U.S. abandons U.N. diplomacy; Hussein given final ultimatum

Abandoning diplomacy, President Bush gave Saddam Hussein a final ultimatum Monday to leave Iraq or face a U.S.-led war. The president planned an address to the nation at 8 p.m. to explain his decision.

"This matter cannot continue indefinitely," Secretary of State Colin Powell said.

The development came as the United States, Britain and Spain ended diplomatic efforts in the United Nations to disarm Saddam, withdrawing their proposed resolution setting an ultimatum and clearing the way for a U.S.-led war without Security Council approval.

by pushing this resolution," Powell said.

The latest draft of Bush's address gives Saddam a firm deadline to go into exile or face military action, said two senior White House officials who spoke on condition of anonymity. They would not say precisely how long the deadline would be, but said it was a matter of days.

The officials cautioned that Bush could decide before his address to drop the deadline, and that some of his advisers were opposed to it.

Whether Bush sets a deadline or not, several White House officials said war is days away unless Saddam complies.

Ahead of the speech, top congressional leaders were to go to

the White House to meet with the president. First thing Monday, several top administration officials, including Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld, Attorney General John Ashcroft, Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge and FBI Director Robert Mueller, filed into the White House.

Bush's speech, scheduled to run anywhere from 10 to 30 minutes, was to include a warning for humanitarian workers and journalists to leave the country, officials said. Bush planned to warn them that Saddam has a history of taking hostages, they said.

Powell, in a news conference at the State Department, said that Bush would say that leaving Iraq was the only way for Saddam to

Three arrested in morning car window bashing spree

Big Spring police scurried around the city this morning taking reports after an alleged car window bashing spree ended in the arrest of three people on charges of criminal mischief.

"We're taking reports of criminal mischief. We have from 40 to 60 (complaints) right now," said Big Spring Police Sgt. Roger Sweatt, public information officer.

Adam Anthony Starr,

18; Angela Leaton, 20; and John Rutheford, 17, all of Big Spring, were arrested early this morning by police on criminal mischief charges.

At press time, the trio were awaiting arraignment by Municipal Judge Tim Green.

"We have the three in custody but we would like

any witness or anyone with information to call," Sweatt said.

The window bashing spree apparently occurred all over town Sunday night and early this morning, Sweatt said.

"It was all over the city from Kentwood to the base housing to the North Side to Highway 87," Sweatt said.

Cuts eyed

Coahoma trustees to consider every possible alternative

COAHOMA Coahoma Independent School District trustees will be seriously scrutinizing a small reduction in personal, reorganization of campuses and other ways to cut costs tonight during a specially called workshop budget meeting.

"Right now we have and the same as everybody else in the state of Texas — very little clue of what state funding will be like in the next biennium," said CISD Superintendent Dr. Bill Kingston. "What we are looking at for the possibility of state funding is basically scary."

With the looming budget troubles in Austin adding to an already clouded school financing situation, Kingston said the district may have to look at cutting back on its biggest expenditure personnel.

"We're obviously going to have to make some budget cuts and that's obviously going to have to come from personal because it's such a high percentage of our budget costs."

The purpose of tonight's meeting, Kingston added, is to look at a range of revue estimates and prepare for several budget

Heavy rain Saturday pleases Forsan farmer

A weekend deluge has made at least one local farmer a happy man.

Horace Tubb, who farms cotton in the Elbow area, said he got about four inches of wet stuff on his deep-broken farmland, just in time for planting.

"We got washed away," Tubb said. "I got 3.1 inches at my house, and I got four inches over by Elbow School where I farm."

Tubb said the moisture will really help out his next crop.

"A bunch, a bunch ... a bunch," he crowed. "We

needed it bad. It came a little fast, but you're glad to get it. It washed my fences out and we had to fix them yesterday, but that's a good one. It washed the fences out and there were pickups in ditches everywhere."

Tubb said he had just plowed the land in preparation for planting.

"I had the ground deep-broke, and it just soaked it all up," he said. "We had it deep-broke about 14 or 15 inches deep, and that old water just soaked in. It's planting time next month, so we've got it going just right. It's going

to make the cow pasture good too. The weeds are already coming and the grass is right behind it."

Meteorologist Alec Lyster of the National Weather Service in Midland said instruments only managed to capture 0.85 inches of wet stuff Saturday.

"Unfortunately the co-op observer site, they're indicating no precipitation for the past 24 hours," Lyster said. "Here's 0.85 inch from 7 a.m. Saturday to 7 a.m. Sunday."

Lyster said the heaviest local rainfall was concen-

trated in the Forsan/Elbow area.

"I have indications of a three-hour total a little bit southwest of Forsan," he said. "It's near one inch of precipitation. I remember a couple of nights ago there were a couple of large thunderstorms that kept developing just south of Big Spring, and they moved off to the east-southeast. More than likely Forsan caught a lot of that precipitation also. We issued a flash flood warning for Howard County the other night, so I'd say it's definitely possible that (Tubb) got

somewhere between three and four inches."

Over the next several days, wind will predominate the forecast, with a small chance of rain coming back into the area Saturday.

"There's some indication that we could get some isolated showers or thunderstorms today, but that's not looking very likely at all," he said. "As a matter of fact the chance is so small that we're not even carrying an isolated shower or thunderstorm (in the fore

avoid war. He said that those who must leave Iraq include Saddam and "immediate members of his family."

The U.S. ultimatum came a day after Bush and the leaders of Britain, Spain and Portugal held a brief summit on Azores Island and agreed to give U.N. diplomacy one last day. Bush left the impression Sunday that he would work through Monday on finding a last-ditch diplomatic decision.

Powell said the move to abandon diplomacy early on Monday came after "we spent a great deal of time overnight and early this morning talking to friends and colleagues."

Bush spoke early Monday with his two principal allies - British Prime Minister Tony Blair and Spanish King

Juan Carlos and Prime Minister Jose Maria Aznar. Powell spoke to U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan and with a half-dozen foreign ministers.

Powell, who at one time was the administration's strongest advocate for finding a diplomatic solution, said that such efforts had ended. "I can think of nothing that Saddam Hussein could do diplomatically - I think that time is now over. He's had his chance, he's had many chances over the last 12 years and he's blown every one of those chances."

Powell had sharp criticism for France, saying five years ago it tried to weaken the U.N. inspection system. Close aides said he would not attend a foreign ministers' meeting called by France with the support of Russia and

Germany. Powell said that discussions were continuing with Turkey despite the legislature's decision not to allow that country to be used by the United States for a northern offensive. The Turkish government fears that war in Iraq would cause an uprising among Kurds in northern Iraq, including a possible attempt to create their own state.

"We've assured the Turks that we are committed to the territorial integrity of Iraq," Powell said.

At the U.N., John Negroponte, U.S. ambassador to the world body, told reporters, "It has been nearly 4 1/2 months since the council unanimously adopted 1441 which found Iraq in material breach and gave it a final opportunity to disarm. The government of

Iraq has clearly failed to comply."

Earlier Monday, White House spokesman Ari Fleischer told reporters: "The diplomatic window has closed as a result of the U.N.'s failure to enforce its own resolutions for Saddam to disarm."

Those words echoed those of the president at Sunday's news conference in the Azores. "He got to decide whether he's going to disarm, and he didn't. He can decide whether he wants to leave the country."

Saddam threatened a wider war if attacked.

On Monday, Saddam said that Iraq once had weapons of mass destruction for defense against Iran and Israel but no longer holds them, the Iraqi News Agency said. The agency said Saddam made the remarks while

meeting with a Tunisian envoy.

Fleischer said U.S. officials were reviewing whether to raise the national terror alert.

Also Monday, Mohamed ElBaradei, head of the International Atomic Energy Agency, announced that the Bush administration had advised the agency to start pulling its inspectors out of Iraq.

The American-led military buildup in the Persian Gulf continued. More than 250,000 troops, a naval armada and an estimated 1,000 combat aircraft are in the region, ready to strike if and when the president gives the word.

The American public, by a 2-1 margin, supports military action against Iraq to remove Saddam, a slight increase in support from recent weeks,

according to a CNN-USA Today-Gallup poll out Monday.

The State Department on Sunday night ordered nonessential personnel and all family members to leave Israel, Kuwait and Syria in a precautionary move. The departure order updates an advisory list month that authorized those people to leave voluntarily.

Field for Relay for Life already heating up

The road to the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life is heating up as about 50 teams have already announced their intention to join the overnight campout and fund-raiser this year.

About 40 people attended the first team captains' meeting on March 6, but if you weren't among them, it's not too late to get your team together, said Joanne Sayles, team recruitment chair for the event. Her goal is that 80 teams will take part on Relay May 9-10.

"This is a good time to start the process," she explained. "Just call me and I'll get the packet of information to you. You

need to get your team members together and think of a team name or theme. Start your fund-raising as soon as possible and you'll be on track for Relay."

Big Spring's Relay takes place at Blankenship Field next to Big Spring High School, where teams set up tents, canopies and even a teepee or two and prepare to spend all day and one night walking around the track for donations. In between, they join in games, enjoy entertainment, and eat fabulous food cooked by their fellow participants.

As March moves on, though, deadlines are coming up fast and furious, Sayles explained. On April 3, the next team captains' meeting takes

place at Trinity Baptist Church's new annex building. That evening, team captains must turn in a count of all members and their T-shirt sizes.

"This is earlier than we usually have to turn in T-shirt sizes," Sayles said. "We're going with a new distributor, the one being used by all Relays across the state, and because of that we have this earlier deadline."

Team fund-raising can happen anytime, anyhow, and many local teams have become creative about their drive to be among the biggest money-raisers and take home the coveted plaques. Some teams, including the VA Medical Center and Big Spring State Hospital, have taken an early start

and already have several thousand dollars in the bank.

Changes to this highly successful event come each year, and 2003 is no exception. This year's big news is that the Howard Glasscock Relay will end earlier than ever before. Instead of lingering around in the hot sun well into the afternoon, teams will finish their laps and gather in the big tent for a 10:30 a.m. closing ceremony.

"This decision was

made with our teams in mind," said Diane Wood, co-chair of Relay. "We want to continue to improve the event and keep it enjoyable for everyone who joins us in this worthy cause."

Organizers hope Relay 2003 will raise \$165,000 to top last year's total.

given out." Kingston added he believes the district is looking at a small reduction in force.

"I don't expect extensive reduction, but I do expect some," Kingston said. "There will be probationary personnel who won't have their con-

tracts extended. In the past, we've been able to reduce staff through attrition. The potential for that this year is really not there. In fact, we don't have anybody retiring."

During the meeting trustees will scrutinize several cost-cutting scenarios to meet the different revenue projections from program reductions

and reorganization to campus reorganization, more efficiently using staff and delaying a number of capital purchases.

"We're looking at every possible issue," Kingston said. "We're trying to make budget reductions in a way that has the least direct impact on student performance. It will have some impact. You don't make personnel cuts without impact."
