JUSTICE OF THE PEACE HENDRIX journeys to his long home

Rev. J. J. Hendrix, who had reeided in Uallahan county about 35 or 40 years, died at his home in Baird at 7 p. m., Tuesday, January 18, 1921.
'Squire Hendrix, as he was better known, be being Justice of the Peace of Precinet No. 1 at the time of his death, having held that office for some time, had been ill since last summer. He leaves a wife and many friends to mourn his loss. He Was born September 20th, 1859 , and was 68 yeare old bia last birthdey was 68 years old he birthada fe was an apright, honorable citizen, and it grieves us to have to re ord his death.
Services were conducted at the home by Rev, J. U. McKenzie, pas tor of the Baptist Church, after which the members of Baird Lodge, No. $172,1.0 .0$. F. took charge and interred the body in Ross Cemetery, with the ceremony of that order.
A good man has gone from among us. Peace to his memory.

He trained at Camp Travis and went to Vrance as a member of Company E, 144th Infantry, 36th Division. Overseas he was tranaferred to Company A, 23d infantry, and sent to the front. He was desperately wounded during the Argonne drive. October 9, 1918 dying from: the effect of these wounds, in a base hospital, a few days later. His body arrived home December 1, but owing to the bad condition of the rosds, the funeral was post poned until Sunday. Rev, Stephen Jackson, a Church of Chriat minis er, conducted the religious services the grave, preaching a most elo quenc and affecting sermon. At its close Commander Evana psid merited tribute to the service rendered by the dead soldier. BAIRDITES ORGANIZE OIL COMPANY

Local capitalists, last week, or ganized the Baird Oil and Development Company, with Ryk Van der Valk as president, and Thomas E Powell, secretary-tressurer. The capital ztock of the company is $\$ 6,000$, divided into sixty shares of the par value of $\$ 100$ each. The atock certificates are being printed by The Star Printery
The new company has leases on 600 acres of land in the Deep Creek shallow field, which is a continuation of the Moran shallow field, and extends uearly to the center of Callahan county. One hundred acres, lying between the deep test Hart well No, 1 and the Alamo well will be developed at once and a well drilled on every five acres.. Star rigs will be used and they hope to start drilling by the first of Vebru ary. The drilling contract will probably be given to a company inch from the Sipe Springs Field.
There are two sands in the new company's territory, one at a depth of 560 feet, and the other at 710 feet. The oil at both depthe grades bigh, and holde a large content of superior geeolive. In the deep tests is this field oil sand was found that pumpe from seven to twelve barrele a day. nches.

According to the careful record kept of rainfall in Callahan county for the past 36 years by Observar M. R. Hailey, of the Belle Plaine section, 99 feet, 85.8 inches of water have decended upon our fertile soth to fructiy and nourish the growing things.
Daring 1920 there were three rain. less months, March, April and July. ruary 1 inch 3.8 inches fell, in Yeb, and 11.4 inches, in September 5 inches, in October $21-2$ inches, in November 21.2 inches and in De -. cember 1 inch, a total precipitation for the year of 361.2 inches, whteh was 37.25 inches more than the average for the 36 yeare of record, he average yearly precipitation for hat period having been 3211 .
