Runoff set Tuesday to fill 19th Congressional seat By ROGER CLINE

Staff Writer It's time to vote, Howard County.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday in the 19th Congressional District runoff election between Randy Neugebauer, R-Lubbock, and Mike Conaway, R-Midland.

Early voting in the race concluded Friday. Only

1,048 of Howard County's 14,951 registered voters cast votes early, 1,000 in person and 48 by mail.

In the May 3 general election, 17 candidates vied for the position being vacated by retiring Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock.

Neugebauer and Conaway were the top vote-getters, two Neugebauer with 12,844 and Conaway with 12,211.



Neither received the 50 percent of the total needed to avoid the runoff election.

The two candidates faced off in a pair of public forums Tuesday and Thursday.

There's a new jailer in town Clint Galloway is responsible for keeping bad guys behind bars

Staff Writer There's a new man responsible for keeping Howard County's bad guys behind bars.

Clint Galloway – a 17year veteran of jail work has taken over the reins of the Howard County Jail as chief jailer.

Galloway said his last position was as jail administrator in Lubbock County.

"I grew up in southern Illinois," he said. "I moved to Midland and went to Midland College. Graduated from Midland College and went to Texas Tech. I graduated from Texas Tech with a degree in education. I later went to UTPB and

got a degree in criminology, then a master's in criminal justice administration.'

The new chief jailer has been on the job about a week, and said his first goal is to get back to the basics.

"As far as dealing with inmates on a day-to-day basis, just get back to the basics of security and things of that nature," he said. "Learn to be more professional."

Galloway said the jail. on the fourth floor of the Howard County Courthouse, offers some challenges.

"One of the immediate problems that Howard County is facing is over-



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
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

Legislature gets budget passed

AUSTIN (AP) - Whew!

Texas lawmakers narrowly beat the clock Sunday and passed a final version of the 2004-05 state budget.

With just three hours left before a midnight deadline, the House by a 105-41 vote OK'd the only bill legislators are legally required to approve. The Senate passed it 24-7 earlier in the day.

The regular session ends today.

The \$117.4 billion budget was complicated by a \$9.9 billion shortfall, promises of no new taxes and last-minute problems with moneymaking and costcutting bills.

Top issues come down to final day

AUSTIN (AP) _ Lawmakers signed off on an avalanche of major bills that rolled through the Texas House and Senate as the legislative session wound down.

The last day is today, but Sunday was the last day of real work for the lawmakers.

Racing against the clock, the two chambers approved compromises on key bills including civil lawsuit limitation, homeowners insurance, health and human services restructuring, college tuition deregulation and the state budget.

The House had to suspend its rules to approve bills past a midnight deadline, barely passing an ethics bill and home-

owners insurance legislation. The Senate unofficially ended, its night about 9:30 p.m. when a state senator began a filibuster on an education

Constable heads to trial

bill.

LUFKIN (AP) _ A constable accused of stealing debris from the Space Shuttle Columbia planned to return the material to a collection site in Nacogdoches, not keep it, his defense attorney says.

Robert Hagan II, 45, a Harrison County constable the past three years, faces federal charges he stole U.S. government property.

Four other people, including a former Angelina County sheriff's deputy, have been charged with stealing debris. Hagan's case, scheduled to begin Monday, was the first set for trial.

Longview attorney Eldred Smith, who is representing Hagan, said his client participated in the search for shuttle debris after the Columbia disintegrated over Texas on Feb. 1, killing all seven astronauts aboard.

After two days of searching, Smith says Hagan turned in debris he and others collected to officials in Nacogdoches. Smith said Hagan then headed back to Marshall with plans to return later in the week.

"There was one small plastic bag (containing debris) that did not get removed from his car," Smith said of Hagan. "He got off late and had to get to his job here. He was going to go back Monday."
