

March primaries set Tuesday

Area voters will be asked to return to the polls Tuesday, as the Democratic and Republican primaries wind up in preparation for the November election.

In contested races on the local Democratic ballot, voters will have the chance to vote in the sheriff's race with incumbent Dale Walker facing off against Willie Rangel Jr.; county commissioner, Precinct 1, which involves incumbent Emma Puga Brown and challenger Yolanda Mendoza; and justice of the

peace, Precinct 1, Place 1, between Donna Gamboa and Phil Bustamante.

In contested races on the local Republican ticket, the battle for the State Senate District 31 seat will continue between recently elected State Sen. Kel Seliger, R-Amarillo, and challengers Kirk Edwards, R-Odessa, and Jesse Quackenbush, R-Amarillo. Former candidates Bob Barnes, R-Odessa; Don Sparks, R-Midland; and Lee Gibson, R-Dumas, will still appear on the ballot, but all have officially dropped out of the race.

ticket will be the county com- Hardy missioner seat for Precinct 3, incumbent Bill Crooker and Allen; challenger Kathy Lusk.

Local candidates running unopposed in the Republican Primary include Kent Sharp, who is vying for the District 85 State Representative seat. Sharp's Democratic opponent in the November election, incumbent James "Pete" Laney of Hale Center, is also running unopposed.

Council to consider possible zoning change

The Big Spring City Council will meet Tuesday at 5:30 p.m. to discuss several matters, including a public hearing regarding the adoption of a new subdivision which would result in a zone change for an area on the west side of Martin Luther King Boulevard.

According to public notice posted by the city of Big Spring, the owner of a 5-acre tract out of the southwest quarter of Section 32, Block 33, has requested a zone change from single family designation to "light commercial," for the use of a multi-family complex.

The area is approximately one block east of FM 700 on Martin Luther King Boulevard, on the north side of the street.

Big Spring Mayor Russ McEwen said he hopes members of the community - and especially land owners with concerns about the zoning change — will attend the hearing and make their voice heard.

"That's what these hearings are for," said McEwen. "We want to encourage anyone who has concerns about the zoning change or the land in that area to come to the hear-

McEwen declined to comment on what may or may not be built on the 5-acre plat if zoning is approved.

"At this point it would simply be speculation," he said.

· Final reading of a resolution authorizing the city manager to execute an agreement with Barker and Associates Consulting for performance management systems development and training.

· Final reading of a resolution authorizing the city manager to execute a contract with Maximus for preparation of an annual cost allocation plan.

· Final reading of an ordinance calling for an election to be held on May 15, 2004.

Homeowners still waiting for breaks on insurance rates

DALLAS (AP) - Texas cies a month. homeowners are still saddled with high insurance premiums nine months after state lawmakers passed reforms aimed at reducing rates and making it easier to obtain coverage.

Average premiums have decreased by about 4 percent from early the Texas Department of Insurance said. That figure is well under the 12 percent to 18 percent reduction that was predicted when the insurance reforms were signed into law in June.

"We have heard some people say their rates have stabilized decreased slightly, but we're also hearing from a lot of people whose insurance rates are still going up," said Dan Lambe of Texas Watch, a consumer group active in insurance issues.

Other homeowners have been forced to buy coverage through a state plan that offers minimal protection because State Farm Insurance, the largest insurer in Texas, is still not selling policies to new customers. The company instituted that policy in September 2001 to combat soaring mold-damage claims.

Farmers Insurance, meanwhile, has limited its agents to 10 new poli-

Both companies also are continuing a legal battle against Insurance Department effort to roll back their rates, which were deemed excessive last year.

Insurance Department spokesman Jim Hurley said the ongoing battle is disappointing.

"The longer they drag this out, the longer it will take for their customers to receive the savings they should have been getting," Hurley told The Dallas Morning News for a Sunday story.

But both insurers said their rates are necessary to cover losses and other expenses.

"The reductions being sought by the Insurance Department are excessive," Farmers spokeswoman Michelle Levy said. "Our rates have not changed since 2002, when we announced a 6.8 percent reduction."

Backers of the new law insist the reforms need more time to turn things around.

Insurance An Department study estimated that a typical premium now costs \$1,390. That is about 4 percent lower than in early 2003 but well above the typical \$1,000 in annual premiums in 2000.

Freed man still trying to clear name

HOUSTON (AP) - A man freed from prison last year after new DNA tests showed he did not commit the rape he was convicted of in 1998 is still trying to get his record cleared, his attorneys said.

David Dow, director of the Texas Innocence Network, is trying to clear Josiah Sutton's name through a court order to vacate the conviction, as well as a governor's pardon based on innocence, the Houston Chronicle reported Sunday.

State District Judge Joan Huffman is scheduled in mid-April to hear arguments on vacating the conviction of Sutton, 22.

After serving 4 1/2 years, Sutton was freed on bond days after an initial retest excluded him as a contributor to the DNA evidence in his case. A second test also excluded Sutton, who had been sentenced to 25 years in prison.

Sutton is among hundreds being retested after a state audit found a lack of training of lab employees, insufficient documentation and possible contamination of DNA samples at the Houston Police Department.

Fish oil to fortify fatty lunch fare

DALLAS (AP) - At some South Texas schools, a new plan for serving nutritious meals to children is a little fishy.

Old favorites like pork tamales, breakfast tacos with bacon and nacho cheese are injected with oil taken from a small, herringlike fish. The oil contains omega-3 fatty acids, which research has linked to positive health effects, including decreased risk of heart attacks.

But critics are skeptical of the benefits from adding a healthy fat to unhealthy foods. They say the quantity of omega-3 added to foods is too small to have any health benefit.

Earlier this month, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs issued a new school nutrition policy with restrictions on fried and other fatty foods, setting rules for types of foods that can be served in schools.

Advocates of fish oil say it's a way to make lunchtime healthier without getting rid of children's favorite foods.

Congressional races overshadow others

AUSTIN (AP) — With the Democratic presidential nominee assured, the Texas primary drama turns to what many Lone Star State voters are infinitely familiar with — new congressional districts.

Candidates for Congress in Tuesday's primary are

squaring off in Republican-drawn districts that received federal court approval in January and could give the GOP a commanding advantage in the state's 32-member congressional delegation.

Republican legislators pushed through the new districts last year, despite two out-of-state boycotts by Democrats.

Also before the voters are a race for Texas Railroad Commission and contests for the Texas Supreme Court, Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, State Board of Education and Texas Legislature.

"As Texans and Americans, we should remember that democracy is dependent on a single act — the act of voting. There are plenty of reasons to go to the polls on March 9th," Texas Secretary of State Geoff Connor

Ten candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination appear on the ballot, but John Kerry is the only major candidate still in the race. John Edwards dropped out after Kerry's victories last week on Super Tuesday, diminishing the significance of this week's primaries in Texas, Florida, Louisiana and Mississippi in selecting the eventual nominee.

Roundtables illustrate interest in Civil War

DALLAS (AP) — Eyes shifted from side to side, and anticipation began to build.

The objective rested only a few feet away. Suddenly, with a slight nod from their leader, they

surged ahead. The foe never stood a chance. Mounds of golden fried fish and green beans were

wiped out. The victorious charge on the buffet line brought the monthly meeting of the Dallas Civil War Roundtable to order. Roundtables give historians the chance to promote

their work and dedicated Civil War buffs a chance to gobble up endless information — frequently the nuts and bolts of key battles or the leadership qualities of Union and Confederate generals. "They started originally to study the war, to have a

speaker come in. Since the early 1970s, a number of them have become very interested in historic preservation," said Ed Bearrs, former chief historian of the National Park Service and frequent speaker to Civil War groups. The number of roundtables began to grow rapidly

before the Civil War Centennial celebration of the 1960s, said Bearrs (pronounced Bars), an octogenarian who dazzles audiences by rattling off dozens of obscure battle details on demand.

A typical meeting includes topics like "Lee and the Appomattox Campaign" or "Booth Shot Better Than he Thought he Did."





Tactics matter in this race

he new media spin is that President Bush may be making a mistake by supporting a constitutional amendment prohibit-

ing same-sex marriage — not because the American public supports same-sex marriage (it doesn't) but because voters are reluctant to mess with the Constitution.

Don't bet the farm on it. As George Washington University law professor Jonathan Turley warned, "The San Francisco controversy has given

Bush has not endorsed a particular amendment, although the Bushies have praised the Federal Marriage Amendment sponsored by Rep. Marilyn Musgrave, R-Colo., that would prohibit states from legalizing same-sex marriage. Critics are right to point out that such a federal amendment would limit states' rights.

this amendment a powerful

momentum on Capitol Hill."

Bush, however, is correct in saying that a federal marriage amendment would protect states' rights by releasing states from the U.S. Constitution's Full Faith and Credit clause's requirement that states recognize marriages conducted in other states.

In 1996, President Clinton signed the Defense of Marriage Act, which also freed states from any requirement to recognize out-of-state same-sex marriages. Bush now argues that if activist courts can override state law, they can override the federal Defense of Marriage Act. Hence, he argues, the need for an amendment.

Polls indicate that the public is split on a constitutional amendment. But Karlyn Bowman, editor of "Opinion Pulse" for the American Enterprise Institute, noted that no poll has established that voters are aware that states may be able to export their same-sex marriage laws to other

states. (Indeed, Democratic Sens. and Oval Office contenders John Kerry and John Edwards both say they oppose the amendment because they want to leave marriage up to the states — when they must know that states could be forced to accept other states' nuptials.)

Imagine the likely reaction when same-sex couples married in San Francisco or Massachusetts (where the top court has ordered same-sex unions starting in May) return to, say, Peoria, Ill., and demand that their employers provide health benefits for their new spouses. Support for a constitutional amendment is likely to grow if people in Tennessee or Texas believe the mayor of San Francisco or four Massachusetts judges can dictate marriage laws in their states.

The first openly gay member of Congress, Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., told the San Jose Mercury News that he opposed San Francisco Mayor Gavin Newsom's nuptials because "If people believe that marriage in one state is going to have to be recognized in every state, we lose votes."

Hastings College of the Law professor Vikram Amar believes there is "no clear indication" that state courts across the country will force their states to recognize out-of-state same-sex unions. He opposes an amendment while Americans are "feeling their way" through the issue.

I'm against the amendment, too, but there is a strong indication that the courts will rule against states' rights. Two San Francisco judges, fully aware of state law, decided they didn't have to uphold laws that limit marriage to a man and a woman — in deference to Mayor Newsom's belief that those laws violate the state's equal protection clause. Judges James Warren and Ronald Quidachay could have stopped illegal same-sex weddings until hearings are neig on the matter next month, but they didn't feel they

Let me explain what angers me the most about Newsom's nuptials and state courts' failure to immediately uphold the law: I voted against Proposition 22, which prohibited same-sex marriage in California and was passed by 61 percent of voters in 2000. Still, I believed it was only a matter of time before voters accepted same-sex marriage. A voter mandate would be the best way to win the issue because it would produce less resentment in the years that followed. As Turley observed, American

courts were ruling for gay rights as they saw societal acceptance grow. "The irony is that the gay-rights movement was at the very edge of success," said Turley. "And it now stands to lose much advantage." If a marriage amendment passes, it could set back gay rights for decades.

San Francisco's Winter of Love sends two messages to America. The good message is that many same-sex couples want to spend the rest of their lives together. The bad message is that if pro-gay politicians have power, they will use it to break the law, and the establishment — the courts and the attorney general — will aid and abet them.

Until now, Bush had resisted pressure to endorse a marriage amendment, even as Vermont and Massachusetts legalized same-sex unions. Only when San Francisco broke the law, and the courts let the city do it, did Bush endorse a constitutional amendment. Said Turley: "This controversy in San Francisco could not have been better planned by the opponents of gay rights."

Kerry-Edwards ticket unlikely


ohn Kerry will not choose John Edwards as his running mate, and I will tell you why:

Kerry looks at his own career: Nineteen years in the U.S. Senate, preceded by being a lieutenant governor, preceded by being a prosecutor, preceded by being an antiwar activist, preceded by being in combat in Vietnam.

Then he looks at John Edwards's career: five years in the Senate, preceded by being a personal injury lawyer.

It is not just that Kerry believes Edwards has not punched his ticket, it is not just that Kerry believes Edwards has not paid his dues, it is that Kerry believes John Edwards is not ready to be president of the United States.

Many considerations go into choosing a vice president

Others will say Edwards has earned a spot on the ticket, that he ran a terrific campaign and Ke ry would be a fool to pass him un But what did Edwards really accomplish during his campaign?

The most important primary he won was the media primary. He was the beneficiary of a media swoon different in intensity but not in kind from the John McCain media swoon of 2000.

The media went on and on about Edwards's speaking skills, his good looks, his energy, and his ability to connect with audiences. The voters, however, seemed somewhat less impressed:

Edwards won only one primary, his native state of South Carolina.

The Edwards swoon reached the height of its silliness in Wisconsin, where Kerry beat Edwards by 6 percentage points. Six percentage points is a very solid victory, especially in a multi-candidate field. Six percentage points is only 4 percentage points away from a landslide.

But the press treated Wisconsin as an Edwards victory, not a Kerry victory, writing about how close the outcome was and how Edwards had beaten expectations (meaning the foolish expectations of the media based on foolish polls.)

I guarantee you that if Kerry beats George W. Bush by 6 points in November, the same reporters who wrote that 6 points was a razor-thin margin in Wisconsin will write that Kerry decisively beat the incumbent president, signifying a sea change in American politics.

Edwards kept saying he could carry the South in the fall, but he presented no evidence. And, in fact, preserving the illusion of his Southern support is what caused him to drop out Tuesday.

Next week, four Southern states — Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Florida — will hold primaries. If Edwards had entered those primaries and lost, his Southern support would have been exposed as mythical, making it very hard for him to run again.

He was not a bad candidate. He got farther than many thought he would get. And having good speaking skills is no small thing. But the vote-drawing ability of your speaking skills is diminished in a vice presidential candidate because very few people are listening to you.

Some say Edwards will not get the vice presidential nod because a vice presidential candidate should be the attack dog of the ticket, and Edwards was not good

on the attack. I disagree, however. He was not mean on the attack, but he was good. His message about George W. Bush creating ' two Americas, one fixed in favor of the rich and powerful and one for the rest of us, was a powerful

But Kerry doesn't need an attack dog. Kerry is going to be his own attack dog. He has to make the case for change; he has to make the case that George Bush has been a failure. If Kerry doesn't, Kerry will lose. Unless voters are given a convincing reason to oust an incumbent president, they will retain an incumbent president.

So whom will Kerry select as his running mate? The list of possibilities is pretty long, but I think Dick Gephardt has a strong shot. And Hillary Clinton has an outside chance.

But don't Republicans hate Hillary Clinton? Yes, but they hated her husband even more, and he got elected and re-elected.

Why would Hillary want the job? Wouldn't it be better for her to run on her own some day as senator from New York? Maybe. But look at the record: Only two people in history, Warren Harding and John Kennedy, have gone directly from the U.S. Senate to the White House. (John Kerry is hoping to be the third.)

But vice presidents have gotten to the presidency 14 times: five times through election, four times through assassination, four times through natural death and once through resignation.

So, if you want to be president someday, the vice presidency turns out to be a very good job to have while waiting around.

AUSTIN (AP) - Shallowater had already lost two state championship games. The Fillies weren't about to let a third one get away.

Plainview couldn't say the same for its try at a fourth straight Class 4A crown.

Katy Pounds had 12 points and nine rebounds and ignited Shallowater's second-half rally that won the Fillies' first Class 2A state title Saturday 44-37 over Aubrey.

Casey Burnett scored 13 for Shallowater (36-4), which lost in the state title game in 1997 and 2003. Kameron Cates scored 12.

Valery Redfearn scored 13 points and grabbed 14 rebounds for Aubrey (35-3), which played in its first state tournament.

Shallowater raced to a 9-0 lead in the first quarter as Aubrey looked nervous and missed its first seven shots. But the lead quickly disappeared under a 23-5 run into the second quarter that put Aubrey up 23-14 after Kenzie Spruiell and Redfearn hit consecutive 3-pointers.

Pounds and the Shallowater defense took over in the third.

Pounds converted a 3-point play to make it 27-25. Then she tied it when she intercepted a pass under her own basket, dribbled the length of the court and split two defenders for a layup. She drew a foul on the next possession and hit two free throws for Shallowater's first lead since the end of the first quarter.

Pounds drew her fourth foul with 11 seconds left in the quarter but Aubrey, which hit three 3-pointers in the second quarter, managed just three total points in the third period and couldn't retake the lead went to the bench.

With Pounds sitting, Shallowater took a 34-29 lead on Erin Corkery's 3-pointer, and Burnett scored four straight on a pair of free throws and strong turnaround jumper over two defenders. Her free throw with 1:43 left made it 39-32.

The Plainview Lady Bulldogs saw their three-year stranglehold on the state 4A title come to and end with a 57-35 loss to the Dallas Lincoln Lady Tigers Saturday.

For Lincoln, the championship ended a three-year string of near misses. The Lady Tigers had lost to Plainview in each of the last three state title games.

In Class 3A, Canyon nailed down its 11th state crown with a 49-29 win ocer the Winnsboro Lady Raiders. Canyon has won state three times since 2000.

In Class 5A, Spring Westfield downed Duncanville, 66-49, in the title bout. In Class 1A action, City defeated Fayetteville by a 59-47 matrgin in the Texas Cup bout that pits the state's two Class A champions against each other.

Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a referendum on the proposition of whether or not cotton growers shall establish a boll weevil eradication program in the statutorily designated St. Lawrence Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and pay a maximum annual assessment in the amount of \$6.00 per land acre of irrigated cotton and \$2.00 per land acre of dryland cotton each year until costs of the eradication program plus finance charges are paid off, which is anticipated to take up to 11 years, and a nominal maintenance fee thereafter. The initiation of a program is contingent upon state and/or federal cost share in an amount to allow a program to operate within the proposed budget at the maximum assessment rate of \$6.00 per land acre of irrigated cotton and \$2.00 per land acre of dryland cotton. It approved, the program and assessment are expected to begin in the zone on a date determined by the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors.

The St. Lawrence Eradication Zone consists of that area of Midland County south of a line 15 miles south of Interstate 20 running from the Ector County line east to the Glasscock County line: Glasscock, Reagan, and Upton counties. If a zone program and assessment are approved by this referendum, growers in the zone shall vote again on whether or not to continue eradication efforts after four years of active program activities.

Also, as part of the referendum, a representative of the above-referenced zone will be elected to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The referendum and board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed by April 1, 2004. All ballots cast by mail must be postmarked no later than April 16, 2004, in order to be valid. Any cotton grower having cotton production in 2003 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and if he or she resides in the St. Lawrence Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, to have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton and receives income from the sale of cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm.

Any person eligible to vote in the referendum or board member election who resides in the St. Lawrence Boll Weevil Eradication Zone. and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below.
