

## Pony Express ready to ride again



## Council, Animal board to try and work out solution



While the specifics are still up in the air, the Big Spring City Council agreed on one thing during its Tuesday night meeting:

There is a "This is serious dog problem in the city.

Council members discussed tethering and chaining dogs, as well as the problems that have recently been seen concerning dogs at large and what several council members described as "breed spe-



cific" problems. While no easy answer to the current problems concerning chained or tethered dogs could be had, Mayor Russ McEwen said it's most certainly a problem in Big Spring and it will be addressed.

## Council OKs \$200 per year, per team local ball field use



## Let's tear down Abu Ghraib

oward the end of an interview with Bob Woodward, President Bush explained what he thought would be the big story of Woodward's book,

"Plan of Attack." The story, Bush said, isn't how he makes decisions, but: "To me, the big news is America has changed how you fight and win war, and therefore makes it easier to keep peace in the long run." Bush was referring to a new U.S. resolve to win the war with Iraq — but with historically low



civilian casualties, even if it meant coalition troops would sus-

tain higher casualties. Now, this war is being undermined by the most dangerous combination known to man: cruelty and stupidity. I refer of course to the gratuitous humiliation, sexual abuse and torture of detainees in Iraq's notorious Abu Ghraib prison by U.S. troops so cretinous that they photographed their crimes for souvenirs. (In addition, authorities are investigating possible homicides of Iraqi detainees, although it is too early to tell

lead.) Thousands of American troops have put their lives on the line to liberate a country of strangers. Their sacrifice should not be overshadowed by the antics of a hand-

where those investigations will

ful of thugs and fools. A New York Times story about victim Hayder Sabbar Abd suggests the damage to America's reputation on the Arab street may not suffer as much as some pundits predict. As horrific as Abd's experience was, Abd had expected to be murdered (something that hap-

pened frequently when Abu Ghraib operated under Saddam Hussein). Abd, who said he was wrongly held and has been released from detention, didn't demand vengeance. Instead, he said that most U.S. troops had treated him well and that he wanted to be compensated and would not refuse an offer to move to America.

That's good.

But what kind of country would America be if our government did nothing to punish criminal behavior by U.S. troops sent to do good abroad? Army Vice Chief of Staff Gen. George Casey called the prison episodes a sign of "a complete breakdown of discipline." But the ritual humiliation of prisoners - in the absence of any intelligence imperative, but just for the kick of hurting others also shows a breakdown of decency and an absolute erosion of the social pact.

**Defense Secretary Donald** Rumsfeld argues that the military had responded appropriately to the prison-abuse allegations before "60 Minutes II" aired the damning photographs. Rumsfeld is right: The brass began investigations into the abuses immediately. It should be noted that probes were ordered before the media got wind of this story.

But Rumsfeld is wrong to think that the military has done enough.

A decision to reach plea agreements with soldiers involved with detainee abuses at Camp Bucca in May 2003 — the worst punishment was a less-than-honorable discharge — may have sent the wrong message. The hapless Army Reserve Brig. Gen. Janis Karpinski, who was in charge of Iraqi detention centers, told Maj. Gen Antonio Taguba — as he was preparing a report requested early in the year, before the story broke

— "the system communicated to soldiers (who mistreat detainees), the worst that's gonna happen is, you're gonna go home."

Yesterday, Maj. Gen. Geoffrey Miller, who is now in charge of detainee camps, invited the Red Cross to keep a close eye on Abu Ghraib to ensure that conditions improve.

Here's a better suggestion: Tear

it down. The Taguba report also notes

that the detention camps are overcrowded — and that many prisoners should not have been detained or now merit release. The jails are understaffed, and it doesn't help that they don't separate insurgents from career criminals. It's a recipe for disaster.

Besides, it's bad juju to set up house in a one-time torture/assassination factory. Put impressionable minds in that madhouse, and they might get bad ideas. Continuing to use Abu Ghraib to incarcerate Iraqis sent the wrong message. What, if anything, were they thinking?

Washington has to act. There will be a probe, and there will be trials, as there should be. But there also should be some permanent deconstruction in Iraq.

The French tore down the Bastille. Let Iraqi civilians, led by Hayder Sabbar Abd and the children of Hussein's slain opponents, join with U.S. troops who worked in Abu Ghraib and tear down the house of woe.



## Twisters derail train in Panhandle, damage Conroe buildings By The Associated Press

and businesses in Conroe, tearing roofs from some structures, and one tornado derailed a freight train in the Texas Panhandle. The force of the twister

knocked a slate roof from a Conroe hotel and embedded it into a car dealership's wall Tuesday afternoon, emergency workers said.

Employees of the Gullo Ford-Mercury dealership along Interstate 45 saw the tornado race across the west side of the freeway about 4:15 p.m.

"It seemed like it formed right in front of us with the swirling and stuff flying up in the air," Cindy Spears, a dealership employee, told the Houston Chronicle in Wednesday's editions.

But the twister missed her car distributorship, instead damaging the Gullo Hass Toyota dealership across the freeway.

A medical professional building, motels, apartments, restaurants and a lumber yard were also damaged, said Conroe Department Battalion Chief Tommy Bowen. A church's roof

was also blown off. commercial Sixteen properties and 18 houses were damaged, Bowen said. He said many trees were blown down, causing much of the damage.

No injuries were reported, said Bowen, although

A damage estimate was not yet available.

Crews used a front-end loader and chain saws to move trees from roads to allow Emergency Medical Service and fire department personnel to reach the damaged sites.

Roofs of many homes in Conroe's Rivershire subdivision were damaged. Roofer Lewis Powell helped place plastic and plywood on the damaged roof of his house and

dwellings.

"Obviously, I'm there, so I had to make a quick response," Powell said, adding he got supplies late Tuesday afternoon from a roofing supply store that had already closed for the day. "When you got somebody in need, you do what you can for them."

Powell and neighbors placed plastic and plywood over holes in roofs of some homes to protect residents from the elements.



## Guilty or not, Bryant hits for 42 in win over Spurs

It's obviously doing wonders for his psyche. And for the Los Angeles Lakers.

After spending most of the last two days in a Colorado courtroom, Bryant scored 15 of his 42 points in the fourth quarter Tuesday night, leading the Lakers to a 98-90 victory over the San Antonio Spurs to Western even the Conference semifinals 2-

Shaquille O'Neal added points and 14 rebounds for the Lakers, who won by outscoring the Spurs 55-37 after halftime.

As dominant as O'Neal was for a second straight game, Bryant was the

story. "I don't see how he does it," O'Neal said. "He's a fabulous player, probably the best player that ever played the game, especially with all the stuff he's been going through. And it was a fabulous night for him, a memorable night."

Game 5 in the best-ofseven series will be Thursday night in San Saturday night at Staples Center.

Bryant pleaded not guilty to his sexual assault charge in Eagle, when the teams met in the Spurs' 13.

noon, and arrived in plenty of time for the game and got in about an hour of sleep.
