Eighty-four Friona boys are active participants this year in Boy Scouting.

And in support of these boys, their projects, work and activities, the annual financial drive is to be conducted locally next Tuesday, December 8, according to Frank Spring, councilman.

Starting with a kick-off breakfast at 7:30 a.m. at Mary's Cafe, 21 adults will meet, later canvassing the community in the one-day concentrated solicitation. Funeral Held Friday for T. N. Jasper, Colorful Pioneer Freighter, Officer

Thomas Newton Jasper, 82 years of age and Friona resident since 1917, died at the family home here last Wednesday morning at about 7:30 o'clock.

Mr. Jasper, pioneer freighter, rancher, farmer and law enforcement officer, had been in ill health with cancer for some months, and had been confined to hospitals much of the time recently.

Older residents well remember, and the newcomers have heard the tales and seen the pictures, of Tom Jasper and his team of sturdy oxen, familiar sights of only a few years back. Until his last illness he took interest in fine stock, driving a team of heavy draft horses in local dray work.

Funeral services were conducted

Friday morning at 10 o'clock in the First Baptist Church of Friona, with Rev. C. M. Fields in charge. Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery.

Thomas N. Jasper, oldest of fifteen children born to James N. and Mary M. Jasper, was born August 22, 1271 in Victor, Erath County, Texas, where he lived until moving to Comanche County in 1880. From there he moved to Haskell, living there until 1896, then beginning travels that took him to Arkansas and Oklahoma. He met Miss Lenora Burke near McAlister, Oklahoma, and they were married at Gainesville, Texas.

The Jaspers then moved to Silverton, Texas, living out a claim and running freight wagons across country. He moved from there to Kress in 1915, then to Tulia and on to Friona on February 17, 1917.

Mr. Jasper is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lenora Jasper, Friona, and seven sons: Walter and Raymond, both of Amarillo; James J. and Andrew J. of Friona; and Clarence and Virgil of Prescott, Arizona; and Martin of Phoenix.

Also surviving are five brothers, Will Jasper, Portales; John P. Jasper of Claude; Charles R. of Lubbock; Nathaniel S. Jasper, San Diego, Calif.; and C. M. Jasper of Silverton; and five sisters: Mrs. Bettie Hodges and Mrs. Mary F. Thompson of Memphis, Texas; Mrs. Mattie M. Burrows, Texhoma, Okla.; Mrs. Katie Washington, Flomot, and Mrs. Katie Spear of Tulia; 12 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

And admission will be charged—to go into a fund for some future construction of a swimming pool in Friona.

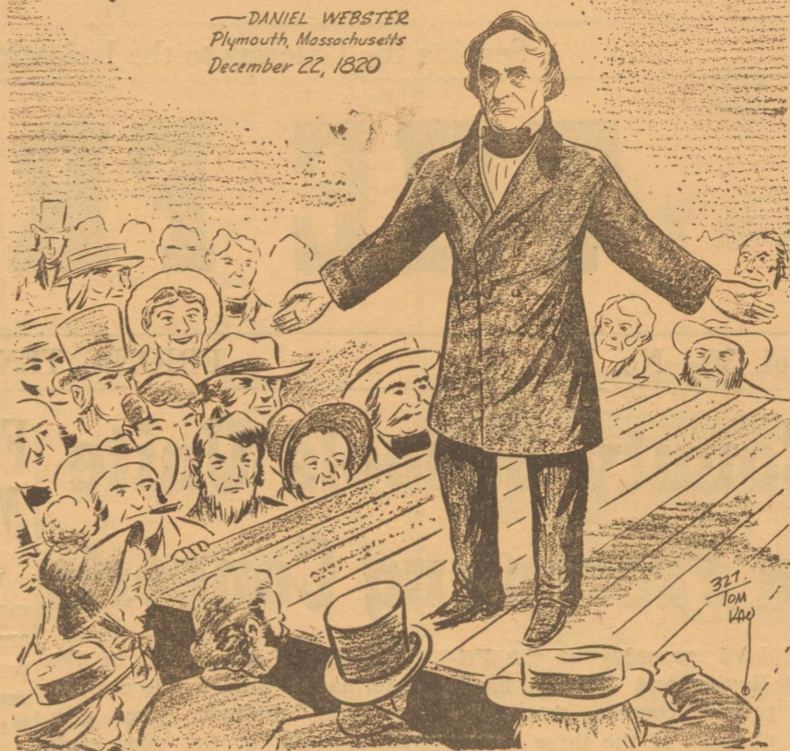

hope they see fit to go through higher proportions of injured victims to dead ones by official count in a number of states. One state averaged 113 persons injured for every highway fatality over the three-year period was 75; in others nearby, 65 and 45. Mr. Boate concedes that in some states the rates run somewhat lower, but these lower averages are usually due to incomplete reporting or they occur in less populous states and have little effect on the national average.

TWO MILLION VICTIMS

Far from the entire story of the staggering increases in automobile accidents in recent years is told in highway death statistics, which are more commonly used to depict the horror of it all. The threatened toll of 40,000 dead in 1953 and perhaps as many or more in 1954 speaks volumes in depicting the extent of the nation's accident problem. But a great deal more is told, too, by the enormous total of injured traffic victims, which reflects almost as vividly the constant threat of accidents to our safety.

According to Thomas N. Boate, nationally known highway safety authority, motor vehicles will injure some 2,000,000 victims in 1953 and possibly even more in 1954.

His estimates run far higher than some quasi-official ones, which he declares are "completely unrealistic." These run in the neighborhood of 1,350,000 injured annually. The lower estimates, Mr. Boate explains, are based on theoretical ratios of approximately 35 persons injured for every person killed on the highways.

Independent annual studies support Mr. Boate's broader picture of the actual motor vehicle toll. He gives further credence to his contention that the injury toll is from one-third to 55 per cent greater than is generally believed by citing much

So, instead of 35 persons hurt for every one killed, he believes the national average would present a far more accurate picture if it were computed at 50 to 55 injured for every fatality. That is shocking but believable news. Surely it demands that accident prevention measures of every kind must be adopted to stop our motoring insanity.

"Small Business"

The sudden departure of William D. Mitchell as head of the Small Business Administration seems to cast light on Administration's attitude toward small business.

Mitchell was first head of new agency set up to make loans to business when Reconstruction Finance Corporation was dropped. RFC records showed Congress consistently made money on small business loans, a fact that did not receive the publicity that a few political maneuvers with RFC funds received.

But Mitchell apparently decided that Congress was wrong idea.

As he viewed the situation, rather than extend loans to independent business that require them, he preferred to give them advice. With SBA acting as a small business management consultant service.

But independent businessmen took the stand conversation is no substitute for cash, and also there are better sources available on management problems than a 41 year old attorney.

In setting up SBA lending authority Congress acted on a realistic appraisal of the immediate situation. Under present tax laws, it has been impossible for independent businesses to lay aside from profits the cash reserves needed to expand.

Many sound business enterprises are placed in hazard because of a low cash position due to the use of cash to pay taxes. This fact is best evidenced by the record of the RFC. Most small bus-

ness loans were paid off on a short term basis.

But Mitchell ignored the immediate facts, preferring a "pie in the sky" attitude.

He also neglected to recognize Congress is getting touchier about run-arounds from agency heads. Small business leaders laid the facts before Congressmen, especially Sen. Edward J. Thye, chairman of the Senate Small Business Committee.

Shortly thereafter Mitchell was called to the White House at which time his resignation was accepted, with the usual note of regret and appreciation of past services noticeably missing.

Mitchell wanted to give independent businessmen lessons on how to swim.

But Congress feels independent businessmen already know how to swim. All they need is a climate conducive to swimming.

An interesting note: on "you can't take it with you: neither can you give it away."

In London, E. C. Bruce, who claims to represent Coastwise International, Inc., acting as agent for the U. S. in disposing of butter acquired under the price support program, complains that he has been unable to give away 20,000 tons of butter. British balk at paying 5¢ per pound transportation charges.

But it can be assumed that astute British businessmen have not lost the opportunity this offer presents.

Undoubtedly they are mentioning free U. S. butter to hammer down prices of butter they buy from Denmark and Holland. This may not "butter up" U. S. relations with these two strategically located allies.

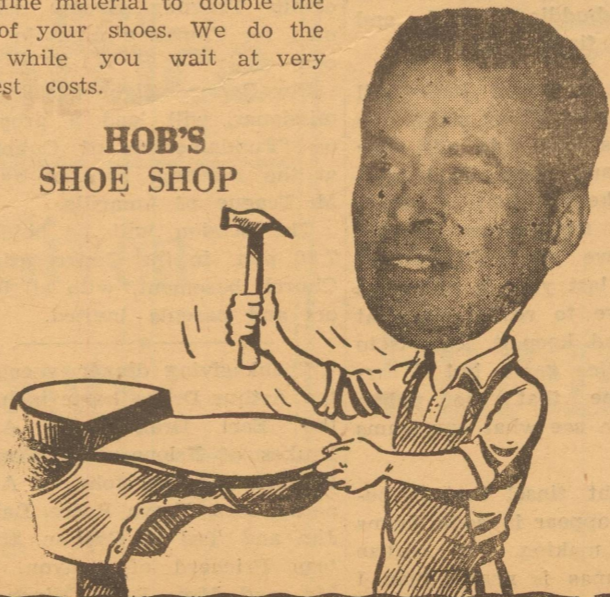

5th, 6th Amendments Outlined by Rogers

November 25, 1953
The coming session of Congress will produce many heated discussions of and arguments about the Fifth and Sixth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States. These two

amendments are integrated parts of the bill of rights. It would be well for all Americans to acquaint themselves fully with these two amendments, if you have not already done so. The Fifth Amendment contains the provisions behind which many witnesses before Congressional investigating committees have hidden themselves for a number of years. The Sixth Amendment contains the provision affording an accused the right to be confronted with the witnesses against him. The spotlight was

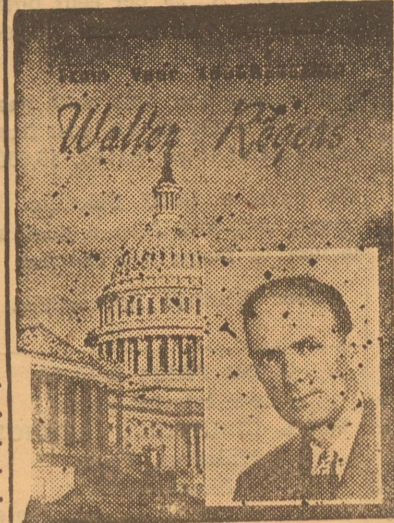
the federal government and perhaps many state and local governments in this country, as well as employees of manufacturing concerns engaged in defense work. No matter who a man is or where he comes from he should not have even the color or right or privilege to work for any of the branches of our government, national, state or local, not for any industry engaged in defense work or work incidental thereto, unless he or she is completely and devotedly dedicated to our form of government, our way of life, and the basic principles on which they were founded, with no ifs, ands, or buts.

Every American should read our Constitution and weigh every word, phrase, sentence and paragraph therein very carefully.

The reorganization of the Soil Conservation Service is still being subjected to much fire and will, no doubt, be one of the first matters facing the next Congress. Few people realize that proper soil conservation is a major health measure. It is not only necessary for the amount of food to be produced, but it is vitally necessary in so far as the quality of that food is concerned. Many diseases and ailments can be prevented by the proper quality of food.

I saw a TV show the other night that was one of the best I have ever seen on the trials and tribulations of the farmer. The first thing that happened in the show was a hailstorm that ruined all of the farmers' wheat. The truth is they are not even in the same Congressional district. It is hard to say which group would be offended by this show, the Shelby county residents or the Houstonians.



placed on this particular amendment in the speech made by President Eisenhower before the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League at the Mayflower Hotel recently. The Washington Post quoted him in an editorial as follows: "In this country if some one dislikes you or accuses you, he must come up in front, he can not hide behind the shadow, he cannot assassinate you or your character from behind, without suffering the penalties an outraged citizenry will impose."

You may not have a copy of the Constitution handy, so I am going to quote these two amendments as they appear in the Constitution:

Amendment (V)

"No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous unless on a present Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb, no shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, not be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without the process of law; no shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation."

Amendment (VI)

"In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall enjoy the right of a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and District wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defense."

The language, "to be confronted with the witnesses against him," was not original. Actually, it was a right enjoyed under the English common law. Its inclusion in the Constitution was to preserve that right, but not to broaden it. This right, however, did not prevail in many other jurisdictions. Probably the most famous of the historical cases involving the violation of that right was the trial of Joan of Arc in France. In a recent history of that trial, it was pointed out that not a single witness appeared in person before the court against Joan of Arc. All the evidence was produced in the form of affidavits, and these were always written in the third person, the object being to conceal completely from the accused both the name and the identity of the witness.

The whole controversy, of course, will center around the Communist menace. Their tactics have been to employ our Constitution and our laws to protect themselves while they work diligently at the task of trying to overthrow that Constitution and those laws. It will primarily concern employees of

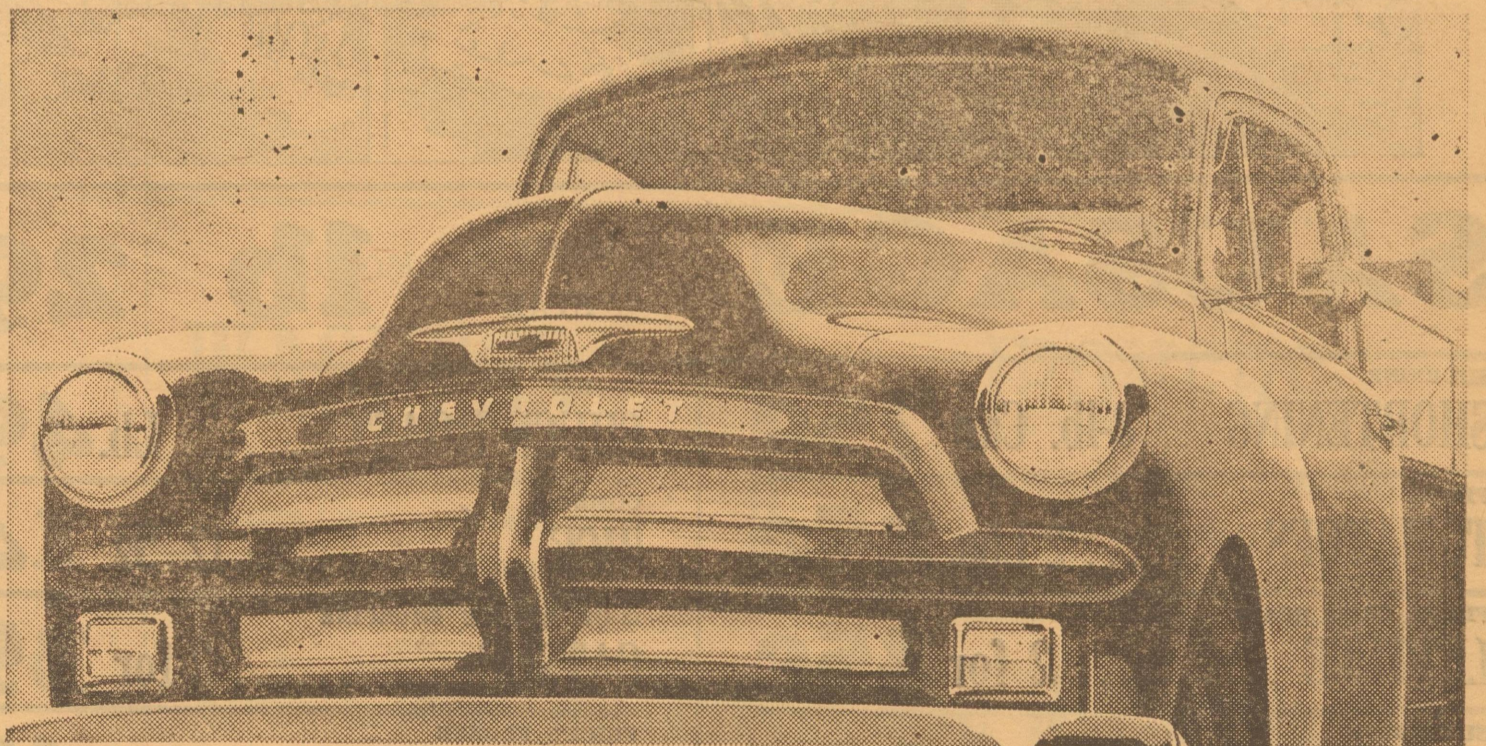

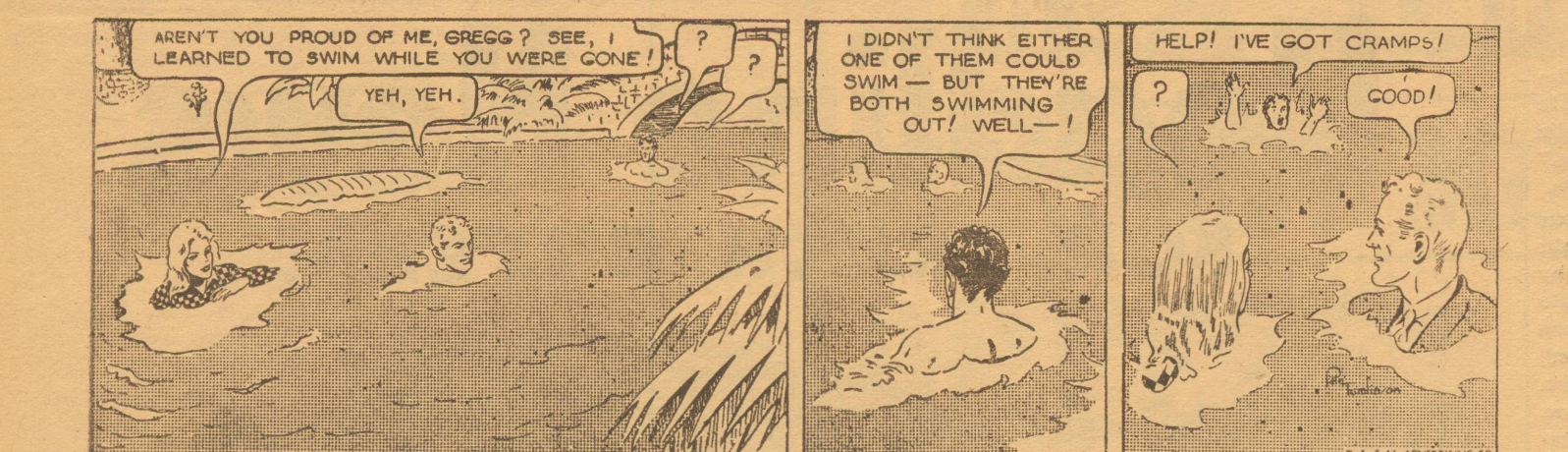

1 tbsp. flour.
2 small onions (little garlic may be used, if desired)
1 green pepper
2 tps. chopped parsley.
1/4 cup chopped celery.
1 cup canned tomatoes
1 small can mushrooms

2 tps. Worcestershire sauce.
Salt and pepper.
Put shortening, flour, onions, green pepper and parsley in skillet and cook until onions are brown. Add tomatoes, chopped celery and mushrooms. Season with salt and pepper. Add cooked turkey meat and cover. Let cook very slowly for one hour Onehalf hour before serving, add Worcestershire sauce. Serve over cooked rice and sprinkle with chow mein noodles, or serve rice and creole separately.
