## Soil Conservation District ACTIVITIES - NEWS - SUGGESTIONS

Last Friday morning brought back memories of the 1934-35 era. According to the weatherman that was the first old black dust storm since 1937.

I was down by the S. L. Shelley farm last Thursday. My old Dodge decided to quit running right in front of his house. So I had to walk up in the field where Mr. Shelley was doing a pretty job of breaking with his 2-way moldboard. Mr. Shelley is the only person in Parmer County that we know about that has elected to take advantage of the ACP payment for establishing a crop rotation. He plans to use either vetch or winter peas to help increase the organic matter in his soils.

We have just laid out 18 acres of bench leveling on the Roy Euler farm. Even though Mr. Euler's farm is pretty flat he feels that bench leveling has some advantages. It will help him get uniform water distribution plus holding all of the rainfall exactly where it falls.

After the leveling job, Mr. Euler feels that the soil will need conditioning. At the present time he plans to plant this block to clover for soil conditioning and improvement.

You should hear C. L. Murray who lives across the draw south of Hub, tell about the effects of vetch on crop production. He planted 20 acres on his place near Lubbock and was well satisfied with its results.

Friona will be 50 years old soon and I hope the event will be celebrated by a semi-centennial.

Surely you can understand why I hate to miss an issue of the Star. I lived there 27 years - years of wonderful memories.

According to radio reports you're getting a record big blow today. Dry? Well, ask Lillard, Reeve, Harris, et al about a real dry period - 1908 thru 1914.

Did you know, Parmer County's first court house stands on Main Street in Friona, owned by Scotty Weir?

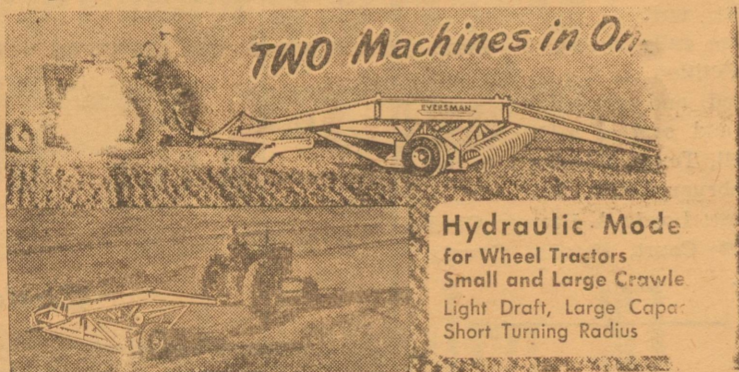

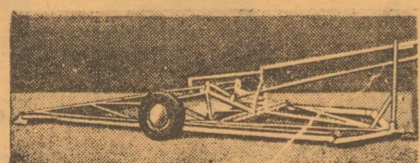

## Hospital Enthusiasm In High; Drive Underway

Hospital Management Sends Message Emphasizing 'It's Up to You'

The organization work is over, it is up to you, the people who live in Parmer County, as to whether the Hospital Building Program will be a success or not. The workers received their final instructions, and you will no doubt be contacted in the next few weeks for a subscription. If you value your health or the health of the future generations who live in this area, your hospital building program will be a success. We believe we can give

that care as well as any hospital, but not forever in our present out-dated facilities. Facilities which never have been adequate, and with additions to our staff of another doctor and dentist, will be even more unpleasant - both to our patrons, and to as good a medical service as is possible to be given in an up to date hospital. Your subscription is not for cheaper medical care - it is for better care. It is cheaper in that as a charit-

able non-profit organization, no tax money is needed for its operation. We are not in competition when it comes to medical care received.

To those people who would like to acquire membership, we have on hand several persons who are willing to transfer their stock. The first step in this action is to contact the Hospital management for a questionnaire which is very similar to one filled out when acquiring an insurance policy. When that is complete, the hospital manager will take it before the Board of Directors and the doctors for approval. When this is accepted (and it will be, unless, like on insurance policies, it is considered a poor risk) the party buying the stock can go ahead and pay the seller whatever price they have agreed on. New stock sold for \$100 and the hospital will enter the selling price of transferred stocks in no way. When this has been accomplished, a \$10 transfer fee will be paid to the hospital where the old stock (which must be presented) will be voided and a new one issued. Dues will then be paid which are \$16 for the head of the family and \$8 for each dependant, this being due annually. Benefits received are no doctor fee except after hours calls, \$1 cheaper room rate, and a percentage off of x-rays and laboratory work. Medicine is the same to members and non-members. In other words, your membership is a form of prepaid insurance.

We urge each citizen of this area to ponder the advances of medical care which have been made in the past century. Are we going to stop where we are now? Are the future citizens going to have to do our work for us? We believe not; we believe the people will accept their responsibility and speak out by making the building fund program a success. That way the road to better health will have one less rough spot for future citizens to travel. We owe it to ourselves as well as the future. LET'S DO IT!

Hereford. The secretary will mail a meeting notice together with a list of nominees to all members of the co-op at least ten days before the meeting date. Additional nominations may be made from the floor of the meeting, however no one member may nominate more than one candidate.

For voting purposes, a member is defined in the laws as a person holding a \$50.00 membership. A joint membership may be held by husband and wife. In this case only one vote may be cast by the holders of the joint membership.
