# Unemployment rate rises for **Howard County**

The unemployment rate in Howard County jumped in January, following a statewide trend believed to be associated with the end of the holiday season.

Virginia Belew, area manager for the Workforce Network for Big Spring, said the spike in unemployment is something seen on an annual basis, as employers who provided holiday employment begin trimming their staffs back to their normal numbers.

"The latest data received BELEW from the Texas Workforce

Commission indicates that the unemployment rate for Howard County increased 0.8 percent from December to January," said Belew. "This followed the normal seasonal trend, as employers ended the Christmas holiday employment period."

Belew said the sudden trend is effecting statewide unemployment numbers as well, and although the increase comes as no surprise, its comparison to percentages posted last year are encouraging.

"The unemployment rate in the Permian Basin Workforce Development area followed the same trend, increasing from 4.8 percent in December to 5.6 percent in January," she explained.
"Reports indicate the retail trade experienced a job decrease of 1,100 jobs, brought about by the end of the holiday

"The unemployment rate for our region stood at 6.5 percent a year ago. The unemployment rate in this area

At the same time, he stays very active in extracurricular activities as a member of the marching and honor band, student council, the Spanish club and is very



## Preliminary TAKS tests show 89 percent passing

Big Spring Independent School District is well on its way.

Preliminary results from the first administration of the third grade Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) reading test show that 89 percent of the 300 or so Big Spring third

graders who took it passed. The passing rate percentage is on par with the school district's overall passing rate from last

first and second administrations, Although not quite an "A," the, said BSISD Superintendent Michael Downes.

"The passing standards were increased from last year, yet we still had about the same number of students pass as last year," Downes said.

The Texas Education Agency released the results of the March 19 test to the school districts

Monday. Third graders must pass the test in order to advance to the

year, which includes both the next grade. The second adminis- ing results from the second test tration for those who did not meet the test's minimum requirements will be held in

"With these results, we know of about 30 students we need to work with in small groups and one-on-one to prepare them for the second test administration," Downes said.

Final passing results, which will be officially released in August, will take into consideration several other factors, includ-

Texas school districts are accountable for the test scores of students who were enrolled in their district on the last Friday in October 2003.

Test scores of students who moved into BSISD following this date will be counted in the preliminary results, but not in the final figures.



## UMC trial gets under way

BOTHELL, Wash. (AP) - Despite efforts by dozens of protesters to block it, the United Methodist Church trial of an openly lesbian pastor got under way with one witness warning clergymen not to "replicate the crucifixion of Jesus."

Dozens supporters of the Rev. Karen Dammann were arrested Wednesday in this Seattle suburb as they tried to block the start of the trial before a church panel that will determine whether she should continue her ministry. Dammann, 47, is charged with "practices declared by the United Methodist Church to be incompatible to Christian teachings."

Dammann is on leave as pastor of First United Methodist Church in Ellensburg, 95 miles east of Seattle. Last week she married her partner of nine years, Meredith Savage, in Portland, Ore., where officials began allowing gay marriages earlier this month.

One of her first witnesses Wednesday was Mary Ann Tolbert, a professor of biblical studies at Pacific School of Religion in director of its Center for Lesbian and Gay Studies. Tolbert reminded the jurors that Jesus was killed because he disagreed with the religious norms of his time.

"We have to be very careful, you have to be very careful, that you

don't replicate the crucifixion of Jesus in what you do," she said.

## **Bush thanks troops**

WASHINGTON (AP) - A year after he sent troops to Iraq, President Bush is thanking about 20,000 who have returned to a military base in Kentucky and meeting with survivors of some who never made it home.

The trip Thursday to Fort Campbell is part of Bush's campaign to persuade Americans to give him another four years as commander in chief, at a time when military leadership occupies center stage in the presidential campaign.

Democrat John Kerry accuses Bush of leaving American troops vulnerable in Iraq, while Bush and Vice President Dick Cheney argue that Kerry lacks the judgment to lead the armed forces.

## GOP pushes financial plan

WASHINGTON (AP) - House Republicans are standing by President Bush with a plan for containing deficits that would curb expanded benefits for Medicare and other programs, but leave future tax cuts unfettered.

By voice vote, Republicans Berkeley, Calif., and executive pushed an election-year bill through the House Budget Committee on Wednesday requiring lawmakers to find spending cuts to pay for any enlargements in benefits. Such savings would not be required for tax reductions an exemption favored by Bush and

congressional GOP leaders.

The panel also used a party-line, 24-19 roll call to approve a \$2.41 trillion budget for 2005. The fiscal outline, which sets guidelines for future tax and spending bills, mostly follows Bush's priorities but maps faster deficit reduction. smaller tax cuts and tighter spending than he has proposed.

## Halliburton pay halted

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon is withholding about \$300 million in payments to Halliburton Co. because of possible overcharging for meals served to troops in Iraq and Kuwait.

Defense officials said Wednesday that starting next month, the government will begin withholding 15 percent of the money being paid to Halliburton under a multibilliondollar contract to provide services such as food, housing, laundry and mail to American forces in Iraq.

Halliburton spokeswoman Wendy Hall said the company disagreed with the decision and hoped to persuade the Pentagon to drop its plans. But if the Defense Department does withhold the money, Halliburton in turn will withhold 15 percent of its payments to its subcontractors, she said.

The withholding won't affect Halliburton's bottom line, Hall said. Company executives told Wall Street analysts last week the company was taking in about \$1 billion a month from its operations in Iraq.



# Spanish elections: Fear vs. Leadership

he outcome of the Spanish elections this week teaches us a valuable lesson: Democracies require leadership in times of crisis. Much has been made of the voters' decision to oust the ruling Popular

Party because of its support of the U.S.-led war in Iraq. But until terrorists slaughtered innocent commuters on their way to work in Madrid last week, the Popular Party was widely expected to win a majority of seats in the Spanish parliament. Then the terrorists struck, and the Spanish population reacted in fear

and anger. But it was the failure of Spain's leaders to lead in this moment of national crisis that directed that fear and anger toward themselves and the United States rather than at the murders.

Outgoing Prime Minister Jose Maria Aznar has been a loyal ally to the United States, but his reaction to the attacks in Madrid left much to be desired. From the first moments after the attack, Aznar's government seemed anxious to blame anyone but the likeliest of suspects, Islamist terrorists. No doubt Spanish authorities had to consider the possibility that the attacks came from the Basque terrorist movement ETA, which has been responsible for more than 800 killings in the last 30 years. But the methods were uncharacteristic of ETA and similar to Al Qaeda's modus operandi. Within hours of the attacks, evidence indicated

Islamists were to blame. Still the government stubbornly kept pointing the finger at ETA, even while arresting Moroccan and Indian

Moslem suspects. The elections might have turned out very differently if the government had shown leadership instead of fear for its own survival. What if Aznar had addressed the Spanish people and made a direct case against Al Qaeda and its wannabe imitators cropping up in North Africa and elsewhere in the Moslem world? What if he had told his people what the Islamists themselves say is their motive in targeting Spain namely that they consider Spain part of Islam's empire and have not forgotten the ignominy of 1492, of being driven from their kingdom in southern Spain over which they had ruled for more than 700 years? What if Aznar had reminded Spaniards that long before the United States overthrew Saddam Hussein, Al Qaeda operatives — including Mohammed Atta

the World Trade Center. One can imagine Tony Blair giving such a speech. Indeed, he has done so in the face of strenuous opposition from his own party time and again. Unfortunately, neither Aznar nor his hand-picked successor, Mariano Rajoy, chose to try to lead in similar fashion, and so the people went with the demagogue who was willing to blame America for Spain's tragedy.

No doubt John Kerry is delighted at the outcome of the Spanish elections and hopes he'll have sim-

ilar success in ousting the governing party here at home in November. But he should be worried. Spanish appeasement puts all of us at risk. The Islamists will attack again — perhaps the next target will be France, or Italy, or even the United States.

Throughout the primaries, the Democratic presidential contenders (with the exception of Sen. Joe Lieberman and Rep. Dick Gephardt) behaved irresponsibly, using the war in Iraq to fan partisan hatred. Now that John Kerry is all but officially the party's nominee, he should be very careful in what he says and does. He should leave no doubt in any would-be terrorist's mind that any attempt to manipulate the U.S. elections through terrorism would be met with unified and deadly response.

Kerry has said almost nothing about how he would fight the war on terrorism, except to hint that he believes acts of terror are crimes that should be prosecuted accordingly. If the terrorists believe that Kerry would be a less aggressive adversary and that he would pull back from Iraq and Afghanistan, they may well try to repeat their Spanish electoral success, using the same tactics. It's up to Kerry to set them straight, and the failure to do so in unambiguous terms should weigh heavily on his conscience.

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
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# The government's manufacturing czar

he most charitable explanation of why President Bush's choice to be the government's manufacturing czar crashed and burned last week is sheer incompetence. But the real causes of this embarrassment look

like something worse: secrecy, deceptiveness and vindictiveness in this administration. It could be a script

from television's "West Wing." Nebraska industrialist Tony Raimondo was selected to be the newly created assistant secretary of manufacturing in the



Commerce Department at the recommendation of his friend and business associate, the state's Democratic senator, Ben Nelson. But before Secretary of Commerce Donald Evans' scheduled announcement, the appointment was leaked to Sen. John Kerry. The prospective Democratic presidential nominee then revealed that Raimondo runs a factory in China. Senate Republican leaders won White House agreement not to make the nomination, and Bush aides blamed Nebraska's Republican senator, Chuck Hagel.

The incompetence stems from White House failure to notify Hagel or any other Republicans in advance. That the process of vetting an important nominee fell apart in the fourth year of the Bush administration defies credibility. Somewhere in the White House, too-clever-by-half staffers made a decision to sneak through Raimondo's nomination without telling Hagel. That failed process gives Republicans plenty to worry about on the eve of a long, hard election campaign.

Had Hagel been notified, he would have informed the White House of two political facts of life. The first was Raimondo's factory in China. Hagel is a sophisticated former businessman who understands the global economy and sees no sin in an American manufacturer setting up a plant in China selling strictly to the Chinese market and simultaneously generating sales jobs at home. But Hagel is also a politician who understands that "China" is a buzzword in today's highly politicized Washington. It made no political sense to name a manufacturing czar who owns a factory in China.

The second fact of life that would have been imparted by Hagel to the White House is that Tony Raimondo may be a registered Republican but is not a loyal Republican. He supported then Gov. Nelson's 1996 bid for the Senate against underdog Hagel. After providing private jet transportation for the heavily favored Nelson's losing campaign, Raimondo took Nelson on his Behlen Manufacturing board (where he still serves as an unpaid

Imagine Hagel's astonishment when an aide gave him an Associated Press dispatch last Wednesday disclosing Raimondo's selection. Kerry made the actual first announcement, and it was not difficult to figure how he found out. A former Nelson press aide now works for the Kerry campaign. Naturally, Kerry knew all about the factory in China, and Democrats — in their current mood of economic jingoism took the Senate floor to ridicule Bush's choice and effectively kill the nomination before it was

Appalled, Secretary of Commerce Evans called Hagel to say he had

thought surely the senator had been notified about Raimondo. White House Chief of Staff Andrew Card phoned Hagel with the same message. But Hagel was not alone in being kept out of the loop. Nobody called Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, Majority Whip Mitch McConnell or Commerce Committee Chairman John McCain (who would preside over Senate confirmation). Nor was Nebraska's Republican Gov. Mike Johanns informed.

Somebody at the White House other than Andy Card apparently made a decision to go with Nelson, a rare Senate Democrat who occasionally votes with the president, over Hagel, a Republican who always backs Bush (voting for administration bills at rates of 96 percent, 98 percent and 98 percent in Bush's first three years). It made no apparent difference at the White House that Hagel and Johanns are co-chairmen of the president's re-election campaign in Nebraska.

Chuck Hagel may vote the right way but speaks his mind all too often to please the White House. Presidential aides, talking not for quotation, unfairly blamed Hagel for killing the nomination. One Republican source close to the White House said Hagel was not informed in advance because he simply cannot be trusted. Those remarks suggest what's wrong with George W. Bush's operation heading into a presidential campaign. The Raimondo fiasco points to failings that will not be corrected if they are not admitted.

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



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

What's the best thing to do if you're caught in a severe

A: Some thunderstorm safety tips could save your life, says Kelsey Curtiss of Texas A&M University. A severe thunderstorm, she explains, is one defined by winds of at least 58 miles per hour, hail at least three-fourths of an inch or has produced a tornado.

"If you're outdoors, find sturdy shelter, either in a building or a car - preferably not a convertible,"

If you cannot find a place of shelter and are caught out in an isolated area, squat down low so as to create the least surface area as possible. This will reduce the risk of being struck. Laying down flat in a ditch will increase the chances of being struck as the target area has been increased. Water is a great conductor of electricity, so avoid water if at all possible. Golfers can especially be at risk and they should leave



should unplug appliances because they conduct electricity. Curtiss "You should avoid

using the telephone people have been struck by lightning while talking on the telephone. Also, it's a good idea to close the blinds or curtains because if a storm should break windows, the drawn curtains or shades will prevent the glass from shattering in your home. Stay away from water sources as well as lightning can travel through a house. If there is a power failure, some experts advise turning off all electrical appliances before the power comes back on to prevent a power surge that can ruin some equipment. Spring and summer are seasons when thunderstorms become more and more frequent. The National Weather Service estimates there are about 100,000 thunderstorms a year in the U.S., but only about 10 percent of those are classified as severe. But the severe storms can cause amazing damage and even loss of life."

## **Baseball players** forbidden from using the steroid

NEW YORK (AP) -Major league baseball players are now forbidden to use THG, the recently unmasked. steroid at the center of the case against the Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative.

"Testing for THG is an important step toward reaching our goal of zero tolerance," baseball com-missioner Bud Selig said.

"I am committed to that goal and advocate a more stringent and effective drug-testing program in the major leagues, similar to our program in the minor leagues."

The health policy advisory committee of management and the players' association unanimously determined last Thursday that THG builds muscle mass and should be added to baseball's list of banned substances.

The Food and Drug Administration ruled Oct. 28 that THG, which stands for tetrahydrogestrinone, is an illegal drug that lacks federal permission for sale in the United States.

Because baseball and other sports did not know about THG before last October, drug testing was unable to detect it.

"I don't care," Minnesota Twins outfielder Jacque Jones said. "I don't take any of that stuff, so it doesn't matter to me what they ban."

Barry Bonds' personal trainer, Greg Anderson, was among four men indicted last month on charges of illegally supplying performanceenhancing drugs from BALCO.

All four pleaded innocent.

Bonds, Jason Giambi and Gary Sheffield were among the athletes called to testify before a grand

# Safety has its costs

## SAFER barriers at Darlington take up valuable track space

urt Busch wheeled his red Ford Expedition onto the track at Darlington Raceway and immediately headed for the new SAFER barriers on the wall in the middle of turns 1 and 2.

"It'll have an impact here in the center of the mer," Busch said as he cruised within a foot of the SAFER (Steel and Foam Energy Reduction) barriers more commonly known as

'The racing line is right here. It'll take away a little bit of impact, but you won't notice it because you start heading down the racetrack."

Busch then headed toward the exit of Turn 2 at about 50 miles per hour, well under the track record qualifying speed of 173.797 mph. 'You'll scrape the side right on these hash

marks coming off Turn 1," he said. "Then you'll slide right back up toward the wall where they've closed it off and we're back to regular concrete, so the impact will be minimal on the exit of the corner of (Turn) 2.'

Busch was the first driver to get a close-up look at the new walls and the potential new racing lines that will result with 30 inches gone from a track that many drivers said already was too tight.

Ricky Craven, who beat Busch in last year's Carolina Dodge Dealers 400 by two-thousandths of a second, later took a spin around the track where a driver seldom escapes a brush with the wall and collects the infamous "Darlington stripe" down the side of his car.

Everybody else gets to see it Friday when

drivers begin preparing for Sunday's 400-mile race with two practice sessions and qualifying. Some drivers, such as Mark Martin, already have expressed concern that there won't be

enough room to race side by side on this eggshaped slice of real estate nicknamed "The Track Too Tough To Tame." "Once they come down and analyze it they won't have that perspective," Busch said.

"They'll see the changes are for the positive and they'll be able to compete and race here side by "We'll know we're missing 30 inches, but
