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Moore OKs loan for Fibercom

A local company will get a \$180,000 loan from Moore Development for Big Spring Inc. for relocation costs.

The decision was made during an executive session at the Moore Development Board of Directors meeting Wednesday. Board members then returned to open session and officially approved the measure.

Fibercom, a Big Spring com-

pany specializing in the manufacture of fiberglass sucker rods for oilfield use, bought out the oilfield division of local competitor Fiberflex in late 2002.

McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark.

"(The loan is) for two purposes really," said Moore Board member Duane Thomas. "The first is to assist in Fibercom's relocation to part of Fiberflex's old facility. And also, it allows them to purchase some additional equipment."

Thomas said Fibercom will borrow the money on a six-year, zero-interest loan.

Early voting ends Friday in the 19th Congressional District runoff between Randy Neugebauer, R-Lubbock, and Mike Conaway, R-Midland.

Early voting is taking place at the Howard County Courthouse from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Actual election day is June 3 and polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in five locations.

Any registered voter may cast a ballot in the District 19 runoff. It is not necessary to have voted in the May 3 general election to vote in the runoff.

Payments during the first two years of the note are deferred. The company will repay \$25,000 the third year, \$50,000 each of the fourth and fifth years and the remaining \$55,000 the sixth year.

"I know that they're excited about the growth that they're going through and they're really anxious to get out there," Thomas said. "There's projections... currently, I believe they're at 52 employees. They've indicated to me that they plan to be at 80

by year's end, if we were able to help them with this expansion."

In other business, Moore board of directors heard a report from a committee exploring the possibility of using its funds for 4B community development projects.

"(The 4B Committee) split up into subcommittees, one on the (Comanche Trail) Lake, one on the golf course at the park and another on the amphitheater," said Moore Development Director Kent Sharp.

The only subcommittee that recommended moving forward with more investigation of its project

was that focused on the Comanche Trail Park Amphitheater, Sharp added.

"The city is studying the possibility of undertaking pretty extensive renovations to the golf course," he said. "The lake, it was just determined that a private company would be better served in doing a partnership with the city on that."

The Amphitheater Subcommittee recommended drafting a request for proposals on what it would take to put on a large-scale theatrical production — similar to the "Texas" production

performed at Canyon — at the amphitheater.

"What we're trying to do is get a group together to present a proposal on a production," Sharp said. "Then we'll have a formal business plan, in which they'd do costs and benefits and all that."

If a suitable plan is developed, a public election to allow the Moore Board to spend its 4A economic development funds for the 4B project would be required.

am-Bartlett and Harris ACE hardware stores, the Post Office and at the intersection of U.S. 87 and FM 700, said Post 2013 Past Commander Leo Welch.

"Buddy poppies' have become recognized as the memorial flower in countries throughout the world," Welch said. "They have been distributed by VFW posts since 1922 to raise funds for our charitable programs on behalf of the needy and disabled veterans and the widows and orphans of deceased veterans."

All donations are accepted, he added.

"Whatever they want to put in the little can that we've got," he said.

"If a little kid comes up with a penny, we'll take that. If somebody donates \$1,000, we'll take that, too."

More than 14 million of the bright red artificial flowers on green stems — manufactured by disabled veterans — are distributed annually, most around Memorial Day and Veterans Day. The flowers are distributed by VFW posts in every state of the union and in dozens of other countries.

great working with the kids, giving them ideas," Mallett said. "He makes it a lot of fun for them."

said. "The whole journalism career has expanded."


Mallett said the show will continue through the summer. On May 31, the class will broadcast live from the Gregg Street Sonic from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

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

Time to check that first-aid kit

It's almost summer: You've had the air conditioner serviced, cleaned the backyard grill and repaired the window screens, but when was the last time you checked out your first-aid kit? One out of five kids ends up in the doctor's office or hospital emergency room each year because of an accidental injury, and summer is the peak season for household accidents. Yet experts believe only 5 percent of homes have a first-aid kit, and many of them aren't properly supplied. "Having a properly stocked first-aid kit can really make a difference," says Connie Harvey, a health and safety expert for the American Red Cross. "It can save a life."

Unfortunately, just picking up a first-aid kit off a store shelf might not be adequate, nor can you count on that first-aid kit you bought five years ago. Any collection of medical supplies can be labeled a first-aid kit, and some parts of a kit — medicines, antiseptics and even bandages — can be perishable, or at least lose their efficacy over time.

Makers of first-aid kits often don't include any medicine at all, not because something like aspirin isn't useful (it could save you in the event of a heart attack), but because they fear potential lawsuits if the medications cause an allergic reaction.

"There's a liability issue," says Dave Hammond, who designs and markets first-aid kits for home and business use for New Jersey-based DLH Inc.

Hammond's product, the Safe at Home first-aid kit (\$30.95), is one of the more highly regarded kits on the market. It divides up supplies

The American Red Cross recommends...

1. Activated charcoal. Useful in cases of poisoning but should only be used when directed by a physician or poison control center representative.
2. Adhesive tape.
3. Antiseptic ointment.
4. Band-Aids in assorted sizes.
5. Blanket
6. Cold pack. This is the chemical pack that becomes cold when activated and can be useful to reduce swelling.
7. Disposable gloves. Older kits might not have this but they can be a lifesaver in the age of potentially deadly blood-borne diseases.
8. Gauze pads and roller gauze.
9. Hand cleaner.
10. Plastic bags.
11. Scissors and tweezers.
12. Small flashlight and extra batteries.
13. Syrup of Ipecac. (Useful to induce vomiting but only when directed by a physician or poison control center representative.)
14. Triangular bandage.

Experts also suggest consumers consider adding these useful extras:
— Alcohol wipes.
— Cleansing towelettes.
— Aspirin. For use in the event of a heart attack.
— Sterile eye pads.
— Finger splints.
— Burn relief pads.
— Sting relief products.

in pre-arranged disposable packets based on the situation. There's one for bleeding, one for "bones" — meaning a break or sprain — and another pack for bites and stings.

"What you need will always depend on the situation. There's always a chance the standard kit won't be (adequate)," says Dr. Alkesh Patel, a physician at the family medicine clinic at the University of Maryland Medical Center. "Generally, you need to look at it once a year to check expiration dates and replace supplies."

The average first-aid kit costs about \$20, but the average household might need to spend \$5 to \$10 more to customize it to fit a family's needs. For instance, if someone in your house has a severe allergy or asthma, an inhaler or antihistamine might be included.

Experts also recommend that the first-aid kit be kept out of reach of small children, but be located where other family members, a grandparent or baby sitter can find it.

"Think of it as part of disaster

preparedness," says Harvey. "Someday you may need to direct a child to go get it for you. You need easy access and to have all your supplies in one spot."

Another key element for any first-aid kit is an instruction booklet covering situations ranging from a heart attack to what to do for a snake bite, insect sting or sprain. The American Red Cross distributes a pocket-size book, "First Aid Fast," that is available from local chapters. To find the nearest chapter, check the national Web site at www.redcross.org.

Wristband swap freedom

ANGLETON (AP) — A wristband swap has resulted in the release of a prisoner from the Brazoria County Detention Center in what law officers called a plot to fool them.

It's the second time in six months that officers at the Southeast Texas lockup have released the wrong inmate.

DeMarcus Jerome Hart, who was held without bail on parole violation charges out of Missouri, was released shortly after midnight Wednesday after switching identities with Jason Starks, 21, of Champaign, Ill.

When a person came to the jail early Wednesday morning to pay Starks' fine, Hart answered instead and was released.

"Seems that he and another inmate exchanged wristbands yesterday sometime," Chief Deputy Charles Wagner told The Facts in Angleton for Thursday's editions. "During roll call, he would answer as the other guy."

Tulia defendants' bill OK'd

AUSTIN (AP) — A bill allowing for the release of 13 people who remain imprisoned from a discredited 1999 Tulia drug bust won approval in the Texas House on Wednesday.

Without opposition, the House gave a final OK to the measure by Rep. Terry Keel, a Republican from Austin. The bill now goes to Gov. Rick Perry.

The legislation will help bring an end to an injustice against the Tulia defendants, who are awaiting court action that is expected to set them free, Keel said.

"In this case all the parties agree that the case presented against these people who are in prison was rife with inconsistencies. Perjury was committed in their convictions," Keel said.

JP's conduct questioned

HOUSTON (AP) — A Jefferson County Justice of the Peace told inmates he knew their home addresses and would have sex with their wives while they were locked up, took off his belt and instructed parents to use it to beat their children and swore at those who appeared before him, according to a Texas Commission on Judicial Conduct report.

Justice of the Peace Thurman Bartie has 15 days to respond to the findings by Pat Boone, a judge appointed by the Texas Supreme Court as a special master to consider evidence against the JP, who has served in Jefferson County since 1995.

Bartie, who was suspended last August by the Texas Supreme Court based on the allegations, was previously disciplined in 1999 and 2000. He is set to remain in office until 2006 unless the commission recommends that a seven-judge panel consider removing him, commission executive director Margaret Reaves, said.

"I'm not commenting on that," Bartie said Wednesday from his

Truelove, who also coached the running backs, was named the head football coach at





Former Steers mentor lands job in Missouri

When Bobby Doe held the reigns of the Big Spring High School baseball program he led the Steers through one of their grandest periods in history. Now he'd like nothing more than to show Missouri baseball fans the same thing.

Doe, who guided Big Spring to a pair of appearances in the state baseball tournament, joined the ranks of the un-retired last month when he was named the head baseball coach at Stockton High School in Stockton, Mo. The return to coaching ends a three-year break in his coaching career.

"I kind of balked when they offered it to me the first time," said Doe, who also serves as the director of the Mickey Owen Baseball School. "I was kind of retired, but once it (coaching) gets into your blood it never really gets out. It just seemed like a good thing when I thought about it for a while."

Under Doe, Big Spring enjoyed more than a few good times on the baseball field. The Steers, despite using a lineup that features six sophomores, advanced to the Class 4A state tournament in his first year in 1992. Two years later, the Steers rolled into the

state finals.

Overall, Big Spring won more than 140 games in Doe's 8-year tenure at the school. He coached in the Texas High School Baseball Coaches' annual all-star tilt in the summer of 1994.

"Big Spring and Coahoma have a tradition of having good baseball players," said Doe. "That was a great time in my life. I wouldn't trade those memories for anything."

Doe's career at Big Spring ended unceremoniously in 2000 when he was reassigned within the district by athletic director Dwight Butler.

Doe, a graduate of Snyder and the son of former Big Spring baseball star Robert "Huck" Doe, came to the Steers after helping start the baseball program in Hawley.

In Stockton, Doe will be taking over a program team that saw part of its home field destroyed by recent tornado activity.

"It's going to be different coaching here," said Doe, who guided Big Spring into the post-season in seven of his eight years at the helm. "But I think it's going to be fun. I think we're going to like it."

His wife, Rhonda, and their two children, Brett and Megan, will be relocating to Missouri at the end of the school year.

NEW YORK - CBS chief executive Leslie Moonves was caught uttering the world's worst quote.

Moonves was talking to reporters Wednesday about CBS's two-part movie, "Hitler: The Rise of Evil," which is scheduled to air Sunday and Tuesday.

"We're very proud of 'Hitler,'" Moonves said. "The miniseries!" he quickly amended. "Don't put that quote in. That's a career-ender right there."

CBS received some criticism for making a movie about one of history's greatest villains. A Jewish leader who had been critical, Abraham Foxman of the Anti-Defamation League, praised the film after seeing it for providing a powerful history lesson.

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. (AP) - Wedding bells and birthday cake were in order for former NBA star Dennis Rodman, who married his girlfriend on his 42nd birthday.

Rodman married Michelle Moyer in a private civil ceremony Tuesday in Newport Beach, the Los Angeles Times reported. Rodman, who played for the Detroit Pistons, Chicago Bulls and Los Angeles Lakers, said a "real wedding" will take place June 14 on the beach in front of his house.

Rodman met Moyer, 36, in a bar four years ago. They have two children together: a son, D.J., 2; and a daughter, Trinity, 1.

They have separate homes two miles apart in Newport Beach and don't plan to change their living arrangement.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Lawyers for Britney Spears and the Skechers footwear company have settled competing federal lawsuits over a deal for the pop star to market a line of roller skates and accessories, court documents state.

Terms of the settlement were not disclosed.

Spears filed a \$1.5 million breach of agreement lawsuit against Skechers in December, claiming the Manhattan Beach-based company failed to pay her adequately for marketing a line of skates and accessories.

The settlement was disclosed in documents filed May 8 in U.S. District Court in Los Angeles.
