## Defendants found guilty of aggravated assault

Punishment phase slated for three men today in 118th District Court in Stanton

A Stanton jury found three men guilty of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in the death of 33 -year-old Cruz Aguirre late Thursday evening, with the penalty portion
of the trial expected to get under way this of the trial
morning.
Armando Sosa Gutierrez, 26; Agapito Chapa IV, 29; and Carlos Chapa, 22, were charged with the Aug. 17, 2002, beating and
subsequent death of Aguirre. Gutierrez is suing represented by Big Spring attorney

118th District Court Judge Robert Moore III read the court's charge to the jurors Thursday afternoon, explaining the three men could be found guilty of murder or aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.
Jurors chose the lesser offense, a secondJurors chose the lesser offense, a second-
degree felony, which carries two to 20 years in prison in addition to a fine not to exceed $\$ 10,000$.
