Marines meet some resistance in raiding Saddam's hometown

EL PASO — Just two days after Fort Bliss tearfully mourned the deaths of nine soldiers from the Maintenance Company, sunshine burst through the gloom with word that five others taken prisoner in Iraq are now free.

"I'm going to have a heart attack here with so much happiness," said Maria De La Luz Hernandez, whose son, Army Spc. Edgar Alan Hernandez, was among the group picked up by U.S. military troops advancing toward Tikrit.

A total of seven former prisoners were found Sunday. Some families of the former POWs first got word their loved ones were free from watching live television reports.

"When I saw him, it was like somebody had won World Series. Everybody was jumping around and hollering, said Ron Young Sr., of Lithia Springs, Ga., about his son, Chief Warrant Officer Ronald Young Jr. "It may have been the greatest point in my life."

The joy was tempered by the fact that two members of the 507th _ Spc. James Kiehl, of Comfort, and Pvt. Ruben Estrella-Soto, of El Paso, are to be buried Monday.

"We were happy for the rest of the POWs because we thought they were dead as well," said Alma Wallace, a cousin of Estrella-Soto, as his family prepared for his funer-



The Pentagon confirmed the rescue of six men and one woman five from the 507th and two downed Apache pilots from Fort Hood near Killeen. The helicopter was forced down March 24 during heavy fighting in Iraq.

It was only Friday that smiling photos of nine slain members of the 507th, each draped with posthumously awarded Purple Hearts, were displayed at a memorial that drew thousands.

In that tearful remembrance, the unit's command sergeant major called out the names of the dead, three times each. Grizzled veterans struggled to hold back tears and others dabbed their eyes with tissues.

A total of 15 soldiers with the 507th, based at Bliss, Fort ambushed March 23 near Nasiriyah, northwest of Basra. Pfc. Jessica Lynch, a 19-year-old supply clerk with the 507th, was rescued last week; nine others died.

The newly freed members of the 507th were

Emergency response agencies honoring dispatchers

Without them, our calls for help would go unanswered.

They are public safety telecommunicators: Police and 9-1-1 call-takers and dispatchers, and they're the public's first contact in emergency sit-

National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week — a time to recognize these oft-overlooked members of the community's emergency response team — is April 13-19.

During Monday night's Big Spring City Council meeting Mayor Russ McEwen also proclaimed the week Public Safety **Telecommunicators Week** in Big Spring.

"It started in 1981 in California and it's kind of progressed," said Sgt. Lance Telchik, the police

department's telecommunications supervisor. "Congress usually has a proclamation."

Telchik said most people don't think about the importance of emergency dispatchers.

'This is one of those kinds of jobs where you can be bored for hours or have a few minutes of chaos that seem to last forever," he "They're the ones that are responsible for answering the calls for help from the public and also for keeping track of the officers, the firefighters, the paramedics, everybody's safety once they get to the call. So they're involved with the call from the start to the finish."

Often, dispatchers have to try to get useful information from panicked, angry or hurt callers.

"I'm very happy today knowing my husband is safe. The only thing that will make me happier is when we are together again," she said. She and her husband live on base with their two children two children, Madison, 6 months, and Jason, 2.

"I've always remained positive," said Williams' father, David Williams Sr. "When you believe in God as I do and my son does, you know he will come back home safely."

After the capture of the 507th members, Iraqi TV showed some answering questions, darting their eyes back and forth between an interviewer and another person who couldn't be seen on cam-

Miller's mother said she was elated at the new television images of her son wearing blue shorts and a long-sleeved shirt _ being transferred from a helicopter into an ambulance.

"He looked great _ just like he did before he left except that his hair was longer," Mary Pickering said. "I've been crying a lot today. It's been so stressful."

In front of Johnson's home El Paso home, trucker Kenneth Wayne Krueger leapt out of his rig, unable to contain his happiness. Krueger had served two years at Fort Bliss with Shoshana Johnson's father.

"I'm just so happy!" Krueger shouted as he jumped up and down hugging Johnson's mother, Eunice. After celebrating, he climbed back into his rig and drove off. Horns blared all day outside the home.

"When we heard she was safe and sound, we felt happiness. There are no words to describe it," aunt, Joanne Emmantine, told Los Angeles television station KMEX from her home in Lancaster, Calif. "we are so grateful that they rescued them."

Emmantine said the family was extremely worried after Johnson was captured. "We didn't know where they were, if she was in good health, nothing ... if they were looking for them," she said. "We were very worried about Shoshana because she is a woman."

Riley's father, Athol Riley, said he maintained hope throughout the ordeal that his son would not be killed or injured. "I don't really think people are inherently bad," he said. "Generally people have a good side, and that includes the Iraqis."

Marines were also working to secure the town of Samarra, about 30 miles to the south, where seven American POWs were rescued Sunday. Bedraggled but in good condition after three weeks in captivity, they said they had been shuffled from one jailer to the next as the regime crumbled, until finally their location was disclosed to Marines advancing north from Baghdad.

"We were a hot potato," said Army Spc. Shoshana Johnson, 30, of Fort Bliss, Texas, who had been shot through both her feet by a single bullet. "It was getting to the point where I believed they were going to kill us."

The POWs _ five members of the 507th Maintenance Company convoy ambushed March 23 and two Apache helicopter crewmen seized a day later _ were shown on Iraqi state television shortly after their capture, but had not been heard from since.

As they were flown to Kuwait for a medical checkup and a debriefing, they told reporters for The Washington Post and The Miami Herald that they were kicked and beaten at the time of their capture, and then taunted and interrogated. But

Elsewhere, U.S. forces were working with local authorities to restore order to Iraq's cities after several days of lawlessness. He also said the U.S.-led coalition forces "bear the responsibility" to prevent any threats. Tribal leaders intervened and cooled the situation.



LOS ANGELES (AP) The rock band Incubus and its bass player are parting ways because of what the musicians are calling "creative differences.

Dirk Lance will be replaced by Ben Kenney, former guitarist for the funk hip-hop group The Roots, Incubus announced Friday.

"We, as a band, would love to express our gratitude towards Dirk for an amazing 12 years of artistry and dedication," said singer Brandon Boyd. "He was and will remain a valuable asset to the history of this band."

Lance, one of the group's founding members, declined to comment, said Incubus spokeswoman Melissa Dragich. "I think there were just creative differences, irreconcilable differences," she said.

The decision to part ways was reached after the group finished its latest tour promoting its platinum CD "Morning View."

Named after a mythological demon, Incubus gained popularity nationwide after becoming a cult favorite in its hometown of Calabasas, Calif. Its other albums "Enjoy include 1997's Incubus," 1998's 'S.C.I.E.N.C.E." and 1999's "Make Yourself."

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) A judge dismissed a protection order sought against country music singer Bill Anderson but let an assault charge stand. Deborah Marlin, 40, filed

both the order and the criminal complaint last week against Anderson, 65. She said Anderson tried to injure her with the door of a moving vehicle and shoved her during an argument at their home last month.

Anderson and Marlin reached an agreement Thursday about the protection order.

Marlin said in a statement that she made the decision "of my own free will. It is my hope that both Mr. Anderson and I will move forward from this with mutual respect."

Marlin's lawyer, Jim Hawkins, said the dismissal does not affect the criminal warrant.

Known as "Whisperin' Bill" for his breathy tenor, Anderson has been a member of the Grand Ole Opry since 1961. His hits include "Mama Sang a Song,"
"Still," "I Get the Fever" and "My Life."
