
well," said bee coordinator Karen Reagan.

City council **OKs speed** limit change

The Big Spring City Council approved the first reading of an ordinance to increase the speed limit for the FM 700 north service road next to the VA Medical Center Tuesday evening, raising it from 30 mph to 45 mph by a six-to-one vote.

Council member Greg Biddison was the lone dissenter to the measure, expressing concern over a driveway located on the stretch of road, and what kind of safety problems it could cause with the increase in speed.

"I think 45 mph is just too fast for that area," said Biddison. "If you're going to be accelerating, you need to do it past that driveway and the yield sign. I mean that's what the yield sign is there for, to slow you down. It defeats the purpose.

"I know everyone doesn't drive 30 mph through there anyway. Nobody drives 45 mph on FM 700 either. In another sense, why don't we raise the speed limit on FM 700

also? If they're going to use the rules, lets use them for everything."

While Biddison voted no on the issue, Mayor Russ McEwen said the increase simply made sense considering a recent study showed 80 percent of the drivers traveling the street disregard the 30 mph speed limit anyway.



"It makes sense," said McEwen. "You look at a situation where you have to merge into traffic that is doing about 45 mph and if the speed limit is 30 until you get on the farm road, then you're going to be merging into traffic going 15 mph slower than that night: traffic. That didn't make sense, so it's a very logical move.

We had information that fully 80 percent of the people traveling on that road are doing 43 mph right now, so I would say it shouldn't be a problem.'

While Biddison's comment on raising the speed limit on FM 700 may have been simply to prove a point, McEwen took it a step forward and said he'd like to see a study done on it as well.

"I would like to see a study done along the entire stretch of FM 700 to see if we could increase the speed somewhat," said McEwen. "You're driving through there and there are stretches where it's 45 mph and I feel we could increase that speed and allow traffic to move a little bit faster. I think a study on that would be a good idea."

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
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

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

"I sold beer by the pitcher. You have no idea how fast some guys can drink a pitcher of beer.'

Tommy Hutto spent the first part of his life in Houston County. He moved back there when his sons were young and started a pulpwood business.

"I guess I worked harder and made less money at that than anything I've ever done. One week we worked from daylight to dark all week and when we paid our gas bill and everything we had two

Twenty seven years ago Tommy started hauling off garbage for people who lived in the country. Then, his only vehicle was a pickup truck. His business has grown.

"We're hauling about two hundred thousand pounds of garbage a week away from Houston County. We're running three packer trucks and dumping everything in a landfill in Angelina County. We have a contract with the commissioner's court to pick up everything outside the city limits of Crockett, Grapeland and Lovelady.'


Some years ago, Tommy started a clown ministry.

Eggs are nourishing and an easy menu item


New guidelines are putting eggs back on the plate-and American recent studies show that eating eggs may help prevent obesity, stroke, and memory and vision loss.

Fifteen studies published in the past year show that in addition to being one of the most nutritious, inexpensive and healthiest whole foods, eggs may also play a role in preventing obesity, vision loss, cognitive decline and stroke.

"There is a growing body of research showing potential health benefits for several of the nutrients found in eggs," said Stephen B. Kritchevsky, a nutritional epidemiologist and professor at Wake Forest University.

The best sources of choline are eggs, beef liver and wheat germ.

The most recent American Heart Association guidelines no longer include a specific recommendation regarding the number of eggs yolks that can be consumed and state that eggs can be part of a heart-



For an inexpensive, lowcalorie food, eggs have a lot to offer in the way of health benefits.

healthy diet, as long as one limits average daily cholesterol intake to 300 milligrams a day.

"We need to emphasize eating patterns that cut heart disease risk, instead of singling out specific foods," Kritchevsky.

Eggs can fit into an overall healthy diet that is associated with low risk for chronic diseases such as heart disease."

Japanese Recently, researchers who studied the dietary habits of over 15,000 men and 24,000 women for over 16 years found that specific animal products in the diet appeared to decrease the risk of stroke.

Individuals who consumed the most eggs, fish and dairy products were 20 percent less likely to die from a stroke.

"Interestingly, another recent study suggests that lutein found in egg yolks and dark, leafy greens may prevent-or at least slow-the progression of artherosclerosis in the arteries that supply the brain," said Kritchevsky.

Other research suggests that having an egg or other protein-rich food at breakfast and controlling the level of carbohydrates consumed may help burn body fat and control hunger and cravings that often lead to over consuming calories.

The study found that women who ate the higher protein diet lost slightly more weight but of the weight lost, nearly twice as much was fat compared to those eating a carbohydrate-rich diet.

Another study found

that giving extra choline to laboratory rats at certain developmental stages leads to changes in the brain and improvement in memory throughout the lifespan of the off

spring. The extra choline appears to protect against age-related decline in memory capacity and precision. The best sources of choline are eggs, beef liver and wheat germ.







Mexico makes bid for Expos

MONTERREY, Mexico - In the eyes of Jose Maiz Garcia and others, this clean, modern city always has been "big league."

The city's long love affair with baseball includes visiting Negro leagues' players in the 1940s, a Little League team invited to the White House and several homegrown youths now playing in Major League Baseball.

All that's missing here, they say, is a real majorleague team such as the Expos.

"Monterrey always has been a great baseball city," said Maiz, owner of the local Sultans professional team and a star on a youth squad that was the first foreign team to win the Little League World Series in 1957. "Many people here think like people in the States."

To fulfill their dream, Maiz and a group of investors have been trying to persuade Major League Baseball owners to move the Expos to their proud city, promising the orphaned team more fans and more profits than it has in its current home in Montreal.

Only an hour from Texas, Monterrey is one of eight cities in contention for the franchise, which baseball officials have been trying to relocate since they bought it two years ago for \$120 million. Last year the team played 22 of its "home" games in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

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


