## Let's he vigilant; fire safety is so very important

$N$o question about it, Howard County needs rain. Cotton is at a critical state,
and without some good moisture, the opportunity to make any kind of crop is declining almost on a daily basis. Fact is about lack of rain. However, what we must do is make sure we don't aggravate an already bad situation by doing something foolish.
As the drought index and temperatures continue to rise in Howard County and across West Texas, the threat of wild fires becomes extreme. Because we had some good rains a month or more ago, there is an abundance of brush, that that makes the potential for fires even greater. We can't stop lightning from causing fires, but we can stop the No. 1 causes - human error. According to County, Volunteer Fire Chief Tommy Sullivan, the most common cause of wild fires in our area stems from people. burning trash. With just a little wind, a fire can get out of control and quickly spread.
It helps to use a mesh cover over trash barrels to keep burning debris from flying out. A constant watcch is needed by persons equipped with a water hose or water buckets, hoes and other means of putting out a blaze.
Currently, Howard County is not under a burn ban, though residents are cautioned: Don't take chances.
Fireworks, smoking materials and catalytic converters are three other primary causes for fires at this time of year. Smokers are urged to never throw a lighted cigarette or cigar out of
their vehicle's window, even when the threat of a their vehicle's window, even when the threat of a
fire is low. Naturally, when the threat is high, the fire is low. Naturally, when the threat is high, the
simple act of tossing a cigarette into a ditch is extremely dangerous.
Most of us don't even think about catalytic converters, but they cause many fires each year. They become very hot, and can easily ignite dry brush if you pull your vehicle off the road. Attempt to stay on the paved shoulder, or wait until you can pull into a parking
area if you need to make a stop. The main thing is to use comm. sense and pay Together we can help ensure happens. And continue to ask the no disaster
