Phone Service To Be Expanded

The unattended central dial office of the Friona telephone exchange soon will be enlarged, with additional dial equipment installed to serve a larger number of subscribers, announcement was made yesterday by R. E. Blatz, district manager of the General Telephone Company of the Southwest.
Blueprints were distributed among at least three bidders Wednesday, and construction is expected very shortly. Equipment will be installed just as soon as released by the manufacturer, Blatz said. Plans are for an initial addition of 30 lines, enabling up to 60 new subscribers, and later installation of 40 more lines.

New residential construction will demand enlarged service, inasmuch as some people already are on a waiting list for service under the present set-up.

Jr. Livestock Show Saturday

With all in readiness for the annual Junior Livestock Show in Friona, directors of that organization expressed belief this week that the show would be of comparable size to that of last year, with probably even more animals put up for the Saturday sale.

Though under direction of the Farmer County Fair Association, the Junior show will be under direct supervision of the vocational agricultural teachers of the county and County Agent Joe W. Jones.

Dr. M. R. (Doc) Callihan of West Texas State College, Canyon, will judge the show. Sale plans are being handled by Pete Buske. The sale probably will be held about 3 p. m., Saturday, immediately after show completion.

Entries in the show must be in the barns by 6 p. m. Friday, Jones states.

The show is open to participation of any youth in the county, displaying his or her project of beef, swine, etc.

Benefit Minstrel Slated Tuesday

With announcement this week by Hospital Manager Jimmie Baxter that the Hospital Building Fund now lacks only about \$500 of the total goal of \$50,000, the Negro Minstrel being presented by the Friona Lions Club takes on added significance. All proceeds from this program will go in the building fund and, if attendance is good, should put the fund well over the needed amount.
The program will be given in the school auditorium March 29, at 8:00 o'clock. There will be several musical and dance numbers presented between acts by a Lions Club chorus and Mrs. Maurine Dunn's dancing class.
Admission prices will be 25-cents for grade school students, 50 cents for high school students and \$1.00 for adults.

CONSTRUCTION BEGINS

Construction is beginning this week on the Wright Williams building on east side of Main Street adjacent to Gib's Cleaners and Plains Hardware.
Elmo Jones, who was awarded contract for construction, expects the business building to be completed sometime in June. The building will house a department store, new to Friona, Williams said.

Commission Recommends Fire Ordinance Revision

Rapid and decisive steps were taken by the Friona City Commission, Monday night, with all members present, to insure an equitable and early building code for all Friona localities.
A mandate was virtually handed the Planning and Zoning Commission to set up building recommendations immediately, this situation being forced by:

(1) Vote by the City Commission in second reading of Ordinance 115 (setting up fire zone boundaries and regulations) NOT to consider this ordinance further; and

(2) Vote by the Commission to strike from the city books the old fire zone ordinance passed in 1951. Motion to prohibit further consideration of Ordinance 115 was made by A. W. Anthony, and motion to junk the controversial '51 fire statutes was made by O. J. Beene.

Seven on School Ballot

Eight names had been filed at deadline time Wednesday night for positions on the Friona School Board, with three to be elected. Two names were submitted for County Trustee.

Three petitions were filed as follows:
Roy Clements, Cordie Potts and Geo. Jones, incumbents.
Arthur Drake, Jack Patterson and Eugene Boggess.
Cordie Potts, Hadley Reeve and Russell O'Brian.
Proposed for county trustee

were Incumbent Jim Shaffer and Nelson Welch.

Check yesterday determined that the name of Jack Patterson will not appear on the ballot inasmuch as Patterson lives outside the boundaries of the Friona School District. This evidently had been an oversight of petition bearers submitting his name.
Election will be held Saturday, April 2, in the local high school.

Next step in the orderly and safe planning in Friona then appears to be up to the Planning and Zoning Commission appointed last July, a group now directed to set forth in one ordinance, building plans that consider fire protection as well as nature of business, etc.

The action by the commission in no way means that Friona is wide open for building, without restrictions, even though without fire ordinance on the books at this period. Building application permits must still be submitted to the Planning Commission, a body that must take speedy action, from the fire insurance angle and increasing permit applications, if nothing else.
Prospective builders and the public in general now is given clear notice where the responsibility lies in building regulation. No shuffling or misunderstanding of responsibility between the City Commission and the Zoning City Commission now seems possible.

Likely all zoning (building and fire) plans will be pretty well defined by the time of the public hearing set April 5, at which time the zones, as mapped in the Friona Star last week, will be studied and a final recommendation made to the City Commission.
The city commission took action after discussion Monday night, wherein commissioners and some businessmen expressed themselves on Ordinance 115. Objections mentioned included (a) all central business locations should be governed by one building code rather than a plan that imposed one requirement on one business and another regulation on another; (b) rigid building codes confined to a small area in downtown Friona would retard development there, encouraging building only a few blocks to the north or to either side or even out of town!

Simplified ordinances, with absolute fairness to all, yet planned and regulated growth seemed to be the keynote of the commission thinking Monday night, with responsibility of the details placed squarely in the hands of the Planning-Zoning Commission composed of Glenna Reeve, Joe E. Douglas, Forrest Osborn, Sloan Osborn and Oscar Baxter.

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NEW ELEVATOR PROGRESS

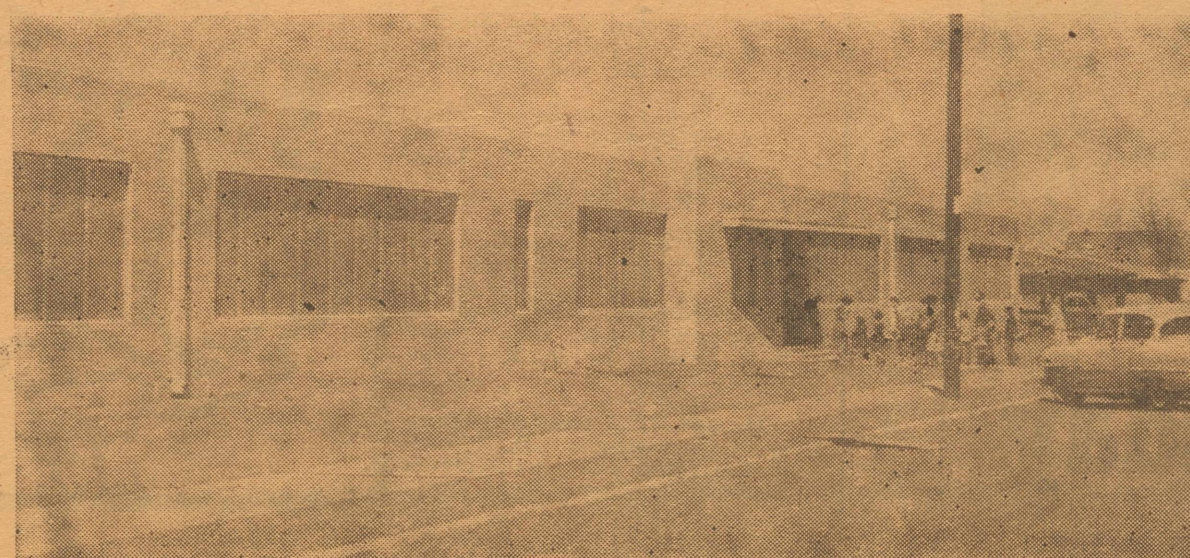

Washington Views

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

An interesting event happened in Congress the other day. Through means of a "privileged resolution" Rep. Clare Hoffman (R. Mich.) got information from Pentagon.

A "privileged resolution" provides information requested by the committee in seven days, or Congressional action forces revelation of information.

Rep. Hoffman wanted to know how many military posts U. S. has abroad, how many men involved, the cost. He was told promptly U. S. has about 950 overseas installations manned by about half present U. S. combat force, or 1,370,000 men. He also learned there are about 167,000 U. S. civilian employees in armed forces plus 218,000 civilians working for foreign governments under contract to U. S. plus 124,000 German civilians. Altogether, wages to civilian employees runs over \$4 1/2 billion per year.

Rep. Hoffman is reported planning to use same method to force some information out of State Department. Thus, he invoked a Congressional weapon that had all but been forgotten.

Revival of this weapon may even embolden some Congressmen to get curious about Foreign Operations Administration which continues to soak up billions in American taxes to give away abroad.

It is held doubtful that one Congressman in 20 knows how these billions are being thrown around, yet so far no investigations have been made.

For example, FOA announces gifts to Israel.

FOA announced among other items it has given Israel \$900,000 worth of fruit wrapping tissue.

Some representatives of U. S. citrus industry on questioning refused to hazard guess on how many oranges could be wrapped with almost a million dollars worth of tissue.

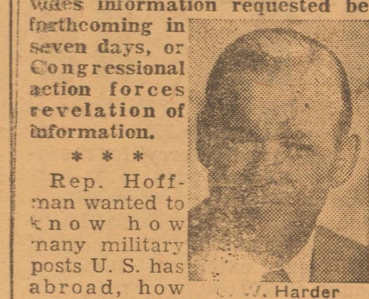
But average monthly exports of Israel of all products is far less than amount of fruit wrapping tissue FOA has just given nation. And it is held pretty certain no Congressman has any idea how many years supply \$900,000 worth of fruit wrapping tissue is for Israel.

Nor probably can any Congressmen explain how tissue wrapping Israel fruit contributes to U. S. defense. If tissue wrapped fruit is vital to defense, then fact majority of U. S. grown fruit is sold naked indicates U. S. home defense is in woefully weak condition.

Thus it appears in Washington Rep. Hoffman has hit upon method whereby Congress if so minded, could learn many interesting facts about way U. S. billions are tossed away while U. S. schools and roads suffer.

Of course, some say GOP will not investigate vigorously a situation it is permitting; neither will Democrats investigate a situation they started.

But on other hand, it is pointed out, Sen Harry Byrd of Virginia, undoubtedly a democrat just as undoubtedly as is fact FHA was started by democrats, pulled out rug from under FHA scandals. So Washington feels it is not impossible for a vigorous probe of FOA to be launched during present Congressional session.

To the People of the 18th District: A VERY BUSY WEEK

My office is on the third floor of the New House Office Building. On this same floor, there are five major committee rooms — Interstate and Foreign Commerce, Interior and Insular Affairs, Agriculture, Public Works, and Banking and Currency. During the past week, I have attended meetings in all of these committee chambers except the Public Works Committee. The matters considered varied from a discussion of drought matters and dust storms in the Southwest to anthracite coal in Pennsylvania, to Hawaiian-Alaskan statehood, navigational aids for aircraft, (which is highly secret), federal control of natural gas, a reclamation project costing in excess of one billion dollars, a discussion with the Director of the Budget concerning the administration's position on the reclamation program, a bill authorizing the granting of permanent certificates to local service airlines now operating under temporary certificates, and a discussion as to whether or not a compilation of facts, figures and conclusions by the administration amounts to a proposal, a policy, a suggestion, or merely a conglomeration of ideas intended for no particular purpose.

This last discussion was with the Director of the Bureau of the Budget concerning a circular compiled by that bureau. The director was before the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee and was flanked by two of his top aides. At the beginning of the hearing, it became obvious that party politics was going to be injected. A former Republican Chairman of the Committee pointed out that the original circular was prepared by the Truman administration. The present Democratic Chairman of the Committee immediately pointed out that the circular had been substantially revised by the present administration. The political aspects of the situation were kicked around for about 45 minutes before we finally got down to questioning Mr. Hughes, the Director. It turned out that they had wasted the 45 minutes concerning the politics, because I asked Mr. Hughes the point-blank question of whether or not any politics were involved and he answered "No." I then asked him if any politics were involved when the original circular was issued by the Truman administration. He declined to answer on the ground that he was not in the Bureau at that time. I was somewhat surprised, because he had not hesitated to give hearsay testimony on other matters. However, we quickly cleared the situation because his two aides had been with the Bureau for a number of years.

Monday Morning Musings

THE BUSIEST PLACE

Ordinarily, when we think of the busy places in town we think of the bank, the market, or the city hall. But you know something? Perhaps the busiest place of all is the school.

We often take the school for granted, forgetting that school business is our business. At school we are busy raising the town's next citizens.

Your school is part of our great democracy and we might just as well realize that it is perhaps the busiest place in town.

In its classrooms are your next policemen, your son-in-law, your secretary, your doctor, a worker at the plant, or perhaps the young couple who will buy the lot next door.

It is up to the school to make sure that he is a good policeman, that he's a responsible son-in-law, that she's an efficient secretary, that he's a reliable worker, that he succeeds as a doctor, and that the folks next door are good neighbors.

And you and your community usually put the responsibility for the education of these future citizens where it belongs, in the hands of the teacher. We know that a child learns more quickly with a good teacher, because the good teacher is the key person who...

Oh, where did he go? What's happening? Well, I'll tell you. Literally thousands of well-trained and qualified teachers are finding other lines of endeavor more lucrative and attractive. Consequently, the number of sub-standard emergency type teachers is on the increase. Every time a competent, well-qualified and trained teacher leaves an American classroom to obtain the necessities of life in another profession, the people of America lose. We simply cannot tolerate this sort of thing for long. One of the most alarming statements found in the Teacher Supply and Demand Report for last year is that there were only 867 persons prepared to teach chemistry and physics and this is only a specific example there are shortages in other lines, too.

What can we do to halt this exodus of competent personnel from our profession? To be sure, salary improvement is basic, and could perhaps do more to alleviate the situation than any other single factor. However, there are other ways. There are certain fringe benefits, the absence of which are causing teachers some concern. For example, whatever can be done to improve the Teacher's Retirement provisions and other security benefits should certainly be done.

Our Legislative Committee recognizes cer-

tain weak spots in our Retirement System. It certainly is not a bad retirement system, but there are certain improvements that need to be made in it.

We have now completed an actuarial study to determine what might be done to improve the retirement benefits of Texas teachers. Specific plans based upon these findings have now been presented in the Legislature for the improvement of our Retirement System, and it is hoped that the people of Texas will give serious thought to this as one important avenue of making teaching more attractive to those already in the profession as well as to young graduates of our colleges. As matters stand now, the demand for teachers is very high, while the supply of teachers is dangerously low.

Yes, if we are to have reliable policemen, responsible sons-in-law, intelligent employees, and congenial neighbors, you must depend a great deal upon the quality of your teachers and the quality of your teachers depends upon your support of "the busiest place in your town," the public school. —The Texas Outlook.

Another Opinion

An editor runs into roadblocks in the most unexpected places and at the most surprising times!

There are a few times (though admittedly few) when we conscientiously try to avoid any controversial subject, coming out for only those things which we believe all are in favor—such as better living, more money, less sin! And it is at these times that we get slipped up on.

For instance, we have recognized Friona as a "church town"; in fact that was one of the factors contributing to our location here -- we like that kind of atmosphere and that kind of people. Fireman Honored

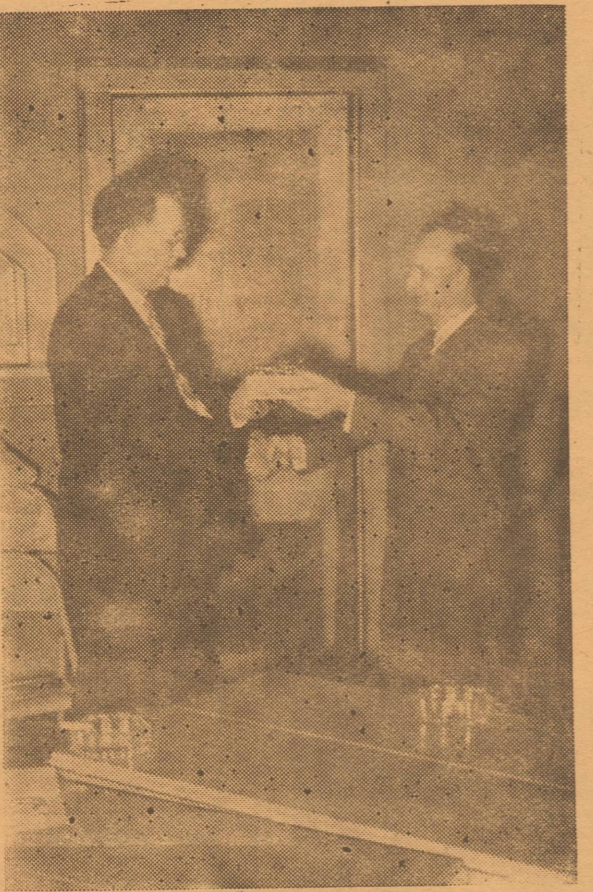

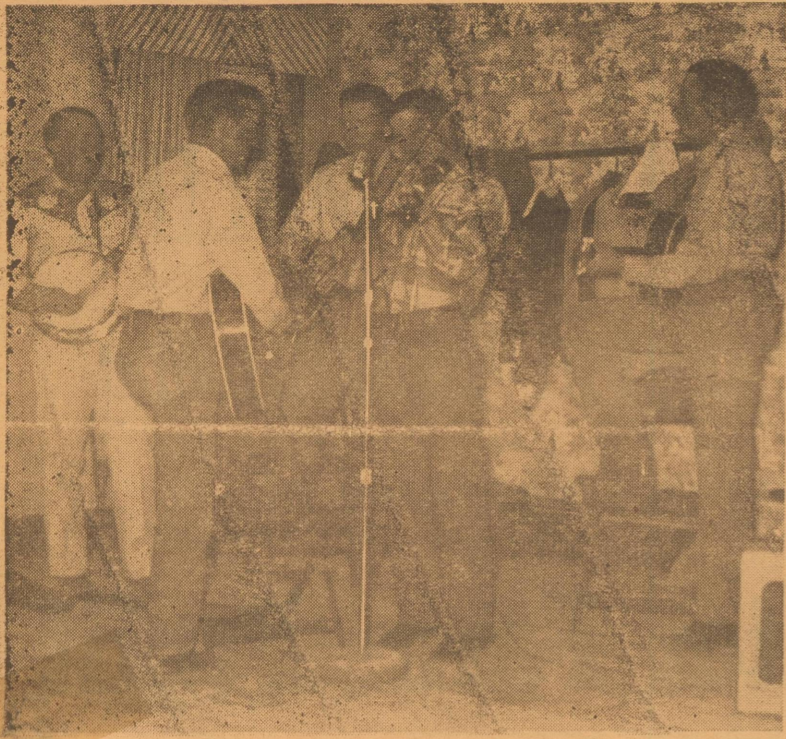

HYBRID GRAIN SORGHUM PROSPECTS

The first large-scale seed stock production of hybrid grain sorghums will be initiated in Texas this year by about 100 seed growers, paving the way for commercial stocks by 1957.

This will be good news for farmers interested in new hybrids. Comparison tests show increases in production of from 20 to 30 per cent over sorghum varieties now commonly grown.

Hybrid grain sorghum is the result of many years of experiment and study conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations. It had its beginning as far back as 1927 and was eventually developed at the Chillicothe and Lubbock stations, thanks to efforts of Chillicothe men, Supt. J. Roy Quinby, and Mr. J. C. Stevens, as well as Dr. Nicholash W. Kramer and R. E. Karper of Lubbock.

The Seed Division of the Texas

Department of Agriculture will have its role in production, also. Seed stocks will be released to responsible seed growers who will produce small plots under TDA supervision. This program will be conducted with the cooperation of the Extension Service of A. and M. College.

Present plans call for the distribution of this hybrid seed to farmers in sorghum producing areas for field trial and comparison in 1956. Seed growers who participate in production this year will be eligible for larger and more extensive production next season, also. This should result in the availability of a large supply of hybrid sorghum seed in 1957.

Production methods are somewhat technical, requiring the planting of two rows of pollinator seed adjacent to six rows of male sterile growths. The hybrid seed is produced from the male sterile rows and the pollinator seed rows are discarded for seed purposes.

Inspection will be made by TDA men. Rules and regulations of production have been tentatively adopted by the State Seed and Plant Board. These "Seed Certification Standards" help assure the producer of high quality seed.

These objectives are the primary purpose of field seed certification activities of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

"There is just one month remaining," Garrison said, "in which about one-third of the car owners in Texas must have their vehicles inspected if they are to continue operating them on the streets and highways."

Meanwhile, W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol, said that State Patrolmen would begin enforcement of the law on April 16 against operators of cars not bearing the 1955 approved inspection sticker.

"We are making this last ditch appeal," Garrison added, "for car owners to visit their inspection stations without delay if inconvenience is to be avoided."

As a result of the war, Korea has 100,000 orphans, 300,000 fatherless families, 3,000,000 TB children and 10,000,000 refugees living in improvised shelters of straw and mud. Three hundred Korean church pastors were killed and 600,000 homes destroyed. 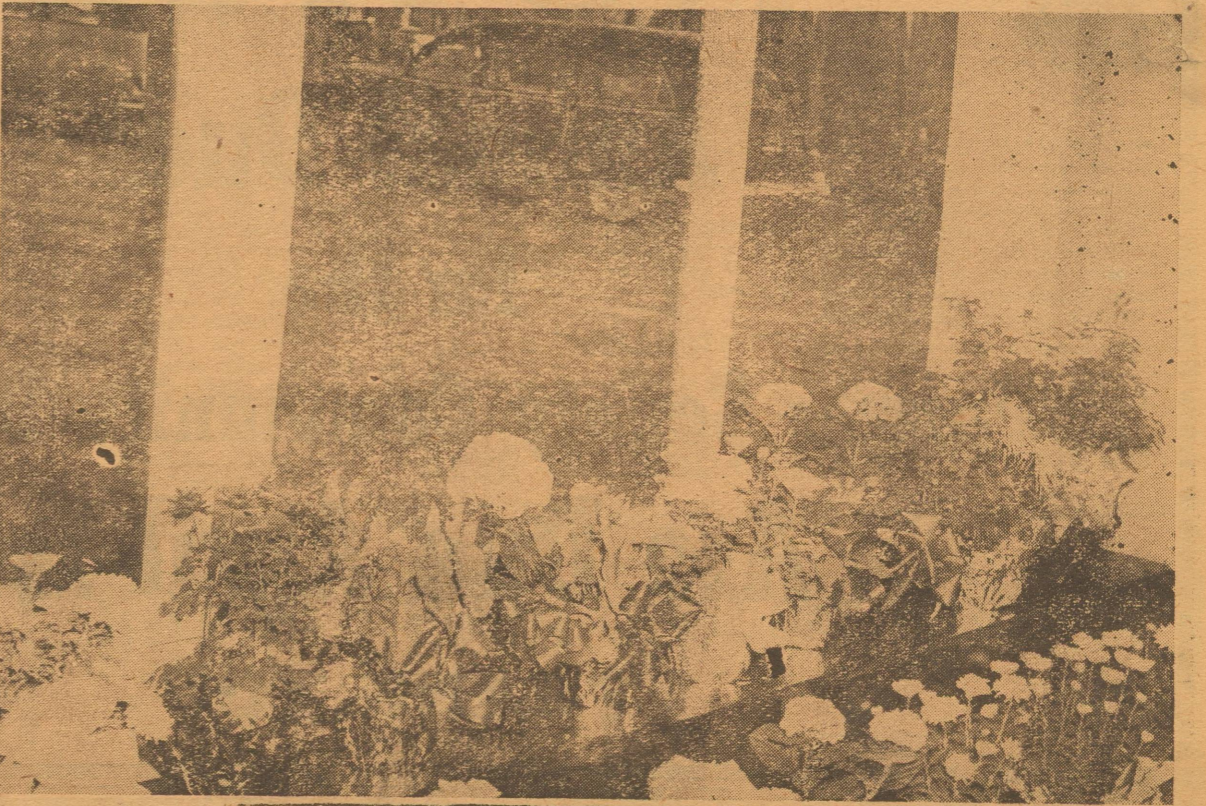

Q—I pay my G insurance premiums once a year in advance. If I die, what will happen to the money that has not yet been applied to premiums?

A—The money, earmarked for premiums beyond the month during which death occurred, will be refunded to your beneficiary in a lump sum.

Q—I understand that veterans disabled in service after January 31, 1955, may receive disability compensation at peacetime rates—80 per cent of the wartime scale. Are there any conditions under which these veterans may get the full wartime rate?

A—Yes. Disabilities resulting di-

rectly from armed conflict, or from extra-hazardous service—including service under conditions simulating war—may warrant compensation payments at the full wartime rate.

Q—In order to get my college degree, I am supposed to take a course in public speaking. Would I have to get prior VA approval for that course, on the grounds that it may be considered "avocational or recreational" in nature?

A—No. Since your public speaking course is an integral part of your GI training program leading to a degree, prior VA approval will not be necessary. If the course were taken by itself—not a part of an over-all educational program—VAs approval would be required.

Q—Has the Presidential proclamation, ending the establishment of entitlement for wartime GI benefits, had any effect on the cut-off date for starting Korean GI Bill training? I am a Korean veteran, already out of service.

A—The proclamation has no bearing on when you must begin your Korean GI training. Under the law, you still must start within three years from the date of your separation from military service.

Q—I plan to convert my GI term insurance policy to a permanent plan. Will I have to send VA a new list of beneficiaries, or will beneficiaries already named carry over to my permanent insurance?

A—It is not necessary for you to submit a new list of beneficiaries when you convert your insurance. The beneficiaries you have named originally will carry over to your permanent insurance. You can, of course, change the designation of beneficiaries at any time you desire.

Q—What is the time limit for filing a claim for an allowance to cover burial of the veteran.

Q—I have just been released from military service. Will the Veterans' Administration help me find a job?

A—Job-finding assistance is outside the scope of AV's activities, as defined by law. Employment placement is a function of the Veterans Employment Service of the U. S. Employment Service. Any local State Employment Office can give you further information.

Q—I intend to buy a house with a GI loan. I have approached a lending institution, and it requires a down payment. Are down payments mandatory under the law?

A—The law itself does not require a down payment on a GI loan. However, since private lenders do make the loans, they have the right to make decisions as to terms and down payments.

Convincing homemakers that they ought to be spending more money for beef is one of the jobs which has been taken over by the Texas Beef Council, an organization formed last fall to promote the increased consumption of beef in Texas.

The Council is providing information on the preparation of the lesser known cuts of meat which are just as nutritious and tasty as the expensive cuts, pointing out to housewives that they can get more for their money in beef than in other meats.

The Council is supported by cattle producers in Texas who contribute to its program of promotion of their primary product.

AUSTIN. — After prodding from the head coach, line coach and backfield, the Legislature got busy on both the put and the take phases of its money job.

House and Senate committees reported the biggest biennial budget in history. The Senate version calls for \$1.5 billion. The House bill ran slightly less.

In one day of debate, the House passed its bill, calling for \$212 million in two years for the general revenue fund, now currently in the red. It would require \$33,600,000 more than current spending, for general purposes, plus a proposed addition of \$27 million for highways.

Hearings by the revenue and taxation committee finally were held on Gov. Allan Shivers' tax recommendations — the Murphy 2-cent per gallon gasoline tax increase; and the Kirklind one-cent cigarette tax increase.

Although the current House is one of the "workingest" groups ever, Speaker Jim Lindsey, called on the members to work harder. He predicted that most of the urgent program—water, insurance laws, hospital, tax and spending—could be achieved. He estimated \$60 million new taxes would be required.

Governor Shivers renewed his urging for the gasoline tax hike, backed by the highway commission's estimate that Texas needs to spend \$2,200,000,000 on highways during the next 10 years.

Rep. Jerry Sadler who said he was "authorized to speak for a majority of the House," told the revenue and taxation committee that the 2-cent gasoline tax hike won't pass.

Sadler prefers a one-cent per gallon gasoline and condensate processing tax. This, he contends, would bring in \$160 million a year and permit repeal of the present 4-cent gasoline sales tax. A processing tax would reach out-of-state as well as Texas buyers of gasoline.

Sadler also has proposed a \$3.50 per barrel hike in the tax on beer. Heard by the oil, gas and mining committee was Rep. J. B. Walling's "anti-waste" bill to set minimum prices for natural gas. At present rates this bill would bring in an estimated \$20 million a year.

Under committee rules, the tax and gas-conservation bills automatically went to sub-committees for a week's study.

Veterans' Affairs

Veteran land deals and their investigation resulted in an ever-growing list of legal suits against Bascom Giles, former commissioner of the General Land Office.

Filed by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd in 53rd District Court here was a civil suit against Giles, seeking a lien on property purportedly owned by the former commissioner in Falls County.

Giles has been indicted by a Bexar County grand jury on a charge of accepting a bribe. He also faces a Travis County indictment accusing him of conspiring to take \$83,500 in veterans land program funds.

Issued by the Travis jury as a subpoena directing officials of the Capital National Bank of Austin, to produce Giles' bank records.

Other civil suits for recovery were filed, making a total of over \$2 million that Shepperd is trying to recover for the state.

Shivers Testifies Again

Governor Shivers went back a second time to appear before the Senate investigating committee. This time under oath.

He said that neither he nor any of his aides brought "undue pressure" on the veterans land board to expedite processing of applications for loans.

It is the policy of the governor's office, said Shivers, to refer questions about the program to the veterans land board.

Shivers testified further that he had never received any warning of any irregularities concerning the program, and that if he had, something would have been done about it.

Commending the investigators for their work, Shivers said, "There isn't anything as wholesome as bringing out the real facts and letting the public look at them."

Continuation in Doubt

Continuation of the Veterans' Land Program is in doubt. House investigators have recommended liquidation of the present set-up.

Sen. George Moffett abandoned "indefinitely" his plan to ask Texans to vote another \$100 million in veterans' land loans.

Only 15,000 of the 971,000 eligible veterans have applied for land to date, under the eight-year-old veterans' land programs. That is less than 1.6 per cent of those who are eligible.

General Legislation

TOURIST BUSINESS. — Texas will be able to advertise for tourists if the House okays a senate-passed measure to permit the State to advertise—and if voters approve the constitutional amendment next year.

INSURANCE BILLS. — Sen.

Crawford Martin's bill requiring adequate financing of fire and casualty insurance companies, by ample capital stock and surplus, passed the Senate. It also broadened the supervisory powers of the state insurance commissioners.

LUNACY TRIALS—Backed by Governor Shivers is a proposed constitutional amendment to permit the waiver of jury trials in lunacy cases. It would permit persons of unsound mind to be committed to mental hospitals on the basis of medical or psychiatric testimony and avoid the mental anguish of jury trial. House members approved the bill 124 to 23.

LABOR LEGISLATION—Senate action is awaited on two labor bills which have received favorable committee reports. One would deny unemployment benefits to workers idled by a labor dispute between the same union and the same employer in a different plant. The other would prohibit picketing by a union or organization not representing a majority of the workers.

SHORT SNORTS—Sen. William Shireman has proposed that \$15 million be spent for a State Department of Health building in Austin. ... Killed by the House was a bill to permit the state to build boat-launching and parking facilities on lakes and streams.

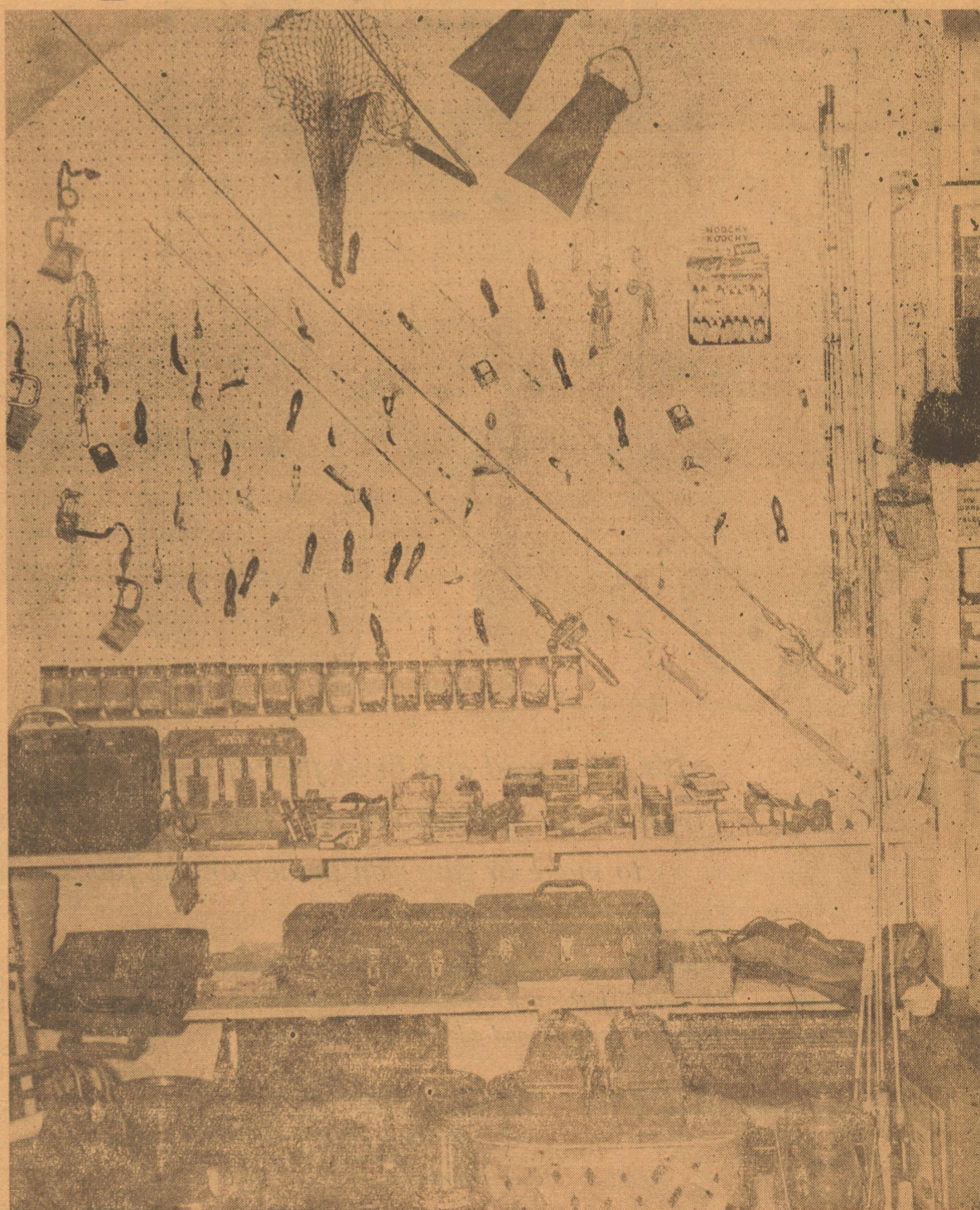
Brotherhood Met
