HOW TO CARVE A TURKEY

Prepared by Poultry and Egg National Board for and released by Purina News Bureau



REMOVE LEG (thigh or second joint and drumstick). Hold the drumstick firmly with fingers, pulling gently away from turkey body. At the same time cut through skin between leg and body. Continue as follows: (1) PRESS LEG AWAY FROM BODY WITH FLAT SIDE OF KNIFE.

Then cut through joint joining leg to backbone and skin on the back. If the "oyster", a choice oyster-shaped piece lying in the spoon-shaped section of the backbone, was not removed with the thigh, remove it at this point. Hold leg on service plate with drumstick at a convenient angle.



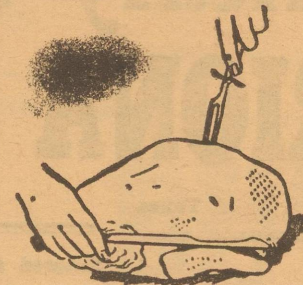
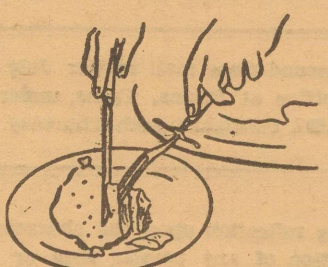
to plate. Separate drumstick and thigh by cutting down through the joint to the plate (2).

SLICE DRUMSTICK MEAT. Hold drumstick upright at a convenient angle to plate and cut down, turning drumstick to get uniform slices. (3)

SLICE THIGH MEAT. Hold thigh

firmly on plate with a fork. Cut slices of meat parallel to the bone. (4)

CUT INTO WHITE MEAT PARALLEL TO WING. Make a cut deep into the breast to the body frame parallel to and as close to the wing as possible. (5)



SLICE WHITE MEAT. Beginning at front, starting halfway up the breast, cut thin slices of white meat down to the cut made parallel to the wing. The slices will fall away from the turkey as they are cut to this line. Continue

carving until enough meat has been carved for first servings. Additional turkey may be carved as needed.

Remove individual servings of stuffing from an opening cut into the side of the turkey where leg has been removed. (6)

Contests were entered Saturday, and then they went on to Waco to spend the night there, making one other overnight stop at Snyder before returning home. They went through the prison at Huntsville, through the Gatesville reformatory and saw the Methodist Children's Home in Waco, also viewing the tornado damage in Waco.

The boys were entertained last night at the home of their director, Mr. J. T. Gee, vocational agricultural supervisor in the schools here.

Last year the county collected .4679 cents per capita in the drive. Parish states that increased needs over the nation call upon the county to raise this figure to .59 cents per capita, actually a total of \$127.30 to be raised at Friona.

Club Heads, Hospital Board to Air Building

Leaders of Friona clubs and civic organizations will meet with the Board of Directors of the Parmer County Community Hospital Friday evening for further discussion of the proposed building program wherein a completely new and fireproof hospital would be erected here.

The meeting will be at the American Legion Hall.

This meeting is a forerunner

of others to be conducted in every community of the county in the near future.

Since the hospital directors have outlined publicly the needs of the growing institution, much favorable comment has been noted locally. Most agree that the fireproof protection is needed, and that the expanded facilities are necessities in order for the hospital to continue its efficient service. Also striking a note of approval are the plans for office space for three doctors (two now on the staff), and a dentist. All dental work now is going elsewhere.

Estimated costs of the tentative plans are \$150,000, with two-thirds of that amount necessary for "go-ahead" on construction. Financing plans are expected to be a prime topic at the scheduled meetings.

J. B. McFarland last week sparked the financial drive with a gift of six bales of cotton.

Manager Jim Baxter urges all civic club leaders to be present at the meeting this week—much discussion may transpire then that will have direct bearing on the future course of the building program.

Local Traffic Casualties Alarming

Eight persons killed and 74 injured.

That, complacent friend, is the Parmer County toll on record for the year to date. And the actual count no doubt is higher; these are the record figures only.

Unquestionably these totals are excessive—they are higher than for any county adjoining us.

Our roads are no worse, our traffic is no heavier, our law enforcement officers are fully as efficient—then why?

It might be noted that a considerable number of these "accidents" are within the city limits of Friona, also intersection collisions are a commonplace. Why?

Personally, we are afraid that the attitude of the people is a big factor. All of us are prone to read the headlines "Three Killed, Four Injured" and shrug it off, merely stating "that's too bad," then forgetting it as we turn the page and read the sports and funnies. We fail to become alarmed unless the tragedy directly affects ourselves. Consequently we are complacent, even in our driving.

But this must change.

We believe there are three courses toward safety improvement, and a combination of the three must be utilized, with equal emphasis on each: (1) More law enforcement personnel, (2) unwavering action by the courts, and (3) driver education and attitude.

No doubt a limited budget has hampered the work of the Texas Highway Patrol. The department has not been able to add personnel in keeping with the increasing number of drivers and the improved thoroughfares and speedways. So we cannot criticize the present membership of the patrol, on a whole they are a dedicated group working as best they can under the limits imposed by under-staffing.

Certainly few citizens could find fault with rigid laws regarding drunk and careless driving—then a follow-through by the courts that would assure just punishment for EVERY offender. Too often we have seen an inebriated killer on the highway get off with minimum sentence, or none at all, while other crimes are dealt with to the letter of the law.

The third need—better education resulting in changed attitude of the public—can do much to remedy the first two factors. When the public demands—when we here in Friona and Parmer County become sufficiently aroused over the needless loss of life on our streets and highways, then we will lend a hand when serving on

juries, will give true witness on the stand, and will cooperate in safety measures in the town, the county and state. We will see to it that "Stop" signs are installed at all intersections so that right-of-way priority in Friona can plainly be understood. Then we will abide by the signs and the rules. One can't continue to run the stop lights here and at the Hub, etc., and then express surprise when a fatality occurs.

More and more we hear talk among the traffic enforcement officers that the case of a traffic "accident" is a rarity. There usually is no "accident" about it—rather there is a reason—a cause, and at least one party to blame. Is that person you or I? Will it be us sometime in the future? Unless our attitude changes, we are afraid so.

In all seriousness, we urge concentrated study within our own county to assure a better traffic record in 1954.

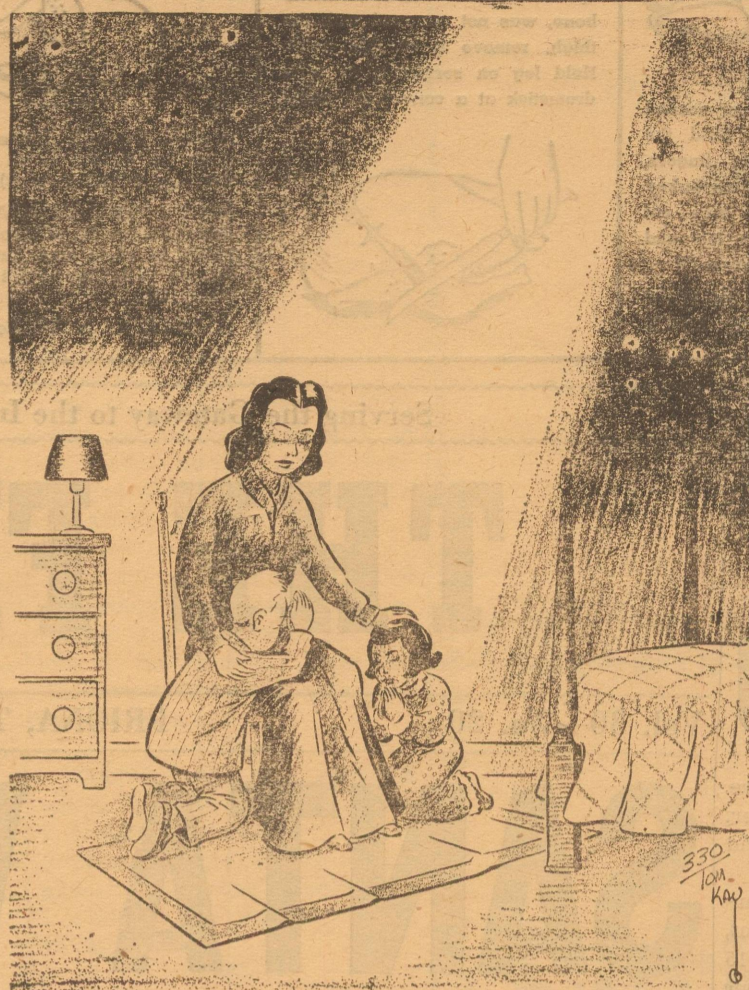

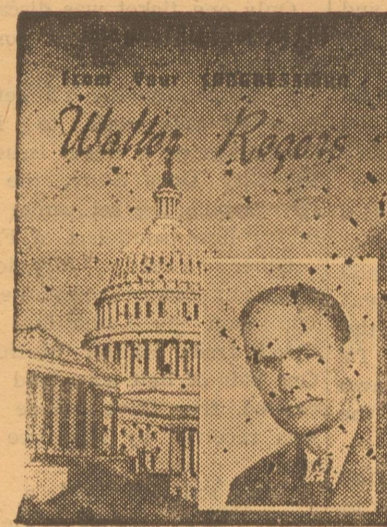

The comments on Pres. Eisenhower's speech before the UN concerning the dangers of the atomic age and what should be done met with approval on all sides. We then get into a head-butting contest that results in headaches with no progress in the solution of the problem involved. Certainly this country can not subordinate itself to an over-all world government federation. Each country must stand upon its own feet and build its own strength as a dependent nation. Certainly cooperation necessary for building this strength, but a joining of all the nations in a world government would serve not only to weaken the nations that have remained independent and strong, but would create a world social problem that would contribute greatly to the socialistic and

It is also a story that leaves a question whether or not the Bureau of Internal Revenue is being pushed into a corner that was never intended by a man named George.

Out in San Francisco, Arthur Samish, public relations man and lobbyist extraordinaire is convicted of income tax evasion totaling more than \$70,000.

This news shows again a good job by BIR but there is more to this case.

Artie Samish made a major mistake. During Kefauver hearings in San Francisco he erred in baiting Sen. Estes Kefauver.

Senator Kefauver requested the BIR to make a tax probe.

In California it has been a maxim that to sell booze in California see Samish first before talking to the State licensed liquor wholesalers.

Samish power in California has been legendary. In fact, a former governor, now U. S. Chief Justice, once remarked that Samish had more influence with the California legislature than he did.

But when Sen. Kefauver's probe of the situation met with rebuffs, seemingly, only the BIR could be induced to act.

But the question in many minds is why the Samish affair was not investigated by other government agencies, especially in regard to anti-trust laws.

Samish was convicted for concealing money he received from

for securing . . . account for the money.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower has a right to stand up for the people's huge wine industry. They wish to please Samish.

And while Californians approve of the fact BIR convicted Samish, there is wonder why the Justice Department, especially the anti-trust division, was not more active in seeking to learn just what Samish did for Schenley.

The BIR quite properly confined its interest to failure to declare the money, not why it was paid Samish.

In the minds of most Californians it would have been far better if Kefauver could have turned situation over to the FBI with knowledge the FBI could pursue case unhampered.

But recent events show, despite excellence and integrity of FBI it is subject to the whim of prevailing political party.

This situation could be avoided, it is felt. For example, U. S. Controller is not subject to shifting of political winds.

As J. Edgar Hoover demonstrated in his testimony on the Harry Dexter White situation, the FBI can and is over-ruled. Therefore, sentiment is strong to make FBI agent of the people, not subject to political control. One thing is certain. Hoover does not try to philosophize laws away. He has old fashioned belief laws are meant to be enforced. And anti-trust laws are laws.

This is about Big Booze.

But it could be a story about Big Milk, Big Oil and others. Communists are not alone in wanting J. Edgar Hoover's wings clipped.

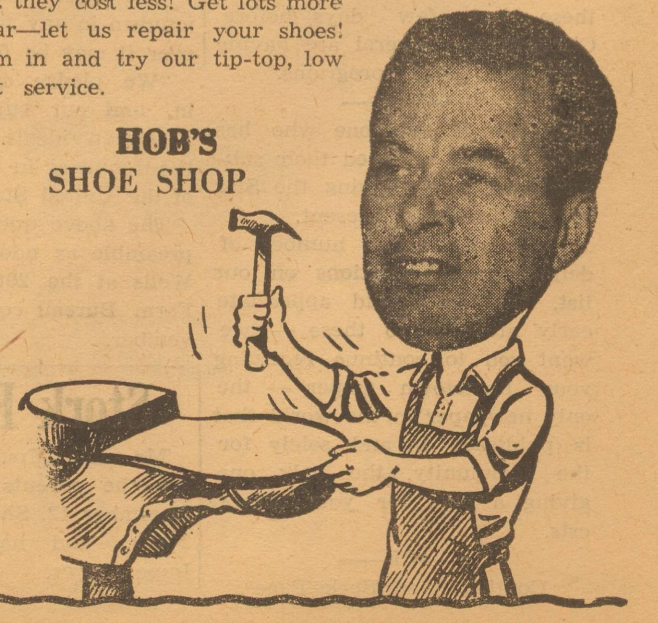

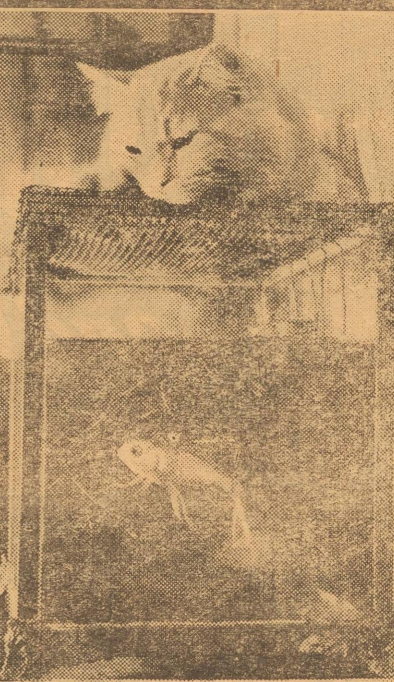

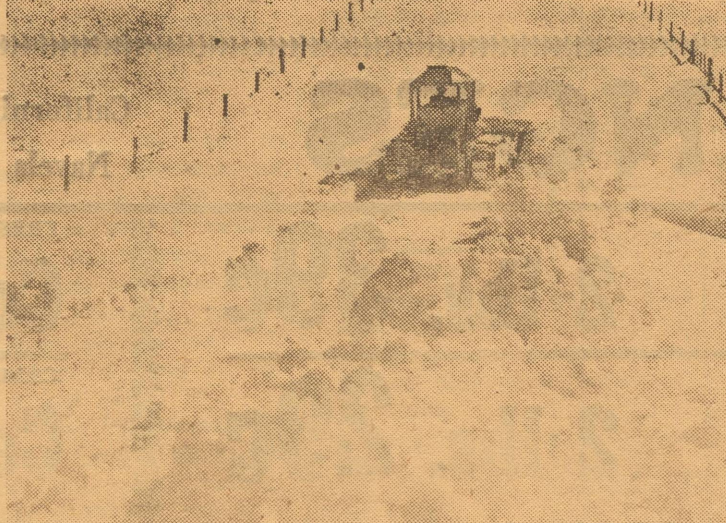

Cooperative Relationship SCS And Extension Service Stressed By Heads

Administrators C. M. Ferguson and D. A. Williams of the Federal Extension Service and Soil Conservation Service, respectively, today released a joint statement dealing with the relationship of the two services. "We regard," they said, "this statement as a significant expression of the cooperative relationship between the two agencies."

Their statement follows: "The conservation and proper care and development of our soils is basic to the economic well-being of families now farming and ranching and those who are to follow. It is essential to the future of the Nation's food supply and to the continued expansion of efficient food and fiber production to meet our ever-growing population needs."

"The reorganization of the Soil Conservation Service is designed to carry forward a more effective national program and to strengthen the work in each state. It does not change in any way the functions of the SCS in carrying out a national program of soil and water conservation

primarily through soil conservation districts. The Soil Conservation Service and the Extension continue to have the responsibility for effective cooperation at county, state and national levels. Both services will look to the state experiment stations and to the Agricultural Research Service of the Department for Improved Technology through which to assist local people in handling their programs.

The work of the Extension Service and the Soil Conservation Service will succeed only with the enthusiastic, whole-hearted support and efforts of farm and ranch people. Both require the continued development of well-informed leadership in soil conservation districts, farm organizations, planning committees, and other such groups.

The use of the soil and water resources must dovetail into and provide a base for sound farm management, cropping practices, livestock management, machinery requirements, building needs, and marketing opportunities,

while at the same time conserving and improving those basic resources.

These objectives will be accomplished only through the closest possible kind of teamwork between the technical assistance of the Soil Conservation Service and Extension's teaching, through demonstration and other means of education, to encourage farmers to adopt farm practices consistent

with the sound use of land and water resources. Such teamwork will result only from harmonious interagency relations. These relations do not occur by chance. They develop and come to full fruition through every-day on-the-job teamwork, with a common objective and the best interests of the farmer and the rancher, his family, his land, and other resources in mind.
