Local man killed in highway wreck, Arizona pair arrested

A hit-and-run accident Tuesday left a Big Spring man dead and landed two Arizona residents in jail.

Cecil Herbert Drake, 73, of Big Spring was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident, directly in front of the ALON USA's Big Spring Refinery on Interstate 20,

According to reports filed by Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Marc Couch, Drake was the driver of a pickup truck traveling east in the outside lane of Interstate 20. A Honda, driven by 19-year-old Jacob Robert Dotson of Arizona, approached from the rear and was apparently passing another vehicle.

Two more fill out election papers for Big Spring City Council seats

Two more people filed paperwork Tuesday to run for Big Spring City Council seats.

In a joint written statement, local attorney Elias Gamboa Jr. announced his candidacy for District 2, while local businesswoman Frances Billalba-Mekiski declared her intent to run for District 6.

The announcements increase the number of candidates in District 2 to four, including incumbent Oscar Garcia and

challengers W.A. "Woody" Jumper and Manuel Ramirez, as well as Gamboa.

Billalba-Mekiski joins incumbent Greg Biddison and challenger Ronnie Carter in seeking the District 6 seat.

"In announcing our candidacy, we seek to promote the city of Big Spring as council members and as individual citizens," Gamboa and Billalba-Mekiski said in a prepared statement. "To promote the growth

of Big Spring. To promote citizen participation and provide access for citizens to express their concerns and issues. To address issues that detract, divert or otherwise eliminate city and business opportunities."

The candidates are for Ports-to-Plains, but against "diverting truck traffic away from the city," according to the statement.

The race is on. A third contender jumped into the Forsan school board trustee's race this morning ensuring a May 3 election.

Dr. David Sutton, psychologist with the VA Medical Center, filed candidacy papers to seek his first term on the

"Forsan is an exemplary school and we want to keep it that way," said Sutton.

"There is always room for improvement."

The seven-year Forsan school district resident has two children, Elizabeth, a 2002 graduate from Forsan High School, and Jon, a freshman at the high school. His wife Anita, is a physical therapist at the VA Medical Center.

A veteran who served as an Air Force pilot in

Vietnam, Sutton holds a doctorate and master's in psychology with a minor in Spanish.

Sutton joins incumbents Louis Boeker and Gary Hise in a bid for one of the two at-large seats up for election.

Today is the last day for a candidate to file to put his or her name on the May 3 ballot. Filing for most area school boards ends at 5 p.m.

Currently, Big Spring, Coahoma, Forsan and Stanton school districts face contested elections on May 3.

Snakes alive! Rattlesnake Roundup to strike here Saturday and Sunday

The 41st annual Rattlesnake Roundup is expected to get off to a slithery start this weekend.

Monty Stallcop, snake handler, said spectators can find a fun-filled and educational time at the roundup.

"Snake handlers come in and do things that some people call stupid, other people think we're crazy, but it's basically to show people that given the right set of circumstances, you can do almost anything you want if you pick the right rattlesnake," Stallcop said.

Spectators can expect

to see handlers putting snakes all over themselves, getting into sleeping bags with snakes, walking through a pit of snakes, snake milking, skinning and races, as well as safety programs.

"We have handlers that got into handling the snakes to show that basi-

cally snakes are not nearly as bad as what people want you believe they are," Stallcop said.

The annual event is sponsored by AMBUCS and begins Friday with a snake weigh-in at the Howard County Fair Barns.

Saturday and Sunday's activities center around the demonstrations. Also, a free arts and crafts show along with a flea market will be part of the festivities. Saturday's events begin at 10 a.m. and end at 7 p.m. The Sunday the show begins at noon and continues through 6 p.m.

The cost for admission \$5 for adults and \$3 for

March to war

Troops head to border; Saddam remains defiant

Hours before the deadline set by President Bush, Saddam Hussein gave no sign of yielding, and long columns of U.S. armored vehicles moved through swirling Kuwaiti sand storms today toward Iraq's border.

In Baghdad, fortified by trenches and sandbags, streets were quieter than usual, with light traffic and some shops shuttered. Saddam ordered residents to stack wood and oil barrels to be set afire in hopes of concealing targets from bombardment.

Iraq's rubber-stamp par-

liament rejected the U.S. ultimatum and reaffirmed support for Saddam. The idea that he would flee into exile "is absolutely unthinkable," said Speaker Saadoon Hammadi.

Just across Iraq's southern border, U.S. and British troops piled ammunition and combat gear into fighting vehicles and broke camp, ready to invade on short notice. One major deployment involved the U.S. Army's 3rd Infantry Division.

About 300,000 troops were within striking dis-

changing lanes and 'there that truck was...there the pickup truck was.'" Couch said. "He ultimately ended up hitting the vehicle from behind on the left rear section of the tailgate, causing Mr. Drake's vehicle to go out of control. It traveled back to the northeast across the median into the westbound lane, overturning and Mr. Drake was ejected."

Dotson, along with passenger Tanda G. Gowens, 32, and her two minor children, left the scene of the accident. They finally pulled over at Lakeway Grocery at the intersection of South Moss Lake Road and the Interstate 20 service road.

"They never did report the accident themselves, but a clerk for the

Lakeway Grocery called in because of the damage, and another customer had said an accident occurred on down the street," Couch said.

Dotson was arrested and charged with intoxicated manslaughter, felony failure to stop and render aid and possession of controlled substances.

"He was found to be in possession of a controlled substance, one being crystal methamphetamine and the other being some prescription medicine without a prescription," Couch said.

Gowens was also arrested and charged with possession of drug paraphernalia and child endangerment.

The trooper said Drake was not wearing a seat-belt.

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What's new at the library...with Hollis McCright

As many of you know, the state of Texas is in a budget shortfall. Funds and programs have been cut or re-allocated and this also includes libraries. On Feb. 12, I attended the Texas Library Association's Legislative Day in Austin to lobby for support on both a local and statewide basis. Myself, along with other librarians and library advocates, visited with Sen. Robert Duncan, Rep. Pete Laney, representatives from Speaker Tom Craddick's office and others. Results were mixed. Representative Laney was most supportive as was Sen. Duncan; I wish I could say the same for the other offices that we visited.

Libraries are important. Texas needs them. They provide citizens with a wealth of knowledge at no cost to the user. If the local library does not have the item needed, then it can be obtained via inter-library loan. Libraries have books (fiction and non-fiction), videos, books on tape, research materials, computers for the public to use, programs, community rooms, literacy programs — the list can go on and on.

Howard County has been most supportive with the funds to maintain a first-class library. However, there are some areas of funding that the county cannot provide. Could Howard County have provided over \$100,000 (over a 10-year period) to purchase and upgrade computers as was necessary?

The Texas Legislature created a program in 1995 to do just that. The Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) was charged with the task of allocating \$1.5 bil-

lion over a period of 10 years to promote an advanced, statewide telecommunications infrastructure through libraries, schools, higher education and non-profit health care facilities.

This program has been invaluable to Howard County Library, Howard College and local school districts. All have benefited immensely from TIF. What TIF does is to allow libraries (and other entities) to purchase computer hardware and software, technology training, and content (such as TexShare and the Texas Library Connection).

On a local level, libraries serve as a primary source of access to the Internet and advanced telecommunications services in the state. There is no state source of funding that exists to continue and improve library telecommunication services and electronic services if TIF is not renewed.

TIF has provided more than \$131 million to Texas libraries. This translates into \$40 million going directly to 506 public libraries that serve more than 20 million Texans. Seventeen million dollars has gone directly to school libraries in 331 school districts (serving 4 million students and teachers); \$37 million to colleges and universities (serving 890,000 students and faculty); \$27 million

to the Texas State Library and \$10 million for the Texas Library Connection.

All of this has been funded by funds collected from your phone bill. If you look on your phone bill you will see how much you have contributed to Texas and her libraries, schools and colleges. This built a world class "highway" of information; now it must be maintained. Continuation of TIF will do just that.

Please write Sen. Teel Bivins to support re-authorization of the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) in Senate Bill 124 sponsored by Sen. Shapeigh. Sen. Bivins is the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and will play a major role in whether or not TIF is renewed. You may write Sen. Bivins at Capitol Station, P.O. Box 12068 Austin TX 78711.

On the House side, Rep. Talmadge Heflin is the chair of the House Appropriations Committee. His address is Capitol Station, P.O. Box 2910 Austin TX 79711. He also will play an important role in the continuation of TIF. House Bill 46, sponsored by Rep. Sylvester Turner, will re-authorize TIF in the House of Representatives.

There are additional issues that I will address in next week's column. These are issues that are vital to Texas, libraries, colleges and universities and schools. If you

you. Howard County Library is open from 9 to 6, Monday to Friday and 9 until 4 on Saturday. The

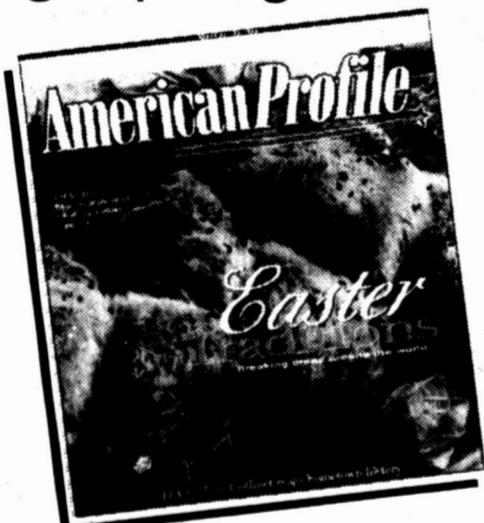

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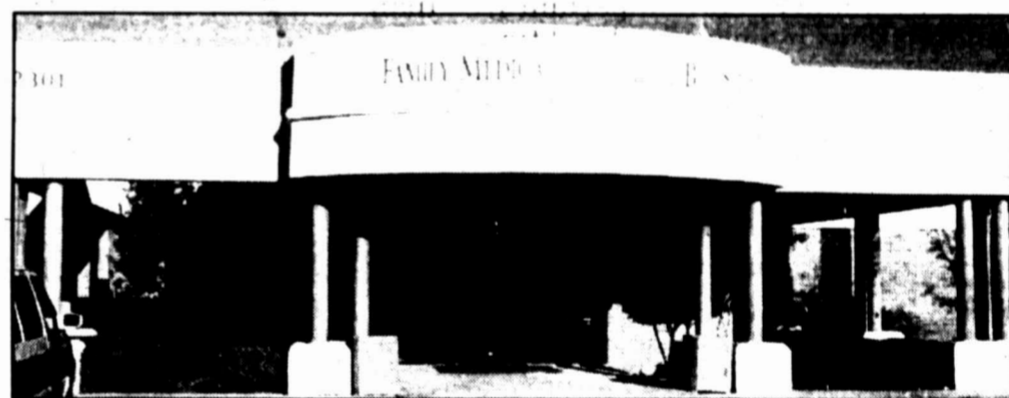


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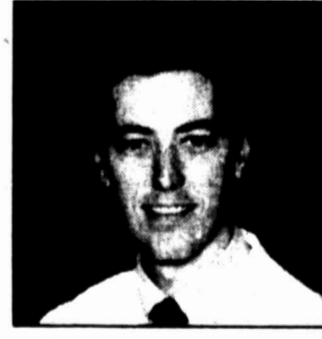
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Bulldogettes commit 8 errors in 9-0 setback to Midland Christian

LÖS ANGELES - Martin Sheen defended the rights of Hollywood anti-war activists to express their views in an opinion piece published Monday in the Los Angeles Times.

The 62-year-old actor, who plays the president on NBC's "The West Wing," said celebrity activists carry added responsibility because their statements are likely to receive press coverage.

"As a result, we are often called to give voice to the voiceless and a presence to the marginalized," wrote

Sheen, who has frequently expressed sympathy for the people of Iraq.

His article was published next to an opinion piece by Esra Naama, an Iraqi-American from San Diego, who wrote that her family fled Saddam Hussein's brutal regime in 1992.

"When Martin Sheen, Tim Robbins, Susan Sarandon and Barbra Streisand speak about the Iraqi people, they are not speaking about people like me," wrote Naama, a member of the nonprofit group Women for a Free Iraq.

Sheen recently said top executives at NBC had let him know they were uncomfortable with his vocal opposition to war with Iraq.

He said the network fears his position will hurt the show. NBC representatives, however, said network executives have expressed no such concerns.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) - Marie Fredriksson, one half of Swedish pop duo

Roxette, sued a Swedish newspaper Monday, claiming it falsely reported she suffered from a second brain tumor.

Fredriksson, who had surgery last year to remove a brain tumor, denied that doctors found a second one, as the newspaper Expressen wrote in January.

In a letter to the paper, her lawyer, Leif Silbersky said the report was false and sought an apology and a \$58,500 payment.

Expressen apologized and said its report had no basis, but the issue of payment was never settled. Ulf Isaksson, one of Expressen's legal representatives, said the paper rejected the demands.

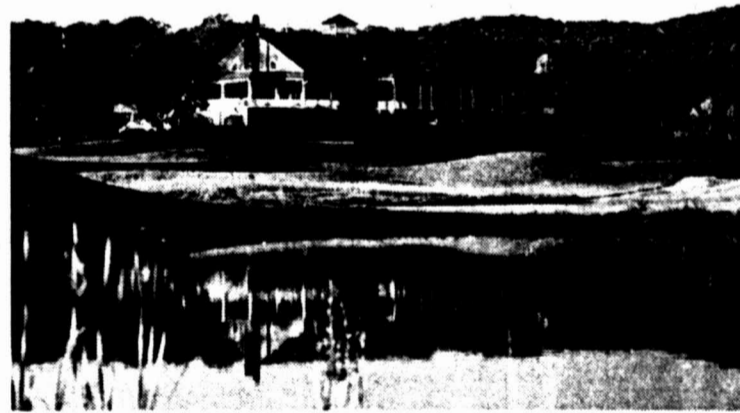
