### Bovina Schools Opening Aug. 31

All registration for the Bovina schools will be conducted Monday morning, August 31st, Supr. Willoughby has announced.

Busses will run that morning, returning students at noon.

First classes will be held Tuesday, with school all day and with the cafeteria serving at noon.

Increased enrollment is expected at Bovina, with the high school expected to gain about 20 students, and a larger number expected in the first grade. Total enrollment last year was 245; about 300 is anticipated for the coming term, Willoughby forecast.

Two first grade rooms will be established, with Mrs. R. E. Everett hired to teach the additional room.

Other new teachers include Mrs. Lois Patterson in the 5th grade; she comes to Bovina from the Rosedale, New Mexico, schools and has done college work at Portales and at Edmond, Oklahoma. At this date no commercial teacher has been hired; this vacancy is expected to be filled before the term begins.

Teachers hired are Mrs. Everett and Mrs. Leola Williams, 1st grade; Mrs. Myrna Hammonds, 2nd; Mrs. June Rhodes, 3rd; Mrs. Hazel Rigdon, 4th; Mrs. Patterson, 5th; and Miss Grace Paul as principal and 5th grade teacher. Mr. Willoughby remains as superintendent; R. E. Everett, high school principal; C. T. Ratliff, coach; Ollie Ellison, social sciences; Miss Eve Simpson, English; Herm Henson, vocational agriculture; Mrs. Norene Young, home economics; and Mark Williams, band director.

Mr. Williams already has begun work with the band, classes having started Tuesday with about 40 reporting for the senior band. Williams comes from New Deal. He is a graduate of the University of Texas, and has had band direction experience in the Austin schools and was conductor of

a Marine Band in the service.

Six busses will run again this year, with one new 54-passenger bus replacing a smaller one. Frank Wilson is bus foreman, and all drivers of last year are expected to return.

The cafeteria will continue operation with same charges - 25c and 30c. The same crew will serve under the supervision of Mrs. Helen Wassom.

### Mystery Cloaks Shooting Of Bud DeMent at Black Home

J. L. (BUD) DEMENT, 49 YEAR OLD RAILROAD WORKER AT BLACK, DIED ABOUT 7 O'CLOCK TUESDAY EVENING, RESULT OF GUNSHOT WOUNDS INFLICTED ABOUT 7:45 THE MORNING OF THE SAME DAY.

Dement was found about 8 o'clock in his small home south of the tracks at Black by J. R. "Pete" Braxton and Les Deaton. Braxton had gone to his elevator to unlock the doors, and he heard cries from the Dement quarters. Braxton called Deaton and they both went to the location, finding Dement lying face downward inside the small house, a single-shot .22 caliber rifle protruding from underneath his body.

Dement was rushed to the Farmer County Community Hospital in the local ambulance; blood transfusions and

plasma injections revived him somewhat, and he responded to questioning for a few minutes, stating "I didn't do it". He denied knowledge of who might have shot him.

Investigating officers believed today that the shooting could well have been accidental, although they are exploring all angles. The

Mr. Dement will be buried at Harshorne, Oklahoma. His body will be sent overland from Amarillo, and no local services will be held.

door of the Dement dwelling was quite low, with a high step just inside, and it could be entirely possible that he stumbled as he stooped to enter, causing the rifle to discharge. The bullet entered his skull to the back and slightly above his right ear, coursing upward through the brain and lodging against the skull at the top and slightly to the left of his crown.

X-ray photographs indicated that the bullet was of soft lead, the same type as others found on a table in the house, .22 long rifle. An empty shell was in the gun when examined by Sheriff Lovelace and by County Attorney Sam Aldridge Tuesday morning.

After emergency treatment and X-rays at the local hospital, Dement was rushed to a neuro-surgeon at the Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo later in the day.

Dement had worked on the local railroad at various times since 1948. However, he did not report to work this week. He had spent Sunday night with a brother, Burnie Dement, in Friona, and had asked to borrow a gun to kill ground squirrels he said were getting into his "bus" home. He borrowed the gun from Lonnie Dement. Complaining of feeling bad, he said he probably wouldn't work for a day or two, relatives said.

He lived alone at Black.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Huey DeMent of Harshorne, Oklahoma, two sisters, Mrs. Bonnie Warren and Mrs. Wills Keeling, both of Friona; three brothers, Boe and Bernie of Friona, and Melvin of Elk City, Oklahoma.

### The Responsibility Cannot be Shifted

Who is responsible for traffic safety?

With school approaching, with the hundreds of our youngsters exposed to traffic hazards, and with the localized situation of excessive traffic fatalities in recent weeks, the tendency for most of us is to recognize more than usual. We read traffic safety somewhat more than usual. We read the headlines and shake our heads. But how often do we add the postscript — "THEY shouldn't have been driving that fast", etc. And right there—when we think of THEY, we are laying the groundwork for our own accidents.

For we must think of ME as well as you in taking inventory of the precaution necessary to sane driving.

Who is responsible for traffic safety?

No one but OURSELVES.

No doubt many will pay fines locally some time this year for traffic violations. The Texas Highway Patrol is keenly aware of the infractions in the Friona area whether involving local people, travellers on the nationwide Highway 60 artery, or a combination of both. We have the assurance from that department of rigid enforcement of traffic laws here for some weeks. And the local people no doubt will learn some lessons.

Still we have the problem of the traveller. All we can suggest here is nationwide recognition of traffic precautions—a goal that can only

be reached through multiple effort by every little community over the country. Let us be the first to fall in line—for your sake and mine.

Nationwide reports are that at least 60 per cent of drivers in fatal accidents were violating a traffic law at the time of the accident. We suspect the local rate to be higher.

Have you suggestions for concrete action locally to improve safety conditions? If so, why not express your views; they will be printed in The Friona Star. We are sure that the law enforcement bodies would join with us in welcoming full cooperation and suggestions.

Personally, we have compiled a collection of photographs of automobile wrecks—many of them taking lives, others in which absence of fatalities was nothing short of miraculous. The pictures are impressive, gruesome as they are.

We have often thought that displays of wrecked vehicles at regular intervals along the highways would make some people stop (or slow down) and think. We once passed through a town where a mangled car "adorned" the main intersection of the town. Not a bad idea.

In this modern world, a lucky man is considered to be one that has a wife and a cigarette lighter, and they both work. —U. S. Coast Guard Magazine

Coincidentally with the local safety consciousness, the writer received a magazine only this week printed by the Kentucky Safety Council. It carried front page and lead stories telling of the work of Al Romich (former Chamber of Commerce manager here at Friona) in the interest of Safety in that area. Al is manager of the Elizabethtown Chamber of Commerce. With one of the highest traffic accident rates in Kentucky, his county organized its own Hardin County Safety Council.

In its goals, that council emphasize that every member of the council must literally preach safety. "We must convince everyone beyond the shadow of a doubt that safety IS worthwhile, its spokesman said. "Traffic accidents as an economic problem alone are appalling," Highway Safety Coordinator C. B. Jones added, "not to mention the immeasurable grief and suffering that has resulted from the traffic accidents."

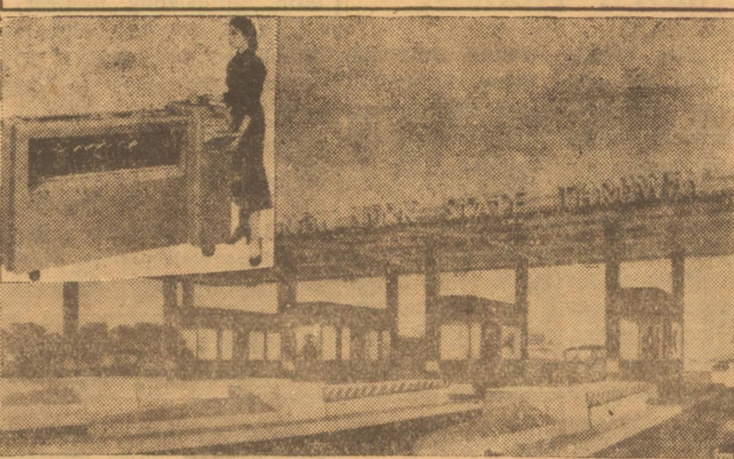

### Automatic Drivers Next?

#### Machine Takes Heavy Toll



THE AVERAGE MOTORIST breezing merrily along the 427-mile New York State Thruway sometime next year won't be aware of the intricate toll collection and auditing equipment he'll have called into play.

As he enters the Thruway, he'll be handed a punched-card type of ticket. As he leaves, it will be put into an ingenious "exit interchange computer" that calculates his fare, registers all sorts of information about his trip. A treadle counts axles as he leaves; occasionally a special movie camera photographs them and the car's grille-work.

And the mysteriously punched ticket will be sent to a central accounting office where batteries of punches and special tabulators will analyze his comings and goings, in untepen different ways.

All this complex machinery won't hold the motorist up for more than a few seconds. It's necessary because the Thruway Authority must have traffic studies and financial reports. It also needs to protect itself against leaks in toll collection, for with several hundred thousand vehicles expected daily, losses due to one sort of cheating or another can become astronomical. In a happy example of industrial cooperation, Remington Rand Inc., and Teller & Cooper Inc., have pooled resources to perfect the devices for which they were recently awarded contracts.

**THE COUNTRY WE CAME THROUGH:** Much of the Southwest was settled by folks from the states that we drove through. From all appearances, the folks in that section of Virginia, North Carolina, and Tennessee are all good basic American stock, honest, God-fearing and law abiding. If

you ever get a chance to drive through this part of the country, through the Blue Ridge and Smoky Mountains, don't miss it. The beauty is breathtaking.

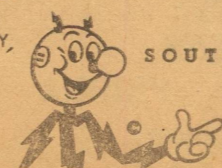

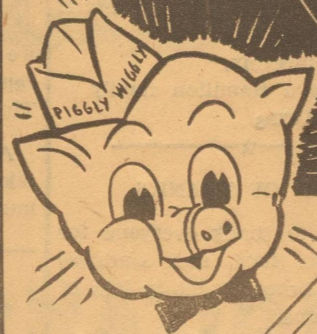

## Judge Rules on Liability Of Mutual Insurance Companies

Editor's Note: Several insurance men have called to our attention a recent court ruling in South Texas regarding the assessability of various policies. Due to possible misunderstandings on this phase of mutual policies in particular, we reprint the following from reports in the Dallas News and The Austin Statesman:

AUSTIN, Texas.—Holders of policies labeled non-assessable in mutual insurance companies can

be assessed if the company failed to meet all financial requirements, Dist. Judge J. Harris Gardner held here Wednesday.

The decision was in a suit involving the Texas Mutual Insurance Company of Beaumont, which has been in receivership since February.

Judge Gardner ruled in favor of the request of W. G. Knox, the receiver, for an assessment of policyholders to meet liabilities of approximately \$1,300,000.

Involved in the ruling is construction of a statute which permits mutual companies to write non-assessable policies when they have a surplus of \$200,000. If the case is appealed, it will be the first higher court ruling on the question.

Judge Gardner's ruling was based on a finding that the company did not have the required surplus which would make it eligible to issue non-assessable policies and therefore the policyholders could be assessed to pay creditors.

Max Scheid, executive secretary of the Dallas Association of Insurance Agents adds: True insurance is the transfer of a hazard. A policyholder of a stock company may transfer to the shoulders of an institution, strong enough to carry the responsibility a hazard too great for him to bear. When one insures in a Mutual he may be relieved of a part of his own burden but he assumes responsibilities he never had before.
