But significantly, U. S. richness as a consuming market is not due to any corner on world's resources, nor from pillaging of colonies.



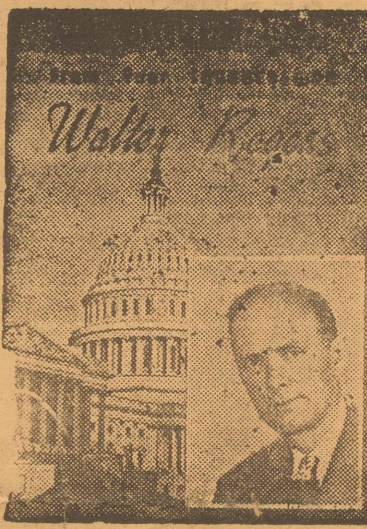

AUSTIN. — Tourists are detouring Texas.

James F. Melton, acting director of the governor's economic advisory commission, says that Texas' gain in manufacturing and employees, from 1947 to 1952, ranked among the nation's highest—but that the tourist trade fell off sharply.

Melton says Texas is losing 300,000 visitors a year.

The state's economy expert estimates the state's loss of potential income as 77 million dollars for the past two years alone.

He blames the states constitutional provision which prohibits Texas from advertising for tourist business.

Shivers' Hat

Parents of children in Austin's Pease School will have a chance November 19 to bid on the Panama hat worn by Governor Allan Shivers during the gubernatorial campaign.

Shivers donated the hat, a tie, and some aprons, for the school's annual harvest festival.

Final Election Returns

Final reports from the Texas Election Bureau show that Governor Shivers rolled to a 521,373 to 51,907 victory over Republican opponent Tod R. Crockett.

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson received 491,228 votes to Republican Carlos Watson's 85,079.

Mystery Blasts

Central Texas residents read of another "mystery blast" last week. This time it was at Granger. But as in the previous seven cases no cause could be found.

First blast of the series came in September in Austin.

Cause of the blasts has been attributed to everything from jet planes breaking the sound barrier to small boys playing with dynamite.

Inductions vs. Separations

More Texans left the service last

month than entered.

Separations numbered 5,365 while inductions totaled 4,691, including six Texas doctors.

Narcotics Big Business

Black market narcotics have been called "big business in Texas" by the Department of Public Safety.

TDPS reports 20 big bootleg dealers and hundreds of peddlers are operating in the state.

"We believe that most of the Texas narcotics come across the Rio Grande and through coastal ports," said Chief W. E. Naylor of the department's narcotic section.

Drink to Death

Records in the Texas Department of Public Safety reveal that drinking drivers were involved in 49 per cent of all fatal accidents last year.

Leading Investigation of Comics



Attorney General and Distributors Waging War on Undesirable Comics

AUSTIN. (Special)—Representatives of the major distribution outlets for comic magazines in Texas Saturday pledged their cooperation in a program to halt the sale of comic booklets featuring crime, horror or sex.

Meeting in Austin at the invitation of Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, leaders of four statewide business organizations set up a committee which will begin immediate work to stop the sale of all objectionable comic books.

C.J.M. Roesch, executive secretary of the Texas Pharmaceutical Association, was named as temporary chairman of the committee to evaluate comic books in Texas.

Attending the meeting were W.C. Edwards of Beaumont, president of the Independent Magazine Wholesalers of the South, W. H. Cochran,

Austin magazine distributor, Jerry Johnson of Waco, secretary-manager of the Texas Retail Grocers Association, Jack Lewallen of Austin, executive director of the Texas Association of Tobacco Distributors, Ted Deming, editor of the TEXAS DRUGGIST, and Roesch.

The Texas Attorney General met with Judge Charles F. Murphy, new Comic Code Administrator, in Murphy's New York office Wednesday. Shepperd said that he had called today's meeting to determine if a voluntary control program in Texas might substitute for State Legislation at least until the Legislature has a chance to consider the problem.

The Attorney General pointed out that "bad comics are only a part of the filthy literature problem, and the filthy literature problem is only part of the juvenile delinquency picture in Texas, but this Texas Comics Evaluation Committee should make quick progress in eliminating a menace to our children."

"Committee members will represent wholesalers or retailers who sell almost all of the 1.2 million comics sold in this state each month," he said, "and their support of the voluntary control program in Texas should contribute to its immediate success."

Prehistoric Skull Shown in Smithsonian Exhibit

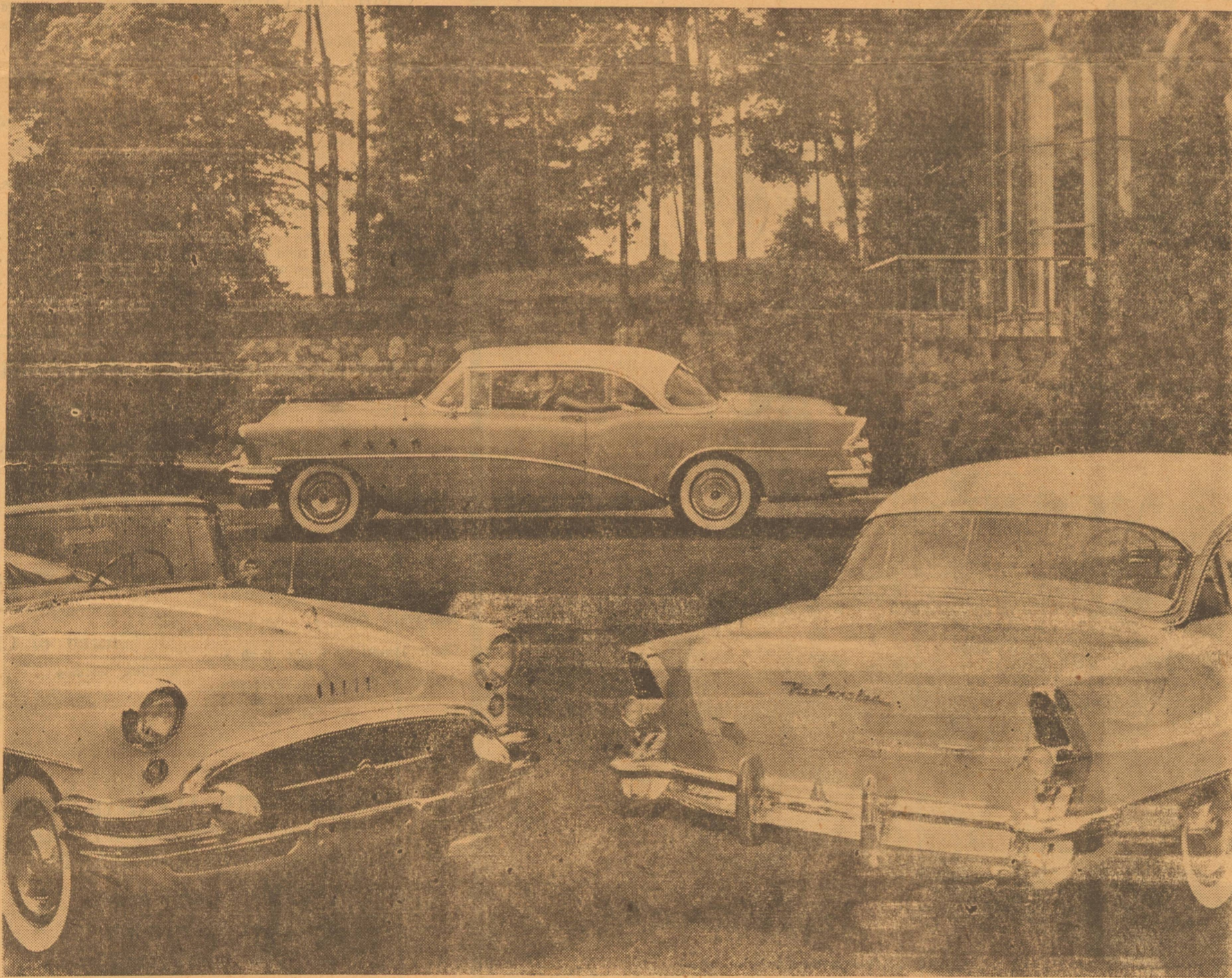


Washington, D. C.—A 1,500-year-old Peruvian skull on which the original surgical dressing of finely woven cotton gauze is held in place by strands of wool, is part of an exhibit showing the evolution of bandages, presented to the National Museum by Johnson & Johnson, the firm which pioneered and developed the manufacturing of sterile surgical dressings and its availability for medical use throughout the world. The display features the type of lint dressings actually used in the Civil War, as well as the first type of wet dressings created, and then takes the viewer all the way through the evolution of bandaging up to the modern sterile bandages presently used in hospitals and homes throughout the world. 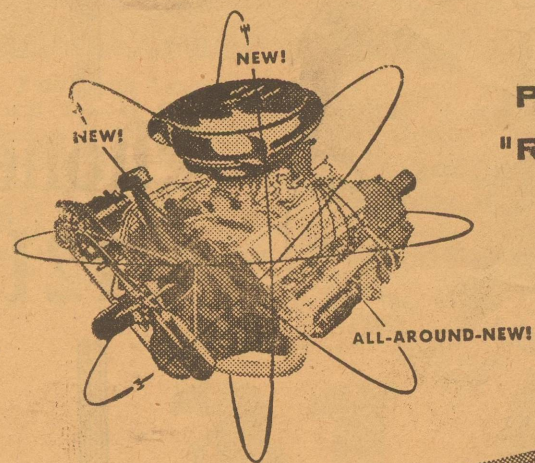

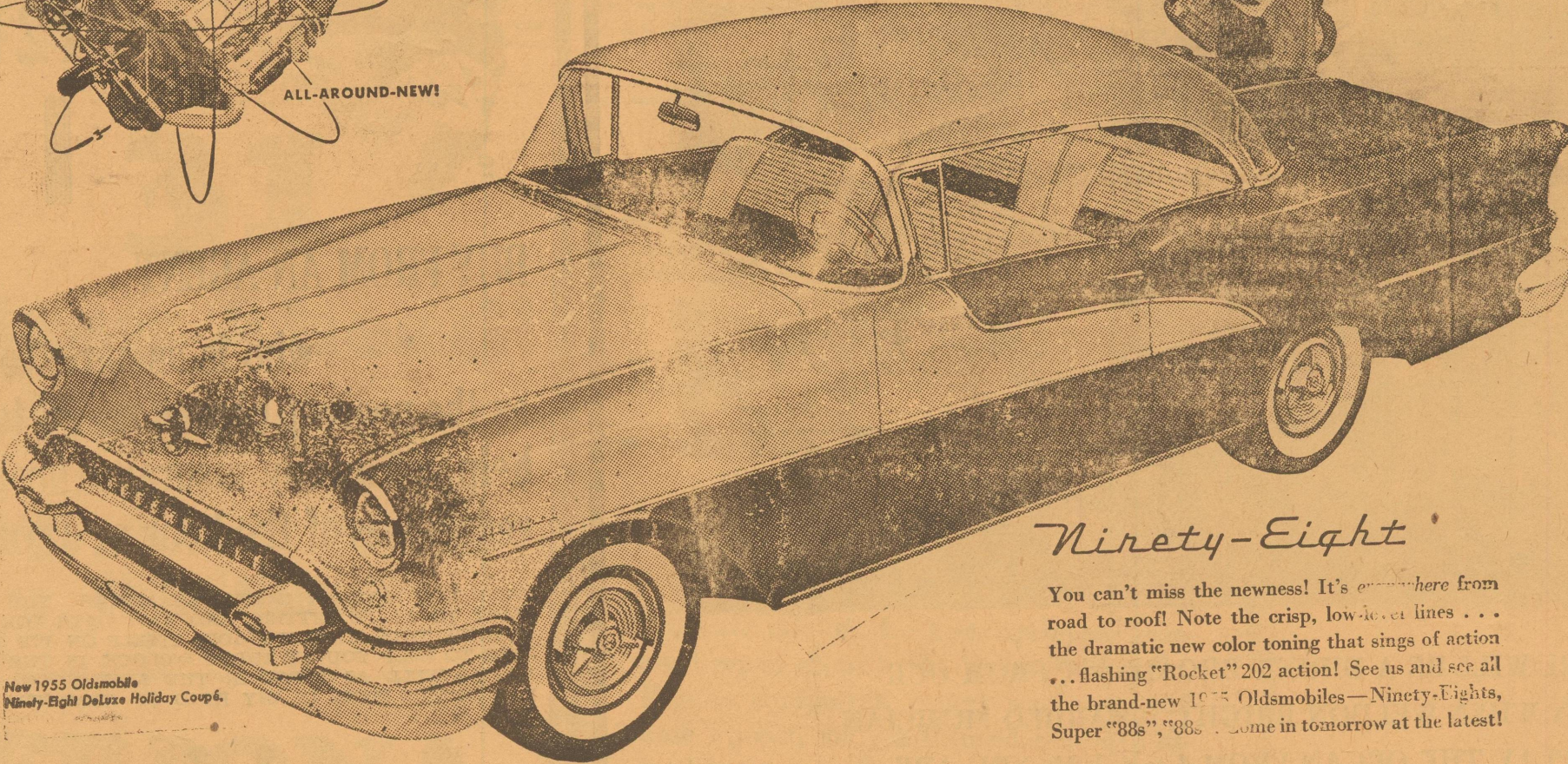

We also had a visit from Mr. Lyle Restine, of Amarillo, who works for the Santa Fe. He was on his way to Bermuda for a visit.

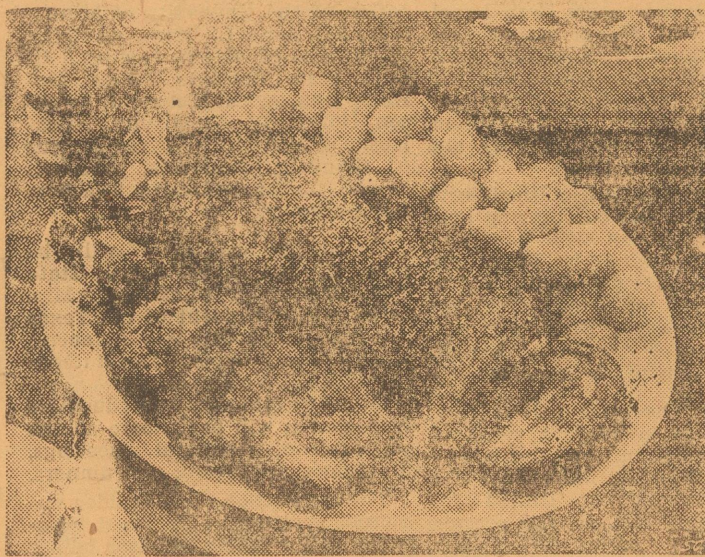

Roll-up Meat Loaf

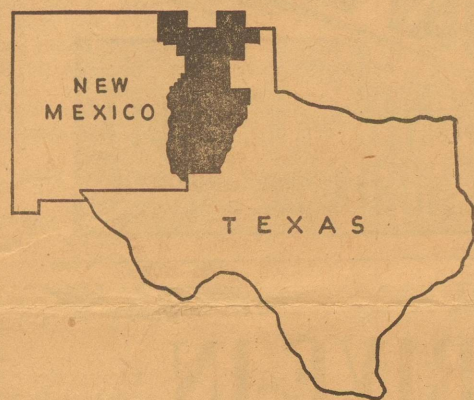

- 2 lbs. ground beef
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 grains pepper
- 1 cup sliced onion
- 2-1/2 cups (1 can) sliced apples
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
- 2 teaspoons sage
- 2 tablespoons sugar

Combine beef, salt and pepper. Roll out to 1/4" thickness between sheets of waxed paper. Remove top paper. Saute onion in shortening until light brown. Drain apples and chop. Combine apples, onion, bread crumbs, sage and sugar. Spread on meat; roll jelly-roll fashion. Place in shallow pan. Bake in moderate oven, 350° F., 1 hour. Yields 6 servings.

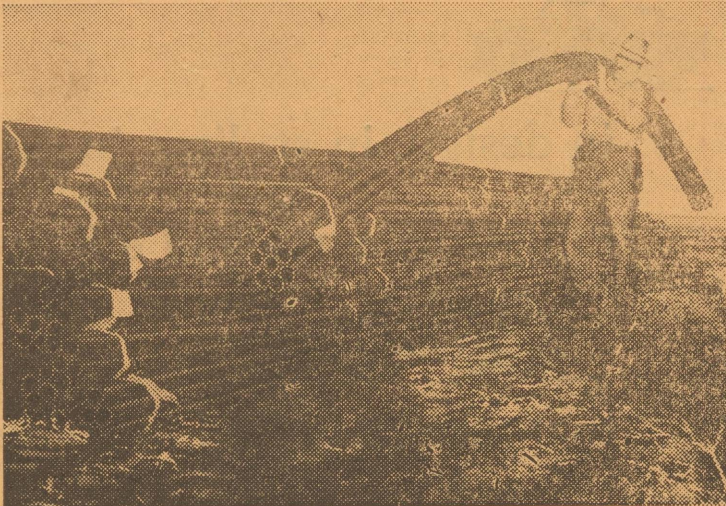

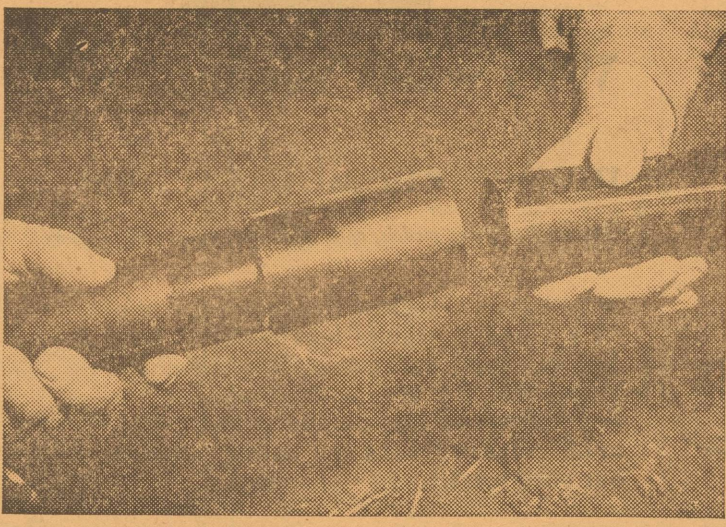

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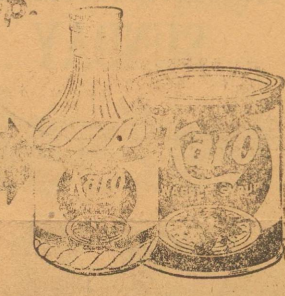

Troester, Jr., executive secretary of the American Association for

Rowe, professor of business education; Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, Illinois; Dr. Esther J. 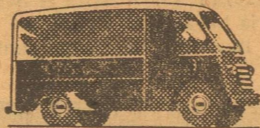

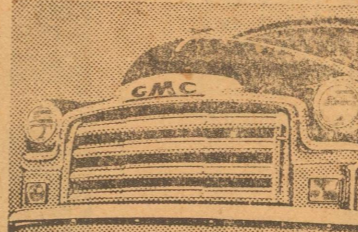
