Trades Days Are Set on Saturdays

Trades Days will be continued in Friona, but moved from the former 1st Monday time to the first Saturday in each month, the Chamber of Commerce voted in meeting Tuesday night of this week.

Details of prizes were not concluded at this meeting, but maximum awards will be made in accordance with number of Trades tickets issued by the merchants. All customers of the area are urged to ask their merchant for the free trades day tickets. This month \$150 worth were awarded.

The Third Saturday Community Auction will be continued, with a special feature added this

month at the March 20 auction. Consignors at time are invited to bring their goods and contribute all, part or none of the proceeds to the local hospital fund. Several already have indicated intention of selling items for the hospital benefit.

Committees were appointed at the meeting to work on Trades Day and another to take proper action regarding the March 1st curtailment of Sunday mail service for Friona and many other towns along this Santa Fe route. The committees were instructed to work with other affected towns to promote group and individual

\$250,000 School Bond Vote Rooms for Primary Building

The rapidly increasing enrollment has posed a very acute housing situation at the schools here, Superintendent Caffey joins with the board in pointing out, and some immediate remedial steps are necessary to cope with the problem, he added.

This year the first grade enrollment is 109, compared to 78 at the close of last school year; and with estimate of future need it is anticipated that within four years there will be 12 sections in the first four grades (with 25-39 students to a section). Next year enrollment is expected to

include about 160 first graders alone.

The school board has negotiated with Arch A. Edwards & Co. of Dallas to prepare the petition proceedings for calling of election. The petition is expected here this week end, and the bond election would be called 12 days after filing of the petition.

So a bond election could most likely transpire here within three weeks.

Present indebtedness on the school totals \$372,000 on a total

school district property valuation of over \$8 million. The indebtedness has decreased from the 1951 high of \$5450,500 in spite of the heavy demands on the budget.

A school board spokesman stated that voting of the proposed bonds would not call for any increase of property valuation, with the 50 cent rate continuing.

The Friona school system has undergone rapid growth in the past few years, bringing it to the present enrollment of 780 students, with 31 teachers. When

Supt. Caffey came here in 1947 the enrollment was 410, and 13 teachers were employed.

Should the bond vote carry, the board plans to launch the building of the Primary school immediately so as to have it ready for the pressing needs at the beginning of the 1954-55 term in September.

Bonding companies already have looked the situation over, and Caffey reports that offers include some as low as 3 1-4 per cent interest, with 24 year retirement.

Parmer Wrecks Exact Heavy Toll

... person was hospitalized, ... were placed in jail ... '52 Dodge pickup over... 2 miles northeast of Bovina on Highway 60 about 3 A. M. last Friday.

Investigating Highway Patrol reported that the Dodge, driven by Halford Alley of Dimmitt, rolled for 81 feet before flipping some 20 more feet to land straddling an irrigation ditch on the north side of the highway. The pickup was a near total wreck.

Placed in a Clovis jail on drink charges were the passengers, Donald R. Ziegler, Harry G. Nance and Wayne Newton. The sailor driver was home on leave from the navy.

Earlier the same night a car driven by J. B. Pennington, 56, of Albuquerque, veered off the highway east of Lariat, completely wrecking the vehicle although the driver was uninjured. The car landed between trees along

side the highway and was pinned with wheels completely off the ground.

Total Parmer County vehicle accidents in February alone accounted for over \$1550.00 property damage, and the 2-month total of this year is \$4450 damage and four injuries. This is higher than average for the 26 Panhandle county total of \$86,680 property damage. In fact, the local patrol states that Parmer County is higher in accidents and traffic infractions than any other county they serve.

Principal traffic violations here are recorded as (1) speeding, (2) failure to signal and (3) improper parking.

Rural Phone Problem Is Nearing Showdown Stage

With subscribers to the Rural Telephone Cooperative in the Friona area still having to pay toll charges for calls into Friona, representatives of the City of Friona, Rural Telephone Cooperative and General Associated Telephone Company met Monday night to investigate a solution to enable an Extended Area Service

contract. As a result, the General Telephone firm was granted permission to poll subscribers on its lines in Friona asking if they are willing to absorb the increased costs by a rate increase. If the increase is granted, then no toll will be charged on calls from Friona to the country, and visa

versa. Proposed increases would be an additional \$1.50 for private business phones; \$1.25 for two-party business phones; 40 cents for private residence, and 30 cents for party residence lines.

Co-op subscribers are now benefitting from a rate of \$3, which will be increased to \$4.75 regardless of the toll outcome, according to Robert Bell of the co-op organization. The initial low rate was a local concession desired to effect the toll charges, but the national phone cooperative from whom this concession was urged their objection of \$1.75.

General Telephone representatives present at the meeting were Messrs. Cramer and Fleming of Brownfield, and Roberts and R. B. of the Littlefield office. They pointed out their contentions that toll charges or increased rates were their only appreciable revenue from long distance calls, inasmuch as they do not own the trunk lines serving this area and must pay Southwestern Bell for use of their lines which must be used for even Friona calls since the Hereford central office is used, tying up Hereford-Friona Bell lines. Also they said they would have to erect lines to the edge of their territory to connect the Hub and the Parmer Exchanges. These lines would be longer than those necessary in the Bovina area, and more people would be served, hence a slightly higher rate than charged at Bovina.

Fifty phones have been taken out by subscribers in the Hub and Parmer Exchanges because of the toll charges for calling into Friona, with Mr. Bell emphatically stating that these would be replaced by the subscribers when and if the Extended Area Service contract was negotiated.

!FIRE!

Firemen of the entire area are becoming well acquainted with the Parmer County town of Bovina, again answering a call this evening to fight blazes at the Triplett Feed Pens located in the east edge of Bovina.

Fire broke out in a stack of cotton burs about 4 o'clock, and late in the night firemen were still standing vigil from Friona, Bovina, Clovis, Texico, Farwell, Hereford and Dimmitt.

Most acute problem proved to be the lack of water, couple with the high winds. The entire Bovina water supply was exhausted early in the night and firetrucks then stood by with emergency tanks filled from irrigation wells.

Fortunately for the entire town of Bovina, wind remained in the west, spreading the flames to the east of town rather than through its midst. The entire Triplett holdings south of the old highway were burned. Fences, barns, hay, sacked feed and cotton burs all lit up the sky, the burs and sparks fanned to phenomenal distances by the high winds.

Cattle were loosed through the burned fences, and none were believed burned.

Actually, fire has been smoldering in the burr pile at the yards there since Thanksgiving, flaring up from time to time when the winds were high. It was from this pile that the present fire originated.

Three Left on Ballot Friona City Officials

Indications are that three names will appear on the Friona City ballot for April elections.

Names on file are the incumbent officials: Charles Allen, mayor; and Raymond White and H. K. Kendrick, commissioners.

Kendrick allowed his name to be submitted only to be placed on the ballot if he is determined eligible. At present he resides outside of the city limits, although petitions have been circu-

lated to annex the "West Loop" addition.

Petitions were circulated Saturday bearing the names of a proposed slate of T. J. Crawford for mayor, and O. J. Beene and Raymond White for commissioners. However, Mr. Crawford did not sign the application, and Beene withdrew his name early this week after it appeared that Mr. Crawford's name would not appear on the ballot.

Monday Morning Musings

Is the National Budget To be Balanced by Friona?

There is distinct difference in sound economy and false economy.

We hope the postal department recognizes this, on both the local and national levels.

We have been led to believe through the years that the postal department was set up as a service institution. Then, when "economy" moves affect that service, something is grossly inconsistent and amiss. We are in accord with sound moves that do not limit the service we have learned to expect - service that is deserved.

But, when a "false" economy move is proposed for political or selfish reasons, then we vehemently comment "nutz".

For one thing, Sunday mail service is needed in this community. It was here when the community was much smaller than it is at present. It was cut off on March 1st. Though often very few letters are mailed here, comparatively speaking, on Sunday, the INCOMING traffic is heavy, and IMPORTANT, and should be recognized and distinctly emphasized on any recommendation

from the local postmaster.

The post office is the only link between the Federal Government and the little towns in many instances. It is an important link, and maximum effort should prevail to see that relationships through this channel remain harmonious with full service rendered.

We don't know what will be done on a permanent basis about hour cutting and rumblings of lay-offs on the local scene and possibly elsewhere, affecting post office personnel, but we do offer this: When the highest as well as the least employee submits to hour cutting, we can observe with much more open mind than when only some are affected. Actually the trend of thought among postal workers over the nation is that raises are in order. We would not be an authority on this.

Until the postmaster, anywhere, and Friona in particular as it affects our community, cuts HIS salary first, backing up to accept his set pay check, we cannot think he is playing cricket by balancing the national bud-

get at the expense of his help-less employees.

Right, Mr. McLellan?

There is a very real problem with us regarding Extended Area Service of telephone service, the connecting link between the rural phone cooperative members and phones on the General Telephone lines here in Friona.

We carry the story this week in the news columns of this issue, refraining from editorial comment.

But, like it or not, SOMEONE is going to have to pay for the connecting service if it is obtained without toll charges.

Sixteen were present at the publicized Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday night in Friona. Though this was far from total membership, a more representative group was present than often true at such meetings, enabling some constructive discussion of such pressing problems as trades days, postal situations, general civic activity, etc.

The group present did all they could, we have no doubt; also the Retail Activities committee has worked hard and conscientiously.

Yet something is lacking - we believe due to NOT ENOUGH local businessmen participating.

The solution? We suggest more active C of C members and/or regular meetings of the retail businessmen of Friona to thresh out ideas, schemes and mutual problems. We'd better do more, fellow Friona citizen, in keeping our community abreast of its natural position of leadership.

Cannot all the retail merchants meet and feel free to discuss the ever present problems? We believe so. Who will take the initiative?

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

PEANUT BUTTER CUPCAKES

1-3 cup butter, margarine or other shortening
1-2 cup peanut butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
1-3 cups brown sugar
2 egg yolks, plus 1 egg
2 cups sifted flour
3-4 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup milk
Meringue (see below)

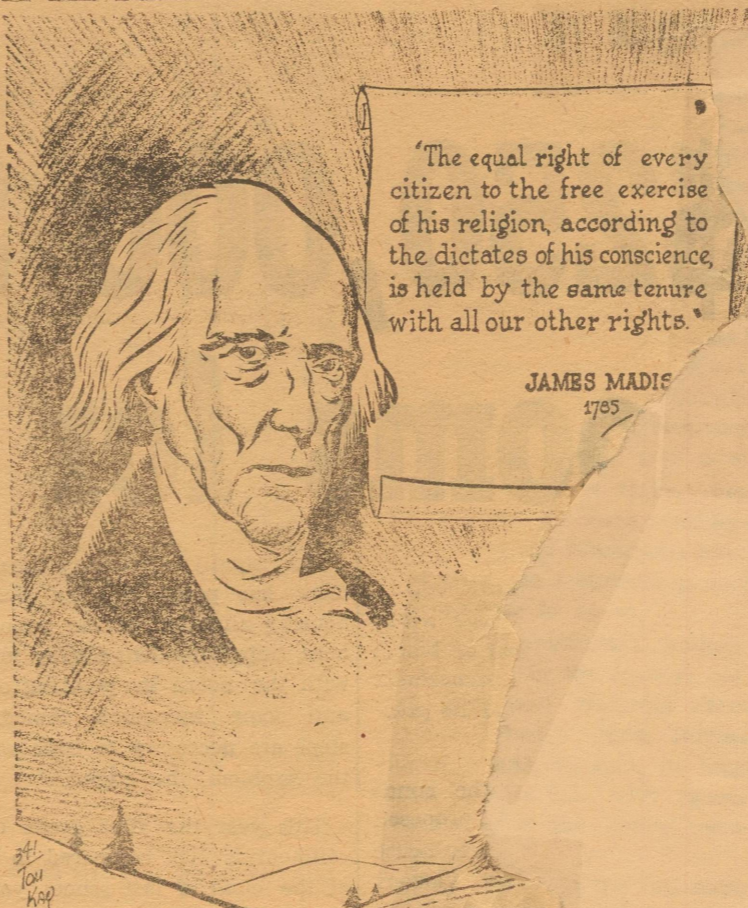
1-2 cup chopped salted peanuts

Blend shortening, peanut butter and vanilla. Gradually add cup of sugar, creaming until light and fluffy. Beat eggs with remaining 1-3 cup sugar. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with milk to the peanut butter mixture. Fill lightly greased muffin pans half full, cover with meringue, and sprinkle with chopped peanuts. Bake at 350 degrees (moderate oven) about 25 minutes or until the meringue is set and well browned. Makes 24 2-inch cupcakes.

AUSTIN -- Political tension tightens as the March 15 convening date of the Texas legislature draws nearer.

There are three aspects: (1) the special session to raise money for teacher and state employee salary increases and other purposes; (2) the conservative-liberal conflict within the Democratic Party of Texas; and (3) the jockeying for position by candidates for public office.

As to the special session, there are a variety of proposals for collecting the money for teacher pay. Some advocate tax on beer. Others say gas should pay the way. And still others think an increase in the present omnibus tax law would do the trick.

Also mentioned is the possibility of a sales tax.

The open-end cost of the Gilmer Aiken school law, now estimated to increase taxes several million dollars annually, and the continued demands for additional services from the state government, is bringing more talk of a general sales tax.

Shivers and Senterfitt are at odds concerning the Democratic party's affairs.

The governor was not invited to the Southern conference of the National Democratic Committee held in Florida last Saturday, and a spokesman said "I don't think he would have gone anyway."

Two men, who have been close to the governor, however, were invited. They were Wallace Savage of Dallas, state chairman of the Democratic Party, and Geo. Sandlin of Austin, state party secretary.

Also invited were Senterfitt, who has announced that he will be a candidate for governor this year, and John C. White, commissioner of Agriculture who also may be a gubernatorial candidate.

In a speech at Houston, White called upon Texans to reject Shivers' party leadership.

While he did not mention the governor by name, White obviously, referred to him in saying that it is time to "re-establish political integrity" in our state. And he added: "The principals of party affiliation have been so abused that it is difficult to determine which party is in the lead - or if any united party exists at all. I cannot see how we can afford to maintain people in public office who owe allegiance to nothing else but selfish interest."

Shivers, meanwhile, seem to notice that the fight between conservatives and the nat party will continue.

He challenged the right national party to establish "Democratic Advisory Committee" in Texas and questioned group's authority to "advise anybody".

As to the political aspects of the situation, Senterfitt is the only man who has definitely announced as a candidate for the state's highest office.

James P. Hart of Austin, former associate justice of the state supreme court and former chancellor of the University of Texas, said he would not be a candidate for governor. There had been speculation that he might make the race.

It was obvious that developments in the Legislature would affect the political fortunes of Senterfitt, Shivers, Lieutenant Governor Ramsey, and others.

There are already two candidates in the race for the lieutenant governor's office.

The latest is C. T. Johnson, Austin businessman, who made his formal announcement the past weekend. He lashed out at the telephone company because, he said, the company is unfair to the public in that local telephone rates are set without regard to revenue from long distance calls.

Another announced candidate for lieutenant governor is Representative George T. Hinson from Mineola.

Ramsey is considered a likely candidate for re-election if Shivers tries for a third term as the state's chief executive.

Things have been stirring, too, in the ranks of Texas Republicans.

Passed by the Travis County Republican Executive Committee was a resolution asking Jack Porter of Houston, national committeeman, to run for the U. S. Senate.

Horace Spiller, speaking on the resolution, said, "Porter is the only man in Texas who can run and win against Lyndon Johnson."

But the Republicans, like the Democrats, were also having their internal strife.

"Old Guard" party members were organizing for an attempt to recapture control of the Texas GOP from Porter and his fac-

The Texas Highway Registration laws concerning Motor vehicles have been somewhat revised and now require that every one purchase their registration plates in the county in which they reside. The percentage of Parmer County residents registering cars in other counties has been very low in the past. Parmer County (since it has a population of under 10,000) retains the first \$50,000 from motor vehicle registrations. 50 per cent of all over \$50,000 is remitted to the State of Texas, Highway Department.

1954 Motor vehicle plates are now on sale at this office and may also be obtained at the following places and the days designated, in the month of March.

Every Friday in March at the City Hall in Bovina, 9 AM to 5 PM.

Every Saturday in March at the City Hall in Friona, 9 AM to 5 PM.

Monday, March 15th at Lazbuddie Store, 9 AM to 5 PM.

Monday, March 22nd at Black store., 9 AM to 5 PM.

We are prepared to handle any registration by mail in case this form of purchase is desired. We will need the certificate of Title and the 1953 registration receipt to register any Motor vehicle. It is not necessary to have your inspection receipt.

When purchasing 1954 plates you can render your 1954 personal and real property for taxation and secure a Homestead exemption on your real property on state tax. The statutes allow an exemption on your homestead on State tax only.

As in the past, we will be open on Saturday afternoons in the month of March to register cars and trucks.

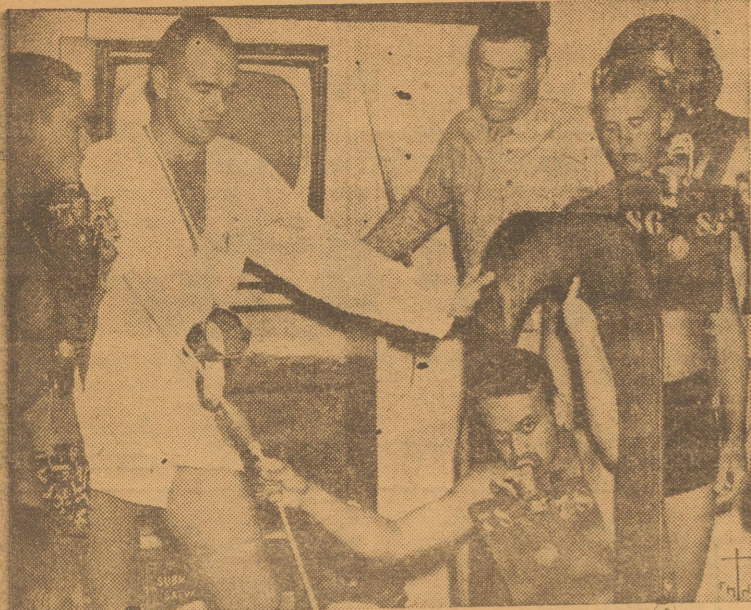

Soil Conservation District ACTIVITIES - NEWS - SUGGESTIONS

BY STEVE BAVOURETT

A couple of weeks ago I was down through the Brownfield, Levelland, Lamesa, Stanton area. It is still very dry there. Wind erosion has certainly taken its toll. Nearly every field has blown until it is hummochy. In some fields there are large sand dunes. Between Brownfield and Lamesa there is a field with a dune in the middle that is six feet high and 300 yards long.

Dry weather has contributed to the condition of that area. However, I wonder if their land use isn't a bigger factor than the drouth. Most of that area has a record of continuous cotton year after year for several years. Our best defense against wind erosion is the use of crop residues or stubbles. Cotton doesn't particularly hurt the soil by what it removes from the soil. It hurts by not putting much back into the soil. Recent field tests show that machine stripped cotton often loses up to 90 times as much soil per acre as does a good field of grain sorghum stubble that is about knee high.

I know that during a drouth you can't grow good crop residues. However if each year we tried to see how much stubble we could leave on top of the soil instead of trying to cover it all up, we might have less wind erosion.

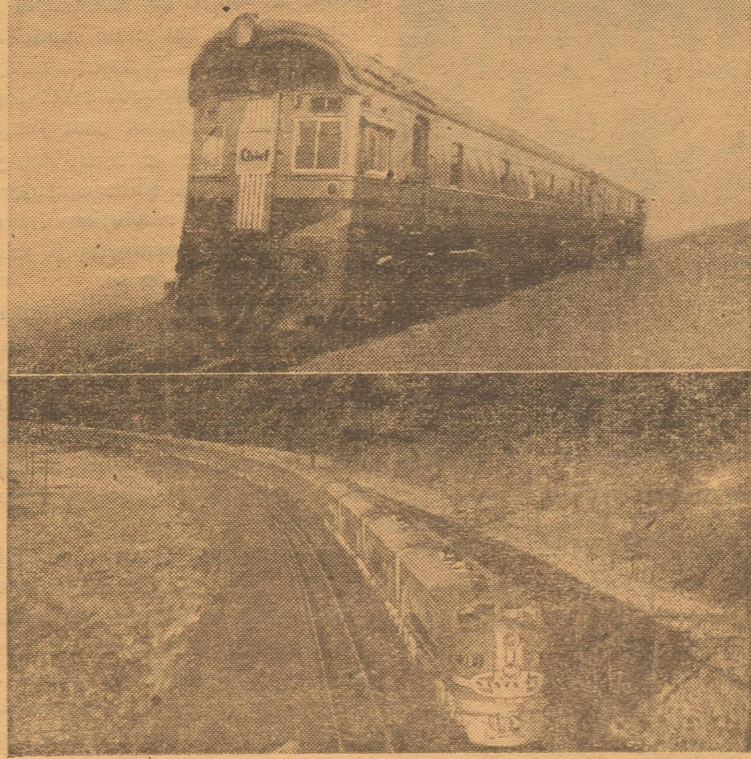
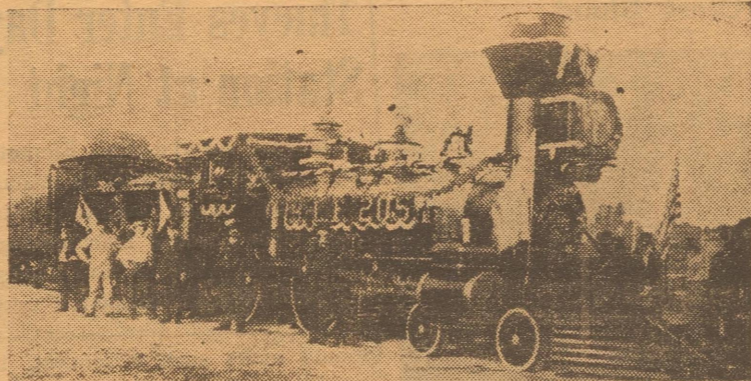

All farm Bureau insurance services are maintained only for farm Bureau members in good standing. This is the policy for all casualty, fire, liability and hospitalization insurance. Life insurance is excepted from this ruling because of the long term contract nature. There has apparently been some misunderstanding about this. (Adv.)

Farm Bureau is a Christian, democratic organization of, by and for farmers and ranchers. Only those deriving at least 51 per cent of their income from farming or ranching can be voting members. Others are welcomed as associate supporting members, and are entitled to all services, but cannot vote in the formulation of resolutions.

Every recommendation from Parmer County Farm Bureau to the State Farm Bureau has been adopted by a majority vote at annual convention time. No individual in the organization has the power or right to make recommendations other than those voted by the membership to any group in the name of the Farm Bureau.
