Goliad making switch to combat low test scores

Goliad Intermediate School will switch from a departmentalized to a partially self-contained classroom program next academic year in hopes of combating low test scores.

"It's something the administration and staff have looked at for several years," said Rey Villarreal,

Big Spring Independent School District assistant superintendent. "The main reason we want to implement this change is directly attributable to student performance."

The switch means instead of students attending seven different classes taught by teachers who specialize in that particular subject, they

will be instructed by a team of two teachers, who will teach all subjects.

The majority of sixth-grade teachers

have voiced strong opposition to the move. They argue the students, who go through a huge maturity growth dur-

ing the year, need the more mature environment provided by a departmentalized program.


Also, teachers say they are more efficient teaching a subject they are specialized in.

Villarreal cites creating a sense of stability for the children, developing a sense of personal ownership for the

teachers and more efficiently using resources as the administration's top reasons in favor of a more departmentalized program.

"At this point the prevailing administrative thought is the teachers can't work any harder. That's not the issue," he emphasized. "Its a

Hang gliding championships expected to double in entries, local activities to soar as well

If you see some mighty big birds soaring over Big Spring this summer, take another look.

The U.S. Hang Gliding Association is coming back to Big Spring to hold its U.S. National Hang Gliding Championships July 27 through Aug. 2.

Last summer, the group flew the U.S. Open Hang Gliding Tournament out of Big Spring and attracted about 35 hang glider pilots and many other family and ground crew members.

This year's tournament is expected to attract about twice that number of fliers, and the McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark Development Advisory Board has formed a Hang Gliding Committee to prepare for the event. The committee




matter of trying to do something programmatic that's going to help us do a better job of teaching the kids so we can perform better on the statewide tests.

"We're lagging behind the state and the region in our schools at that level in sixth grade," Villarreal continued. "Fifth grade across the district is on the 90s and then one year we take a big dip."

According to Villarreal, in one year, those same fifth graders who test in the 90s will, as sixth graders, drop below both the state and region standards, an area of serious concern for the school district.

With a high percentage of at-risk students, the administration is hoping the switch will create a more stable environment for the students.

"They need stability," Villarreal said. "There's a lot of discipline issues from the standpoint of moving around the hallways. They have double the documented discipline incidents that sev-

enth grade does at that school to date.

"Another factor to go self-contained is that it helps link ownership to the teachers as opposed to departmentalized where they have the students only so much time during the day," he continued.

Villarreal said curriculum and supplemental educational materials will also be strongly reviewed and analyzed to find ways for improvement during the process.


Both programs are utilized throughout the region and both have been shown to be successful, Villarreal admitted.

In his own personal experience, Villarreal has overseen switches from departmentalized to self-contained and found the experience turned out to have successful results. In this case, he will not guarantee it will succeed.


"Even through all the changes that have occurred at Goliad Intermediate through the last several years, sixth grade has been constantly the same. The changes have been around them," he said. "We have had this same situation for many years and we've not shown it to be successful for us to the extent we want it to be successful. Our teachers can't work any harder."

going to be a similar event to what we had last year, but a bigger event," said Airpark Manager Jim Little. "They are going to have as many as 100 different participants this year, they tell us, so we are going to have a diversity of events, more than we did last year, and more people."

The U.S. National Hang Gliding Champion will be named at the event. Little said the partici-

pants gave mainly positive feedback about last year's event.

"They liked the support," he said. "We asked them many times 'what we could do better,' and they had very few answers."

This year, the Hang Gliding Committee plans to get the public more involved by staging a major festival-type event for Aug. 2, including music, food vendors and possibly a community-wide craft and garage sale.

The plan includes the

Downtown Revitalization Association joining forces with the event by moving its bi-weekly Concert in the Park, already scheduled for that day, to the airpark.

That plan has not yet been presented to the DRA, and must be approved by the members of that association before it becomes a reality.

Early voting going slow in school board races

Election totals show a sluggish turnout at the polls for area school board trustee races as the election heads into the last two days of early voting. By 3 p.m. Friday, polls reported a total of 228 votes cast in the five area school board trustee elections during the past two weeks. In the Big Spring race, single member District 2, the new majority-minority district, has drawn 27 votes between first time candidates Maria V. Padilla and Robert G. "Bob" Smith. The District 4 race

being fought by Tony G. Kennedy and Linda Perez has garnered 53 early votes. Early voting continues at the Howard County Clerk's office in the Courthouse from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. The Stanton school board race has brought out a total of 59 voters, but only four have cast ballots in the single member District 2 race being contested by Connie Weaver and Ramiro Reyes. The District 7 race, an at-large seat, between incumbent Dr. Pablo Teveni and Danny Ireton has received 55 votes. In other at-large school board races, 60 votes have

been cast in Coahoma, 14 in Forsan and 75 in Glasscock County. In Coahoma, three at-large trustee seats drew a candidate field of six. All three incumbents, James White, Larry Cordes and Jody Reid are being challenged by Bobby Lang, Brandon Iden and Danny Martin. The result of a three-way race between incumbents Louis Boeker and Gary Hise and challenger Dr. David Sutton will determine who will represent two at-large seats on the Forsan school board. Glasscock County ISD has drawn a four-way race for three at-large seats. Douglas Schaefer, Carl Hoelscher and Andy

Wheeler are all seeking their first term on the board while incumbent Brad Avery is making a bid for another term. Voters should bring their voter's registration card or driver's license to the polls. Where to Vote

The Lady Steers' Eve Tobar just missed a spot at the state meet Saturday evening. She finished third in the 1,600-meter run with a time of 5:17.33.



Westbrook freshman upsets defending champ, advances to state tennis tourney

Westbrook freshman Trey Chavez entered the 2003 tennis season with a lofty goal: He wanted to win the state's Class 1A tennis championship.

Chavez put himself in position to do just that Thursday afternoon when he nailed down the Region II-1A championship with a sparkling effort. He defeated defending regional champion Dylan Dyer of Newcastle by a 6-2, 7-6 (7-4) margin to earn the Crossroads area's only berth in the state finals.

"Trey did a fantastic job at regionals," said his father and Westbrook tennis coach

Marcelino Chavez, who graduated from Coahoma High School. "He has had a remarkable season as a freshman."

The win over Dyer was made even sweeter considering it was Dyer who edged Chavez by a 6-2, 6-1 margin for the district crown earlier this year.

Chavez, who won two tournaments this year and finished second in two others, made sure Dyer would not enjoy the same success in the regional finals. He broke Dyer's serve early in the first game and then built a quick 3-2 lead.

Dyer managed to rally back a bit in the second game before Chavez roared back to tie the score at 6-6 and force a tiebreaker.

Down 3-0 in the sudden-death game, Chavez found his game. He reeled off seven of the next eight points to nail down the win — and the region's No. 1 seed at state.

Chavez had a relatively easy time getting to the finals. He ousted Lohn's Lance Helberg in straight sets, 6-1, 6-1, in his first match. He followed that win with a 6-0, 6-0 whitewashing of Ira's Scott Johnson in the quarterfinals.

Chavez's first test came in the third round. Baird's Will Green battled to a 3-3 draw before Chavez took complete control. He scored nine straight points and took a 6-3, 6-0 victory that sent him into the finals against Dyer sporting a 24-6 record on the year.




