Commission Votes For Enforcement Of Ordinances

Friona city commissioners settled down to serious business in the Monday night meeting of this week, voting several important measures. Action included voted for:

- (1) \$7500 to be spent for water works improvements in the near future, including additional fire hydrants.
- (2) Serious attempt to collect all delinquent taxes.
- (3) Strict enforcement of present sewer and trash ordinances. Sewer connections will be made for fees of \$18 for the 4-inch connection, and \$24 for 6-inch sizes. Regarding trash pickup, both businesses and residences are reminded that the containers must be of convenient size for one man to handle, and they must without exception be covered with a lid.

Friona Schools Commence Sept. 1; Senior Registration Begins 23rd

Superintendent Dalton Caffey announced this week that the Friona schools will reopen September 1, which leaves less than four weeks for vacation time. Superintendent Caffey, together with Principals Dillie Kelley and John Parish, completed the registration schedule this week with the following dates announced: Seniors will register on the twenty-third of this month (Monday) at the high school building. Juniors will register the twenty-fourth (Tuesday), with Sophomores registering the twenty-fifth (Wednesday) and Freshmen completing High School's registration on the twenty-sixth (Thursday).

Grades 1 through 8 will register the first of September (Wednesday) in the morning. Classes will be conducted in high school until noon on that day. Buses will run for the first time September 1, with high school students furnishing their own transportation for registration. Many of the former teachers are returning. Practically all of the positions are filled. The Star will carry a complete list of teachers for the coming year in the Friona schools, next week.

One hundred and five first graders enrolled last year and an equal number is anticipated this year. The second grade will be divided into three sections, instead of the former two.

The total enrollment last year reached a peak of 762 and judging from past school records, it is estimated that the number will increase by 30 or 40 new students, Caffey says. Facilities are being expanded to better care for the expected increase in enrollment. One new subject will be presented this year. Spanish will be offered to Sophomores and Juniors. Two years are necessary to receive credit toward graduation, so therefore, it is not available to Seniors. However, a senior may take the subject if his schedule is not already overcrowded and he desires to do so.

Friona School Annuals Arrive

The Friona School Annuals arrived Tuesday, according to Dillie Kelley, Principal. Students may obtain the annuals by coming to the High School building Thursday afternoon, August 5, between the hours of one and six. Students are asked to refrain from calling the residence of Mr. Kelley to procure an annual, they must come to the school.

The white leather covered books, stamped in gold, represent the 11th annual received at FHS. The cost was higher than any preceding, with an approximate amount of \$2,000.00 being paid. It is also the largest annual to be published for Friona, with 122 pages. One hundred and eight books, printed by the University Supply and Equipment Company of Fort Worth, have arrived. Editor of the annual was Don Lewis.

For the first time, all of the pictures have been mounted by students. The division pages are entirely original. Also for the first time, type has been set instead of the customary photograph that has been taken of each page. Students desiring an annual are requested to bring their receipts to eliminate the waste of time in hunting records of payments made.

School Building Is Ahead of Schedule

The Friona School building under construction is considerably ahead of schedule, according to Dalton Caffey, Superintendent.

The contract was originally let for 180 days completion period, but if no material or labor shortage occurs, it should be completed in 150-160 days.

Brick laying will be finished sometime next week. The only possible shortages that might occur are those of window or door frames, says Caffey.

Zoning Group Issues Permits

Four building permits were issued at the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting, Tuesday night.

The permits were issued to: Howard Mayfield for the building of a carport, Mrs. G. F. Williams to repair roof and brace house, Neal Fulks for two-room addition to his residence, owned by F. S. Truitt, and to Henry McCauley for a new two-bedroom home.

County Demos Give Support Shivers Camp

Thirty-three precinct delegates were present Saturday at the Parmer County Democratic Convention in Farwell, nineteen of them from the Friona precinct and the remaining from Farwell.

The session was harmonious throughout, and the body unanimously passed a resolution in substance asking the local delegates to the state convention to align with the "states rights" branch of the party headed at present by Governor Shivers.

The resolution placing Parmer County in the Shivers camp originated in the Friona precinct convention a week ago. It read: "Be it resolved by Parmer County Democratic Convention that the Governor of the State of Texas, and all other state, district and county officials be urged to oppose any interference and encroachment upon our state government and state institutions by the Federal Government and its instrumentalities."

Named as delegates to the state convention in Mineral Wells, on September 14, were Bill Sheehan, Sloan Osborn, G. B. Buske, J. G. McFarland, Sam Aldridge, and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Anderson.

Emergency Polio Drive Is Called

Loyde Brewer, County Chapter Chairman, and Raymond Euler, County Campaign Director, for March of Dimes, attended a meeting the Herring Hotel in Amarillo, Friday, where plans were discussed for an emergency drive for additional funds.

Because of the high incidence of polio cases and the additional costs incurred by vaccine tests, foundation monies have been exhausted. Parmer County still has around two hundred dollars on hand, but two or three cases of polio could deplete that, according to Brewer.

Queen Contest Is Entered by 29

The Queen Contest sponsored by Parmer County Farm Bureau, from all indications, is going to be an even greater event than was last year's. Mrs. Melba Miller, who is in charge of entries for the contest, reports 29 candidates already sponsored. Last year there were only 18 at the time of the contest. Mrs. A. J. Ellison of Bovina turned in 11 from that area and 18 Friona entries have come in. At this writing neither Farwell nor Lazduddy have reported, but there will be several from both communities, it is expected. Mrs. Jeanne Graham is in charge of Farwell entries.

After hearing the facts pointing to the desperate need for more money, Euler and Brewer came home ready to inaugurate a drive in Parmer County. No definite goal will be set. Parmer County citizens have been so cooperative at the regular January drive periods that these workers wish to make it clear that pressure will not be used in any manner. Coin collectors will be set up, letters mailed to all residents, the facts presented and contributions accepted.

Fifty Registered At Congregational School

Closing exercises for the Congregational Vacation Bible School was conducted at the Congregational Church, Friday evening. The work accomplished by the students was displayed for the parents to view. Each child participated on the program, presenting something that depicted what he had learned at the Bible School.

All art work was in connection with the study, "Pioneering with Christ." Judging by enthusiastic comments and remarks made by the children, it was determined that this year's Bible School was more thoroughly enjoyed than those in previous years.

The attendance average 45 a day, with a registration of 50, which produced an attendance of near 100 per cent, according to Mrs. George Treider, Superintendent.

Last week word was received from J. Walter Hammond, TFB president, that additional awards had been offered for district winners. That means that 12 additional Texas girls will receive a certificate entitling them to a week's stay at the Crazy Hotel in Mineral Wells. As stated in the letter, "Each (district) Queen, and one person to accompany her, will receive a week's stay complimentary in the Crazy Hotel, Mineral Wells, Texas. This will include a nice room, delicious food, invigorating baths, and other entertaining features." These additional awards come as complimentary expressions from Mr. Fred Brown, manager of the hotel.

Each district winner will also be guest of Texas Farm Bureau at the State Convention in November. An attendant is included in this provision. The State Queen is the lucky one, who, with her attendant, will be allowed \$500 to take her to New York City in December, where she will be guest of American Farm Bureau.

In the course of the Amarillo meeting, Dr. Bob Jarrett, of Canyon, asked some questions about the foundation recommendation for city-wide administration of gamma globulin. When his questions had been answered, he immediately left the meeting and went to Canyon to prepare for just such a program. Three cases had been reported in that city in the last few days. The same workers who assisted in placing the pin collectors in the January drive will be asked to help in this emergency, according to Euler.

The reduction of the death rate from polio, ironically increases the need for funds to treat and rehabilitate patients. The greatest hope being entertained now is that the preventive vaccine will prove effective enough to remove polio from the top crippling disease in the near future, possibly within the next two years. Brewer and Euler say they are confident that people will want to give something who they understand the urgent need, carry on this work of mercy, completely financed by the American public on a voluntary basis.

## Other Editors Say:

### WHO'S WHO IN POPULATION SCRAMBLE ON THE PLAINS (The Canyon News)

This population battle between Amarillo and Lubbock is rather amusing.

The federal census gave the edge to Lubbock. Now she claims 108,678 population. Amarillo will have to take in a few more towns, like Borger or Pampa. Amarillo has already gobbled up Canyon and Claude and possibly Panhandle in her count for a Greater Amarillo.

On with the battle. We shall wait with abated breath the federal count of 1960 before becoming too excited over the population race.

### UNDERPAID MINISTERS (Ochiltree County Herald)

The Herald has been referred by at least two local ministers to an article in a recent issue of The Nation's Business magazine, dealing with the underpaid minister, stating that his pay in 25 years has increased 41 per cent while that of teachers has gone up 102 per cent.

Fewer than 10 per cent of the ministers in the United States receive pay of more than \$5,000 a year. The average religious worker receives \$2,500 a year and that's little encouragement to 40,000 persons becoming new clergymen each year.

The young Jewish rabbi, just out of college, will get a minimum of \$5,000 without house rent — this is the highest denomination pay in the nation.

The article pointed out that the average donation per church member of \$35 per year, while the average of unpaid bills and debts per Protestant minister is more than \$500, simply because a preacher can't make ends meet on his present salary.

The trend is toward the feeling that 3 to 5 per cent of income is regarded as fair for church gifts instead of the tithe or 10 per cent, due to the government entering the field of philanthropy.

Churches throughout the land have built new buildings in these postwar years, and in many cases

have a huge debt riding on them. This debt takes precedence over a minister's salary, in too many cases. While the minister today doesn't make much money, he is called upon for a great many activities that weren't thought of a generation ago. Churches have youth

programs, etc., which keep activities going at the church all week long, and the pastor and his wife are expected to participate. He is expected to maintain his traditional visits to the sick, making his rounds of the members of the congregation, etc.

One church in Chicago called a meeting of men members. They wrote their salaries on slips of paper without signatures. The average income was \$3,900 and they promptly raised the minister's salary to that sum.

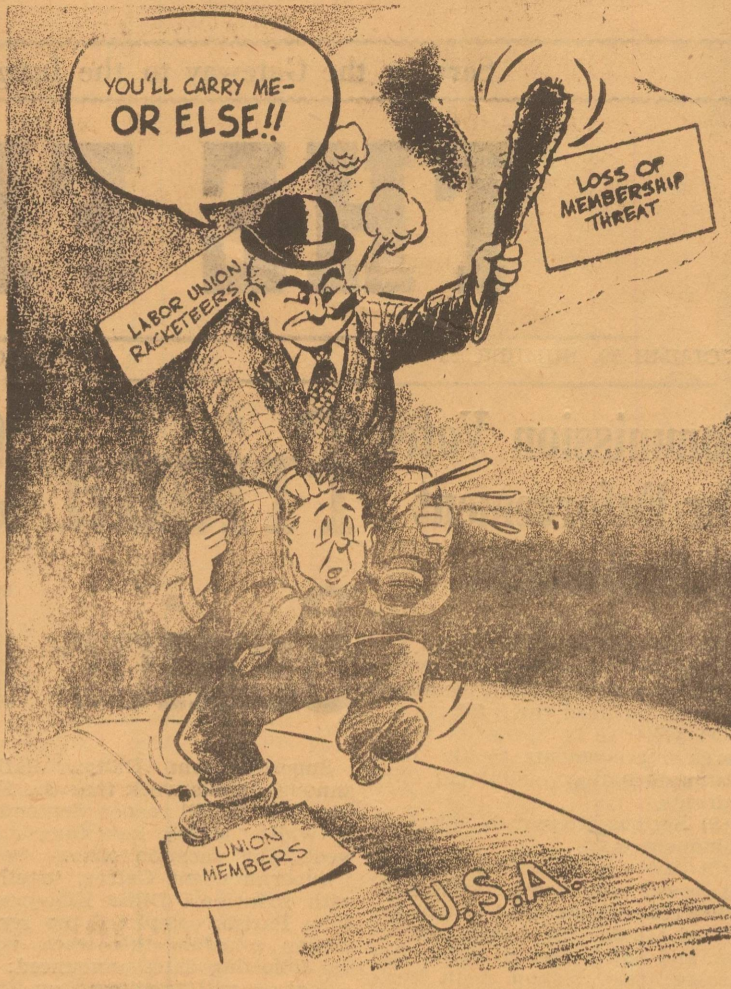

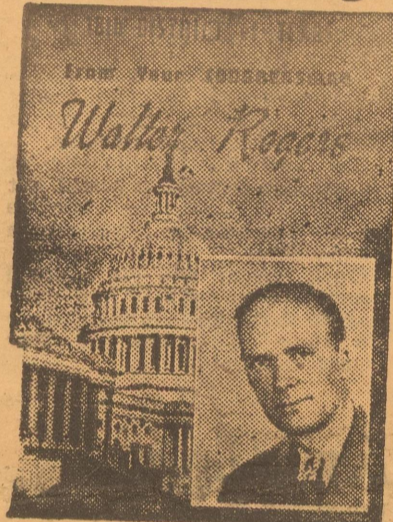

## Washington Views—



To the People of the 1st District: ELECTION DAY

The fourth Saturday in July every two years is the main reason that Texas will never tolerate Communism in any degree, or any other dictatorial government or force that denies the people the right to express their desires in a loud, clear voice at the polls. The people just wouldn't stand for interference with election day, and especially election night, when the returns begin to pour in. I had thought that I would have to vote absentee, since Congress was still in session and several important matters were pending in the Senate that could come back to the House at any moment. However, a filibuster started over there, which created the breathing spell I was looking for, and I immediately took off for the Panhandle. The House was still in session, and I knew that I would be shown with a few absentees, but the call of the Plains was too strong. I wanted to be home on election day, and I was home. To the people of the Panhandle, I want to express my gratitude. I wish it were possible for

me to come to each of you and do this personally. I shall always strive to merit the confidence and trust with which you have honored me.

I only wish that I could have brought the family home with me, but the trip was a whirlwind one that gave me only three days at home. Those of you with families know that it takes that long to round up the kids to get started on a trip.

The Congress is now protected. The House passed a bill yesterday on a voice vote that I voted against. It was a bill that created a Capitol Police Force and provided that a uniformed and armed member of that force would be in each of the galleries of the House.

The entire debate supporting the bill was centered around the Puerto Rican of March 1, when several of the members were hit. In other words, now that the horse is gone, we are attempting to close the barn door. Certainly the March tragedy should never have occurred, but it did. It was only by the Grace of God that a number of us were not killed. If, in the future, the same type of fanatic should again appear in the gallery and follow the identical procedure followed by the Puerto Rican woman and her stooges, I dare say that the results would be just as bad, if not worse. Probably the only difference would be that an armed officer would slay the assassins before they could get out of the gallery. This, of course, would not bring back to life any member of Congress who had been slain by such a fusillade or some innocent bystander in the gallery who might be hit by the bullets of the fanatics or the armed officers. None of us wants to be shot at, but I do not think the American taxpayer should be saddled with a cost for a service that will not provide the result sought. The degree of fanaticism or mental instability that would prompt an assassin to fire upon the Senate or the House of Representatives is such that he would not be deterred by the presence of some uniformed and armed guard. Our government is a civil government, and our Congress is supposed to be constituted of civilians elected by the people. I do not believe that the wearing a uniform and the bearing of arms inside the House Chamber will be conducive to the best interests of

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

Some in Washington feel if Congress had more like Sen. John J. Williams of Delaware, lower taxes, lower Federal budget would be a reality instead of theory.

When the Senator was 18 he left the family farm and started his own hay and grain business and was engaged in independent business for the not inconsiderable years until his election to the U. S. Senate in 1946. So the Senator does not have the disrespect for the dollar common among those who have little idea how difficult it is to lay aside one for a rainy day.

The other day the Senator was audibly concerned with a few items in the operation of U. S. Farm programs.

He stated for example, a doctor, with a good income, secured a Farm Credit Administration loan of \$16,035. He also states he found an Otto Zuecher of Arapahoe, Col. engaged in the construction business via FHA loans and also operating a rather elaborate tourist camp tapped the same source for \$58,100. He also stated he found that J. Frank Kendrick, an Agriculture Dept. employee at \$8,400 per year and a worth of \$62,000 received a loan of \$35,164 in 1951 to put more buildings on his Ohio farm.

Other unusual facts are coming to light on nations' farm programs.

For example, the largest price support loan in 1953 was given to a Mississippi corporation owned by a concern in Manchester, England. From its 35,000 acres, the British got U. S. loan

of \$1,268,492.00 on 7,220 bales of cotton. Average Mississippi cotton farmer received \$972.

Figgen Inc., operating in California's San Joaquin Valley, got \$1,246,516.46 on 7,314 bales of cotton.

Seattle's Horrigan Investment Co. received \$201,832 on wheat.

Largest corn loan went to Adams Bros. & Co., a family partnership headed by R. G. Adams, trustee of a large insurance firm with homes in Iowa and Miami Beach His firm received \$190,944. The average Iowa corn grower received \$2,154.

Government records show only 64 corporate farms accounted for almost \$18 million in government loans. And this is a situation of which Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson is aware; is even said to deplore.

Independent businessmen, knowing nation's welfare rests on independent family sized farms along with independent business opportunity, have willingly paid taxes to help tide over independent farmers while squeezed between domestic surpluses and flood of cheaply produced imported farm products.

But independent businessmen little relish tapping of their tills for benefit of wealthy corporate farm ventures, including British owned ones. As long as this situation continues whereby big corporation farms are subsidized to produce surpluses, and foreign imports continue, the problem of the taxpayer, the consumer or of the independent farmer will never be solved. Former Agriculture Secretary Charles Brannan proposed to limit price support loans to the first \$25,000 worth produced on any farm. Now businessmen wonder what plan Secretary Benson has to stop this abuse.

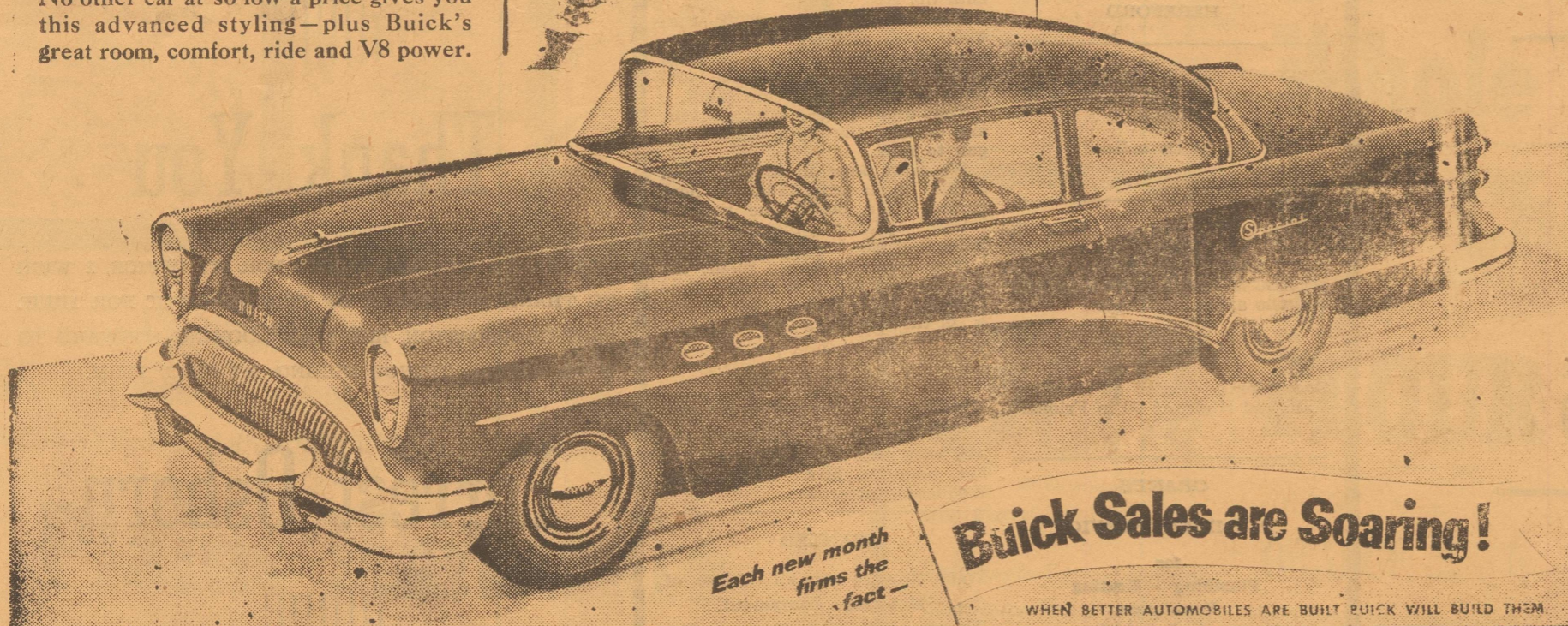

**Letter From A. O. Drake:-**  
**SUCH CHANGES THAT CAN TAKE PLACE**

The first motor trip back to my old stomping grounds was in 1918. Going by way of Elk City, Oklahoma, we noticed that, though most roads were graded, the bridges were rough and in bad shape. I was lucky to have a good car to start out with, an eight-cylinder Oldsmobile, but as many have done, we went through Oklahoma on the hottest day of the year. A hot wind cooked everything ahead of it as far as we traveled. Trailers were very scarce at that time and there were only six children, my wife and I, so we were pulling a two-wheeled trailer which Fred Perry helped me build. We made it to Elk City, Oklahoma, the second day and the only incidents experienced was the loss of our trailer a few times. We had to camp on the road in the edge of Oklahoma and as I remember, the grass burrs were everywhere so that we had to tramp them down, and what a time we had!

After leaving Elk City, we went north and broke our trailer hitch by hitting so many rough roads. I was lucky to find a blacksmith at a little town that fixed the hitch so we could travel the next morning. We crossed the Cimarron river and a low-water, plank bridge. The bank we had to climb was so high that with the trailer behind me, I knew it would take plenty of gas, so I hit it so hard that it broke both the rear springs. It so happened that there were some short pieces of bridge timbers nearby so we blocked the back of the car on the rear axle and made it into Liberal that night. That evening we spread our tent and enjoyed the night until it began to rain.

We were kept in Liberal from Sunday night until 11:00 the next Friday. We pulled the mud to Hooker, Oklahoma, making twenty miles that day. Now with the paved roads, the trip can be made in a day if so desired. Who knows what it will be in the next fifty years? I give up.

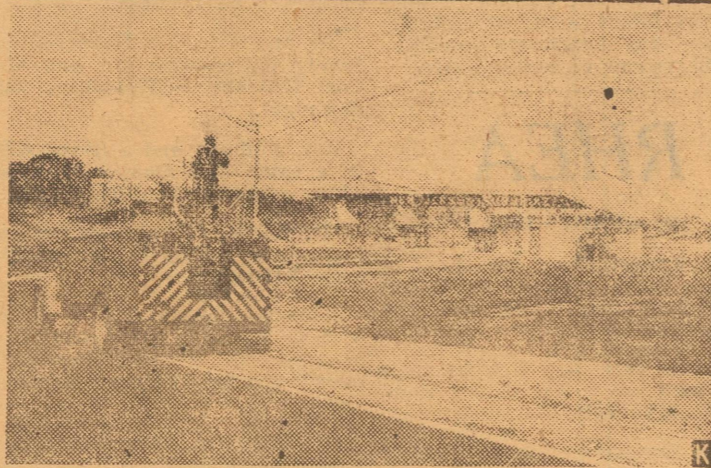

## New Machine Makes Lawns at Two Acres Per Hour



A new machine that sows and fertilizes an acre in 25 minutes is going to make many a home owner, with his handkerchief lawn and lame back, feel pretty disillusioned.

By ingenious use of auxiliary tanks and the twisting of a valve, an operator can sow grass quickly on a bare or sparse piece of roadside. Or, if he is rolling along and spots a stand of grass needing fertilizer — a couple of twists and the fertilizer streams out.

Faced with the problem of creating and maintaining 3,600 acres of grassland along the 118-mile New Jersey Turnpike, Authority engineers developed this new truck-mounted lawn maker.

According to Homo Hegemeister, Turnpike horticulturist, the machine can spew a scientifically blended mixture of grass seed, lime, water and fertilizer to a swathe up to 150 feet wide. Such

of the Turnpike's grassland is on steep slopes inaccessible to the usual machinery. Without the "flosser," as the machine is called, such stretches would have to be separately fertilized, limed, seeded and watered by hand — a task to stagger the Turnpike's maintenance crew of 250 men.

The rig has already saved several times its initial cost over the costs involved in accomplishing that task by hand. Besides seeding and fertilizing, it can also do a host of other chores — spraying insecticides, painting rails and lines — when it isn't making lawns. Home owners and lawn keepers have finally seen their dreams come true!

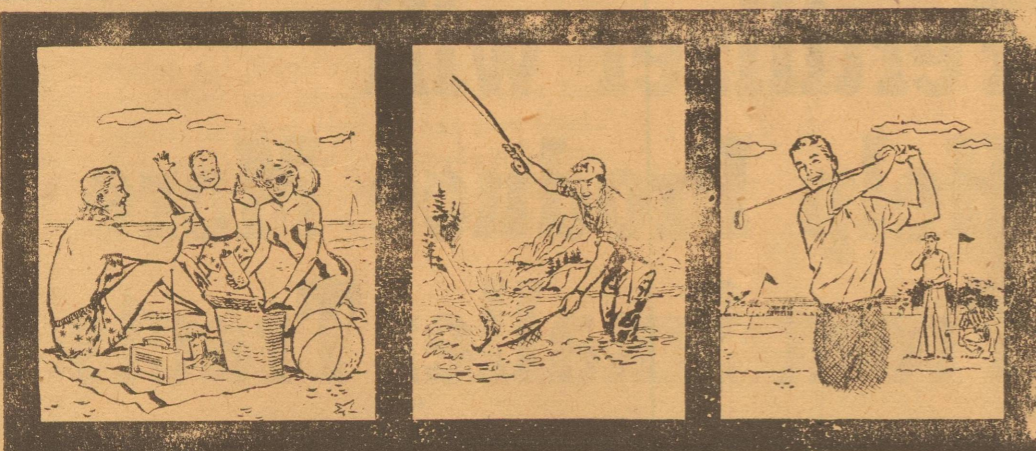

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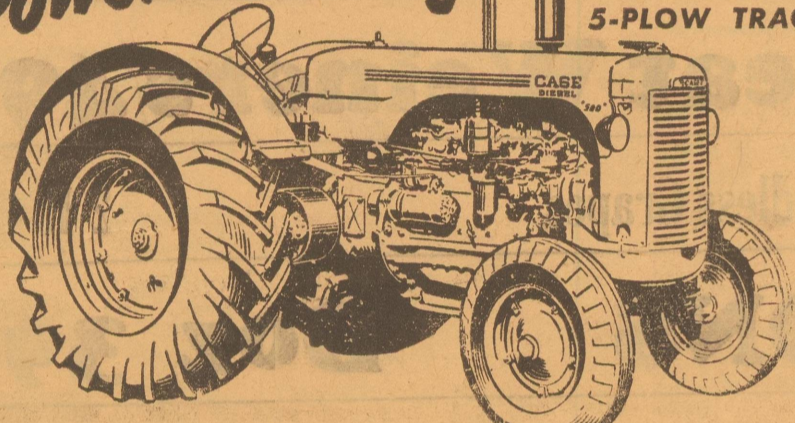

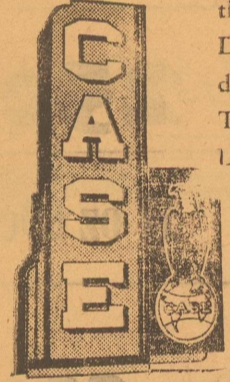

this nation. I would much prefer to run the risk of being shot at than to see even the faintest shadow of a police state cast across the chambers of our legislative bodies, national, state, or local.

**The Russian Approach**

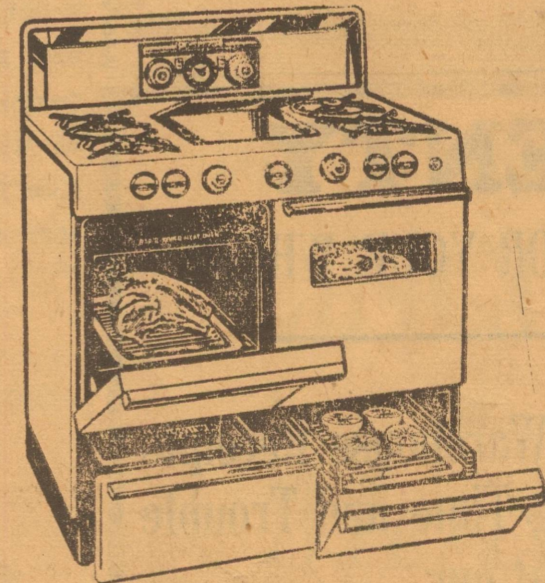
