Others think that he will continue ing that will clearly spell out the supremacy of the Constituth esupremacy of the Constitution over treaties and executive agreements. I shall, of course, support the Constitution of the United States and the theory that it is the supreme law of the land and supersedes all others, whether they be treaties, executive agreements, statutes, administrative decisions or otherwise.

There are many things in the President's message to which I can wholeheatedly subscribe. On the other hand, there are a number of things with which I must beg to disagree. Some of these are items and issues that I have fought in prior administrations and which I intend to continue to fight, regardless of the personalities involved. This country was not built on peronalities. It was built on principles, and on principles its survival must depend.


