
The concert is set for Wednesday, July 3. Gates to the park will open at 4 p.m.

Police investigating case of assault; suspect sought

Staff Writer Police are searching for a male suspect after an incident of family violence Saturday left a Big Spring woman with severe facial injuries

"The lady advised that she and a family member had gotten in an argument and she had been struck in the head with an object, she believes it was a hammer," said Police Sgt. Roger Sweatt. "She had some pretty bad injuries about the face and head."

The incident reportedly

occurred about 6 p.m. Saturday at a home in the 300 block of Northeast Street, Sweatt Eighth added.

"We're not sure exactly. but it appears like her cheekbone was broken right around the eye socket," he said. "She was struck at least twice, she's figuring. She was struck a couple of times causing some cuts and bruises and knots, and probably some broken bones."

Rodeo pays off more than \$30,000 to top-notch competitors

Sports Editor Byron Walker will likely have a soft spot in his heart for Big Spring for some time to come. Winning a pocketful of money tends to do that to a person.


Walker walked away from the 69th Annual Big Spring Reunion and Rodeo as the biggest winner Saturday night. The Professional **Rodeo** Cowboys Association standout earned more than \$1,900 in prize money for his two days work in the Crossroads capital.

In all, Big Spring Reunion and Rodeo officials handed out more than \$30,000 this

year to top finishers in the four-day event. The Big Spring PRCA rodeo drew more than 3,000 fans and 280 entrants in 2002 the largest total in recent history

Brett Franks, who hails from Goodwell, Okla., and Cuero standout James Boudreaux were the top prize winners in their event and took home \$1,088. Kelly netted \$824 for his efforts.

Boudreaux, a native of Cuero, won \$1,040 in the bareback division.



'We've had overflow crowds at the amphitheatre every year," he added. "But that's part of the beauty of an event like this. Even for those who decided to spread blankets on the grounds outside the amphitheater, the show was just as thrilling as for those sitting inside."

The 2001 celebration, which featured a performance by the Big Spring Symphony and Chorale and the traditional patriotic fireworks display, began with a performance by country music star Janie Fricke.

This year, however, the committee has opted for the West Texas Musical Review that features local talent performing a variety of music, rather than trying to book another "big name."

Sponsors of the event are Crime Division.' the Big Spring Herald, Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce, Big Spring Symphony, the city of Big Spring and KBST, which broadcasts the concert for those who are unable to get into the amphitheatre. Yet the real key to the concert's success has always been the response from the businesses and individuals who donate funds for the project. And while the committee has received a number of donations and is closing in on the amount needed to fund the show, contributions are still needed some \$7,000 to \$9,000. "We're getting closer to having what we need to pay all the bills for the show, but we're not there yet," Blackshear noted. "We still need people to get caught up in the excitement so our community can collectively display its patriotism and celebrate the freedoms we enjoy as Americans.' When gates to the amphitheatre open on July 3 numerous vendors' booths will also open. Those vendors always offer a wide range of foods and novelty items. Food booths usually offer hamburgers and hot dogs, turkey legs, barbecue, sausage on a stick, popcorn, snow cones, cotton candy, burritos, roasted corn on the cob, corn dogs, cheese fries, fajitas, french fries, nachos, Frito pie, pizza, cookies, candy, soft drinks and bottled water. Other booths will offer gift items and glow-in-the-dark necklaces. 

The Power Team started a quarter-century ago with the one man's discovery about how to get people's attention.

"John Jacobs, the leader and founder of the Power Team, started it 25 years ago," Kopta said. "He was going to Bible college and started going to prisons and preaching. He saw a guy on TV snap a pair of handcuffs and he was a teenage powerlifting champion at the time and he thought, 'Well, I could do that.

Jacobs told a group of prisoners that he would duplicate the feat at the next week's session, Kopta said.

"He told the prisoners that he was coming back next week and he would try to snap a pair of handcuffs," he said. "He had about 30 to 40 people every week and when he came back he had, like, 400, to see him snap those handcuffs, and he snapped them. That day over half of them gave their hearts to Christ, so he felt like at that point he was on to something."

The Power Team has spread its message all over the United States and in 27 countries. It has also been featured on the television "Walker: Texas show Ranger," and now does about 1,250 school assemblies each year.



> If you are a parent, grandparent, guardian, or someone else responsible for rearing a child, have you ever heard these words from your child: "You don't love me!" Now, I'm sure in some cases the words, "You don't love me" are actually true. There are some people who never feel love and because of this, it's impossible for them to give love. However, in most cases the child who says, "You don't love me" is actually using these words as a tool to get what he or she wants.

In recent years, discipline has become a major problem in our nation's schools and also in millions of homes across America. If

we are to reverse this trend, it is important for us to understand the difference between "true" love and doing what is best for our children, as opposed to letting them use our emo-

If we do a good job of raising them, when they are old enough to understand, we can say "Do you remember when you used to tell me. 'You don't love me."" Well, the truth is, I loved you enough to ask you to clean your room, to not make excuses for your lack of respect and bad manners. I loved you enough to let you stumble, fall and fail, so that you could learn to stand alone. But most of all, I loved you enough to say 'no,' when you hated me for it. This, my child, was the hardest part of all."

There's little question the four-day run opened in impressive fashion with an entergetic crowd Wednesday night — Dollar Night.





Less than two weeks after Sept. 11, The Washington Post reported on an e-mail written by a lobbyist and circulated at Graham's request. Graham had asked her "to convene key lobby ists to identify and rank' the regulations business most wanted to target. Among the 57 listed were parts of the Family and Medical Leave Act, foodlabeling requirements, reporting toxic emissions and mine-ventilation standards. That may sound to some like a grandiose plot. but here's the genius part of smart deregulation: Instead of doing this secret ly (well, OK, the memo wasn't supposed to become public), the OMB now puts all the info about who meets with Graham right up on its Web site, www.whitehouse.gov/omb/i nforeg/regpol.html. The site offers a log of his meetings,

letters he sends to agencies and general guidance he issues on rulemaking, says the WSJ As Izzy Stone used to say,

"Who needs a conspiracy when what they're doing to you is right on the front page?'

OMB Watch, a public interest group, took a close look at Graham's performance on the problem of underinflated tires: The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates hundreds of people die each year as a result of underinflated tires

After the big flap over bad tires on SUVs, Congress told the highway safety people to fix the

was dangerously low. But no new rules can be put in place without the OK from the rules czar, and Graham told the safety people to go back to the drawing board.

In rejecting the safety folks' plan, Graham argued that they should instead allow a cheaper "indirect system" favored by automobile manufacturers, which works with anti-lock brakes. Graham fully acknowledges that the "direct" system works bet ter, but he claims the cheaper, less effective alter native would serve as incentive for manufactur ers to install anti-lock brakes, and the brakes would save more lives than the tire pressure gizmo.

Now this might make sense if anti-lock brakes saved lives. But Graham cites a study whose own author contends it does not show that anti-lock brakes would save lives.

"This is hardly the first time Graham has implausi bly interpreted evidence to fit his preconceived point of view against regulation," says the OMB Watch report. In 2000, while serving on the EPA's Science Advisory Board, he claimed studies showed low levels of dioxin can actually pro tect against cancer, that it is an "anti-carcinogen."

I always wonder if people like that would feed dioxin to their own children According to the EPA, dioxin – even at low levels is linked to cancer, infertility, immune system damage and learning disabilities.

Safeguards, says Graham is "a nice guy doing enormous damage. He deserves credit for more transparency at OMB so we can see how he's gutting safety, health and environmental protections. He cloaks his actions under the guise of science, but it's mostly pseudo-science.

The OMB Watch report concludes: "By invoking anti-lock brakes, Graham gives the appearance of being chiefly driven by safety concerns - although it should be remembered, this concern is expressed in the context of rejecting a safety standard. This is reminiscent of Graham's opposition to EPA's 1997 regulation to prevent against smog, which he argued would actually increase the rate of skin cancer.

"As with the tire pressure monitoring case, Graham did not attack the standard directly, as an industry lobbyist would, nor did he focus on costs alone. Instead, he cast himself as an advocate for greater public health while opposing the regulation. Ironically, when Graham expresses concern over health or safety, this is usually bad news. "In playing this role,

Graham frequently pits one possible health or safety measure against another, forcing an unnecessary trade-off to justify inaction, which has long been his hallmark.' I'd say Graham uses the

Sports Editor It's a good thing Kay Blandford knows patience is a virtue. She had plenty of opportunity to exercise it last week.



HC's DeGeer takes sixth in College NFR All-Around

Big Spring star ready to prove NJCAA title is just the beginning



As a freshman at Big Spring High School in 1997, Ashlie Simmons found her game. The rest of the collegiate world has been paying the price for it ever since.

Simmons recently etched her name into the National Junior College Athletic Association history books. In May, the former Lady Steers' standout helped guide McLennan Community College to the NJCAA national golf championship in Shawnee, OK, In so doing, she became the first Big Spring golfer ever to nail down the NJCAA individual title.

"It was a wonderful feeling doing that," said Simmons, a three-time district medalist during her prep career at BSHS. "I was really overjoyed when I found out I had woh."

Winning the junior college title was anything but easy, however. High winds plagued the tournament for two days. inflating scores and playing havoc with tee shots. "The wind was really high on Wednesday and Thursday, getting up to about 40 miles an hour at times," said Simmons, the daughter of Janet McMahan and "Snuffy" Simmons. "All the scores were high on Thursday so it was hard.' Simmons fires a 79 in the opening round of the national tournament and found herself down three strokes.

Howard College rodeo standout Jake DeGeer highlighted a solid performance by the Hawks this past week at the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyo. DeGeer placed sixth in the men's All-Around standings and helped Howard College finished 21st in the overall team standings.

DeGeer, en route to amassing 100 of his team 195 points, placed in the top 45 in the nation in both steer wrestling and calf roping. Two-time all-around champion Cody Demers of

Southern Idaho won the men's title and led his school to the CNFR crown.

Behind Demers, Southern Idaho racked up 602.5 points, and easily outdistanced Walla Walla `('Wash.) Community

"I was the only player to shoot in the 70s on the final day. That just goes to show you how the game of golf is," she said.

The winds blew in the ensuing day, pushing all the scores into the 80s. Despite the win. Simmons managed to pencil in an 81 and remain tied for the individual lead.

The tie melted away faster than a snowball in Miami in the final round. Simmons shot a 74 over the final 18 holes of the tournament and claimed a 10-stroke victory.

Anchored by Simmons' play, McLennan edged out several junior college powers for the overall team championships – ending a two-year run of finishing as the NJCAA runner-up.

"That was our goal all year long," she said of her team's play. "We were just sick and tired of finishing second. We finished second the past two years and we didn't want to do that again.'

Of course, the schedule McLennan faced last season also helped. Through the season, the McLennan squad competed against Division I powers such as Notre Dame, Texas A&M, Ohio State and several Big 12 squads.

The Juco crown — and her strong play during the spring – turned more than a few of the larger college's attention her way. 
HC star gunning for Miss Texas **Rodeo** honors






