"In Flanders fields the poppies blow, between the crosses, row on row."

The immortal line was penned by Dr. John McCrae, a World War I soldier, to memorialize those who died in that war. In the poem, the spirits of dead soldiers urge the living to remain faithful to their cause. Ever since, poppies have been linked to the memory of those slain in war.

Big Spring's Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 213 will be offering poppies for dona-

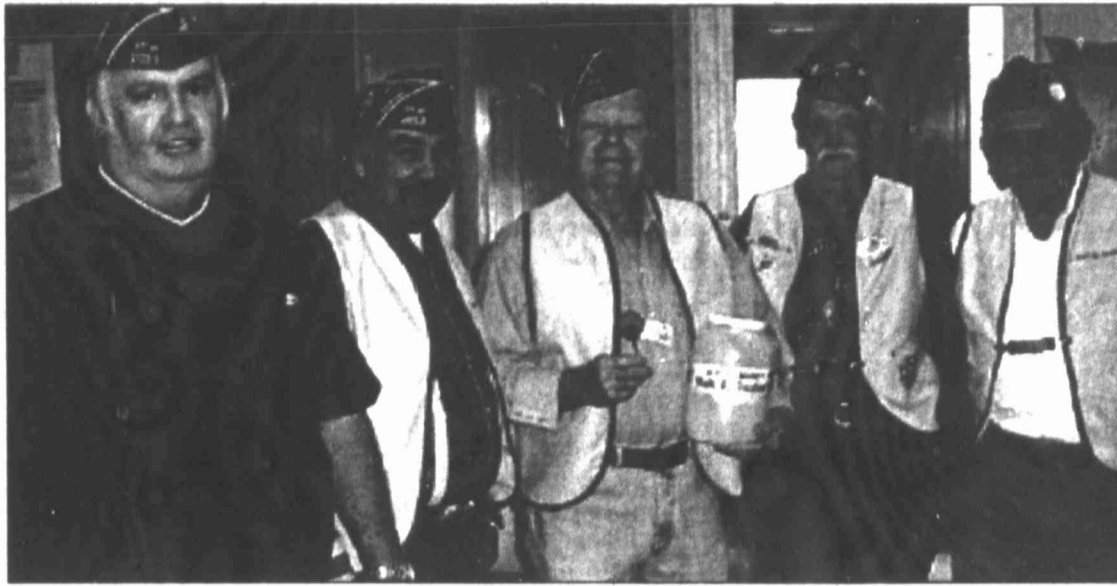
tions this Saturday at various locations around town, said past commander Leo Welch.

"These poppies are made by disabled veterans who are in hospitals and so forth," he said. "They derive a little bit of money for each one that they make and we buy them from the emblem and catalog outfit."

Veterans groups around the country offer the poppies in conjunction with Memorial Day to raise money for needy veterans.

"We go out on a specific day in May, the 25th of

Fund-raising by the numbers

A local fund-raiser took a personal turn for the students and staff of the Big Spring Junior High School.

"We (the junior high math teachers) were deciding whether to do the St. Judes (Children's Research Hospital) fund-raiser again," said Joey Roberts, eighth-grade math teacher.

Then the teachers thought about fellow junior high math teacher, Marvin Wynn and his son, Matthew. Both father and son are fighting cancer.

"We decided to have it for the Wynn family," Roberts said.

In 2001, the students raised about \$2,000 for cancer research to donate to St. Judes by performing different math problems. Each student found their own sponsors for the project.

In this year's Math-for-Matt, 84 seventh and eighth graders doubled the 2001 amount for the Wynn family.

"It was for a good cause and I know that dude (Matthew)," said seventh-grader Brandon Stowers, who raised almost \$350.

"I asked family and people at church (to donate)," said eighth-grader Juan Rocha, who raised almost \$240.

Once again, students completed math problems but this year the 12-page booklet was created by the junior high math teachers.

"Some of the teachers left a little for the students to

Big Spring police search for robbery suspects

Big Spring police are searching for two unknown subjects in an aggravated robbery which occurred Sunday.

The two men reportedly entered North Side Laundry in the 700 block of North

Lancaster shortly after 7 p.m. Sunday and demanded money.

Officers were dispatched to the scene at 7:41 p.m., and received descriptions of the robbers from the victim.

"Suspect number one is described as a black male, approximately 6 feet 0 inch-

es, 165 pounds, and 15 to 17 years of age," said Big Spring Police Detective Lupe Liddick. "Suspect number two is described as a black male, short and stocky, wearing a black sweatshirt and black jeans, 15 to 17 years of age."

The second robber was

reportedly armed with a black metal rod. The victim was allegedly struck with the rod several times during the incident and sustained minor injuries.

Liddick said the victim was not hospitalized for

Cheney: Another terrorist attack almost certain

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Dick Cheney says it is difficult for the United States to respond to the latest intelligence hints that al-Qaida may be planning another attack because no specific information is available.

But he said they must be taken seriously.

"I think that the prospects of a future attack on the U.S. are almost a certainty," Cheney said on "Fox News Sunday." "It could happen tomorrow, it could happen next week, it could happen next year, but they will keep trying. And we have to be prepared."

Cheney said he believes the United States has had success in disrupting Osama bin Laden's terrorist network, but it is impossible to prepare a perfect defense. So few people are told of plans that it is difficult to get details, he said.

"You try to read the tea leaves. We look for pieces of information and

Giuliani defends administration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former New York Mayor Rudolph Giuliani defended the Bush administration's handling of intelligence information prior to Sept. 11, saying on Sunday he did not believe the federal government could have anticipated the terrorist attacks.

Giuliani, a Republican, suggested that the Clinton administration also should be accountable given that much of the intelligence now

coming under scrutiny was collected during its watch.

"Remember, the Bush administration when this attack took place was a very new administration and they had just inherited the intelligence apparatus put in place by the Clinton administration so when you look at this you're going to have look at both," Giuliani said after a speech to graduates of Georgetown Law School.

that you could take, other than a general increase in our level of sensitivity to possible terrorist activities," Graham said on CBS' "Face the Nation."

Newsweek magazine reported that from the summer of 2000 into 2001, the FBI was forced to shut down 10 to 20 wiretaps of al-Qaida-related suspects connected to the investiga-

tion of the 1998 bombings of the U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania.

The action came after U.S. District Judge Royce C. Lamberth complained to Attorney General John Ashcroft that an FBI official had misrepresented petitions for taps on terror suspects, Newsweek said.

Cheney's comments followed disclosures that Bush had been told in an Aug. 6 intelligence briefing that al-Qaida might attempt a hijacking aimed at Americans. The administration has said the information was not specific enough for it to take concrete action to thwart the Sept. 11 attacks — an explanation similar to Cheney's about the difficulty of responding to the latest intelligence reports.

Democrats and some Republicans have cited the Aug. 6 briefing as one of several warning signs that,

Rebates

Sales tax checks take tumble in May

Big Spring joined most area West Texas cities in posting double-digit deficits when it came to sales tax rebates received for May, according to the State Comptroller's Office.

Sixteen of 18 area cities received rebates this month that were less than they received in May of 2001 and for nine of those communities, the deficit was 10 percent or greater.

Big Spring received \$376,281.19, some 14.16 percent less than the \$438,378.96 the Howard County seat received in May of 2001. For the year, Big Spring has received \$1,534,371.23, 5.08 percent less than it received in the same five-month period in 2001.

Coahoma had a 19.95 decrease in rebates for the month. The community received \$4,752.37, compared to \$5,937.09 for May 2001. Sales tax rebates for the year are up 5.43 percent, comparing \$18,851.07 this year to \$17,879.12 last year.

Forsan saw sales tax receipts go down 30.94 percent. The city received \$2,353.79 this month compared to \$3,408.46 in May of 2001. For the year sales tax rebates are at \$16,144.91, up 27.59 percent.

Abilene received \$2,437,160.13 this month, down 7.06 percent from the \$2,622,564.58 received in May of 2001. For the year, the Taylor County seat has received \$10,845,763.68, up 0.47 percent.

Sales tax rebates were up 62.42 percent for Andrews, which received \$142,474.69 this month compared to \$87,715.32 in May of 2001. For the year, Andrews has received \$479,085.20, up

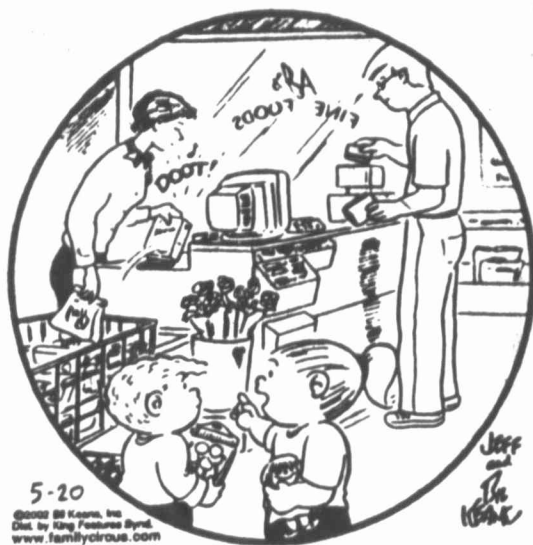

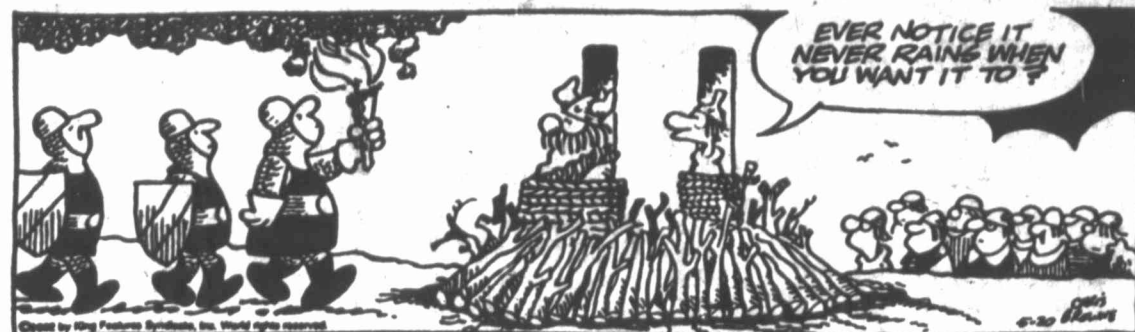

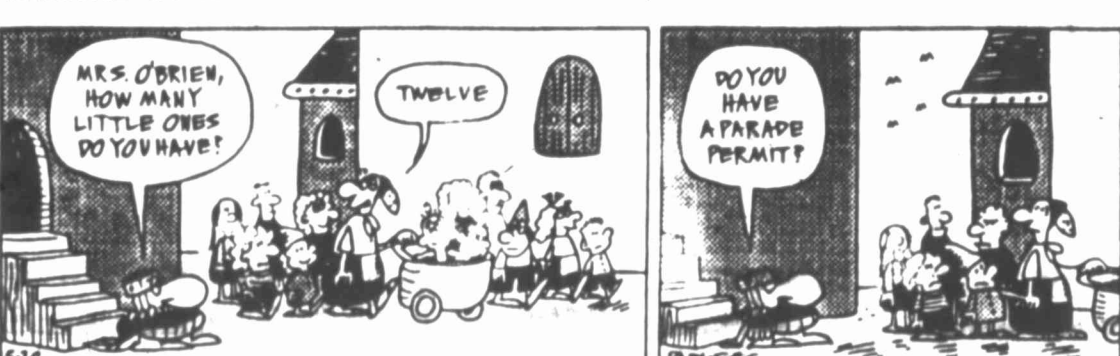

THIS DATE IN HISTORY

The ASSOCIATED PRESS Today is Monday, May 20, the 140th day of 2002. There are 225 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: One hundred years ago, on May 20, 1902, the United States ended its three-year military presence in Cuba as the Republic of Cuba was established under its first elected president, Tomas Estrada Palma. In 1506, Christopher Columbus died in poverty in Spain. In 1861, North Carolina voted to secede from the Union. In 1861, the capital of the Confederacy was moved from Montgomery, Ala., to Richmond, Va. In 1927, Charles Lindbergh took off from Roosevelt Field in Long Island, N.Y., aboard the Spirit of St. Louis on his historic solo flight to France. In 1932, Amelia Earhart took off from Newfoundland for Ireland to become the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic. In 1939, regular transatlantic air service began as a Pan American Airways plane, the Yankee Clipper, took off from Port Washington, N.Y., bound for Europe. In 1942, Glenn Miller and His Orchestra recorded "I've Got a Gal in Kalamazoo" at Victor Studios in Hollywood. In 1961, a white mob attacked a busload of Freedom Riders in Montgomery, Ala., prompting the federal government to send in U.S. marshals to restore order. In 1969, U.S. and South Vietnamese forces captured Apbia Mountain, referred to as "Hamburger Hill" by the Americans, following one of the bloodiest battles of the Vietnam War. In 1989, comedian Gilda Radner died in Los Angeles at age 42. Ten years ago: Proclaiming his innocence to the end, Roger Keith Coleman was executed in Virginia's electric chair for the 1981 rape-murder of his sister-in-law, Wanda McCoy. Today's Birthdays: Actor James McEachin is 72. Actor Anthony Zerbe is 66. Actor David Proval is 60. Singer Joe Cocker is 58. Singer-actress Cher is 56. Actor-comedian Dave Thomas is 53. Musician Warren Cann is 50. Actor Dean Butler is 46. Ron Reagan is 44. Rock musician Jane Wiedlin (The Go-Go's) is 44. Actor Bronson Pinchot is 43. Actor Tony Goldwyn is 42.
