### School Tax Roll Here Is Nearing Completion

An announcement from the Tax Office this week reveals that the 1954 Friona Independent School District's tax roll is nearing completion. The total of the 1954 roll to date is approximately \$125,900 which is an increase of about \$3,600 over the 1953 total.

It will be noted that there has been no increase in either tax valuation or rate in several years—the gymnasium and auditorium, high school and the new grade school now under construction, having all been built without increasing values or tax rate.

The increase in tax over 1953 is due to irrigation and the steady building of farm and city improvements.

Dear Bert,

I have been requested to issue a statement relative to one of the candidates in the Governor's race making promises to build specific roads in certain parts of Texas in exchange for votes.

I have not wanted to get involved in this race at all, but I am alarmed at the fact that one candidate is making these promises, which I do not think is good for the Highway Department.

Governor Shivers has never asked us to build one foot of any specific road. He thinks the three Commissioners should run the Highway Department, without any influence from the Governor's office, or any other office, or from any group. That is the reason I issued the statement.

Frankly, I do not want to see either candidate promising roads and bridges for votes, and I am happy to say that Governor Shivers has never promised a road or a bridge for political support.

Marshall Formby of Plainview, member of the Texas Highway Commission, today expressed deep concern that Ralph Yarborough, candidate for Governor, is reported promising roads and bridges in parts of Texas, in an effort to garner votes.

Formby is a Plainview attorney and owns interest in several West Texas Radio stations. He was appointed to the Commission by Governor Allan Shivers in February, 1953.

Formby said that Yarborough's recent promise to build a \$5,000,000

highway and bridge in Galveston county and along the Gulf Coast, if he were elected Governor, is an example of political promises that would eventually harm the fine Highway Department in Texas. His full statement follows:

"I am deeply disturbed when I hear of the dozens of promises that Mr. Yarborough is making to the people offering to build new roads and bridges in various parts of the state.

"For more than a quarter of a century the Highway Department has been completely free of political road and bridge building. The Texas Highway Department has built roads and bridges based strictly on merit and need.

"Texans everywhere take great pride in the Highway Department, stressing the fact that there are no politics in it, and for the good of all Texas I sincerely hope that they can continue to have that pride.

"The present Commission has not spent one dime on a political road or bridge since I have been a member, and I know that the three members would never vote 15 cents to fulfill any political obligation.

"I have been a member of the Commission for 18 months and during this year and a half Governor Shivers has never once requested me to spend one dime on any particular road or bridge, but has insisted to me that every expenditure be based strictly on need and merit as far as the money would go.

"To my mind, that is the only way a highway department can be run. Texans must see that this condition continues to prevail."

Despite last minute faculty resignations and re-shuffling, everything points to a full faculty and the readiness of classroom facilities for commencement of school in Friona on Wednesday, September 1, Superintendent Dalton Caffey stated today.

Actual registration will commence next Monday, August 23, when seniors will be registered at the high school by Principal Dillie Kelley. Juniors will register Tuesday, August 24, sophomore on Wednesday, August 25, and freshmen on Thursday, August 26.

Elementary ages will be registered Wednesday, September 1, during the morning. Buses will run for the first time on that date, carrying the grade youngsters home at noon.

Thursday, September 2, will be the first full day of school, and the cafeteria will open at that time.

New faces among the faculty will include Mr. and Mrs. Carl White of Albuquerque. Mr. White will in-

struct junior high school English, and Mrs. White will teach the senior high school English. Both are former teachers in the Farmington, New Mexico, school system.

Basketball coach will be H. Y. Watkins. He was a 4-year letterman at Austin College in Sherman, and received his masters degree from North Texas State College at Denton where he was a physical education and social science major. He coached basketball teams while in the navy.

Apartments, rooms and houses are needed for faculty housing, and anyone having these available should contact Superintendent Caffey at an early date. The Whites are needing a furnished house, and several women teachers are needing small apartments or rooms with kitchen privileges.

Resignations during the summer have included those of Mr. Cope, Mr. Scott, Miss Robinson and Basketball Coach Burnett. Miss Robinson resigned only this week. Burnett will teach at Iran.

In addition to hiring the new teachers, H. D. Childress will be transferred this year from the junior high to senior high where he will teach Spanish and English.

Spanish will be offered this term as the first foreign language course ever offered locally. It is open to Sophomores, Juniors and any Seniors who wish to take it.

Another new course offered is that in high school accounting, designed as a life preparation course for students anticipating working in banks or in similar positions after completing high school.

Work is being completed on the temporary buildings to the rear of the school cafeteria, housing two rooms to be utilized for the fifth grade.

With indications of increased enrollment in the grades of from 50 to 75 students, new sections are being added in the second and in the seventh grades. This will make for three second grade sections, and three seventh grade classes.

Total enrollment last year was 774. Thirty-three teachers are in the local system.

### Weather

Temperatures have been in the middle and high 90's during the past week with night-time temperatures in the 60's, with hot, dry winds persisting during the day. No measurable moisture has fallen in the county and irrigation wells are running day and night. In spite of the dry weather, crop prospects are very good both for grain and cotton.

Weather forecast is for continued warm days with the possibility of afternoon and evening thunderstorms.

Mrs. Joe A. Parson, 51, of Kress, died Thursday, August 12, in a Lubbock hospital. Funeral services were conducted from the Kress Methodist Church on Friday, with Rev. Silas Dixon of the Draw Methodist Church, Rev. Robert Brown of the Kress Methodist Church and Rev. Glen Wilson of the Kress Baptist Church officiating.

Mrs. Parson was a former resident of the Friona and Lazbuddie communities and taught two years in the Lazbuddie schools. The family moved from Lazbuddie to Kress in 1950, where Mrs. Parson taught in the elementary department. Poor health forced her to retire before the last school term.

Mrs. Parson, born Essentia Elizabeth Smith, was born June 6, 1903, in Brown County, Texas. On May 29, 1937, at Eldorado, Texas, she married Joe A. Parson. She was a graduate of Rising Star High school and Daniel Baker College in Brownwood. She had been a member of the Methodist church since a child. She had been a school teacher for over a quarter of a century.

Survivors include her husband, two sons, Gabriel and Allen, and a daughter, Nawasa, all of Kress, and her father, G. B. Smith, also of Kress.

Interment was in the Kress Cemetery with Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview in charge of arrangements.

A number of Parmer farmers are taking advantage of the local Atlacide program in the treatment of bindweed along the county road rights-of-way.

The county commission is paying for the chemical, and all that any farmer needs do is call for it at the Parmer County Implement Company, signing a card for record of the commission.

### Highway Patrol Positions Are Open

Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the Texas Highway Patrol will accept applications until August 25 from young Texans for appointment to the Texas Highway Patrol.

Garrison said that examinations for appointment to the Patrol recruit training school will be given at various points in the state early in September. Some thirty vacancies due to resignations, deaths and transfers will be filled from the roster of those qualified.

The Public Safety Director invites all young men who are interested in a career of law enforcement to make application as early as possible. He notes that they must be between 21 and 35 years of age, inclusive, have a high school education, be at least 5 feet 8 inches in height and weight not less than two or no more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height.

Application forms, Garrison said, may be obtained from all Texas Highway Patrol District Offices, or by writing to W. J. Elliott, Chief, Texas Highway Patrol, at Austin.

## About those Amendments

Were They Spanked?—

WE HAVE SEEN THE INSIDE WORKS AT AUSTIN

(The Canyon News)

Publication of the constitutional amendments were denied the Tullia Herald and the Falls Banner. The publishers are hollering their heads off charging that they were spanked by the Shivers Administration simply because they supported Yarborough in the recent election. This makes good reading for the

public, and makes an issue for campaign thunder. It so happens that Governor Shivers has nothing to do with placing the amendments for publication. This is the duty of the Secretary of State, and let it be known that a mere request, either on the part of the publisher of some opposition paper or the request of a member of the legislature, will change the paper to receive the bills.

We happen to know simply because while a member of the House we received requests from the Sec-

retary of State to select the papers in our district which was to be the official paper of the year. Unless our request was entirely out of line, the business went as we recommended.

Which brings up another question: That of paying for the amendments. The price is entirely ridiculous and far below commercial rates. As a matter of fact the legal rate for constitutional amendments in Randall county is just one-half of that charged for other legal advertising. Due to the long hours involved setting the type, reading the proof and making returns on published notices, especially constitutional amendments, there is no profit to be made, regardless of the number or the kind. A lawyer from a neighboring town recently requested that we publish a bunch of legal notices at state rates. We gladly turned down the business, which was likewise turned down by other papers in this area. The lawyer posted the notices of sale because he was unable to get a "cheap" advertising rate.

When Texas refuses to pay an adequate rate for its publications, and when it must rely upon second or third class newspapers for publication of its notices, there is something wrong with the system. No, and the Governor has nothing to do with the system. The blame may be laid at the door of the legislature.

### Big Vote Anticipated

Absentee balloting reports from over the state indicate a good possibility of the August 28 Democratic run-off primary bringing a heavier turn-out than did the first primary, according to various county clerks.

In Austin, Travis County absentee ballots were coming in at a rate approximately five times that of the July primary, according to County Clerk Emilie Limberg.

### A Short Ballot

Texas voters August 28 in the Democratic run-off primary will have one of the shortest run-off ballots in years.

Only two state-wide run-off races, the gubernatorial contest between Allan Shivers and Ralph Yarborough, and the Supreme Court race between Alfred M. Scott and Few Brewster.

There will be 21 district races composed of two runoff for Congress, one for district judge, three for district attorney, and fifteen for state representative.

### New Bridge

Texas Governor Allan Shivers will be the chief speaker at August 21 ceremonies opening the \$2.5 million surface highway bridge at Brazosport.

The bridge is the only fixed span over the Intracoastal Waterway. It has a 78-foot vertical and 201-foot horizontal clearance for water traffic.

### Road Bids

Bids for construction on 288 miles of state roads were scheduled to be opened by the State Highway Department Tuesday and Wednesday with estimations running near \$9 million.

Bids were to cover some 182 miles of farm roads and 106 miles of state and federal highways. A large portion of the total cost will go for expressway construction in Austin and Dallas.

### Farm Income Up

Texas' farmers earned more during January-June of this year than during a like period last year although farm prices were declining, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has reported.

The bureau said that farm income was running nine per cent over that of the first six months of 1953. Increased revenue from cotton and cattle were primarily responsible for the increase, the bureau said.

### Shivers Campaign

In his campaign appearances, Shivers:

Rapped Yarborough for being "the only man I know of in Texas who has cast doubt on Texas' tide-lands claim to the 10 1/2 mile limit."

Charged that Yarborough misled Negro voters in the first primary by announcing that he was for segregation and then later stating his opposition to the U. S. Supreme Court's segregation decision.

Told Port Arthur listeners in a public rally that people who represent Communist-dominated unions and opposed the present law outlawing the Communist Party are supporting Yarborough.

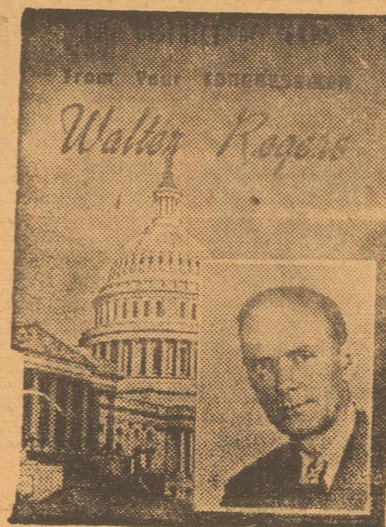

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

Current Federal Trade Commission investigations into coupon practices, brings up interesting question which may require Justice Department action.

The question: "Are big corporations using coupons to wreck independent manufacturers, violating laws regarding issuance of money?"

The U.S. Constitution is specific on this matter, some claim:

Section 8 provides Congress shall have power to coin money, to regulate value, and to regulate value of foreign coins. Section 10 prohibits states from coining money, or making anything but gold and silver legal tender.

In other words, no sovereign state can demand, for example, its citizens to accept shoe buttons or any other item, in exchange for goods and services. It must be in legal tender prescribed by Congress.

Thus it now appears to many that some corporations are operating as super-sovereignty exceeding power of any state.

While coupons are not claimed to be currency but merely an offer to pay, it is being found in actual practice they have the full force and effect of currency.

A housewife receives a coupon that tells her to take it to her grocer, buy the product being pushed, and the grocer will knock ten cents or some other amount off the price.

The grocer can legally refuse to honor the coupon. If he refused a genuine U. S. dime for a dime article, he could be deprived of his ability but while

refusal to accept the coupon will not deprive him of his liberty, it will deprive him of patronage.

But law interpretation is often based on actual practice as well as technical wording. In this case, through actual practice, coupon issuing corporations are exercising right of printing currency, which is restricted to Congress.

Many housewives do not read or understand fine print on coupons. Many save coupons until they have around a dollars worth, and on their next trip to the grocer, use them as currency, because in their minds they accept in good faith that coupons have a definite monetary value.

So with all good conscience, and with good faith, the housewife literally blackjacks the independent grocer into accepting these coupons, regardless of whether he handles some of the products, or whether or not the coupons have expired. He cannot afford to antagonize customers, so some compulsion exists as if grocer were handed lawful currency, even though he never collects from the corporation.

The chains do not have this problem. If coupons are obsolete, or for any other reason not acceptable to the corporation if turned in by an independent grocer, a big chain, by virtue of its mass buying from the corporation, compels the corporation to accept coupons. Again, element of compulsion enters.

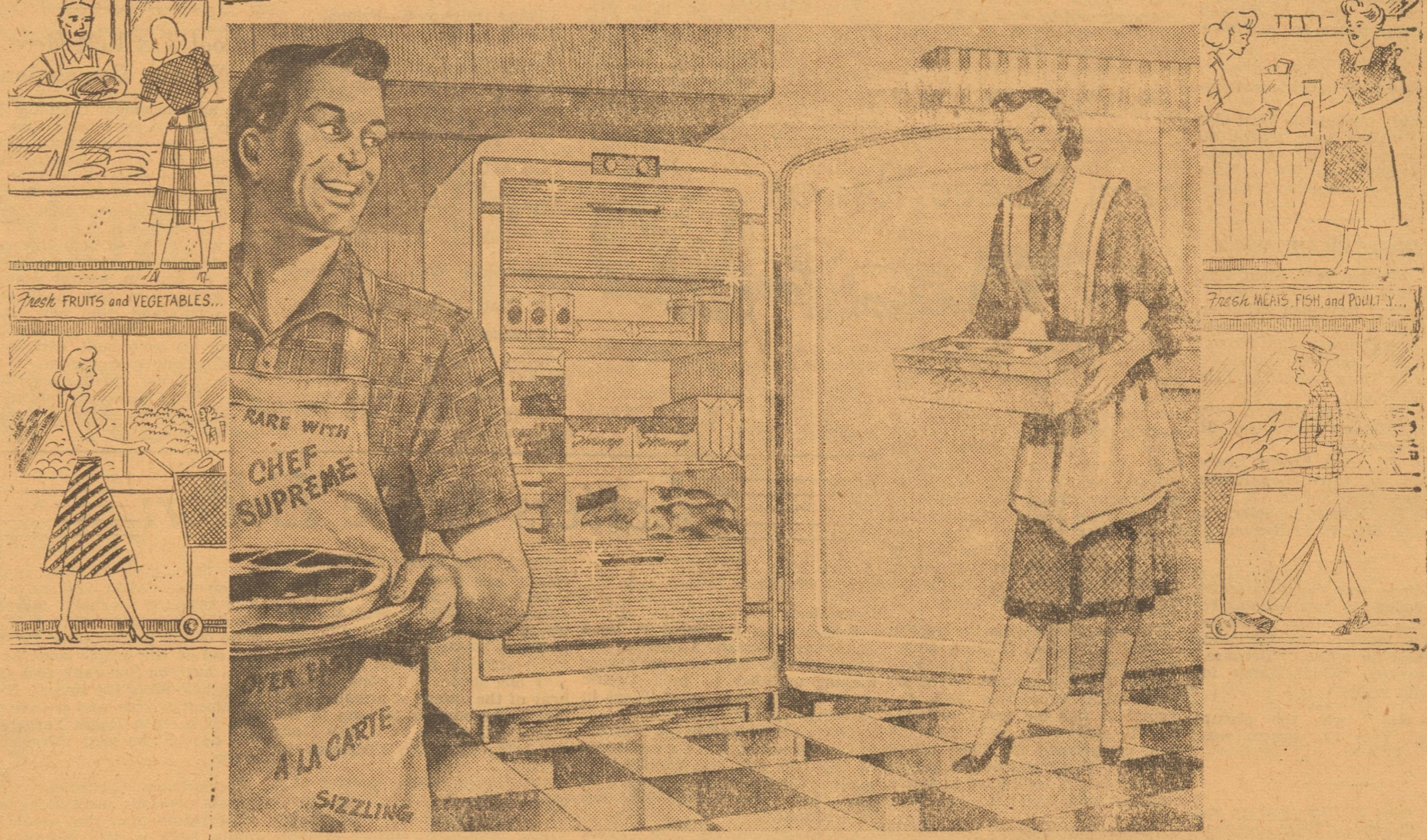
So coupons, which from a technical legalistic standpoint are bogus currency, become through the elements of practice and compulsion, as valid as legal tender. The only difference is that while independent grocers are compelled to accept them as offered in good faith, they lack the power to compel redemption by the issuing corporation.

# PARMER COUNTY

IS ENTITLED TO

## THE TRUTH!

### I. PUBLIC SCHOOLS:

- (1) As a State Senator, Lieutenant Governor, and as Governor, ALLAN SHIVERS has sponsored, supported or signed every major piece of school legislation during the past 20 years.
- (2) During his administration the average salary of public school teachers has been increased more than \$1,100 a year.
- (3) State funds paid to public schools have been increased during Governor Shivers' administration from \$107,914,884 to \$210,800,000.
- (4) The Teacher Retirement Program has been expanded.
- (5) Public instruction for handicapped children has been made available.

### VIII. CANADIAN RIVER DAM:

- (1) Canadian River Compact approved by Texas in 1951.
- (2) Canadian River Municipal Water District created in 1953 under Allan Shivers' administration and signed by him as Governor.
- (3) Governor Shivers asked that the Legislature provide for local ownership of the Canadian River Dam in the Act regardless of how the Dam was to be financed. When the people of the Panhandle pay for the Dam they ought to own the Dam — or else they will have paid the price and find that the Federal Government owns the Dam.

### IX. SEGREGATION:

- (1) The United States Supreme Court has decreed that compulsory segregation in public schools is illegal. Allan Shivers believes that decision was one of the greatest invasions of state's rights in the history of the court.
- (2) Hasty, ill-advised action, the Governor believes, would work hardships on people of both races. He still believes that local problems can be solved best on the local level by local people, and this is true of the segregation problem.
- (3) "I will use every legal means at my disposal to maintain the public schools of Texas as they now exist says Shivers.

### X. PRISON REFORMS:

- (1) Administration of the Texas Prison System today is recognized by experts as being among the best in the nation. Allan Shivers began working toward this goal when he first took office.
- (2) In addition to prison improvements, the net cost per man per day in the prison system has been reduced 50 per cent during Shivers' tenure as Governor.
- (3) The work of the Youth Development Council among juvenile offenders has thrived under Governor Shivers. Increased facilities and improvements at Gatesville School for Boys and Gainesville School for Girls have been provided.

### XI. LABOR:

- Labor has prospered during Allan Shivers' administration. It will continue to prosper as his leadership brings more industrial expansion and more new industries to Texas, creating more and better jobs.
- The Governor's battle is not, and has not been, with laboring men but with the professional bosses who want to do the thinking for all labor and who also want to run the state government.

### XII. INSURANCE:

- (1) As far back as 1951, Shivers asked the Legislature to strengthen Texas insurance laws to protect the public.
- (2) Allan Shivers has recommended tripling the number of examiners in the State Insurance Department and giving that Department the new laws necessary to back up its campaign against unsound companies.

### XIII. COMMUNISM:

- Texas was the first state in the Union to pass a law making membership in the Communist Party a felony. This law was proposed by Allan Shivers. The Communist Party has announced its intentions to overthrow by force the government of the United States. Allan Shivers believes, therefore, that anyone who is a member of the Communist Party is a part of that vile conspiracy.

### XIV. AGRICULTURE & WATER CONSERVATION:

- (1) Soil and water conservation constitute our number one domestic problem in Shivers' opinion.
- (2) In 1952, Shivers appointed a Citizens Committee on Water Conservation. In 1953, its recommendations resulted in six basic water laws being enacted. The committee is still actively at work.
- (3) Shivers has secured funds for soil conservation, for an emergency feed program, for farm and ranch loans, and cheap hay program for drought areas.

### II. HIGHER EDUCATION:

- (1) The allotment of State funds to Amarillo College was substantially increased twice during Shivers' term.
- (2) West Texas State College has made tremendous strides under Governor Shivers' administration. New buildings and permanent improvements costing over \$1,500,000 have been completed or are under construction on the WTSC campus. The faculty has received increased salary and retirement benefits. The total appropriation for WTSC has increased from less than \$600,000 in 1949 to more than \$764,000 in 1954. West Texas Memorial Museum has received regular and increased appropriation from State funds.
- (3) Higher Educational institutions generally have received the favorable attention of Allan Shivers as Governor. Their faculties and physical facilities have shown marked improvement.

### III. STATE HOSPITALS AND SPECIAL SCHOOLS:

- (1) One of Allan Shivers' first official acts as Governor of Texas was to call a special session of the Legislature to appropriate \$20 million in additional administrative funds and \$35 million in building funds to improve deplorable conditions then existing for the unfortunate patients in our state hospitals.
- (2) The mental institutions of Texas were receiving an average of \$516 per patient per year in state funds when Shivers became Governor. The national average was \$636. Last year, Texas spent \$766.50 per patient.
- (3) Two new Tuberculosis Hospitals are now under construction at Harlingen and San Antonio.
- (4) Allan Shivers is making CURE, rather than mere care, the watchword in our state hospitals.

### IV. STATE INSTITUTIONS:

- (1) Texas School for the Deaf — \$2,500,000 for badly needed complete remodeling was appropriated by 1954 special session of Legislature called by Governor Shivers for this and other purposes.
- (2) Southwestern Medical School — \$3,500,000 for facilities to train more doctors for Texas citizens.
- (3) Texas Dental School — \$1,187,500 for needed improvements.
- (4) Texas Commission on Alcoholism founded in 1953 upon recommendation of Governor Allan Shivers.

### V. TIDELANDS:

- Congress twice passed bills confirming Texas' title to its tidelands but President Truman vetoed both of them. Upon his re-election as Governor of Texas on a platform of getting back the tidelands, Shivers went to Illinois to determine if Adlai Stevenson would also veto the bill if elected President. Stevenson said that he would.
- Allan Shivers then gave his support to Eisenhower, who had pledged to return the tidelands to Texas school children. This has been done.
- The Texas public school funds already have been enriched by \$32,000,000 in cash receipts from bonuses on a portion of the tidelands.
- Allan Shivers stands for Texas first.

### VI. HIGHWAYS AND ROADS:

- (1) During his administration, more miles of Farm-to-Market roads and state highways have been built than in any other comparable period. Last year, for instance Texas added almost 9,000 miles of farm to market and state highways to its network of roads — an all-time record.
- (2) Work has already begun on approximately 4,000 more miles of farm to market roads to be built during the next two years and on 2,662 miles of state highways.
- (3) That the highway program of Allan Shivers' administration is promoting safety as well as convenience by the fact that the state last year had the second best safety record in the nation.

### VII. OLD AGE ASSISTANCE:

- Allan Shivers, while serving in the State Senate, wrote the Texas Old Age Assistance Law. Two years ago, he promised the old people of Texas he would seek a constitutional amendment to increase old age pensions. The people of Texas will vote on that amendment next November.

Rev. Harold Kaestner read the impressive service as the couple and their attendants stood before the altar facing the large cross which forms the mural wall at the west end of the church. Pyramid-shaped tapers formed a center arch, backed by tall palm trees and fernery with tall altar vases holding bouquets of white asters. The immediate altar was flanked by seven branched candelabra and graduating baskets of white chrysanthemums and gladioli. 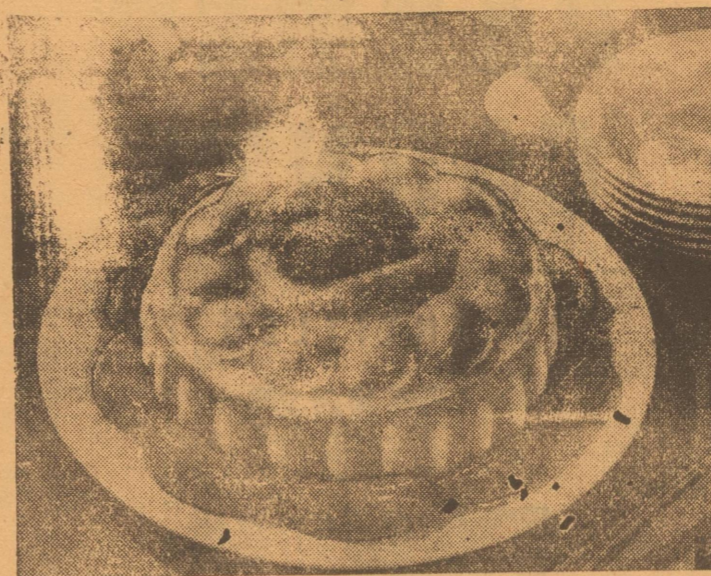

## Cool and Pretty Summer Dessert



Summer food should have maximum eye and appetite appeal, but equally important, its preparation should be easy on the home-maker. Meeting both these requirements is the dessert pictured. Prettily molded tapioca cream comes out of the refrigerator at serving time to be garnished with slices of fresh peaches—so pretty and so good!

### Molded Tapioca Cream with Fresh Peaches

- 1 egg white
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 cups milk
- 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
- 1 teaspoon gelatin
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Beat egg white until foamy throughout; add 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, and continue beating with rotary egg beater until mixture will stand in soft peaks. Set aside.

Mix egg yolk with about 1/4 cup of the milk in saucepan. Add 2 or 3 tablespoons sugar, salt, tapioca, gelatin and remaining milk. Place over medium heat. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly—this takes 5 to 8 minutes.

Pour small amount of hot tapioca mixture gradually on beaten egg white, blending well. Then quickly add the remaining mixture, stirring constantly. (The hotter the tapioca and the faster it is blended in, the thicker and fluffier the pudding will be.) Add vanilla. Blend well. Cool 20 minutes, stir, and turn into 1-quart mold. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve with sliced fresh peaches. Makes 6 or 6 servings.

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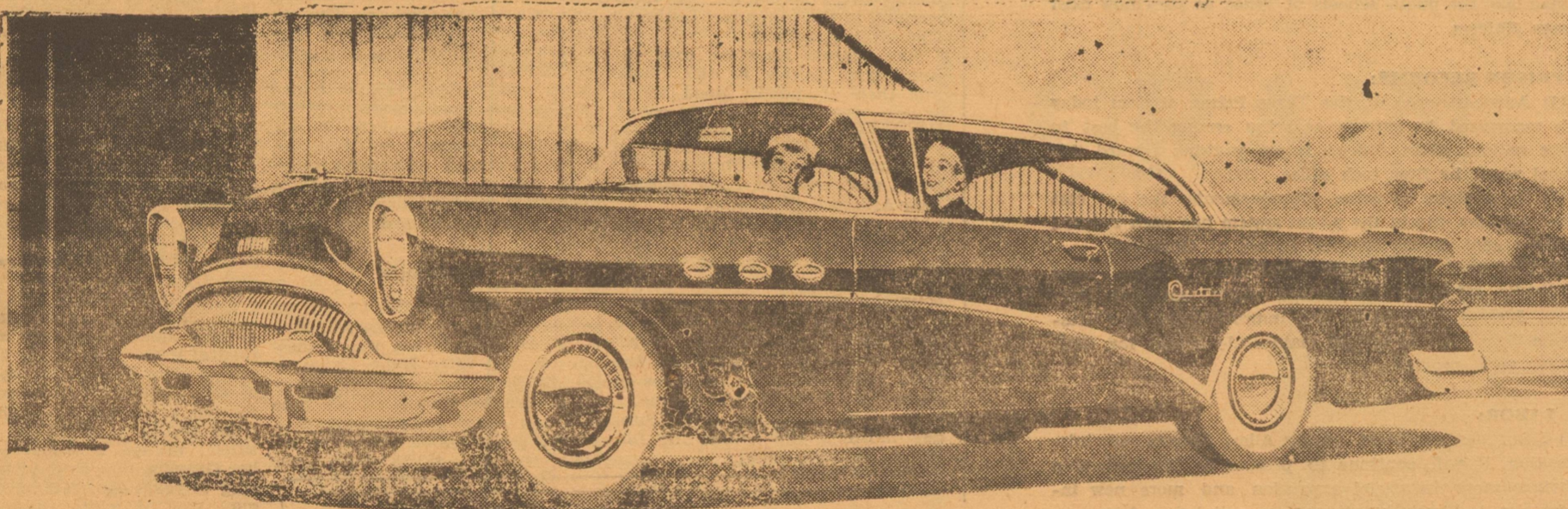

would certainly have less juvenile delinquency, much less adult crime and conspiracy, and a better world in which to live.

### WATER

The New Water Resources Subcommittee of the House Interior Committee commenced its work. We have had two meetings to date. One of these was with the representatives of the departments of the executive branch, representatives of the Hoover Commission, and the Army Engineers. Everyone seems to understand that we have water problems, but very little seems to have been done about it. Few people realize that the creation and the use of mechanical devices by man has brought about demands for water far in excess of the wildest anticipation of those who were running this country at the turn of the century. For instance, industry uses more water than agriculture. Estimates are that in 1957 industry will probably be using two-thirds of all the sweet water available in this country. The East is beginning to realize this as it sees many of its industries moving to the South. Water can certainly be counted as one of the determining factors in many of these moves. We in the Panhandle of Texas have long realized the need for water for industrial uses. If we could provide an ample water supply in our section, the industrial potentialities would be limitless.

Dr. A. L. Miller, Chairman of the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, gave a statement recently at one of our meetings, pointing out the fact that the refining of one barrel of oil requires 770 gallons of water; 70,000 gallons of water is required for one ton of sulphate pulp; 110,000 gallons of water is required to produce one ton of rolled steel; that 300 billion gallons of water passes New Orleans in the Mississippi River every day; 319 million acre feet of stream runoff occurs annually in the United States. Somewhere between 15 and 20 per cent, or 78 million acre feet of this water is developed and put to use. This means that we are wasting approximately 85 per cent of our greatest natural resource.

### BENEFITS FOR AMERICAN PRISONERS OF WAR IN KOREA

The bill providing additional compensation to more than 8,500 American prisoners of war in Korea, including several hundred military and civilian personnel not yet released by their communist captors, as well as certain survivors of deceased military and civilian prisoners, will probably be law by the time you read this letter. This is legislation that was passed in accord with the recommendations of President Eisenhower under Reorganization Plan No. 1. The plan established the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission, which will have charge of the benefits and compensation to be paid under H. R. 9390. Those not presently detained or interned by the enemy will have one year from the date of enactment of this law within which to file their claim for benefits. If you know of anyone who could qualify under this law and who may not know about it, please tell them so that they will not run the risk of losing their claims. These claims should be filed as quickly as possible because a large backlog will soon accumulate, and the earlier ones to be filed will of course be the earlier ones to be paid.

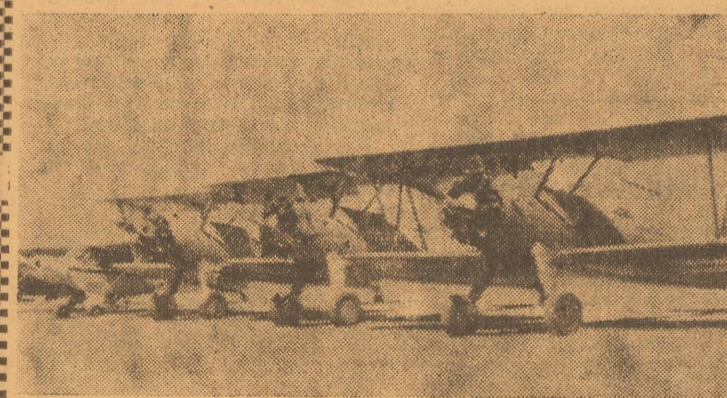

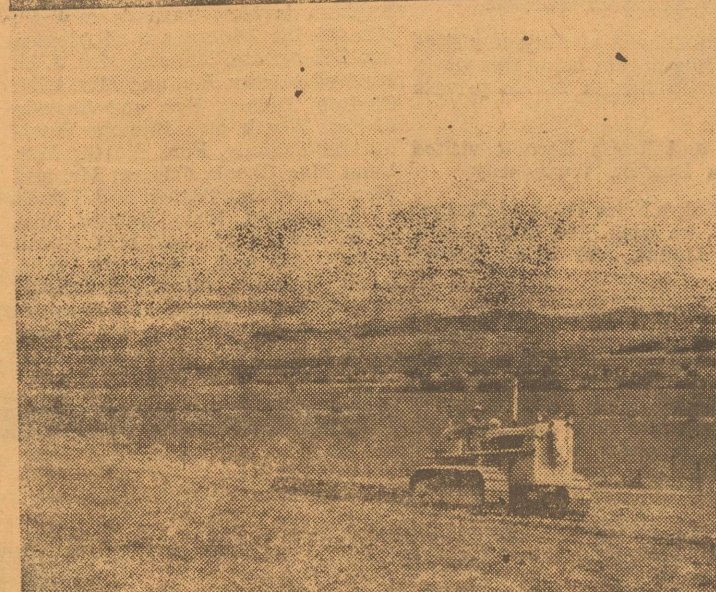

### About that Big Picture

A 30-foot by 40-foot oil painting might be the hardest of work for most folk, but to Mrs. Glenn Smith of Lubbock, the huge and expensive picture just painted on the Elk Drive-In theatre being erected by Bill McGlothlin of Friona, is routine work. The mountain scene, featuring elk watering, was completed by Mrs. Smith, a housewife turned specialty artist, in less than a week. Wife of the Lubbock fire chief, Mrs. Smith took up painting by accident some fifteen years ago when she was asked to prepare a mural for the baptistry of the College Avenue Baptist Church at Lubbock. Since that date her hobby has grown into a near full-time occupation, involving painting of some 300 church pictures, according to Mrs. Smith, ten drive-ins, and specialty interior decorating and painting in homes, clubs and business houses. During this fifteen-year period she also found time to take some seven years of art schooling. Raised in New Mexico, it would be only natural that the artist prefers painting of western scenes, stressing the realistic details in her animal and ranch-life sketches. On her larger pictures, she works from a miniature painting already prepared. She most often climbs the scaffolding to the greater heights in her bare feet, also carefully wearing her St. Christopher medal. Furthermore, she is left-handed. Her garb of bluejeans or red shorts was a familiar scene to local residents who drove by the site of the painting here. When asked regarding prices of such paintings, she replied that her most expensive drive-in painting probably was one at Odessa, similar to the one here, and costing \$1,300.00.

### Tips on Touring

Any amateur can take amateurish photographs on his vacation trip, but with a few professional touches, the photographs become a record anyone can be proud of. The little "extras" that make fair pictures good are easy to learn and well worth remembering.

Photographic experts tell me that the most common fault in vacation pictures is lack of good composition. A little camera angling makes the difference between an ordinary snapshot and one with mood, motion and meaning.

Here are some pointers which should prove helpful to you in getting the most out of your vacation photography.

1. In composing your shots, remember that the horizon line should not cut across the middle of the picture. More sky than terrain is usually best, unless there are people or significant objects in the foreground.
2. Try to get someone into the picture. But don't pose your character against uninteresting backgrounds, standing idly and gazing at the camera. Catch him doing something in keeping with the surroundings.
3. "Frame" the picture with arches, trees, buildings or natural phenomena. They lend depth in the foreground. A road, path or stream leading from one corner of the picture toward the center of interest will add another professional touch.
4. Use side and back lighting occasionally to lend shadow effect and dramatic tone.
5. Use a filter for most black-and-white pictures, especially where a great deal of sky is exposed. Filters bring out clouds, darken skies and soften glare.
