U.S. to intensify attacks on Iraq forces

With sandstorms finally ended and a new front opened in the north, U.S. commanders Thursday they would swiftly intensify attacks on Iraqi forces. In the south, British troops destroyed 14 Iraqi tanks trying to break out of the besieged city of Basra.

In Kurdish-controlled northern Iraq, 1,000 Rangers and other paratroopers from the Army's 173rd Airborne Brigade airdropped overnight onto an airfield that they were busy securing Thursday. It is the first large deployment of U.S. ground troops in the the coming hours, days. region; previously, only small groups of U.S. Special Forces were oper-Kurdish fighters.

According to Davis, who presented the audit for the year ending Sept. 30, 2002, at the city council meeting Tuesday night, Big Spring has made significant financial advances despite a

declining economy. Davis gave the city's financial department what he termed a "clean

Albert Brady Piper Sr., 85, died Saturday, March 22, 2003, at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C.

A memorial service is set for 11 a.m. Friday, March 28, 2003, at the First United Methodist Church of Big Spring with the Rev. Dr. Dave Ring officiating.

Funeral service is scheduled for 1 p.m. Friday, March 28, 2003, at the Belaire Baptist Church in Bowie, Md., under the direction of Beall Funeral Home with Mr. Piper's son, the Rev. David Timothy Piper, officiating. Burial with full military honors will be in National Veterans Cemetery in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Piper was born on March 27, 1917, in a rural area near Killeen. He was the third child born to James Claud and Myrtle Alma Sims Piper. His siblings were Doyce Claud, James Richard, Albert Brady, Mamie Lee Dodds and Claudieus Merle Petherbridge.

When Mr. Piper was four years old, his father was killed in a farm accident outside Bertram, Texas. Following his father's death, Brady and his two older brothers and younger sister were admitted to the Methodist Home in Waco. Their mother was pregnant at the time of their father's death and the baby girl joined her brothers and sister when she was two years old. Their mother was seriously ill for many years and was unable to care for her five children. Later she married Archie Excel "Preach" True. Brady was able to rejoin his mother and stepfather when he was 12 and the other children rejoined the family after that. They lived in Big Spring.

In his youth he boxed for seven years and was a Golden Gloves champion.

He was a veteran, having served in the U.S. Army cavalry and loved riding horses. He later joined the Air Force and rose to the rank of master sergeant. He served tours of duty in Greece, Japan and New Zealand. He was in the service for more than 20 years. After his discharge, he worked for the Naval Research Lab in Washington, D.C. He was injured there when he slipped on an oil slick and injured his spine. He was 100 percent disabled and he suffered from severe sciatic nerve pain every day.

He loved sports and was very knowledgeable about them. He used to referee many different sports. He also loved to play golf. He loved music and had a strong singing voice. He had a great sense of humor and was a wonderful companion. He was a gentle, loving, compassionate man.

He and his first wife, Alethea, had two sons. He married his second wife, Bobbie, and adopted her five children and then had two more sons and two daughters with her. She died in 1996. In 1998 he married his third wife, Eileen. They were happily married for almost 4-1/2 years until his death.

He had been ill and was admitted to Walter Reed Army Medical Center on March 17 where his condition worsened.

He loved his church and its loving, caring people. Jesus said, "By this shall all men know that you are my disciples, if you have love one to another." Brady will be greatly missed.



In a news briefing at Central Command, Brig. Gen. Vincent Brooks said several U.S. units battled successfully against Iraqi forces Thursday, destroying vehicles and inflicting casualties. He said some Marines were injured in fighting near the southern city of An Nasiriyah, but gave no details.

Brooks accused the Iraqis of increasingly flagrant violations of international conventions. Iraqi security forces were seizing children in order to force their fathers to join the military, and were executing men who resisted, he said.

southern Iraq, British forces destroyed 14 Iraqi tanks that streamed out of the besieged city of Basra overnight, according to a British spokesman, Capt. Group

Lockwood. It was the third time this week that Iraqi columns have been attacked while trying to get out of Basra.

Lockwood said militiamen of the ruling Baath were threatening families of Iraqi soldiers to force them into driving the military vehicles out of Basra.

"They are obviously coercing them into this action, whereas in fact we Marines were injured,

to surrender," he said. "The enemy's options

are now limited," Lockwood said of the failed breakouts. "Military cohesion is sadly lacking."

Aid for Basra and other parts of southern Iraq is supposed to come through the port of Umm Qasr, which has been captured by the allies. However, British officers said Iraqi mines have been discovered in the port, delaying the arrival of a ship carrying 200 tons of aid until minesweeping is complet-

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. As a U.S. Army private deployed to Korea in the 1950s, Alva Smith remembers how uplifting it was to receive mail or packages from home.

"That made me feel good," he said. "It relieves you of the pressure a little bit even if it's only four or five min-

Almost 50 years later, the retired sergeant - with three Purple Hearts and one Bronze Star - tries to support others, including other veterans and those currently fighting. He volunteers at the Terre Haute Veterans Affairs outpatient clinic a few times a week. Plus, he and his wife, Sheila, help collect items for homeless veterans and for troops about to be deployed over-

There are a handful of options available for other Americans looking to show their support for the troopers.

The U.S. Department of Defense is urging people to seek alternatives other than sending letters and care packages to troops. The military mail system is becoming bogged down because so much mail is being sent.

Additionally, all programs in which letters and packages are addressed to "any service member" have been suspended by the government because of security concerns. Mail to specific service members from family and friends is still encouraged and will be delivered, according to the Department of



are confident that none of these communities will be without primary care even after these changes are complete.'

Andrews and Odessa facilities are expected to be operated by physicians affiliated with the clinics; Post is moving its affiliation to Physicians Network Services.

In addition to ending ties with the six area clinics, Covenant is planning to convert seven healthcare center locations into rural health clinics. Those are Snyder, Brownfield, Plainview, Littlefield, Crosbyton and Artesia and Clovis, N.M. Under the plan, Covenant would lease the converted

clinic to local hospitals, with the exception of the Clovis Clinic. Roosevelt General Hospital in Portales would lease that clinic.

Covenant said its announcement comes after a recently completed evaluation by the Covenant Medical Group and points to continuing cuts in payments from Medicare and Medicaid programs, coupled with a rising number of uninsured patients, as a reason for its actions.

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



Released by Dallas last month. Emmitt Smith agreed to terms with the Cardinals on Wednesday, moving from one of the league's most storied franchises to one of its most downtrodden. "Emmitt will start."

Smith will wear the same No. 22 he wore with the Cowbovs.

The Cardinals said Smith got a two-year contract, believed to be worth about \$4 million a year.

Now on to the recipe of the week. While many folks have a recipe of their own for this favorite, here is the recipe I like to use.

1 1/2 lb. ground beef

1 green pepper, chopped finely

1 small yellow onion, small diced

1/4 cup ketchup 1/8 cup Worchestershire

1/8 cup A-1 sauce 2 cups bread crumbs 2 eggs Dash of salt and pepper

Ketchup

First you will need to preheat your oven to 300 F degrees.

Next, chop the green pepper and onion into small pieces.

In a large bowl, place the ground beef, onions, pepper, ketchup, Worcestershire sauce and A-1 sauce. Mix together with your hands. Now add your eggs, salt, pepper and bread crumbs.

Make sure that you mix them together very well; the mixture should be a firm ball.

Place the mixture in a 9 x 13 1/2 inch pan; press it flat and even into the pan. Once it is flat, pour a thin layer of ketchup over the entire thing and

cover with aluminum foil.

Bake the meatloaf for an hour or until it reaches an internal temperature of 160 F degrees. Cut into equal slices and serve.

Excellent with mashed potatoes and a green vegetable. The meal can begin with a crisp garden salad.

A biological attack is the deliberate release of germs or other biological substances that can make you sick. Many agents must be inhaled, enter through a cut in the skin or be eaten to make you sick. Some biological agents, such as anthrax, do not cause contagious diseases. Others, like the smallpox virus, can result in diseases you can catch from other peo-

If There is a

Biological Threat Unlike an explosion, a biological attack may or may not be immediately obvious. While it is possible that you will see signs of a biological attack, as was sometimes mailings, it is perhaps more likely that local health care workers will report a pattern of unusual illness or there will be a wave of sick people seeking emergency medical attention. You will probably learn of the danger through an emergency radio or TV broadcast, or some other signal used in your community. You might get a telephone call or emergency response workers may come to your door.

In the event of a biological attack, public health officials may not immediately be able to provide information on what you should do. It will take time to determine exactly what the illness is, how it should be treated, and who is in danger. However, you should watch TV, listen to the radio, or check the Internet for official news

including the following: Are you in the group or area authorities consider in danger?

What are the signs and symptoms of the disease? Are medications or vaccines being distributed? Where?

Who should get them? Where should you seek emergency medical care if you become sick?

Cover your mouth and nose with layers of fabric that can filter the air but still allow breathing. Examples include two to three layers of cotton such as a t-shirt, handkerchief or towel. Otherwise, several layers of tissue or paper towels may help. Wash with soap and water and contact authorities.

Hygiene At the time of a declared biological emergency, if a family member becomes sick, it is important to be suspicious. Do not automatically assume, however, that you should go to a hospital emergency room or that any illness is the result of the biological. attack. Symptoms of many common illnesses may overlap. Use common sense, practice good hygiene and cleanliness to avoid spreading germs, and seek medical advice.

COLUMBIA, S.C. -South Carolina House members say the Dixie Chicks should apologize for lead singer Natalie Maines' criticism of President Bush by performing a free concert for troops.

Republican state Rep Catherine Ceips introduced a resolution Wednesday calling for the country music trio to perform for South Carolina troops and their families.

Maines, speaking about President bash's push for military action against Iraq, told a London audience last week, "Just so you know, we're ashamed the president of the United States is from Texas.

Radio stations nationwide are boycotting the Dixie Chicks even though Maines, a native of Lubbock. Texas, has publicly apologized.

Cindi Berger, the Dixie Chicks' publicist, had no comment on the resolution, which passed the House on a 50-35 vote and left some lawmakers angry and others confused.

"I think it's an olive branch to the Dixie Chicks," Ceips said.

"But only after they apologize first for exercising their free speech, is that correct?" asked House Minority Leader James Smith, a Democrat.

The Dixie Chicks have been in Europe promoting their recent release "Home," which won a Grammy last month for best country album.

LONDON (AP) - Former Beatle Paul McCartney will play his first concert in Russia - an open-air gig May 24 in Moscow's Red

Square. "I've long wanted to play in Russia, but for a number of years when the communists were in power, they didn't want me to,' McCartney said during an online chat with fans.

McCartney said the concert would include "some of my Beatles' stuff - rather a lot of Beatles' stuff, actually - some Wings' stuff and some more recent stuff.'

"I've never even visited Russia as a tourist, so it's exciting for me now to be getting to perform there with a band and finally be singing Back in the U.S.S.R.' and all these other songs for people who, I've got a feeling, might just be ready for it."

The Moscow show is the only Russian stop on McCartney's global "Back in the World" tour. The European leg of the tour starts March 25 in Paris.
