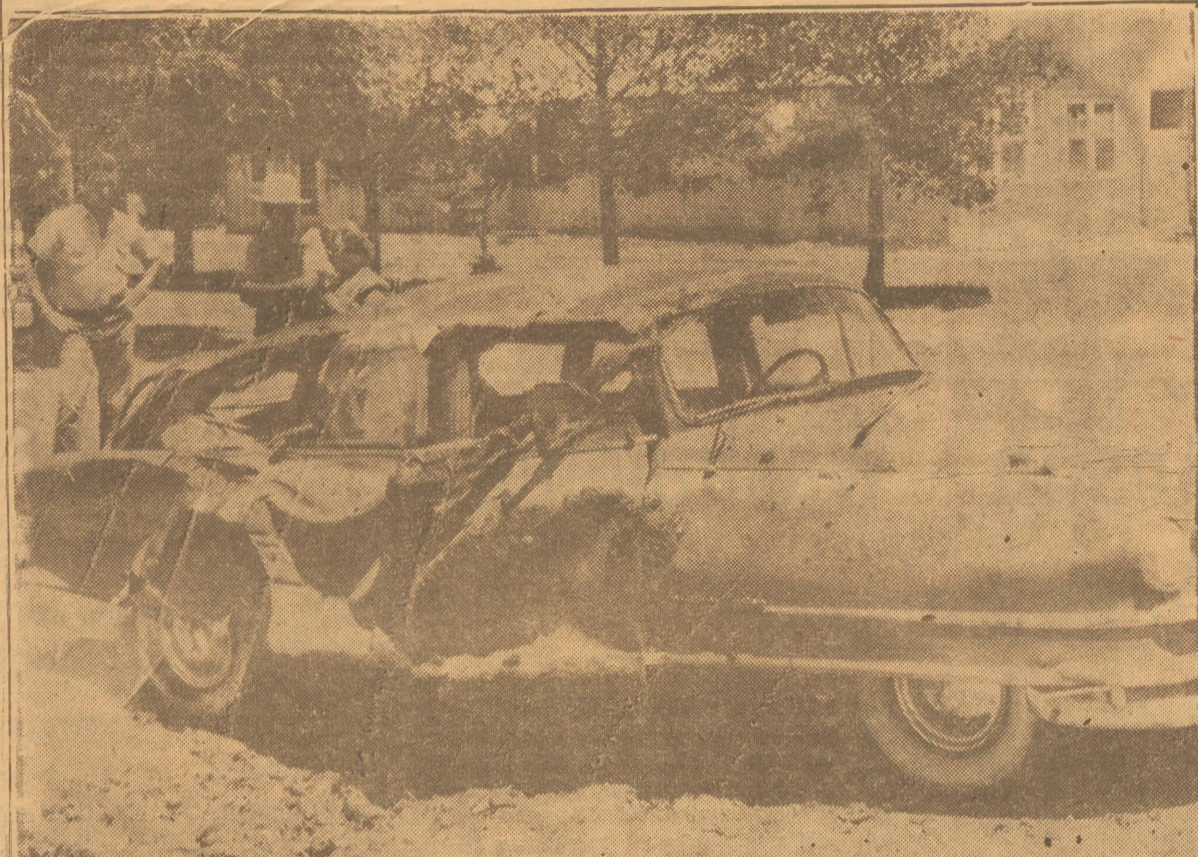
Burl Harrison Beene, 29, Friona; J. D. Johnson, 24, Friona; and Carl Davis Greeson, 39, Black; were killed Saturday night in a collision a few hundred yards west of the Black elevators. Glen Mingo, passenger in the same automobile, was hospitalized, and his condition is said to be satisfactory. Time of the collision was near 9 o'clock Saturday night.

Beene was driving eastward on Highway 60 in a new Mercury, with Johnson, Greeson and Mingo as passengers. Highway patrolmen reported that the Beene car evidently pulled out to pass a car driven by Ray Landrum and collided with a truck driven by Marvin Valentine Crow of Clovis, who escaped injury. Evidently seeing the imminent collision, Beene apparently headed for the north barrow pit, the west-bound truck striking the Mercury broadside. Investigating officers said that the car never overturned, though was as badly wrecked as most overturned cars they have seen. All bodies were thrown clear of the car.

Sheriff Charles Lovelace was at the drive-in theatre in Friona when he received the call via police radio from the highway patrol. Picking up Justice of the Peace Walter Loveless, they went to the scene immediately. Dr. Smith, who accompanied the local ambulance, stated that Greeson wasn't dead at the time he reached him, however he died en route to the Parmer County hospital.

SUNDAY COLLISION

Three women were injured Sunday noon in a collision involving an east-bound California car and a west-bound truck driven by O. C. Jones of Friona, the accident occurring just east of the Friona city limits.

Jones stated that he had unhooked from the Beene vehicle at his wrecking yard here and had driven down the highway to pull Ray Landrum out of a mudhole. After detaching from the Landrum car, he had driven on eastward to an intersection to turn around. When turning across the highway he was struck by the California '51 Nash Ambassador reportedly driven by G. A. Poe of Van Nuys, California. The Poe car overturned, finally landing in the north barrow pit, facing the highway. Two men, three women, and two children were in the vehicle, and the women were taken immediately to the local hospital for emergency treatment. Telephone conversation with Poe yesterday morning at Elk City, Oklahoma, revealed that one of the women was still in somewhat

Six people were hospitalized early tonight after a head-on auto collision just west of the Hub store.

A new '53 Ford, driven by Benjie Lou Riley, 14 years of age, was headed east, and a late model Chrysler, driven by Loyd S. Hamilton, building contractor of Tulia, was going west. The Hamiltons were going on their vacation and were pulling a trailer.

Both cars were badly demolished at their fronts, with the steering wheel of the Hamilton car driven to within 5 inches of the back of the seat.

Emergency investigation at the local hospital revealed Mrs. Hamilton to have a broken arm, lacerations of both legs and multiple bruises. Janice Louise Hamilton, 6, had internal injuries and a broken (continued on page 3 column 4)

Early Morn Fire Burns Farm House

Fire of undetermined origin gutted most of a rent house on the Hadley Reeve farm 1 mile west of Friona about 2 o'clock yesterday morning.

The house was occupied by the Virgil Evans family; and Evans discovered the blaze in time to awaken his family and save some of the household belongings. He notified Reeve who called the Friona Fire Department.

Believed to have started in a clothes closet, the fire and smoke filled most of the 5-room dwelling, virtually destroying the two north rooms. Kitchen and dining room furniture and appliances were lost, though some clothing was saved together with furniture in the south part of the house.

Fire department trucks and men stayed on the scene about two hours, pumping water from a

Schools to Commence Sept. 2nd., More Classrooms Are Provided

No Provision Made for Negro Students; Faculty Completed

Less than four weeks remains before re-opening of the Friona schools.

Superintendent Caffey together with Principals Dillie Kelley and John Parish this week completed their registration schedules, with the following dates announced:

September 2nd (Wednesday): Seniors will register at the high school at 9 a. m.

September 3rd (Thursday): Juniors to register at the high school at 9 a. m. Both seniors and juniors

will have to furnish their transportation for registration.

Faculty meeting for grade teachers will be held Thursday afternoon at 2 p. m. in the grade school. High school teachers will meet in the high school, study hall at the same time and date.

September 4th (Friday): Sophomores and Freshmen will register at the high school from 9 a. m. until 12 noon.

Grades 1 through 8 will register at the grade school at the

same time. Busses will run for the first time on the 4th.

Regular classes will commence Monday, Sept. 7th, at 8:45, continuing on schedule.

All sections of the grade school, 1st through 8th grades, will be divided alphabetically this year instead of age as has been done for the past four years.

The school administration anticipates a good year for the Friona schools, many of the former teachers are returning, new ones are being announced as they are hired; and facilities will be expanded to better care for the increased enrollment.

A public library is bound to be necessary sooner or later. Is any group still including this among its goals?

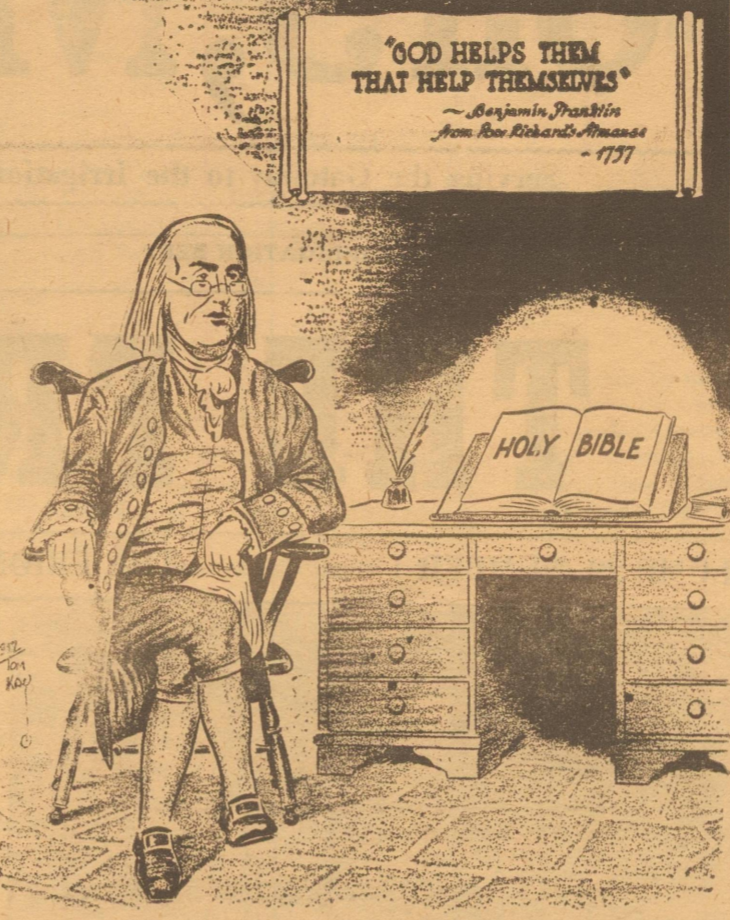

Is adequate publicity being given our county as an irrigation center conducive to successful growth of almost any crop in a diversified and even intensive farming system?

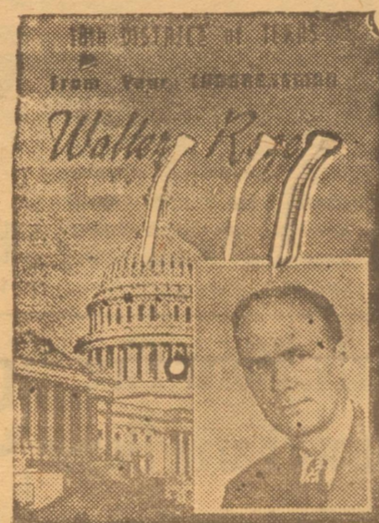
Are the new residents to the town and county being welcomed by visits or special courtesies of the merchants?

Austin - Washington Comments . . .



THE PRESIDENT'S HAT: On July 30th I presented a West Texas hat to the President. The hat came from an anonymous donor on behalf of the people of Pampa Texas, and was handed by the Chamber of Commerce there. When I took it out of the box, the famous Eisenhower smile came out in full bloom. He said, "That's just the kind I like. It is what I call a five-gallon hat. This is one that will sure get some wear." He expressed deep appreciation for the hat and his admiration for West Texas.

THE UN AND RED CHINA: Pressure will begin to mount for recognition of the Mao Chinese government to replace the Chiang government in the UN as representing China. May fear that some secret agreement was entered into binding the US to not vigorously oppose such recognition. China is a UN member. The question is—

"Which is the true government of China?" If this question is treated as procedural matter, recognition of Mao government would not be subject to veto. US Congress unanimously adopted resolution opposing recognition of Red Chinese government. England and other European countries appear to favor recognition of Mao. Basic reason behind this is that those countries need a market for their goods. China is the largest market in the world and has natural resources with which to pay for goods.

SATELLITE COMMUNISM: Communism is undoubtedly beginning to crumble in the satellite countries. Unless Russia can stop this decay and strengthen these under pinnings, the house will fall down on her. This will be the spread of communism. Unless communism can spread, it can not live. Had China been saved from communism, Russia would already be on the ropes. Recognition of Red China and trading with her will give communism the help it needs. We must continue to keep it confined until it is completely dead.

CLOSING DAYS OF CONGRESS: For the past few weeks Congress has been working at a killing speed. This pace has been detrimental to the health of many of the Members. The recent deaths of Senator Toby and Senator Willis Smith were no doubt precipitated by this pace. It is impossible to eat regularly or properly. Most of the members begin

WASHINGTON AND—"Small Business"

Often those who work for salaries or wages, or those engaged in agriculture, write this column, asking a question on this theme.

"What," they ask, "can I as an individual do to help promote small business and the free enterprise system?"

Many inquirers are in small communities. They go on to explain that their town is not keeping pace with the progress of some nearby trading center where many nationally owned concerns have retail outlets.

The problem is common to many towns, and with the need for new school capacity, and other improvements to cope with population growth, small city management is hard pressed to find ways of raising money.

In meeting their problems, all residents of these communities can take one helpful step.

That step is to patronize to the fullest extent possible the local independent businessmen. This should not be undertaken, either, from the spirit of helping the local businessmen out.

Instead, the approach should be one of self-interest. If adequate schooling and other facilities are to be maintained without prohibitive burdens on the residents of a community, it is necessary to have more enterprises to share the tax load.

Independent business establishments have long carried a heavy proportionate share of any community's revenue needs. But an increase in these establishments is only possible if local business

justifies expansion, or increase.

In addition, there is no substitute for money in circulation for local community prosperity. Some economists claim that a dollar spent locally with a locally owned concern, by the time it completes its cycle, will produce eight dollars worth of business. On the other hand, they feel that a dollar spent with a non-independent concern often results in the production of about two dollars worth of business before it leaves the community.

While this is a theory that can be debated extensively, the fact remains that just as the strength of a nation rests on the basic family unit, so does national prosperity rest on the well being of the smaller towns.

Many observers claim this. For generations, country people were considered inferior in education and ability because under a feudal system, facilities for the education of the children of the rural areas was limited.

This was changed by the development of independent trading centers through the nation which provided centers of population that could support schools, libraries, and other advantages equal to that which the big metropolitan centers could offer.

But these observers also feel that the trend is turning back to the old pattern, because growth of smaller communities is not keeping pace, due to profits of local trading being siphoned to distant financial centers.

The only way to reverse this trend, they feel, is for the public in the local communities to support their independent business establishments and thus in turn, draw more business to their communities creating more employment, more sources of support for the community.

Plans for negro school facilities in Friona have been discarded, Superintendent Dalton Caffey announced this week, after a decision of the school board at its meeting Saturday morning.

Such facilities had been discussed at various times, but at this time there seemingly is no demand for this service.

MORE CLASSROOMS

However, expanded classroom facilities are necessary and are being provided for the increased enrollment of white scholastics.

The old band hall is being renovated into two Second Grade sections, and the old cafeteria is being re-finished to accommodate another section of the Seventh Grade.

The 1st Grade will be divided into three sections this year, with an expected 85 students reporting for their first year schooling. Mrs. Ruth Brown, former teacher at Ada, Oklahoma, has been employed to supervise the additional section.

At the end of school in the 1952-53 term, approximately 700 students were attending the Friona schools. This number could be increased by 25-40 students this year, Caffey said.

Mrs. H. T. Carr, former High School English teacher, has resigned and will teach at Brownfield. Mr. John Absher has been named as her replacement; Absher has taught in the Capitol Hill schools in Oklahoma City.

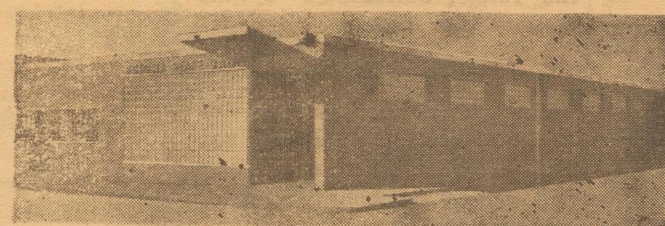

Traffic Violation Said Unduly High Locally

Corporation Judge and Justice of the Peace Walter Loveless probably is one of the more safety-conscious citizens of the area, being in position to observe the financial loss, hardships to families, and the injuries result-

ing from violations of the traffic codes and civil laws, revealed in the charges brought before his jurisdiction.

Judge Loveless verifies reports given by the Texas Highway Patrol members that the Friona area is one of the worst traffic-violation centers of some four counties.

Charges filed by the patrolmen recently included driving without license, driving without tail light, failure to yield right-of-way, speeding, improper signals, etc. Corporation charges have included some of these plus interference with fire trucks in route to fires, and numerous traffic violations.

Joe Culp and Jim Kirkwood, highway patrolmen assigned to this area, must cover a territory extending from Hereford north to Vega, east toward Canyon, south to Dimmitt, and west and southwest to the state line. As Kirkwood stated to the editor Sunday, it is impossible for them to devote full time to any one area, and maximum cooperation and law enforcement is necessary on the part of all officials to insure better traffic management. However, Kirkwood said, they would spend more time in Parmer County in the future, necessitated by the accident rate here.

RADIO INSTALLED

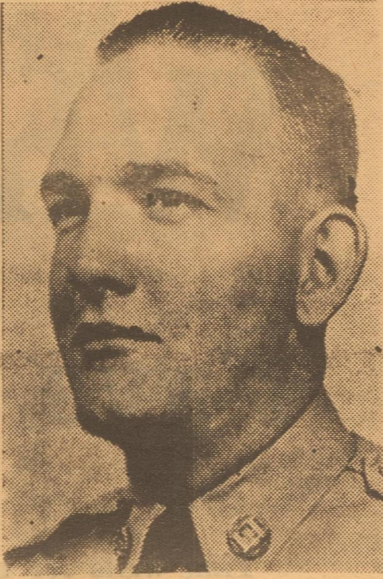
The patrol car belonging to J. W. Roberts, Friona was last week installed with a two-way radio system, enabling local radio contact with other law enforcement bodies in a 30 to 40 mile radius. Sheriff Charles Lovelace installed the system, permitting a low over-all cost of about \$300, paid by the county. Lovelace has radios in his own car, at his home, and at the office, and these contacts plus the highway patrol units and county units at Hereford enable fast contact by Roberts at all times.

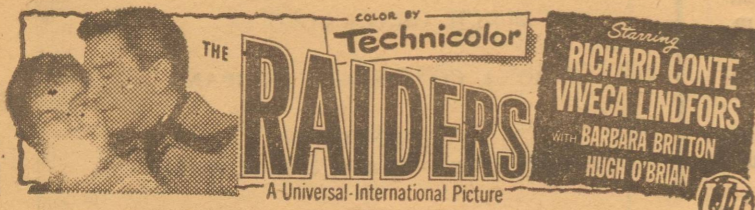

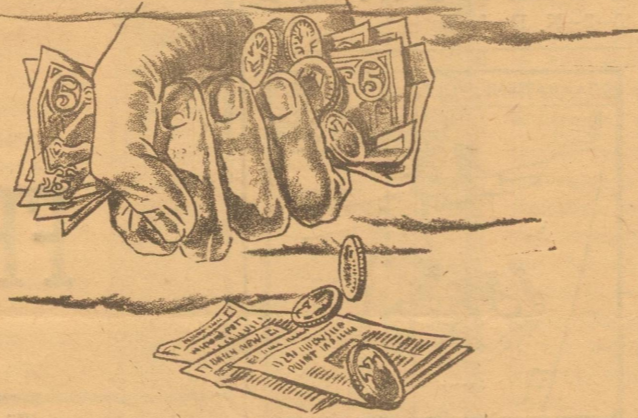
