"Another reason for the continued high cost of food, despite lower farm prices, is the fact that labor costs have increased over the same period that the farmer was receiving less for his produce. Since labor is the most expensive single item in marketing, costs, amounting to more than one-fourth of the consumer's dollar, this has offset the lower prices received

by farmers.' President Ellison praised the increased efficiency in the nation's food distribution system, pointing out that this has been an important factor in preventing the spread between farm prices and consumer prices from becoming wider than it already is.

"Modern method of merchandising and distribution have enabled retail grocers to sell more food cheaper to the American housewife,' he said. "However, th trend toward efficiency has no not kept pace in some food manu facting and processing plants."
