### Revisiting petition drive brings no CCC comment



# Senate opponents discuss same-sex marriage, education

State Senate District 31 candidates Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, and Kirk Edwards, R-Odessa, got the opportunity to get their views out to the public Tuesday evening, as local radio station KBST broadcast live from a political forum held at the Dora Roberts Community Center.

Those in attendance, along with radio listeners, were able to hear the candidate's responses to a number of questions from a panel of local reporters, as the candidates prepare for the Republican primary on March 9.

Here are several of the questions and answers from the forum:

While party affiliation is an important aspect of these primaries, a great deal of concern has been voiced by voters over officials voting in line with their party

instead of in the best interest of their constituents. If elected, will you be a political party "yes-man?"

Edwards - I definitely would not be a "yes-man." I think we've approached this subject in many of these forums. I'll be a person who answers to the people of District 31. Those are the people that bring you here and those are the people that elect you. We've done a wonderful job of being a grassroots campaign. When we got into the runoff it became a forest campaign because we grew up overnight. We really understand the people that got us here and the people that raised our money for us and how important it is to answer to the people. The party is very important in some aspects. It will be very important next week in the Republican primary, when we start splitting out the voters that are Democratic and Republican that have

participated in the last two elections. Seliger — I'm very proud to be a Republican, and it will be a source of great pride to be on the ballot with President Bush... What I found out as a mayor is that potholes are neither Republican, nor Democrat. The water that people depend upon to flow into their homes is not Republican water or Democratic water. They are things that people need. The education our children get will not be a Republican education or a Democratic education, it will simply be essential to their lives. The needs of people are non-partisan, and the response of public officials should not be a partisan one. It should be to address the needs of the people and to work hard to see to it that all of the people of the state of Texas and of this district prosper and grow and benefit from service in the state legislature.

Some state senators have proposed eliminating the small and mid-size school funding weights. Many believe this would ultimately cause a forced consolidation among schools in the state. What is your position on this, and how important is this to schools in District

**Seliger** — As I've traveled around and talked to so many superintendents, what I'm hearing is that smalland medium-size allocations are essential to these schools, and will force consolidation. When you consolidate school districts, you don't just do away with schools. You start the first step to doing away with communities and all of the tradition, memories and culture that have built up there. It's harmful to West Texas, and it's harmful to the towns that we grew up in. I think the small-and medium-size school allocations are absolutely essential.

Edwards — I think as we've traveled throughout this district, the one person that shows up in every town that we go to is the school superintendent... in places like Yoakum County, with Denver City and Plains, and they are far from one another, they are scared to death that there is going to be some consolidations that take place in those schools and what it will do to their town. It will absolutely kill the rural towns that we have here. Coahoma and Forsan are perfect examples. They're wonderful communities with great tradition. And it would absolutely slam the door on some of the tradition we have in West Texas and the Panhandle as well.

The controversy over same-sex marriages in San Francisco has brought the question to a national level, and may some day face the Texas legislature. Do you support or oppose same sex marriages, and do you believe the decision should be made at a federal, state or local level.

**Edwards** — I definitely oppose same-sex marriages in the state of Texas. I believe God intended for people to be traditionally married and I think it's important that we keep those rights in the state of Texas and we do our best. As a senator, I would oppose any change to traditional marriage and I would definitely make it a plank in my platform to never let that happen while I was on watch.

Seliger — I simply oppose same-sex marriages. To me, those are simply not marriages, and while I propose and prescribe no one else's lifestyle, marriage is a legal state as well. I think marriage is between one man and one woman and should have that status at law as well. I do believe it will be a state issue when it comes to benefits and things like that, and my position will be very clear. It will not be a state of marriage between individuals of the same sex

The State Board of Education is considering a teacher certification proposal that will allow mid career professionals to become teachers. The dubbed "instant teacher" plan would eliminate the existing requirement that uncertified college graduates complete a teacher preparation program. Those against the plan say it will produce teachers who can't teach — while supporters argue it will bring professionals with expert knowledge in the classroom. Are you in support or against this proposal and why?

Edwards — To me it is a system that is destined to fail. If you're going to tell the hundreds of thousands of teachers we have throughout the state that the education that they went through to be able to become teachers and all of those years that they put in to take those extra classes... and now you tell them all of that was for naught because we're going to allow people to come through on a loophole, and you're not as valuable as you thought you were, I think it's a very wrong message that we're sending to our teachers, and I think we should do everything we can to recruit new teachers, and we start doing that by paying them the right amount of money and keeping the teachers that we have.

Seliger — I'm a little bit skeptical of the proposal and I think people have their hearts in the right place because in certain areas there are teacher shortages. But just because someone can speak French doesn't mean someone can teach French. Because someone can read doesn't necessarily mean one can teach a child to read. I defer in this case to educators themselves. It's a matter of local control. Can they find people who are trained and educated in the community who can go through a certification program and receive that certification? But in the end it's the local authorities and superintendents that must determine who is ultimately qualified to teach those children, and I think it's something that should be done very carefully.

TEXAS) at Palo Duro Canyon; "Viva El Paso;" "The Great Passion Play" in Eureka Springs, Ark.; or one of

the many Shakespeare festivals around the country.
"Look at our marketing efforts and we're always talking about the amphitheater. But what do we have there? A pep rally and Pops in the Park, and that's essentially it," said Mouton. "We would like to make it into a facility that is used a whole lot more than it

Mouton has already been to the Convention and Visitors Bureau, seeking between \$15,000 and \$20,000 for a feasibility study on the Big Spring amphitheater that would be conducted by the University of North Carolina's Institute of Outdoor Drama. The study would cost \$12,500, but additional funds would be needed for related expenses such as travel, Mouton explained.

To date, all of the work on the project has been volunteer — Mouton even paid his own expenses to the institute — and volunteers are still needed. But it is time to move ahead with the study and then the renovation itself. Mouton told the council.

"We made a proposal to the CVB. Our goal is to get the funding for the study in the next two to three weeks, get the study done, and get this on the ballot in November," he said.

Mouton hopes to fund the renovation as a 4B project through Moore Development for Big Spring - an effort that would require the citizens of Big Spring to

"The worst that could happen with all of this is that we'd have a renovated amphitheater, and that's not a bad thing at all," said Mouton. "And even if it (a vote by citizens) failed, the city would have a better idea to see what it needs to do for the future, concerning the amphitheater. I think everyone agrees we don't just want to watch it crumble away."

The CVB is funded by hotel/motel tax funds — a fee each local motel charges guests to stay overnight.

Council member Joann Knox is chairman of the CVB, and said the organization is intrigued by Mouton's proposal.

"We call it 'heads in beds.' In other words, we support projects that bring people to Big Spring who will stay in our motels. This certainly sounds like it could," she said following the council meeting. "We have this on our agenda for next Wednesday (March 3). We may possibly have some corporate sponsors there as well who would be interested in helping with the funding of the study."

The CVB board convenes at 4 p.m. on Wednesday in the second-floor conference room at city hall. Meetings are open to the public.

In the meantime, Mouton said citizens interested in the amphitheater project are more than welcome to volunteer their time.

"Anybody who would like to be involved is welcome.



## Bush urges gay marriage ban

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush wants quick election-year enactment of a constitutional amendment prohibiting gays from marrying each other, but Republicans in Congress are not rushing to heed his call.

After Bush's announcement Tuesday, House Majority Leader Tom DeLay, R-Texas, said it would take time to gauge the level of support in Congress for a constitutional amendment. He suggested the difficulty of passing one may cause lawmakers to take a different approach to preserving marriage as a solely man-woman union.

"We don't want to do this in haste," DeLay said.

# Mighty are falling; stockholders will be suffering most

he Enron Corporation's house of cards has been tumbling down for quite a while, but now one of the main players in the fiscal game which cost company shareholders billions has been indicted.

Jeffrey Skilling, former Enron CEO and officially labeled as the "sandy foundation" for the shaky dealings at the company, was arrested and taken in handcuffs to face charges of fraud, insider trading and other crimes stemming from the giant company's collapse. He pled innocent to all charges; bail was set at \$5 million; he posted bond with a cashier's check.

What a mess! What a horrible, horrible mess!

The greed that some principals in corporate America have displayed in the past decade of the boom-and-bust economy still boggles the minds of work-a-day citizens who work hard to create a better life for their families. Where average Americans think in terms of tens or hundreds of dollars, the Jeffrey Skillings of the world think in terms of hundreds of millions and billions of dol-

The main goals for greedy people — in any profession — is couched in two distinct, but connected, areas: Power and money. To those types of people, money means power, while power gives one the ability to make more money.

Skilling, and a host of cohorts, was instrumental in transforming a small pipeline company into a mega-giant energy trading company. The company's stock price zoomed skyward for the figures-on-paper analysis provided by the company in its quarterly reports. The only problem was the information was about as good as butter churned from milk produced by a cow that had gotten into a patch of stinkweed.

While former Enron stockholders are left holding shares in the bankrupt company that are virtually worthless, and while former Enron employees are still licking their wounds from being told that the company's pension plan was a sham, the Jeffrey Skillings of the company are still living in huge mansions and paying hefty with cashier checks.

If you think this entire fiasco just doesn't seem

right somehow, then you are correct.

This is not the way the game of business is supposed to be played. Neither is this the way the game of life is supposed to be played. If ordinary citizens ever wanted to see "justice" done, now is the time and this is the case.

## A weekend of kids, out of staters

knew Friday the 13th would be interesting. I just didn't know how interesting. The Monday before the 13th I learned for the first time that I was expected to speak at the junior high school assembly in Brenham at 9 a.m. on the 13th. I was also expected to be in Corpus to board a river barge departing that evening and perform on the

Valentine's Day dur-

ing the cruise. We use our own sound equipment when we do speeches or performances, and because it takes up lots of room, we travel by motor vehicle. The barge was to leave Corpus Friday evening, cruise the Texas coast and arrive in Galveston Sunday afternoon at 2. We would then drive home 10 hours away so I could teach an 8 o'clock class Monday morning. That was the plan. But when you're dealing with Texas weather, you have to follow one rigid rule: stay flexible. The Brenham appearance was

fun. The auditorium was packed

with 800 screaming kids (I asked them to see how much noise they could make) from three different schools. I had half a dozen kids come up on stage with me and tell silly jokes (they had been told to get some jokes ready). Then we all did a nose flute medley. The kids in the audience were attentive and well-behaved. I told them they were in the cradle of Texas liberty but we weren't going to do any Texas history during the show. They loved that.

After the appearance at Brenham, we drove to Galveston, left our vehicle in a parking garage and called the Busy Bee Cab Company. We took a cab to Corpus, 219 miles away. Lloyd, the driver, had never been to Corpus and was used to traveling only on major highways. So my wife Susan, the best navigator in the world, helped him along the "oute of small roads.

The five-hour cab ride sounds bizarre, but it was the only way we could get to the barge on time. We got there at 7 p.m., just before scheduled departure.

The cruise director told us there had been a change of plans. Because of a storm, the barge would not leave until Saturday

night and would not dock until Monday. He said I could perform that night at 8 or not perform at all and still get paid. I said "let's do the show." We got everything ready in less than an hour and did our show in the barge auditorium for people from all over the U.S. They enjoyed our Texas humor.

The next morning (Saturday, Valentine's Day) we took a cab from the barge to the Corpus airport, rented a car and drove to Galveston (219 miles away) to pick up our vehicle. Susan drove it and I followed her to Hobby airport in Houston to turn in our rental car.

By now it was about 5 p.m. Susan had been such a good sport I wanted to do something special. I told her we would drive to Round Top, get a good meal at Royer's Round Top Cafe and spend the night there in one of the B&Bs. I prayed we could do it.

I was afraid the cafe would be crowded. It was. A dozen people were waiting outside. I asked Bud Royer if he could work us in and he said sure. We then called our favorite B&B in Round Top which had a cozy cottage with a bedroom upstairs. We had a perfect ending to an interesting weekend.



# The court that cried wolf

No person should be executed if there is doubt about his or her guilt and an easily available test will deter-

mine guilt or innocence," wrote the 9th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals when it stayed the execution of Death Row inmate Kevin Cooper for the 1983 slaying of two adults and two children. The court was correct, in

principle. But the court was wrong to stop what Cooper apologists call a "rush" to kill an

innocent man before a test is conducted that could establish his innocence.

There were tests conducted after Cooper had asked for DNA testing of the evidence that convicted him. Those tests further implicated Cooper by tying him to the home of the victims — Doug and Peggy Ryen, their daughter Jessica, age 10, and house guest Christopher Hughes, 11 — to their car and to a T-shirt with a victim's blood on it.

So now defense lawyers are asking for other tests. Why not? They have nothing to lose, especially since they've - quite conveniently - asked for tests that cannot further implicate Cooper. The compliant 9th Circuit suggested that crime-scene hair, which clearly isn't his, be tested. (You don't need a forensic scientist to prove that, as the hair is light while Cooper's is black.) Defense lawyers also want to test the incriminating DNA to see if it contains a chemical used in stored blood — which they say would show that investigators tampered with the evidence. It's a safe

request, as the chemical could

show up because it is found in

household detergents and other

products.

Somehow, the 9th Circuit didn't seem to notice that the "easily available test" — tests really cannot resolve the case.

In a 9-2 ruling that resulted in an 11th-hour reprieve, the 9th Circuit highlighted two pieces of "new evidence." One focuses on a declaration by a former warden at the prison from which Cooper escaped. The warden said that the prison-issue shoes that matched a bloody footprint on one of the Ryens' sheets also were sold to the general public. The 9th Circuit decided that prosecutors' failure to share that information with the defense constituted the withholding of vital information that the defense could not have been expected to discover on its own. That's ludicrous.

In addition, the 9th Circuit deferred to two declarations from witnesses who both said they saw two blond, blood-spattered men in a bar near the Ryen home on the night of the murders. Their testimony is supposed to bolster the defense story that three white men killed the Ryens and Hughes. But, as the two dissenting judges noted, other witnesses from the bar testified at Cooper's trial, and by the way, they didn't testify that the men were blood-splattered.

Why does it matter that this stay was granted under misleading pretenses?

It matters because the judges and lawyers know better — or should have known better.

Team Cooper has tried to frame the argument as a battle between careful officers of the court trying to prevent a wrongful death and death-penalty proponents who are so hungry for a kill that they would execute an innocent man.

Nonsense. If I thought ooper might be not guilty, if I believed that his defenders simply were seeking to discover information that could settle questions about his guilt, I'd be with them. I don't want to see an innocent man die. I

would not want the real killers to get away with murder.

What's more, as a death-penalty advocate, I realize that if California starts executing innocent men, there won't be a death penalty in California. So in addition to humanitarian considerations, I have an ideological reason to support tests that expose the truth.

In this case, those most interested in the truth are running from the Cooper defense — including people who worked for it.

Paul Ingels was a private investigator for Cooper. In 2000, he backed Cooper's efforts to force DNA testing. A former cop, Ingels risked the wrath of local law enforcement because, he told me, "I think everyone has the right to access new evidence through new technology.'

But when the tests delivered even more proof that Cooper was the killer, Ingels wanted no part of Cooper's new I-was-framed defense. "I didn't want to be a party to unprofessional and unethical things," Ingels explained.

Former Cooper defense forensics expert Ed Blake called the Cooper defen e and the 9th Circuit's ruling "an outrage. It's an abuse of proce. The reason that I'm outraged s, when you abuse the process, you no longer have a legitimate process that's out there to save people who are actually innocent."

Someday, the 9th Circuit may try to stand up for a wrongly convicted individual, but after it peddled a dishonest Cooper defense. who would then trust this court?

A: A lot of people might have different answers, but one hard to argue against Mount is Washington in New Hampshire, says Kelsey Curtiss of Texas A&M University. In fact, Mount Washington State Park, located in the White Mountains, brags that it is home "to the worst weather in the U.S," and that might be true.

"Some people even consider it the worst weather in the world," says Curtiss.

"Mount Washington is 6,288 feet above sea level, the highest mountain in New England, and it is known for its high winds. A large sign there reads 'The highest wind ever observed by man was recorded here' on April 12, 1934. That day, the winds

"In fact, more than 100 people have died on the mountain, some from falls but most from being improperly dressed and developing hypothermia. That's why the park rangers tell hikers and visitors that proper clothing is a must - not wearing the right clothing can kill in minutes on the mountain, even in summer. The park is home to Washington Mount Observatory, a non-profit corporation that conducts

# Grady rolls over Rule





In 1964, Cassius Clay (later Muhammad Ali) became world heavyweight boxing champion by defeating Sonny Liston in Miami Beach.


In 1973, the Stephen Sondheim musical "A Little Night Music" opened at Broadway's Shubert Theater.




