More Diseases Yield to New Antibiotic "Wonder Drugs"

Medical research in the field of antibiotics, the so-called "miracle jugs." continues to produce ever new wonders. Scarcely was penicillin established some 10 years ago as the drug that tamed dreaded pneumonia into an ailment of relative insignificance, than other antibiotics ropped into the limelight. There was aureomycin, terramycin, streptomycin and tetracycline, each a kil- -

ler of specific types of bacteria and all helping mankind to rid itself of plagues and infections.

Recently the world was given a impse into more antibiotic miracles in the making. Some 500 doctors, among them leading scientific representatives from 36 countries, journeyed to Washington, D. C., to report and listen to the latest in antibiotic investigation. This exchange of information took place at the second annual Antibiotic Symposium held Oct. 25-29 under the auspices of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and the Journal of Antibiotics and Chemother-

apy Among the highlights from the reports read:

• More than half of the prescriptions written today are for antibiotics. Clinical evidence is continuing to pile up as regards the effectiveness of antibiotics against an ever-greater number of diseases, including infections likely to develop during childbirth or surgery

• Antibiotics are now being employed to speed the growth of undernourished children with special problems in physical development. Small doses of terramycin combined with certain vitamins

are reported to have produced dramatic results in growth.



• A cautious hope on the possibilities of having antibiotics deal a death blow to cancer was provided in a preliminary report by Dr. John B. Field, of New York. He found Actinomycin C reduces tumors in mice one fourth to one half the size of those in mice that are untreated by this antibiotic.

• Man's meat supply is also to benefit from antibiotics. Aureomycin and terramycin administered as food supplements to pigs and other livestock are now being commercially employed; this has resulted in a 12 to 22 per cent pig




