

In a letter dated June 30, Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn warned Gov. Rick Perry that recently adopted state legislation may cause Texas public schools to go two weeks without major funding.

Strayhorn explained the legislature adopted an \$800 million delay in the Foundation School Program payments as a one-time savings.

"The delay, when it was originally drafted, would have kicked the August 2004 payment into September 2004, reducing the amount of cash needed to finance the 2004 fiscal budget,' Strayhorn wrote. "Ins.ead.







he Supreme Court's decisions on two cases this week left both sides in the affirmative action debate claiming victory, but the real

losers were the American people. At issue were two programs at the University of Michigan that gave preference in admission to certain minority students. In one case, Grutter v. Bollinger, the Court upheld a program at the University of Michigan law school

that gave preference to black, Latino and American Indian applicants; in the other, Gratz v. Bollinger, the Court struck down a similar program at the undergraduate level. But in both cases, the Court paid homage to the notion that "racial diversity" rather than non-discrimination is the true measure of equal opportunity in this society. In doing so, the Court not only reversed several decades of its own precedents but also, for all practical purposes, abandoned the

Forty years ago this August, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., stood at the Lincoln Memorial and gave a speech that galvanized Americans of all races. In his wonderfully stentorian voice, King invoked the image of a day in America's future: "I have a dream that one day this nation will rise

up and live out the true meaning of its creed: "We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal," he said. "I have a dream that my four children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character.'

These words launched a civil rights revolution that was embraced by the American people and led to passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the Fair Housing Act of 1968. As a result, America is today a more just

Imagine what would have happened if instead of calling for equal treatment, however, the Rev. King had said, "I have a dream that my four children will one day live in a nation where they will be entitled to a "plus factor" based on the color of their skin." As ludicrous as it might sound, that is exactly the principle a majority of the Supreme Court enshrined in their affirmative action decisions this week. No more should we expect the Constitution to be colorblind. No more should we expect the government to extend equal protection of the laws to all persons without regard to skin color. Henceforth the guiding principle will be race as a "plus factor" for certain — though by no means all minorities. Asians and Jews need not apply for a "plus factor," despite the fact that both groups have faced significant — and in the case of Asians, state-sponsored discrimination in the past.

Meanwhile, even wealthy blacks and Latinos may be conferred preferential treatment because, without it, a majority of the Supreme Court implies, they cannot suc-

Make no mistake, the underlying assumption in the Court's argument, especially in Grutter, is that blacks and Latinos cannot be held to the same high standards we expect of whites and Asians. The justices have sent a very clear message to black and Latino students: "We don't expect you to measure up." Melanin, their argument implies, will be treated as a measurable "plus factor" in order to make up for intellectual or academic deficiencies. It is a view that is racist at its core.

Justice Clarence Thomas in an eloquent dissent in the Grutter decision, recalled a speech by the great abolitionist Frederick Douglass in 1865: "What I ask for the Negro," Douglass said, "is not benevolence, not pity, not sympathy, but simply justice. . . . All I ask is, give him a chance to stand on his own legs! Let him alone! . . Your interference is doing him positive injury." Douglass's words could not be more prophetic of the Supreme Court's mischief this week.

Perry expands special legislative session

AUSTIN - Republican Gov. Rick Perry expanded the scope of the special legislative session today to 28 additional areas as some Democrats complained Republicans are pressuring senators into supporting redistricting, backing a congressional redistricting plan.

The redrawing of congressional district lines was the initial reason for the special session, which began Monday amid partisan clashes.

Perry said most of the items he has added to the "call" of the 30-day special session were debated in a government reorganization bill that failed during the regular session.

"By opening the call to these specific issues, I am confident representatives and senators will make efficient use of this time

government more effi- for four days in May and Democrats alike — about cient for the people of Texas," Perry said.

Some House Democrats had a different opinion.

By expanding the agenda, Republicans can make deals with senators on pet issues in exchange for Rep. Garnet Coleman, a Houston Legislative Black Caucus.

"We just don't believe that this process should be corrupted any further governor." the Coleman said. "Why is it that he's trying to blackmail the senators? ... We know our senators will hold firm and not be involved in that kind of activity."

Democrats House thwarted lar session by leaving the bers of Congress in Austin to make state state for Ardmore, Okla., Republicans

blocking a quorum, thus halting debate.

This time. those Democrats say the Texas Senate, where there are enough Democrats to block debate on a bill under routine Senate rules, will have to stop the legislation.

Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Democrat and chair of the Houston, said he doubted senators' votes on redistricting would be swayed by the passage of other bills now eligible for consideration.

"In the Senate, we tend to be a fairly independent and unpredictable group, and I would be really surprised if anybody was selling their vote on redistricting," Ellis said.

Republican Lt. Gov. Republican David Dewhurst said attempts to redraw the most legislators have districts during the regubeen approached by mem-

redistricting. He said DeLay and other congressmen have visited him.

"But at the end of the day, we're going to do what we think is right here in this Senate," he said, adding that presidential adviser Karl Rove also has discussed the subject with him.

Even before Perry's proclamation Tuesday, lawmakers were filing bills in anticipation that the Legislature would tackle more than redistricting this month.

Among issues now on the agenda are legislation relating to civil asbestos claims; abolition of such agencies as the Texas Commission on Private Security and the state Aircraft Pooling Board; a study of privately run prisons: and strengthening of the governor's pow-

One of the items would whether to address exempt from public records laws the governor's office budget proposal working papers. That measure failed during the regular session,

which ended June 2. Meanwhile, bickering continued over congresredistricting. sional Democrats again claimed

Republicans are bowing to the wishes of U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay, who has said he would like more Republican members of Congress from Texas.

Right now Democrats hold a 17-15 advantage in the delegation, even though all the statewide elected officials in Texas are Republican.

In Patterson's account, Clinton emerges as a careless, disingenuous frat boy, mercilessly hen-pecked by the domineering Hillary, whose tirades leave him looking like a "beaten puppy." I haven't read the book, and a portion of this review was taken from Publisher's Weekly, a respected periodical. Read it and weep?

I have been trying to "beef up" the Biography section with new (and some not so new) bios of notable men and women. Isaac Newton played a pivotal role in the development of physics and calculus. James Gleick's "Isaac Newton" (B NEW I) moves between a comprehensive historical portrait of Newton to an illuminatinglook at his important scientific works. This won't be an easy read but it will certainly expand your mind.

In "My Anecdotal Life" (B REI C) Carl Reiner has written down all those funny stories he tells to his friends. At age 80, Reiner has seen it all, from theater to the golden age of television, the 1950s and '60s. All of us baby boomers may see themselves in his stories.

Remember Robert Redford in his baseball movie "The Natural?"

The figure Roy Hobbs was really Eddie Waitkus, slickfielding first basemen who played for the Cubs and Phillies in the 1940s. "Baseball's Natural: The Story of Eddie Waitkus," (B WAI E) by John Theodore, may be found in the Biography sec-

Just received New Fiction: "Eat Cake," by Jeanne Ray; "Secret Justice," by James W. Huston; and "Victory," by Stephen Coonts. "Victory" is a compilation of short stories by well known authors — Harold Coyle, David Hagberg, R.J. Pineiro and Harold Robbins of the men and women who fought during WW II.

NEW YORK (AP) - Two sug estions for those with procious little space left on their cookbook shelves, but looking for a dash of special flavor:

- "The Cornbread Book" (William Morrow, 2003, \$14.95) by Jeremy Jackson is subtitled "a love story with recipes.

This is a compact, lighthearted tribute to what the author calls "a bread of the people, for the people, and by the people." He believes corn-bread should be named the official bread of the United States of America. And that it should also be named the unofficial bread.

The book's 132 pages are packed with whimsy, history and plenty of recipes with very personal comments. Jackson, a writer and novelist, lives in Iowa surrounded by corn fields.

"Eat, Drink, and Be Merry" (Everyman's Library, Pocket Poets, 2003, \$12.50) is smaller still in page size but is quite beautifully designed and bound. It has a red satin ribbon to mark your favorite poem of the wide selection the book offers.

You might choose to mark a ditty by Cole Porter, a pithy verse by Emily Dickinson, a 16th-century quatrain by Robert Herrick or a Robert Frost poem inspired by blueberries.





Forsan hoping younger players can pick up Longorio's workload

Forsan High School football fans will be marking time with a new calender this coming football season: In Forsan, it's officially Year 1 A.W.

As in, Year 1 After Wes.

Forsan fans will find themselves in an unusual situation come August when two-a-day practices get under way. For the first time in years, Wes Longorio won't be the man with the bull's eye on his chest. In fact, he won't even be in uniform.

Longorio's graduation from the high school ranks - combined with the departure of long-time head coach Steve Park from the sideline - weren't lost on preseason prognosticators when they released their predictions. Forsan was picked to finish last in the District 3-2A standings by Dave Campbell's Texas Football maga-

The loss of Longorio will likely be the hardest thing for the Buffaloes to replace in 2003. The speedy running back accumulated almost 40 percent of the team's total offensive yardage last fall and was an allstate selection at defensive back.

In his last 20 regular season games as a member of the Buffaloes, Longorio rushed for more than 2,000 yards and 20 touchdowns. n addition to his rushing duties, he also had 10 receptions for 198 yards and 3 TDs and returned 17 kicks for 415 return vards.

Overall, Longorio amassed 1,553 total yards and scored 13 touchdowns.

Washburn stymies Rangers

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) Jarrod Washburn and Ismael Valdes have given in new meaning to the term 13 "power pitchers."

Washburn has allowed H 13 home runs over 30 2-3 innings over his last five starts with the Anaheim Angels, including three in Tuesday night's 7-5 victory over the Texas Rangers.

Bengie Molina and Troy Glaus went deep against Valdes, who has surrendered eight homers in 12 1-3 innings over his last three starts for the Rangers.

"I heard on the TV before the game that Washburn had given up a lot of home runs in his last four starts, and I'm pretty close to that — or worse than that. Valdes said.

"I don't know what it is I'm just not getting the job done," Valdes said. "It's the worst slump of my life. I was the most consistent guy on the team, but right now I'm the worst consistent guy on the team. I'm not giving my team a chance to win."

The right-hander has allowed 21 earned runs and 28 hits over his last three outings. Before this skid, Valdes was 4-0 with a 3.78 ERA in six starts after spending almost a month on the disabled list because of tendinitis in his shoulder.

stopped bringing my daughter to see him. The hard part of this ordeal is explaining it to her. She has asked about Grandpa many times, saying that she misses him.


