Should Bond Money be Used for Swim Pool, Teacherages or Other Expansion

The question posed last week in this paper regarding use of the difference between cost of the school building and the total amount of bonds voted has evoked considerable comment.

The editor proposed that some of this be allocated to building of a swimming pool. We appreciate those of you who have expressed your viewpoint here, whether for or against the proposal. Actually, majority comment coming to our ears has been in favor of the pool project.

Another situation facing the school board is teacher housing problem. Without question there is difficulty here, and some have proposed using the bond funds to build teacherages.

This last proposal certainly can be considered from two opposing viewpoints—why not study them and let a board member know your opinion.

School property is tax free. Additional building of teacherages would increase the tax-free property in Friona (some \$326,500 property was tax-free last year, and City Secretary Wilson estimates ever greater amount this year). This would seem on the surface to impose a burden on the city, already stretched in making its tax dollars meet existing expenses, to say nothing of further needed improvements.

On the other hand, early August without fail finds school officials busily hunting enough liveable apartments and houses for the teachers' use in the coming term.

To hold many of these houses, the school district must dig down into its own pocket (the taxpayer's pocket) to pay fees or rental for holding these units until the school term actually begins.

So friends, we see the above arguments as basic in use of the bond money for teacherage building.

That the directors, duly elected, shall handle faithfully all details of business, but that any change in policy, or any unusual activity, shall be undertaken only after a vote of the stockholders. We believe the ability of the stockholders to make their own decisions on matters of magnitude was properly demonstrated at this most recent meeting.

Farm Bureau, incidentally, on a state and national basis, has championed legislation that assures the continued right of people to run any business they have need of on the cooperative basis, if they choose to do so.

It is becoming increasingly evident that grain sorghums will come under acreage controls in 1955. Hail and erosive rains are increasing the acres devoted to grain sorghums, and also increasing the probabilities of high yields of the thousands of acres of dry land planted. Present those ideas to your Farm Bureau Directors so that they can use them in formulating resolutions on this subject for the consideration of the membership in October.

Phoenix to New York Via Horse; Whew!

Jerry Couch, 11 years old, may never be president of the United States, he may never become a banker or a doctor, but he will have memories of 1954 that no other young fellow can duplicate. Jerry passed through Friona yesterday en route from Phoenix, Arizona, to Madison Square Garden, New York, via horseback.

Riding with him were Lloyd Davis, an older brother-in-law, and Bryce Waddell, Arizona cowpuncher and rodeo circuit follower. The trio, labeled as the "Highway 60 Cavalcade," left Phoenix on May 12, and is riding some 20 miles each day, planning to be in New York on September 22 to participate in calf roping, bulldogging and wild cow milking in the Arizona and Highway 60.

Six horses are used for the trip, three being ridden on alternating days. The idle horses are taken ahead to the next stop each day by the party consisting of Peggy Davis and Lela Waddell, wives of the riders, and by Shirley Bahart, red-headed Queen of the Hi-Way 60 celebration recently held at Phoenix. Peggy drives the car, and Mrs. Waddell drives the truck loaded with camping supplies and rations of feed for the horses. And of course they even have an advance publicity man, a Mr. Lewelyn, who precedes them along Route 60.

Asked regarding most significant feature of their trip so far, Waddell without hesitation dubbed the continuous wind as the most noticeable aspect. And the party arrived here just in time for an extra dose of just that, the Sunday evening flurry. They were indefinite in forming the local questioners whether the dust originated in Arizona or rather was some of the New Mexico "Enchantment" blowing over into Texas, though hint-

ing it might be the latter.

Near Farmerton Switch, Lloyd Davis caught a little chipmunk or "ground squirrel" and avowed to reporters that he would take it right along to Madison Square as a memento of Friona, Texas. It was being fed milk before the party left here, and no doubt was in for care extraordinary for the next few months. No plans were made to enter little "Friona" in any of the rodeo events.

The group was greeted at Friona by Lynn Chitwood and by the Star publisher.

Spending the night here "in a real bed" was somewhat of a treat for the Cavalcade, they emphasized, for across New Mexico they slept out practically every night, with the towns so far apart.

The horses used were about 10 years old, and all appeared in good shape. Five of them were shod, and later up the way, Waddell said rubber shoes would be placed on all. The horses to be used in the rodeo competition will be shipped via rail or truck from Friona to New York.

The party was extremely friendly in traditional Western manner, and were vociferous in extolling the advantages of travel on Highway 60, the "shortest, safest, and easiest" cross country route.

Thieves Strike At Bovina Drug

Thieves entered the Bovina Drug Monday night, getting off with several cartons of cigarettes, paragonic, watches, and other merchandise.

This was the second time in recent weeks that the Truitt drug has been robbed, last instance netting loss of considerable cash.

The burglars this week carried the safe to the rear of the drug and attempted to open it and later to load it, but failed in both attempts, according to investigating deputy, Roberts.

Roberts was assisted in the investigation by the Bailey County sheriff, in absence of Farmer Sheriff Lovelace who was out of the state, and by Deputy Noble Goldsmith of Farwell.

Wheat Begins Trek To Elevators Here

At Wednesday noon, a total of 24,766 bushels of wheat had been received at the Friona elevators. The yield would be considerably higher were it not for the recent unfavorable weather conditions in and around Friona.

A few loads have been brought in that were too green. The ripened grain came in earlier than expected this year and now it looks as if it may have been cut too soon. The hail damage is extensive and has also caused a drop in the local wheat yield.

WTSC Scholarship Is Awarded Local Student

Miss Anita Gail Scarborough, 1954 graduate of Friona High school has been awarded a scholarship for the 1954-55 session to attend West Texas State college, according to Dr. Walter H. Juniper, dean of the college.

The scholarship, along with several others recently established at WTSC, is granted on a competitive basis and on scholastic achievement and merit. Dr. Juniper said. The scholarship pays tuition and fees for one year.

Fines Assessed Three at Farwell

Battery theft charges resulted Wednesday in the sentencing of two Hereford men before Judge A. D. Smith at Farwell.

Roland Helker and James Adams each were fined \$25 plus costs and 30 days in jail. The batteries were taken last week from the Owen Seamond farm and other locations near Friona, according to Friona Deputy Roberts.

Angel Martinez of Clovis was sentenced by Judge Smith to six months in jail, resulting from a driving while intoxicated charge.

At the time of offense, early this week, Martinez' car was involved in an accident with another New Mexico car about one mile west of Black. Some \$130 damage resulted to the other vehicle, and Judge Smith yesterday informed the defendant that five months of his six-month sentence would be suspended if he paid these damages.

Martinez was alleged to have left the scene of the accident without rendering assistance or reporting.

The barber shop on the east side of Main street has a complete new facelifting. New linoleum is on the floors and the ceiling and walls are repainted in white. The barber chairs have a new rich brown upholstery and the benches and "Shine's" shoe stand are painted blue. The barber shop is now "spic-and-span" and redone in the latest style.

Jack Anderson, the first barber in Farmer county, has been barbering for 43 years, 28 of them spent in Friona. That's quite a record and anyone knows that Friona wouldn't be the same without him but Jack laughs and says that everything is getting redone, remodeled, or replaced except the barber.

Added Preventatives For Fire Said Needed

Considerable recommendations for the improvements of the fire protection facilities in Friona were submitted to the city by the Fire Prevention and Engineering Bureau after a personal investigation by representatives of that group.

The water system is considered to be under good supervision and is being efficiently operated insofar as fire protection is concerned. Recent improvements that have been made were beneficial to the city but the need for additional improvements remains. Following are a few of the most important changes and added facilities that the bureau recommended.

Arterial mains should be installed to strengthen the outlying areas where fire flow tests found very inadequate quantities available. The 8-inch arterial main in Washington street should be extended

north to Eleventh street, then west on Eleventh street to Prospect avenue. The proposed 6-inch main in Cleveland between Eleventh and Thirteenth streets should be relocated in Euclid avenue between Eleventh and Thirteenth streets. The recommended 8-inch main should connect to all intersecting mains and be connected to the 6-inch main at Prospect and Tenth street.

A similar 8-inch arterial main should be extended into the western section of the city to afford supply to the smaller mains in that area.

The 8-inch loop around the Mercantile District should be completed and follow the general route of south on Pierce to Fifth street and then west on Fifth street to Main street.

It is also advisable that an internal combustion engine be provided to drive Well No. 3 and the largest high-lift pump in the event of an electric power failure.

It is important that a minimum of one paid man be maintained on duty at the fire station at all times to receive alarms, maintain the station, equipment, hose, and to assure prompt response of equipment to alarms. Future plans should be made for the employment of additional paid firemen as funds can be made available.

The pumper in the department should be tested annually at draft if possible, and after major repairs. The tests become more and more important as the equipment becomes older.

The drill program could also be intensified with particular attention to drills regarding salvage work, ladder work, ventilation practices, pump operations, forcible entry methods, rescue practices, and hose evolutions.

It is important that every effort be made to have alarms of fire transmitted to a place where there is someone on duty at all times.

It is suggested that a fire prevention code, based on the code of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, be adopted for enforcement by the Fire Marshal.

A strict enforcement of the adopted National Electrical code should be carried out and an electrical inspector should be appointed.

Special attention should be given to the Uniform Building code. It should be enforced and regulate construction within the city, to prevent the accumulation of hazardous structural conditions as the city continues to grow.

The bureau commended the city on the cooperation rendered Mr. Page during the survey, the good practice of inspection of valves and hydrants, keeping storage units as full as possible, and the practice of testing hose.

S.C.D. Observations

The Farmer County Soil Conservation District will be holding the spring community tours in the near future. Watch the papers for the time and place. At the present time we are planning one at each of the following communities: Lazbuddie, Rhea, Northeast of Farwell and Northeast of Friona. We hope to show some meth-

ods of using legumes in soil fertility, some methods of achieving proper water application, as well as some crops and other interesting items.

Do you have your vetch interplanting in your cotton and grain sorghums? Now is a good time to make arrangements for the seed and the inoculant. All legume seed should be inoculated before planting.

Wednesday several of the supervisors attended the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts meeting in Amarillo. They met with other district supervisors to help formulate a plan to combat our wind erosion problem.

Perry McMinn has about 6 to 7 tons of vetch that is about ready to plow under.

There has certainly been a lot of heavy rains and hail in the last few weeks. Now is a good time to look over our fields to see just what damage water is doing to our farms. Maybe some appropriate structure or conservation practice would cut down on your soil and water losses.

THERE ARE BOTH GOOD AND BAD CUSTOMERS

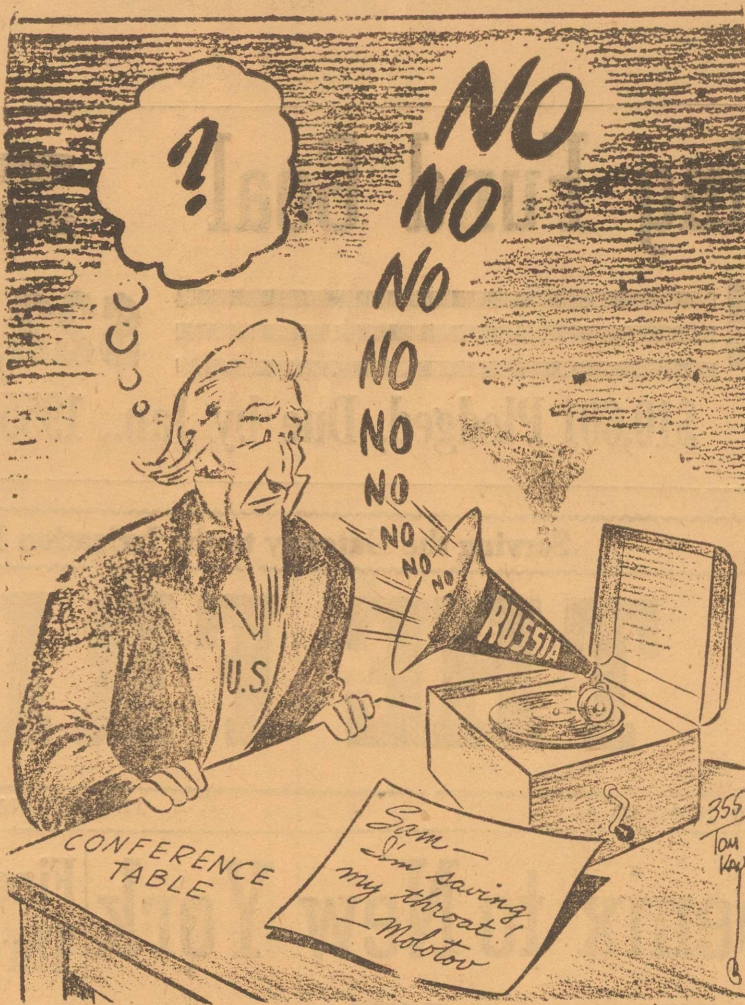

Different Method—Same Drivel

AUSTIN, Texas.—Governor Allan Shivers will claim the political spotlight Monday.

The Lufkin-born chief executive formally opens his campaign for reelection in the city of his birth in the heart of East Texas on June 21.

It will be an old-fashioned political rally, reviving the personal-appearance type of campaign. Newspaper ads are being used to call statewide attention to his talk which will go on the air at 8:30 p. m.

Lufkin is also the home of Gov. ernor Shivers' campaign manager, Senator Otis Lock.

It was in nearby Woodville that Shivers received word in July of 1950 that he—then lieutenant-governor—had become governor, with the sudden death of Governor Beauford Jester.

Shivers Busy Campaigning

Governor Shivers is filling many speaking engagements over the state.

Kicking off his drive for campaign funds was a \$10 per plate luncheon in Dallas, attended by 800 persons.

In his off-the-cuff talk in Big-D, Shivers said he would run on his record.

He branded the majority of his political enemies as persons who believe in a centralized government, subject to the socialistic infiltration, as against the theory of local powers and States' rights.

"Perpetuity" Says Yarborough

Judge Ralph Yarborough, Austin attorney who is campaigning against Shivers, got his own campaign into motion earlier, with stinging remarks about "perpetuity in office."

So far Yarborough has undertaken no statewide promotion. The rest of the political front was much like the quiet that comes before a tornado strikes.

Coke Returns

However, political incidents of 1948 are being brought back to mind. Coke Stevenson has returned to political life.

The former governor of Texas stepped into the limelight with an endorsement of Dudley T. Dougherty for U. S. Senator.

Dougherty seeks the seat occupied by Senator Lyndon Johnson who won over Stevenson by 87 votes, in a hotly contested race for the senate six years ago.

Stevenson will serve as chairman of the campaign steering committee for Dougherty.

He promised the voters a refresher course in Texas political history. "This time," he said, "we can go into and reveal all the details about Box 13 in Jim Wells county, where on Friday after the primary a sleight-of-hand miracle occurred and 200 votes were added to the Johnson total."

Hammonds Confesses Insolvency Legally it's all over. But politically it will be an issue for months to come.

Ralph W. Hammonds has confessed that his Lloyd's of North America insurance company is insolvent.

With head bowed, the heavy-set one-time University of Texas wrestling champion gave up defense of his company in 98th District Court after only three days of testimony. The trial had been expected to

last at least two weeks and was destined to produce explosive political testimony... as the subpoena list included Governor Shivers, his public relations chief John Van Cronkhite, Ralph Yarborough, and many others active in state politics.

It was a victory for Attorney General John Ben Shepperd and Assistant Attorney General Rudy Rice, chief prosecutor for the state in the case.

Criminal trials of four officials of defunct insurance companies have been postponed until October.

The four indicted men appeared before District Judge Charles O. Betts, asked and won continuance of their trials until the Fall term of court.

Now defunct is the Texas Mutual Insurance company of Beaumont, formerly operated by the Lowry brothers. O'Fiel is a Beaumont attorney. Trehearne was operator of the inactive insurance firm of United Lloyd's.

Twenty-eight persons were subpoenaed to testify in the trials, including State Senator William T. Moore of Bryan, chairman of the senate insurance committee, who was an attorney for the Yowry's Texas Mutual company.

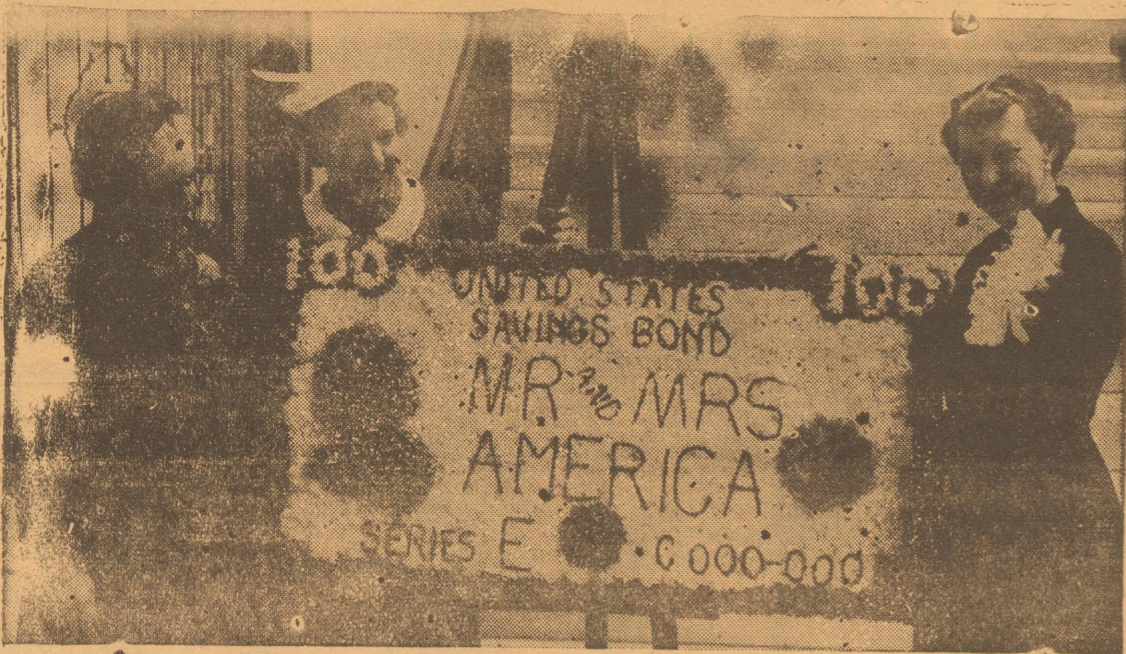

Church Receives Letter from India

The WSCS of the local Methodist Church recently paid Rev. Ralph Odum, former missionary to Pakistan, to bring his message concerning his missionary work to the local Methodist Church. Refusing the money for himself, the minister, now pastor at Adrian, sent it on to the Mission Board in the name of the WSCS. Last week, an interesting letter arrived in acknowledgment of the gift. Excerpts from the letter follow:

Oscar Rees of the Budah Boys' Hostel in India writes:

"We received word yesterday that one of our boys from the hostel was at the point of death from pneumonia. The hostel superintendent and I got some penicillin ready, got in our carryall, and started over 20 miles of ox-cart roads to the boy's home. Upon arrival, after two and one-half hours of travel, we saw the boy running across the field to greet us. During the length of time it took the letter to reach us, the boy had recovered.

"The bitter cold of winter has passed in North India, spring has come with great speed. Many people froze to death here this year. At least 100,000,000 have no blankets, mattresses, clothes to speak of, houses, or wood to burn.

"Your gift is helping a need, too."
This letter gives one an idea of foreign relations in the world at the present time and how each gift is appreciated.

BURNETT ... ALPINE, Texas, June 16.—Lee Andrew Burnett, of Friona, has been elected vice-president by graduate students at Sul Ross State college.

Burnett, who recently completed registration for the summer session, is coach and teaches mathematics in Friona High school.

Q.—My husband, a World War II veteran, died recently. Would I be eligible for VA death pension if my yearly income falls below the \$2,700 limit? I have a young child.
A.—You would be eligible only if your husband had a service-connected disability at the time of his death. His disability, however, need not have been the cause of his death.
Q.—I am a disabled Korean veteran, and I'm planning to take on-the-job training under Public Law 16. Will VA furnish me with supplies I need to pursue my training?
A.—Yes, within limits. The kind, quality and amount of supplies will be limited to those commonly required to be owned personally by non-veterans taking the same training. If your disability warrants it, you may be issued special equipment to help you do your job.
Q.—I am a Korean veteran who was totally disabled in service. I intend to apply for the special GI permanent-plan insurance available to disabled Korean veterans. Would it be possible to have my premiums waived because of my total disability?
A.—Yes. You should apply for a waiver of premiums at the same time you apply for your insurance. But be sure to pay the required premium with your application, and be sure to continue to pay premiums until VA tells you your waiver has been granted. If it is granted, you will get a refund of premiums paid under waiver.
Q.—If I get a GI business loan, will I have to operate the business myself? Or could I turn it over to someone else to run?
A.—You will be required to devote your personal labor or supervision to the business, either on a full-time or part-time basis.

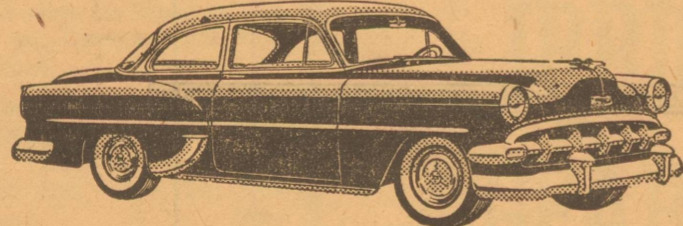

Record Enrollment Was Seen at Bible School

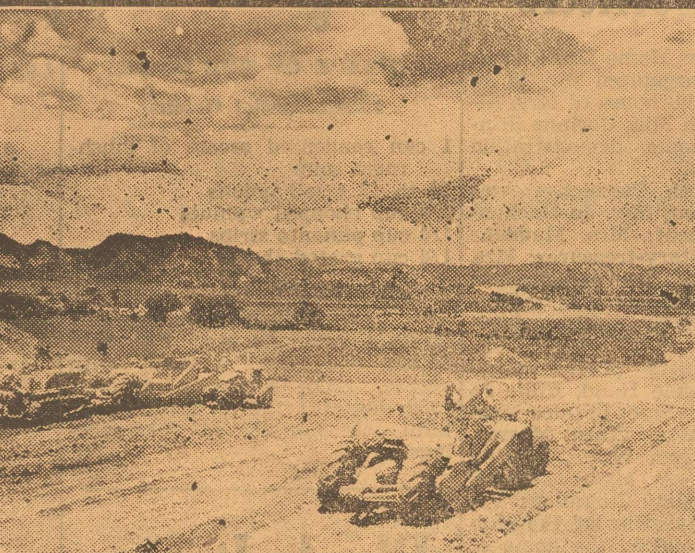

The average daily attendance was 233 with an enrollment of 287. Superintendent of the Bible school was Mrs. Ralph Miller.

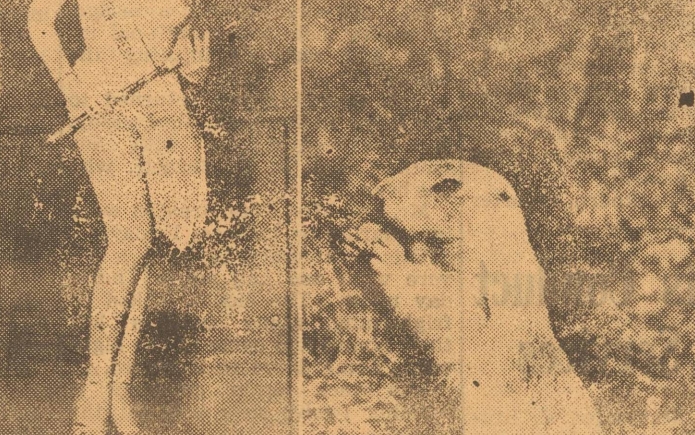

Congressman Rogers Cites Figures Showing Progress of Water Program

Water

The irrigation program in our district has been moving along at a pretty good pace and we hope that it will be continued. I have obtained some figures from the Farmers Home Administration, of the Department of Agriculture, that I think will be of interest to you. They are as follows:

"For the current fiscal year, \$6,500,000 was available for making loans under the water facilities program. Of that amount, \$600,000 was allotted to the State of Texas. The President's budget request for the fiscal year 1955 provides for an appropriation of \$6,500,000. If that amount is appropriated by the Congress, it is likely that the allotment to Texas for the fiscal year 1955 will be about the same amount as in 1954. If Senate bill 3137 should be enacted into law, additional funds might become available under the insured loan features of that bill. To the extent that lending institutions participate in the insurance loan program under the Water Facilities Act, considerable expansion of the loan program could take place in Texas in the fiscal year 1955.

"As of June 1, the Farmers Home Administration had made 142 loans, totaling \$585,660, from regular water facilities loan funds allotted to Texas. In addition, 57 loans, totaling \$344,315, have been made or are in process of being made for water facilities purposes from economic emergency funds. Under these two programs, the total number of loans made or in process is 199 for an amount of \$929,975."

The Hearings in the Senate
During my years of law practice in the Panhandle, I have heard many people, especially prospective jurors, complain about the slowness of court proceedings. I, of course, agree with them that there are many things that can be done to speed up the court proceedings. The judge is usually bending over backwards trying to see that no one's

rights are infringed upon, and that the law is followed to the letter so that justices may finally prevail. However, one look at the Senate hearings would make a so-called slow court proceeding look like a jet-propelled plane. The reason that the headway has been so slow in these hearings is that no one wants to answer questions and everyone wants to make a speech

over television. The questioner usually makes a speech instead of asking a question. When a question is asked that could be answered and throw some light on the subject, the witness usually makes a speech as his reply. I had a chance to listen the other morning and was reminded of the story of the old darkey who turned up late to work. His boss asked for his excuse and the darkey told him that he had stopped down at the corner to hear a politician make a speech. The boss asked the darkey what the man talked about. The darkey replied, "Not much, except he sho did highly recommend himself."

I still say that a good West Texas grand jury could have separated the chaff from the grain and had the facts thoroughly documented in not more than two weeks.

Change in the Pledge of Allegiance

I have received many letters requesting early action on the Resolution to insert the words "under God" in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. I am happy to report that the House and Senate have passed a Resolution to insert these

words in the Pledge of Allegiance and the Resolution is now in the White House awaiting the President's signature. As soon as he signs it, the official Pledge of Allegiance will be as follows: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands; one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all." Word from the White House at nine o'clock this morning was that the President had not yet signed the measure. However, it will be the law long before this letter reaches you.

The group took guests and reported an enjoyable time. However they arrived at the chosen spot just in time for the rain and stated woefully that they reached Friona again just in time for the sand.

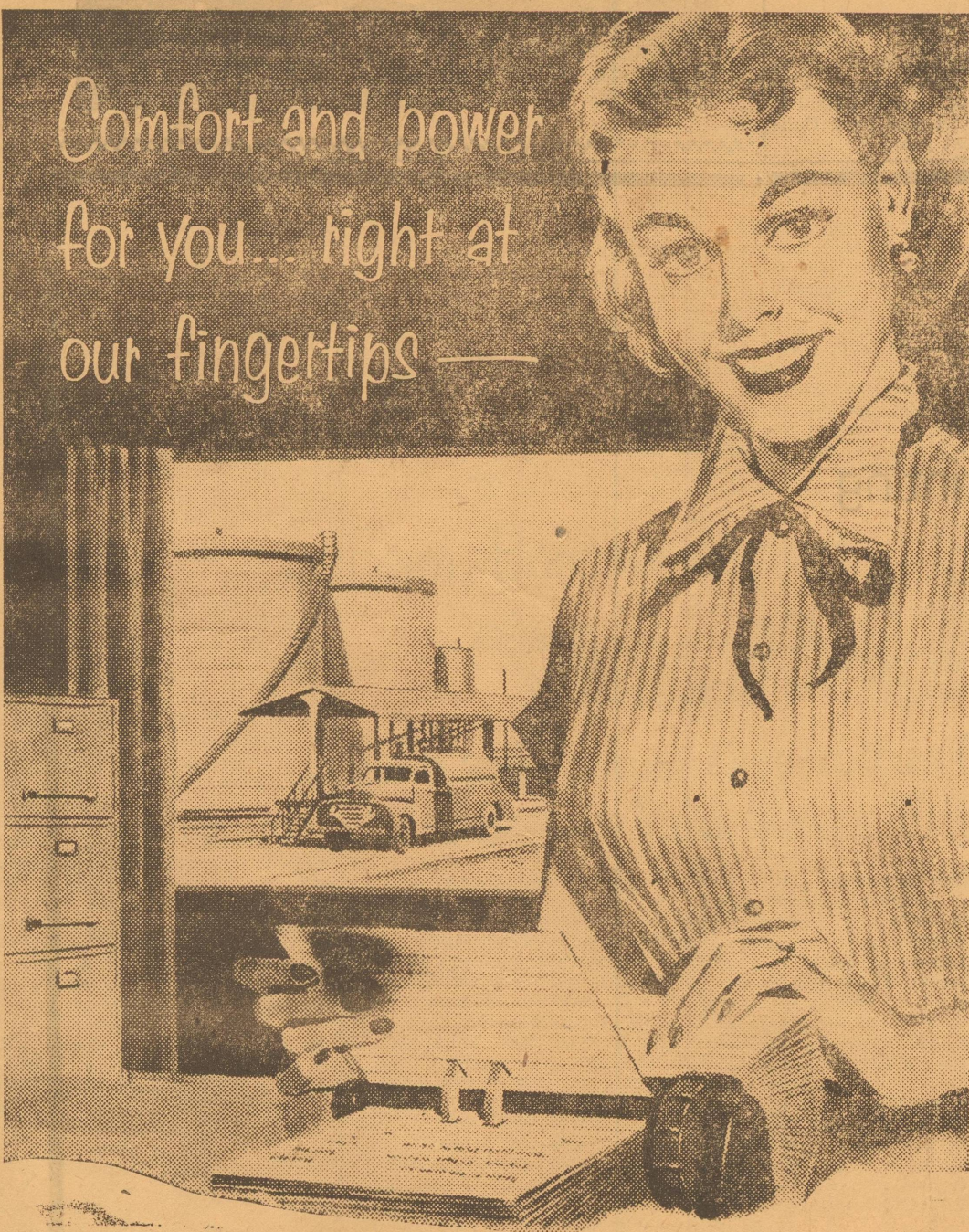

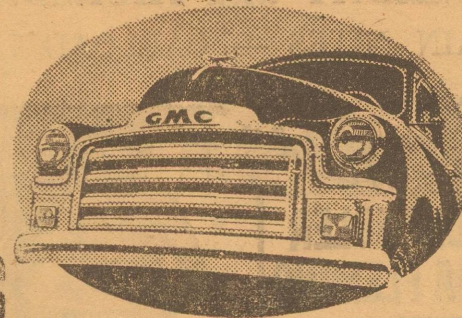
