

Sand slows march to Baghdad

The Associated Press

Sandstorms slowed U.S. and British forces to a crawl and thwarted air missions today as U.S.-led forces edged closer to the Iraqi capital. Baghdad residents, hunkered down for an eventual battle, woke to howling winds and the distant crash of artillery.

The Army met sporadic resistance on its journey. north. A report from the 3rd Infantry Division's headquarters estimated 500 Iraqis were killed during a two-day sweep past the holy Shiite city of Najaf, said Command Sgt. Maj. Kenneth Preston of the Army's V Corps.

At least 20 U.S. troops have been killed and 14 captured or missing since the operation began.

of the state of the military campaign, British Prime Minister Tony Blair said the coalition had secured a key southern port despite tenacious resistance, and had much of the western desert in hand; air attacks were launched on targets in the northern oil centers of Mosul and Kirkuk, as well as Saddam Hussein's hometown of Tikrit, and troops were making advances in eastern Iraq to help defend two main bridges over the Euphrates.

Blair stressed that the final miles on the road to Baghdad would be the most challenging, as U.S. Army troops face the Medina division of





OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM BIG SPRING HERALD Tuesday, March 25, 2003 War: Bush presents \$74.7 million price tag

WASHINGTON

President Bush, seeking \$74.7 billion as a down payment for war in Iraq, said Tuesday that coalition forces are "on a steady advance" but that he could not predict how long the fighting will last.

"We cannot know the duration of this war, yet we know its outcome: We will prevail," Bush, commander in chief of 300,000 troops in the Persian Gulf, told U.S. military personnel at the Pentagon.

"The Iraq regime will be disarmed. The Iraq regime will be ended. The Iraq people will be free and our world will be more secure and peaceful," he said.

"Americans can be confident in the people who attack on Iraq started,

wear our nation's uniforms," he said.

The bulk of the request, \$62.6 billion, will support U.S. troops both in Iraq and other operations related to the broader war on terrorism, the White House said. The rest of the money will go to humanitarian assistance in Iraq, other foreign aid and homeland defense programs in the United States.

The package will help pay for transportation of forces to the Persian Gulf region, supplying troops and maintaining equipment. It also will allow the Pentagon to replace cruise missiles, smart bombs and other hightech munitions, and provide combat pay to troops. Bush refused to provide a cost estimate before the



An earthquake is the sudden release of energy caused by the movement of the Earth's crust. During an earthquake:

• the Earth shakes and cracks;

• there are landslides:

 sandy areas with a lot of water might turn to liquid for a matter of seconds up to a few minutes. The liquid can be forced upward as high as 20 feet.

It blasts through cracks and holes much as a volcano erupts. The holes it makes are called "sand boils" or "sand blows.'





The not-for-profit Central Park Conservancy was founded in 1980 to manage the park under a contract with the Parks Department. It has raised nearly \$300 million, implementing a restoration plan and funding major capital improvements. Since its founding, the Conservancy has built an endowment of nearly \$75 million for the continued care of the park.
