He Needs Your Help

Farm Bureau Report



COTTON ACREAGE ALLOTTED TO YOUR FARM, but not planted, MUST be turned back to the county ASC by June 4th, if you are to receive historical credit for that acreage in 1955. We say this to supplement the ad that your Cotton Improvement Association has been running for several weeks if you fail to make this release, you will have no grounds for any complaint about your 1955 allotment. Do it now.

Farm Bureau's noxious weed committee has resolved to present a resolution at the County Convention this fall, plugging for a more effective and stringent certified legislation in Texas. Their attention was called to some seed from other states, bearing no Texas Tag, that, according to the state tag attached, contained no weed seed. Examination disclosed that there were seeds of noxious

nature present. This happened last week. Immediately Bruce Parr Roy Euler, Aubrey Ellison and Joe Jones began to investigate. They found the distributor of the seed, went to see the State Seed Analyst in Lubbock and made arrangements with him to come and sample the seed. Paul Revier spent the entire next day making these checks. In the course of events, some delinted cotton seed was discovered that contained some delinted cockle burs. Check the seed you buy before planting it this year. Next season, we believe legislation will have been passed that will take care of this for you.

We were glad to see John S. Thompson applying atlatide to a couple of patches of bindweed southeast of Friona the other day. If you have any, now is the time to get rid of it.

County Agent Joe Jones has been making some test applications of Varcol No. 1 on Johnson grass in Farwell. He will be glad to you about any weed problems you may have. In the meantime an attempt is being made to obtain tubes of seeds, and plants of some of these noxious weeds so anyone will know them when he sees them.

A visit to the Amarillo Airforce Base the other day convinced us that our tax money is being spent. We trust it is being spent wisely for necessary defense.

McCutcheon Presented at Lions Club As Outstanding SCD Conservationist

Last Thursday night the Friona Lions Club presented Archie McCutcheon with a plaque. Archie was picked by the Parmer County Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors as the outstanding conservation farmer of the year. This award was in connection with the Fort Worth Press "Save the Soil and Save Texas" award program. Archie was recognized for his knowledge of proper water application. He has a watering system that will let him get even distribution of water and at the same time make maximum use of the rainfall.

Jay Sanders was out at Roy Euler's farm Friday. Roy was just beginning to plow under his Madrid Clover. Jay checked several plots and found that there was an average of 30 tons of green manure per acre to be turned under. We are anxious to water tie production of the crops following the clover. Mr. Euler plans to plant the clover ground to heifer this spring.

A. L. Reznik used vetch this year for a cover crop. A couple

of weeks ago he plowed under 20 tons per acre. He reported having no difficulty handling the rank growth of vetch with his plow.

Now is a critical time for our native grass ranges. When the grass greens up after a long dry period the average person tends to overstock his grass. That is the time when grass should receive its best care. It needs time to regain its vigor and to seed before being grazed.

The leaves of a plant manufactured for the entire plant. Over 9 per cent of the total weight of a plant is made up of elements taken in through the leaves. Less than 5 per cent of the plant is made up of nutrients from the soil. This makes it very important that we let the range grow awhile before we graze it. If we graze off every time the grass puts out a blade, we remove the part of the grass that manufactures the food. The plant is like you and I. If you cut off the food, we get weak and less vigorous, and will die. The same thing happens to the grass.

FRENCH APPLE PIE

Pastry for 9-inch pie shell 1 1/2 tsp. butter
6 to 8 tart juicy apples 1/2 cup butter
1/2 to 3/4 cup sugar (depending on sweetness of apples) 1/2 cup brown sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon (or nutmeg) 1 cup Gold Medal "Kitchen-tested" Flour
2 1/2 tsp. Gold Medal "Kitchen-tested" Flour

METHOD

1. Line a deep pie pan with plain pastry, and chill while preparing apples.
2. Pare and core apples, and slice thinly.
3. Mix together sugar, cinnamon (or nutmeg), and the 2 tsp. flour. Mix with the apples—and place in pastry-lined pan. (If the apples are not very juicy, sprinkle with a bit of water.) Dot with the 2 tsp. butter.
4. Cream together the 1/2 cup softened butter and the brown sugar. Sift the 1 cup flour to be measured—then work it into the creamed butter and brown sugar (using a pastry blender or a spoon) to make a crumb mixture.
5. Sprinkle the crumb mixture over the top of the apples.
6. Bake. Serve with plain or whipped cream, if desired.

TIME—Bake 35 to 45 minutes.
TEMPERATURE—350° F., hot oven, for first 15 minutes, reducing heat to 350° F., mod. oven, to finish baking.
AMOUNT—One 9-inch pie.
