Let's Have No "Morning After" Here

### Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

Editor's Note: On any election year the weekly papers are in receipt of excessive "columns" sent out by potential candidates. For that reason, we are carrying NONE of the individual columns but are publishing the overall observations of the secretary of the Texas Press Association, the very able Mr. Vern Sanford.

AUSTIN: District Judge J. Harris Gardner, speaking from his bench here, lashed out at the legislature on four counts. He found these flaws:

1. Juries in criminal cases have the responsibility of fixing punishment.
2. More stringent divorce laws are needed.
3. Funds are required for a workable adult probation system.
4. That provision should be removed from the statutes which makes "justifiable homicide" a defense in slayings committed by husbands in adultery cases.

There are some faults in Texas insurance laws, says Garland Smith, chairman of the state's insurance commission, but he denies that the situation is as bad as it was described by Robert Gilmore, head of the National Association of Life Underwriters. Gilmore, speaking at a meeting of his group at Knoxville, Tenn., said that Texas has the "worst insurance laws in the United States", and most of the companies writing health and accident policies with "tricky" provisions are "huddled in Texas".

While it is true that Texas laws do not specify the provisions of health and accident policies, the board has set up for those policies the same standards that are in effect in other states, he declared.

Off again, on again was the old folks' march on the capital. Russell Jack Ballard of Wichita Falls, self-appointed leader of the state's aged people, promised that swarms of the elderly would come here, camp on the capitol grounds, and ask for an increase in their assistance allotments and better treatment in state hospitals.

Ballard appointed Cyclone Davis of Dallas as leader of the expedition.

Davis, a perennial candidate for state office, filed with the Democratic Executive Committee for a place on the ballot as a candidate for governor.

### WASHINGTON AND "Small Business"

The question is being asked on Main Streets all over the nation: Just how anti-communist, in a non-political way, is the government?

There is substantial confusion over whether the current ballyhoo over communism is more politicking or not. If not, then wonder is expressed why more definite action steps is not taken.

Practically all Americans abhor communists with a deep, bitter hatred. Even those who a few years ago took attitude if Russians wanted communism, that was their business, believe communism is a world-wide espionage and sabotage system.

That is why Senator Joe McCarthy is an enigma to many. While an apparent majority believe he has clearly focused the problem, wonder is expressed why government as a whole has not made an all out attack on problem using legislation already passed by Congress.

Senator Paul Douglas raises another large question in public mind. "Why is government permitted to trade with communist-controlled nations?"

He cites, for example, trade with Poland, under Kremlin control. He notes, imports from Poland in 1951 to 1952, \$13,500,000 rose to \$12,318,000 during the first ten months of 1953.

Apartheid among nations is necessary to obtain certain vital materials, Senator Douglas also quotes figures.

Imports of Polish canned ham, for example, from 1951 to 1952, shouldered and bacon which in 1951 totalled \$3,956,000 amount to \$9,905,000 in first ten months of 1953. And increased importation of communist pork is in face of domestic farm surpluses.

Sen. Douglas states under the Acts of 1890 and 1930 White House has authority to embargo imports. While Polish trade is not large, it is vital to Soviet Polish economy.

Best evidence of this is fact Polish communist government now takes action to stop flow of relief packages to unfortunate Polish people.

But now the Polish government will collect a tax of \$125 on every new or used dress received from the U. S., \$15 on a pair of children's shoes, \$37.50 on a pair of men's shoes, and right down the line with confiscatory taxes.

On the other hand, Polish government announces no tax on relief packages ordered through its official P.K.O. Trading Corporation, located at 25 Broad Street, New York. In other words, Poland, as all communist nations, hungers for dollars.

In 1952, even Russia gained \$16,742,000 dollars by exports to the U. S. Our exports totalled only \$20 thousand to Russia. And while many experts claim that the present Russian government will collapse of its own weight, that collapse is undoubtedly delayed by dollar bulwarking.

So again the people seem far ahead of politicians.

While the American public dearly loves a Roman circus for a while, eventually Americans want action.

And from indications at grass roots level the average citizen is now expecting government on communism issue to either "put up or shut up."

# Bureau Lends Sympathetic Ear To North Plains Irrigation Need

## Farm Bureau Report



In at least some of the local papers you will find published some of the problems facing farmers north of the Canadian River in relation to the availability of natural gas for the operation of their irrigation wells. Since there is nothing in the books of Farmer County Farm Bureau relating to this particular case, it will be appreciated if members will study the matter and report their feelings about it to the office so we will know whether to lend assistance in the solution. (The story appears at the end of this column.)

Be sure, if you receive a cotton allotment which you do not wish to plant this year, to release it to the County Committee. Some

one else may be glad to use it this year, and you will still be credited with it for your base next year. If you ignore it, it's gone for good from your farm and county.

Of 15 billion, 194 million dollars designated for Federal Aid to specific groups in 1954, 520 million are designated for agriculture. This is 27 million less than the 1953 estimated amount for agriculture. In every other group receiving aid, there is a sharp increase. Business' share, for instance, is increased by 45 million. Farmers have a right in view of these figures, to make demands for decreases in the spending of tax monies, to which they contribute, in other fields. Farmers constitute 15 per cent of the national population, but their share of assistance is one billion, 759 million dollars short of that percentage of the total amount. Who is accumulating the national debt.

This column appears in three papers serving Farmer County citizens, but since there are those near Deaf Smith and Curry Co., N.M. who take other papers, we have been requested to submit it

to two other papers for more complete coverage of our membership area. We'll submit it and hope it is accepted.

For those who wonder: any action of the Water District or Committee is entirely separate from Farm Bureau. To be more specific, there is no connection between the two. Farm Bureau, for the convenience of the public, is providing assistance in speeding up issuance of permits by providing its office facilities. We consider this a public service.

CONSIDER THIS: Apply thine heart unto instruction, and thine ears to the words of knowledge. Proverbs 23: 12.

Farmers north of the Canadian River in Texas, having weathered four years of severe lrouth conditions, are beginning to turn to irrigation as a road to production. Now they find that their chosen route is not without problems.

During the past few dry years Plains farmers have invested heavily in machinery and equipment, all of which has produced little return from farm operations. With more than 3,000,000 acres of land facing permanent damages, the natural swing was to irrigation particularly after geological surveys pointed to adequate underground water.

On May 1, 1953 there were 150 wells in the North Plains area. The number had increased to 250 by January of 1954.

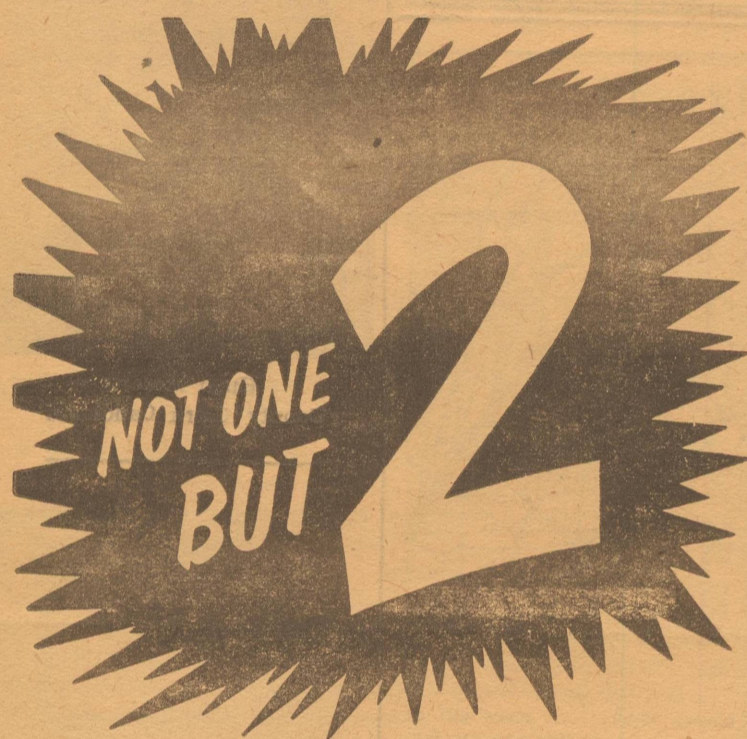
The big blow to the farmers came on September 1, 1953, when major gas producing companies informed farmers that gas which had been used for irrigation well fuel in the past would no longer be available for irrigation purposes. In most cases the farmer owns one-eighth of the minerals where the irrigation well is located, yet under the new directive he no longer is allowed to use a portion of the gas being produced in the operation of his irrigation pump motor.

That fact, say the farmers, is of serious concern to them because cheap fuel is absolutely necessary when pumps are required to lift the irrigation water from 225 to 375 feet.

Area producing gas companies have said that all gas now produced has been dedicated to pipeline companies now serving Eastern states markets. An estimated 49 per cent of all natural gas produced in Texas goes for out of state consumption.

Should gas be made available to farmers of the North Plains at reasonable prices, there would be, in the opinion of Plains agricultural experts, at least 4,000 wells drilled in the area during the next five years. Of course, the total irrigation potential of the Plains area depends entirely on the availability of natural gas.

Mrs. Fowler McEntire of Sterling City was guest speaker at a joint meeting Tuesday evening of the three women's clubs of Friona.

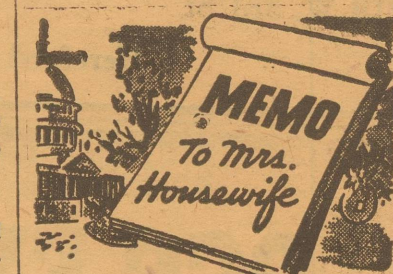
Introduced by Melba Miller, the speaker told of highlights of the General Federation Convention in Washington, D.C. last May, an event which she had attended.

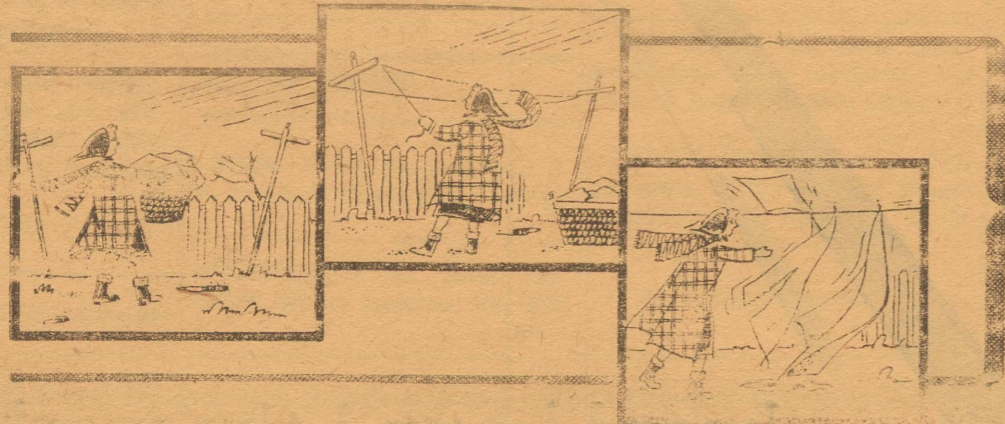

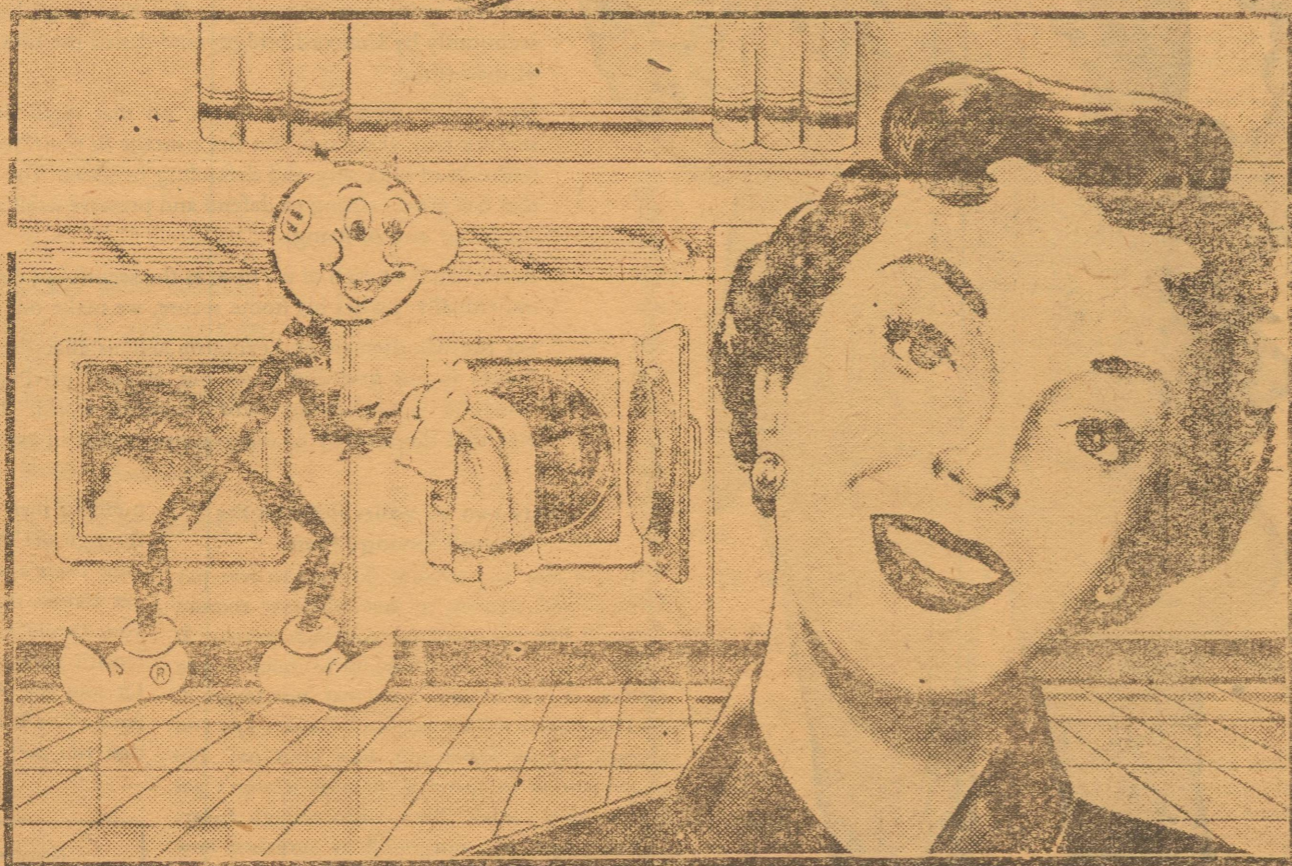

Elsewhere on the political front, State Representative Dudley T. Dougherty of Beeville, a rancher and oil man, scotched reports that he would withdraw as a candidate for the U.S. Senate, opposing Lyndon B. Johnson, incumbent seeking another term.

"There were 87 excellent reasons which prompted me on Feb. 7 to announce my candidacy for the United States Senate," Dougherty said, "and those 87 reasons, plus many more, will keep me in the race right down to the finish line."

Johnson won his office in 1948, getting 87 votes more than former Governor Coke R. Stevenson, who contended that he lost because of 200 illegally added to returns from Box 13 in Jim Wells County after the polls had closed.

Robert S. Calvert announced his candidacy for re-election as state comptroller of public accounts.

And C. T. Johnson, Austin to file for a state office, actively businessman, the first candidate campaigned as candidate for lieutenant governor by visiting 33 towns in Central Texas.

Johnson hammered at telephone rates as a major plank in his platform, saying that "most towns do not have the financial resources to match the battery of lawyers and accountants with which the telephone company launches its drive for rate increases."

Johnson proposes a gross income tax on telephone companies to help finance \$100 per month pensions for persons 65 or more years old.

Busy making speeches over the state and still being talked about as a potential, major candidate for governor is Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney.

Liberal Young Democrats of Texas, pledged to support the National Democratic Party, will convene in San Antonio May 8 and 9th.

Robert E. Hall of Austin, who called the meet denounced the recent Young Demos' session at Mineral Wells as a "fake" and claimed that the convention was dominated by "hand-picked conservatives".


