VOTE **Big Spring ISD** assured of two new trustees By LYNDEL MOODY

Saturday, voters head to the polls to select representatives from the community – leaders whose decisions will impact the quality of the community's public education for years to come.

The five area school boards holding elections are Big Spring, Coahoma, Forsan, Glasscock County and Stanton.

One outcome can be assured that after Saturday, at least two new faces will be seated on the Big Spring Independent School District school board. Tony G. Kennedy and Linda Perez are vying for the single-member District 4 seat, vacated by Board President Frank Long, who opted not to seek another term, while single-member the District 2 race is being sought by first-time candidates Maria V. Padilla and Robert G. "Bob" Smith. By early voting counts, the District 4 race has drawn the largest amount of attention so far with three times as many people casting ballots in the race compared to District



Officers handle belligerent patient; work a couple of traffic accidents

Staff Writer **Big Spring emergency** personnel stayed busy Thursday subduing a bel-

ligerent patient near the Big Spring State Hospital and responding to two major accidents. Officer

cuts and bruises while subduing the Big Spring State Hospital patient about 4 p.m. Thursday, said Police Lt. Terry Chamness.

"Because (the of patient's) mental condition I don't know if we're going to pursue charges. but we did file a report on

it." Chamness said. "That's something we one of our guys hurt is file a report on it."

Police also responded to two major accidents Thursday. The first was at the intersection of East Third Street and South Runnels at about 11:45 a.m. and another at the intersection of 14th Street and South Scurry at about 3:35 p.m.

Although no one was injured, both caused significant damage to the vehicles involved.

In the first accident, a Dodge Caravan driven by Samuel Gonzalez, 61, of Stanton was in the south lane of East Third Street while a Chevy van driven by Sherry Lynn Black, 55, of Sweetwater was in the middle lane.




to 10 people on a list. The queen of Zamboulia wants to give me \$15 million, just for helping her get some financial matters in order. **Publishers' Clearing House**


fort my swollen tissues if I did. They don't want my thoughts on global warming, handguns, affirmative action, prayer in schools or the rain forest.



In an interview with the Associated Press, Santorum offered the opinion that "If the Supreme Court says that you have the right to consensual (gay) sex within your home, then you have the right to bigamy, you have the right to polygamy, you have the right to incest, you have the right to adultery. You have the right to anything."

Santorum was referring to Lawrence v. Texas, which was argued before the court last month and involves a case in which two non were charged under a Texas law prohibiting homosexual odomy. The men were arrested when police came to investigate a neighbor's complaint that someone was wielding a gun and "going crazy" in a nearby apartment and found the two men in flagrante delicto. Although the initial complaint turned out to be wrong -

the man filing it was later prosecuted for making a false report the two gay men spent the night in jail and were fined \$200 each.

Santorum judged too harshly

Only a few states — 13 — still outlaw consensual sodomy; and only four, including Texas, criminalize homosexual, but not heterosexual, sodomy. No state routinely enforces any of these laws, raising the question whether they all ought to be repealed. But the issue before the Supreme Court is not whether such laws are good policy but whether states have the right to make laws regarding private, consensual sex between adults in the first place.

You don't have to be a gay basher to believe, as Sen. Santorum argues, that striking down the Texas statute is problematic. **Either the Constitution protects** the rights of consenting adults to do whatever they desire in private or it doesn't. If the Constitution prohibits a state from regulating consensual sexual activities between adults of the same sex, why should it allow states to regulate such activities between adults of the opposite sex, which antiincest, anti-bigamy, anti-polygamy and anti-adultery statutes certainly do? (Ironically, one of the arguments of the gay rights groups that brought this case is that homosexuals and heterosexuals ought to be treated the same.) Again, the issue isn't whether these laws are good policy or bad, but whether the state should have the authority to pass such laws at all.

These laws reflect a moral consensus about the behaviors involved. But, for better or worse, that consensus is changing, especially with regard to homosexuality. There is far greater acceptance of gay men and women today than at any time in our nation's histo-

ry. Nonetheless, according to the most comprehensive study of sexual attitudes among Americans, the National Health and Social Life Survey conducted in the early 1990s, 65 percent of respondents said "same gender sex is always wrong."

Believing homosexuality is wrong, however, doesn't translate into support for laws outlawing homosexual conduct. Most Americans - 68 percent, according to a 2000 Los Angeles Times poll - favor laws forbidding employment discrimination against gays. Half of all Americans favor giving gays inheritance rights, employer-provided benefits and other entitlements enjoyed by married couples (although an even larger 58 percent oppose allowing gay couples to marry).

These data suggest that most voters would favor repealing the few remaining state anti-sodomy laws, putting the power to make such decisions where it belongs, with the elected representatives of the people. If the Court disagrees and strikes down the Texas statute, not only will anti-bigamy and antiincest laws be at risk, but so will others that interfere with private. consensual behavior, including gambling, prostitution, drug laws and others. No doubt some Americans - lib-

ertarians, for example - would applaud such sweeping change. But most wouldn't, which brings us back to Sen. Santorum's statement. He wasn't equating homosexual behavior with bigamy, incest, etc. - as most of the media reports on the flap have suggested - but rather asserting that the state has an interest in regulating some private behaviors. There's nothing abhorrent about such a view, and he should not be pilloried for stating it.

Diego Porras and the Martinez brothers, Jose and twins Emanuel and Salvidor, are legends to Sands track fans. The foursome helped put Sands on the map in track by starting a proud tradition at the school.

"We've been going to state for five years in cross country and track," said Coach Felipe Castro. At Sands, the sports are almost synonymous.

"As a coach, we have been fortunate to have a great group of kids willing to work hard, which is why Sands is where it is in Texas as a long distance and cross country school," said Castro.

The school cross country team took fourth in 1998, third in 1999 and was the state's No. 2 squad in 2000. Sands returned in 2001 to place 10th but didn't qualify as a team last year. However, senior Deisi Porras kept the tradition going by qualifying as an individual.

Barraza's success, according the Castro, is a direct result of the hard work he put in during the fall in cross country.

"When he was in cross country, he made up his mind to do better," said Castro. "He decided to work harder. All of that is paying off now. He's carrying on the tradition.

Barraza's winding down a stellar season in which he won both the 1,600 and 3,200 in district and area competition, and placed second in both at region. During the fall cross country season he led the Mustangs to a first place finish in district. The squad was seventh in the region, aided by Barraza's 25th place finish individually. At least one SHS streak came to an end this spring, however. For the first time in five years, a Sands girls did not advance to the state meet. Porras narrowly missed keeping the run alive last week at the regional meet. "This is the first year during all that time we haven't sent a girl to state," noted Castro. 




