REBATES

City ends year up just slightly compared to '01

More than half of the 19 area communities polled by the *Herald* for sales tax rebates each month finished the calendar year with lower totals than the previous year.

Big Spring, which witnessed drops of 13.03 percent in October and 8.42 percent in November, stabilized this month. The city received \$270,831.14 — 1.58 percent more than the \$266.601.93 it had during taken in December of 2001. For the year then, Big Spring topped out \$3,739,285.07, just 0.25 percent better than the previous 12-month period Still it was one of only nine area communities that completed the year "in the black" as far as sales tax rebates were concerned.

Here's a look at how area communities fared, comparing this month to a year ago and 2002 to 2001.

Stanton received \$6,771.97 this month, down 20.35 percent when compared to the \$8,502.87 the Martin County seat received in December 2001. For the year, Stanton received \$114,811.34, down 5.23 percent when compared to

Israeli forces reoccupy Bethlehem

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israeli forces reoccupied
Bethlehem after a two-day Christmas respite, while
elsewhere troops killed seven Palestinians — the
worst single-day death toll in weeks.

Israeli soldiers in jeeps drove through Bethlehem
on Thursday, declaring a curfew until further notice
and throwing tear gas canisters at people to force
them indoors, residents said.

The Israeli military said the curfew was brought
back for security reasons. Curfews are usually
enforced around-the-clock except for periodic breaks
of a few hours to allow people to buy food. On
Christmas Eve, the Israelis pulled back from the center of Bethiehem, the traditional birthplace of Jesus.
In other parts of the West Bank, seven Palestinians
— five armed fugitives and two bystanders — were
killed Thursday in clashes with Israeli forces. It was
the highest single-day death toll among Palestinians
since Dec. 6, when 10 Palestinians were killed.

A pastoral response to domestic violence

BISHOP MICHAEL D. PFEIFER

I share with you an important and timely statement of the U.S. Catholic Bishops that was approved at their recent annual meeting.

"Violence against women, inside or outside the home, is never justified," the U.S. Bishops say in their statement -When I Call for Help: A Pastoral Response to **Domestic Violence** Against Women. The Bishops approved this statement November 12 at their Fall meeting in-Washington, and the final draft was published this week.

In this statement the Bishops condemn the use of the Bible to support abusive behavior in any form. Religion, the Bishops say, "...can be either a resource or a roadblock for battered women." "No one," the Bishops say, "is expected to stay in a abusive marriage. "Violence and abuse, not divorce, break up a marriage.'

The Bishops encourage pastors of churches and

pastoral staff members to make their churches safe places where abused women and abusive men can come for help. All churches are encouraged to have an action plan in place to follow if an abused woman calls for help.

In "When I Call for Help", the Bishops as pastors of the Catholic Church in the United States state clearly and strongly that violence against women, inside or outside the home, is never justified. Violence in any form—physical, sexual, psychological or verbal — is sinful; often it is a crime as well. The Bishops call for a moral revolution to replace the culture of violence.

The Bishops go on to point out that violence against women in the home has serious repercussions for children. Over 50 percent of men who abuse their wives also beat their children. Children who grow up in violent homes are more likely to develop alcohol and drug addiction, and become abusers themselves. The stage is set

for a cycle of violence that may continue from generation to generation.

The Bishops point out that domestic violence is a learned behavior. Men who batter learn to abuse through observation, experience and reinforcement. They believe that they have a right to use violence; they are also rewarded — that is, their behavior gives them power and control over their partner.

Abusive men come from all economic classes, races, religions and occupations. The batterer may be a "good provider" and a respected member of his church and community.

While there is no one type of abuser, men who abuse share some common characteristics. They tend to be extremely jealous, possessive and easily angered.

Women stay with men who abuse them primarily out of fear. Some fear that they will lose their children. Many believe that they cannot support themselves much less their children.

The Bishops encourage

all Catholic Churches to be a safe place where abused women and abuse men can come for help. The Bishops offer some

specific suggestions: - Include information about domestic violence and local resources in parish bulletins.

 Place copies of this statement and other information including local telephone numbers for assistance about domestic violence in women's restrooms.

- Keep an updated list of resources for abused women

- Find a staff person or volunteer who is willing to receive in-depth training on domestic violence.

- Provide training on domestic violence to all church ministers, including priests, deacons and lay ministers.

 Join in the national observance of October as **Domestic Violence** Awareness Month.

 Use prayer to draw attention to violence and abuse and to pray for God's grace and assistance to overcome domestic violence.



Couscous Stuffing

For the stuffing:

is simple, full of flavor

NEW YORK (AP) -Keep it simple and full of flavor-that's the guideline for a nice December dinner offered by Jamie Oliver, the British cook and TV food-show host.

Oliver developed the nickname "The Naked Chef" partly because simple is one of the best things about the way he works — it's his cooking style, not him — that's stripped down, his line goes.

What makes the stuffing special is that it uses couscous, the North African specialty, instead of bread crumbs. "The couscous actually steams and puffs up inside the bird — it cooks up fluffy and fragrant and it really absorbs the flavors from the meat. It's a real treat for the holidays."

Oliver's recipe as given here is for an 8-pound turkey, which he favors over a super-size bird.

"Now, of course you can do it with turkey," he says, snatching a moment to talk by phone from Chicago, en route to the West Coast, suggesting you make two smaller turkeys instead of one big one if you need to serve a crowd. "Smaller birds taste better."

However, if you want life to be even easier, he says, "You can use baby chickens, 'poussins,' with the same stuffing. Serve one poussin per person - they'll cook in about 45 minutes."

Scientist tied to UFQ-based religious group claims to have cloned a human

HOLLYWOOD, nected to a group that believes life on Earth was created by extraterrestrials claimed today to have produced the world's first human clone, a baby girl named Eve.

Thursday, said Brigitte Boisselier, head of Clonaid, the company that claimed success in the project. She wouldn't say where the baby was born.

She said the baby is a clone of the 30-year-old American woman who donated the DNA for the cloning process. If confirmed, that would make duplicate of her mother.

Boisselier, who spoke at a Friday morning news conference, did not immediately present DNA evidence showing a genetic match between mother and daughter however. That omission leaves her scientifically claim unsupported.

add the lemon and orange juice. Set aside to soften.

Combine rosemary with the orange and lemon zest, and add the mixture to the couscous. Stir to combine. Stir chestnuts into mixture. Season generously with salt, pepper and nutmeg, as the flavors will mellow during the cooking.

To make the seasoned butter: In a big bowl, combine butter, orange zest and five-spice powder until well mixed.

Pluck any stray feathers or hairs off your turkey and give it good wipe, inside and out, with a paper towel.

Place it on its back with its drumsticks pointing toward you. Find the edge of the skin that's covering the turkey's breast and gently peel it back slightly. Work first your fingers and then your hand under the skin, freeing it from the meat it's covering.

If you're careful you should be able to pull all the skin off the meat, keeping it attached at the sides but without ripping any holes in it.

Now take the soft fivespice butter, and smear lots of it under the skin all over the turkey breast.

Replace the skin and pat into place, smearing any remaining butter over the top of the skin and on the drumsticks.

Stuff the turkey cavity with the flavored couscous, leaving a gap big enough for you to fit your hand in between the top of the stuffing and the bottom of the breastbone.

Block the cavity with the lemon halves from which you have squeezed the juice—this will keep the couscous inside the turkey while it cooks. Season the whole bird well with salt and pepper, and place in the hot oven.

After 15 minutes, turn the heat down to 300 F, and roast for 2 1/2 hours, or until the juices run clear from the thigh when pierced with a knife or a skewer.

(The USDA recommends testing for doneness with a meat thermometer inserted into the thickest part of the bird, but not touching the bones or roasting pan.

The internal temperature should reach 170 F in the breast or 180 F in the thigh, and 165 F in the center of the stuffing.)

Makes 6 servings. Chef's tip: Baste your turkey often while it's cooking to help the skin go crispy.

An easy way to do this is to dip a pastry brush in the fat at the bottom of the roasting tray and brush the skin with it.

A group of Hollywood activists and celebrities, led by director Rob Reiner, has written to City Council members in New York, where Washington Mutual Bank recently expanded operations, alerting them tothe savings and loan's role in a controversial land development project.

"We want to call attention to the fact that when Washington Mutual came to Southern California, they promised to be good neighbors, but now they are going ahead with an environmental disaster," wrote Reiner, who heads the coalition of those opposed to the project at Ahmanson Ranch.

The bank plans to build 3,950 homes on the ranch, which sits on a hilly stretch of oak savanna and grassy plains that straddles the line between Los Angeles and Ventura counties.

In addition to homes, it would include schools, a library, two golf courses, a hotel and 400,000 square feet of commercial and office space.

spokesman Washington Mutual, Tim McGarry, said the bank inherited the development project when it acquired HF Ahmanson and Co. in 1998.

"We thought the project was a good one and decided to proceed with it," he said. McGarry said the project received local approval many years before Washington Mutual became involved.

The letter - signed by actors Leonardo DiCaprio, Martin Sheen and Julia Louis Dreyfus, among others - said the development would threaten five endangered species, add to pollution and desecrate an Indian burial ground.

with any big changes in her


personal life.


