Astronomers detect chemical in atmosphere of planet orbiting star WASHINGTON (AP) - In search fortent extraterrestrial

WASHINGTON (AP) - The gov

But the agency is working t whisk passengers through security in 10 minutes or less, speeding up security checks that are creating long lines in many airports.
