### Kerry concedes after it appears he cannot take Ohio

The Associated Press WASHINGTON - President Bush won a second term from a divided and anxious nation, his promise of steady, strong wartime leadership trumping fresh-start Kerry's John approach to Iraq and joblessness. After a long, tense night of vote counting, the Democrat called Bush this morning to concede Ohio and the presidency, The Associated Press learned.



# Incumbents hold on in wake of GOP victories

There will be no changing of the guard in Howard County. That's the message sent by

area voters Tuesday, as incumbents in all five contested races took the electoral nod.

In the race for Howard County Sheriff, incumbent Democratic candidate Dale Walker took 55 percent of the vote with 5,705 ballots, while Republican challenger Ronald Allen took 41 percent of the vote with 4,339.

Walker, who only four years ago challenged an incumbent and won, said this election has been an eye opener for him.

"I'm definitely seeing it from a different angle — as an incumbent — this time," said Walker. "You certainly take it a lot more personal."

Walker, who seemed pleased with the victory but surprised by the margin, said he plans to make some improvements in his office over the next term, the most important of

which is improving communication between the HCSO and the communities it serves.

"I believe we have some work to do. We know what some of our weak areas are, and all we can do is change a few things," said Walker. "We've heard from the people tonight by those votes, and they are sending a message as well, and it's something we can work on in the Sheriff's Office.

"One thing I'd like to do is have better communications from each community with the Sheriff's Office. We're not real sure how to do that right now - whether it should be a committee or something of that sort - we need more input from the communities to have a better idea what their needs are before they

votes during Tuesday's election, putting him over 93,688 ballots and Stenholm's Libertarian candidate Dr. Richard Peterson's 3,529 votes.

In Howard County, Neugebauer brought in 5,712 votes and 55 percent of the county's ballots, while Stenholm earned 4,373 votes and Peterson contributed 77 ballots to the race.

Neugebauer said he was humbled, but not surprised, by the outpouring of support he received from voters throughout the 19th Congressional District and Howard County.

"The polls began to show the gap between myself and my opponent as we got closer to the election," said Neugebauer. "And while we were grateful to see that in the polls, the ultimate poll was Tuesday evening.

"We have a lot to do. We'll celebrate tonight, but we have to finish the cur: rent session and we have another right around the corner. There are still a lot of important issues at hand, the most important right now being the Big Spring VA Medical Center. I'm just excited to be part of that process."

Stenholm, who ended his 13-term streak in Congress with the loss, said he





Martin County overwhelmingly wanted another four years for President George W. **Bush and Vice President** Cheney. Dick The Republicans got 83.52 percent of the vote, 1,511 total, to the John Edwards Kerry/John team's 293 votes.

In keeping with the rest of District 11, Martin County selected Republican Mike Conaway as its new U.S. Representative. Conaway got 1,327 votes to Wayne Democrat Raasch's 230.

front porch of her home when she yelled to some goats at least 300 yards away. The piercing sound shot across the meadow like a lightning bolt. The goats heard her and started walking toward the house.

Suzanne got her first goat in 1990 at an antique auction.

"They had a novelty item for sale. It was a box with a live goat in it. I bought the little white goat which was about two months old. I didn't know if it was a boy or girl and really wasn't sure how to tell the difference. Turned out it was a little female. Because I don't like the terms Billys and Nannies, I named her Billie."

She got another goat and named

him Bob. They had a kid, Bonnie Bell. Now Suzanne has lots of goats.

The Goat Lady of McCulloch county

"I have about 600 adults and about a hundred eleven kids on the ground.'

She raises meat goats.

"The demand far exceeds the supply. If every goat in this country, meat, milk or hair of every breed were slaughtered, it could not meet the demand."

Five years ago, some stores in San Antonio put out a call for goats.

"The HEB stores in San Antonio alone were looking for 700 goats a week and they couldn't find anyone to provide them."

She says goat meat is healthy. "It has less cholesterol and lower calories. It rates better in every category than even chicken or turkey.'

Suzanne has a goat camp in October which attracts people from all over the country. The week ends with a goat barbecue.

"It's about educating people. I'm interested in seeing an American meat goat industry develop. We

import hundreds of thousands of tons a year of frozen goat meat from New Zealand and Australia. We can't begin to supply what we need. We're not yet on the ground floor of the industry. We're in the basement."

Suzanne did real estate leasing in Houston for 27 years. Now she loves the country. You couldn't get her back to the city.

"I lived in a town house. Never had a pet in my life until 1988." She says there's nothing cuter than a baby goat.

"I say they have springs in their legs. When they get to be about two or three days old they discover that their legs work together and they jump in the air and they turn about a hundred and eighty degrees and drop down. And they're so pleased with themselves."

All of Suzanne's goats have names. She has a system for naming them.

The babies have names starting with the first letter of their mom's name.'

Justice delayed and delayed and delayed

wenty years ago, San Francisco auto broker Paul Cosner disappeared. Cosner's sister Sharon Sellitto told the police her brother was missing, but they wouldn't come to his apartment. Police, however, did show up

when she reported his 1980 Honda Prelude stolen. It was that car that ended of one of California's most heinous killing sprees seven months later. Killers Leonard

Lake and Charles Ng had been driving the car when they were caught shoplifting in South San Francisco.

Ng escaped, but police nabbed Lake, who swallowed a cyanide pill and died.

Police then traced the bullet-riddled car to the missing Cosner. The investigation led to the Calaveras County, Calif., home of Lake and Ng. Grisly remains and horrific videotapes soon revealed that Lake and Ng had sexually tortured women and killed as many as 20 people, including babies.

Sellitto's nightmare had changed. For months, she lived with dread about her brother's fate. She had paid his rent, his utilities and his phone bill in the hope that he would return.

Now, while Cosner's body was not identified, Sellitto realized her brother was dead. But she didn't know if his fugitive killer would encounter true justice.

Twenty years later, the answer to that question still isn't clear.

After the shoplifting incident, Ng escaped to Canada, where he was arrested for shooting a security guard while shoplifting. It quickly became clear that while Ng wasn't a competent petty thief, he was a virtuoso at gaming the legal system. For six years, until 1991, Ng evaded extradition to the United

States.

What no one could have guessed is that, upon his return. Ng used legal maneuvers — suing lawyers, firing lawyers, rehiring lawyers and challenging judges - to delay his own trial for another seven years. His defense budget bankrolled nine full-time workers

to help his defense. But all of Ng's horses and all of

Ng's men couldn't beat the overwhelming evidence against him. Ng and Lake, you see, liked to videotape themselves torturing female victims. In July 1999, an Orange County jury found Ng guilty in the murder of six men, three women and two babies and sentenced Ng to death. To Sellitto's dismay, the jury deadlocked on the murder of Paul Cosner — even though it was his car that brought the killing spree to an end.

In 2001, a San Francisco judge declared that Cosner died at the hands of Lake and Ng. That helped Cosner's family move on, Sellitto told the San Francisco Chronicle at the time.

Except that Sellitto doesn't see how she can move on when Ng's capital sentence seems more mirage than reality. It has been more than five years since a jury found Ng guilty. Five years later, Ng is no closer to his execution. date. Ng has an automatic appeal to his sentence - but no lawyer. And as long as his appeal is pending (or unfiled), the state can't execute him. It's like Canada all over again.

Why the delay? Robert Reichman, a staff attorney with the California Supreme Court, explained that the State Public Defender had a conflict of interest and could not prosecute. So the court is negotiating with a premier private attorney.

Why five years? Reichman noted that Ng's case "is neither unduly delayed or put off compared to other cases with a similar judgment of death." For you nonlawyers, that means that it's customary for capital killers to enjoy a five-year reprieve before they begin the appeals process. Ng is getting a lawyer now, because his case was in a long line that covers death sentences issued in 1999 and 2000.

To which Sellitto, 20 years after her brother's abduction, replied: "Unbelievable, and it's unacceptable.'

Reichman explained that there aren't enough qualified attorneys to handle the volume of deathpenalty sentences meted out in California. There were 23 last year.

Still, it's hard to believe the state couldn't speed things up if fast appeals were a priority - especially since appellate work pays well.

As Sellitto noted, death-penalty opponents frequently cite the cost of the appeals process as an argument against capital punishment. "This is what makes it expensive," she noted.

No lie. When Charles Ng was on trial, the courts found lawyers to work with him, a staff, investigators, everything - and taxpayers were stuck with the huge tab.

Now that Ng is facing execution for the gruesome murder of innocent people, there's a five-year wait to find him a lawyer. Five years on death row to inflate the cost of prosecuting Ng. The worst of it is, Ng had to get creative to buy years of delay in Canada and before his trial here. This time, Ng doesn't have to get creative. The system is doing his work for him.

Dirk Nowitzki, however, remains the key to that story's plot.

With the Mavericks now tailored around him for the first time, Nowitzki responded by scoring 29 of his 33 points over the first three quarters, helping them to a steady lead, then making clutch plays on both ends of the court in the final half-minute to preserve a 107-98 victory over the Sacramento Kings Tuesday night.

"The way this team is set up, the ball is going to go through Dirk," teammate Michael Finley said. "We need him to give us that. He's really stepping up and taking that role." Nowitzki assisted on the game's first basket and scored the second one. Nowitzki, meanwhile, made five of his first six shots. He had 10 points in the first and second quarters, and a buzzerbeater gave him nine in the third: He took only one shot in the fourth, finishing 12-of-19. He made both his 3-point attempts and had 10 rebounds and five assists.

"I felt good right from the warmups," - said Nowitzki, who shot under the watchful eye of his German mentor. "I tried to be aggressive and make things happen."

Harris had eight points and seven assists. He showed his poise by making a nice pass to Michael Finley for a dunk that made it 103-93. He also held Mike Bibby to just eight points.

# **Cowboys win other election as Arlington says yes**

Associated Press Writer ARLINGTON - Hang up your cleats and make yourselves comfortable, Dallas Cowboys. This will soon be your new home.

The NFL's most storied franchise scored a major victory at the polls Tuesday — to the tune of \$325 million — as voters in this city halfway between Dallas and Fort Worth approved paying for half of a 75,000-seat,

retractable-roof stadium. "This is a historic moment for America's Team and for the economy of the region," said Rob Allyn, head of the public relations firm that handled the pro-stadium for the campaign Cowboys.

The decision means the Cowboys will move to Arlington when the team's lease at Texas Stadium in Irving, where Dallas has played since 1971, expires in 2008.

Jerry!" greeted Cowboys owner Jerry Jones at a victory rally by the Vote Yes! A Win for Arlington Committee, the pro-stadium group into which the team pumped more than \$5 million

"Well, I'm going to be brief. You know that's hard for me to do, but if I can stay in the closet as long as I have stayed in it. the last few weeks, I can do it," joked Jones, the billionaire owner who

the campaign as the antistadium No Jones Tax Coalition accused him of seeking "corporate welfare."

With all of Arlington's ballots counted Tuesday night, 55 percent of voters supported the city's proposition to increase sales, hotel and motel, and car-rental taxes to lure the Cowboys.

"The Cowboys won this game," said Warren Norred, a leader of the No

The \$650 million stadium will be built next to the Texas Rangers' Ameriquest Field and near the Six Flags Over Texas amusement park, creating what city leaders envision as a sports and entertainment mecca. Arlington is about 15 miles west of Dallas.

# Spurs reach long-term agreement with point guard

Associated Press Writer SAN ANTONIO Before last season, the San Antonio Spurs wanted to push Tony Parker aside to make room for Jason Kidd at point, guard.

This week the Spurs made a big commitment 22-year-old to the Frenchman: a six-year contract extension reportedly worth \$66 million.

The deal was finalized late Monday night, within a few hours of the league's signing deadline. Had an agreement not been reached, Parker would have become a restricted free agent at the end of this season.

"I'm very, very happy. There has been a lot of stress the last couple of days, and I'm just so happy it's hard to express in words," Parker said Tuesday at a news conference. "The last two or three days I thought it was finished and was not going to happen."

For San Antonio, the

signing locks up the team's top three players Parker, two-time MVP Duncan Tim and Argentine guard Manu Ginobili – for the rest of the decade.

Duncan signed a sevenyear, \$122 million deal last year, while Olympic gold medalist Ginobili agreed in July to a sixyear pact estimated at \$52 million.

Negotiations between the Spurs and Parker bogged down as the signing deadline approached, and on Monday, an agreement did not look likely. Team chairman Peter Holt had dug in his heels on his offer of \$64 million over six years, while Parker gradually lowered his price to \$66 million in an effort to get the deal done.

"It was just time for me to make the right decision, and I'm glad I did," Holt said. "Tony is a key component to our success over the last three years. I started looking at that and realizing how important he is to this team."

with Spurs coach Gregg Popovich, said publicly that he wanted to stay with the Spurs. He said had urged him to test his scorer behind Duncan year NBA career. value on the free-agent market.

"Every year we are going to play in the playoffs and every year we have a shot to win the championship," Parker said. "That's most important for me. It's not making \$85 million and playing for the Hawks or the Clippers and be sad every day.'

Popovich, who led the effort to land Kidd after the 2002-03 season, helped to persuade Holt to sign Parker. So did Duncan, and Parker is eager to show his appreciation.

"I'm just going to pass him the ball a little bit more," Parker said.

The Spurs drafted Parker, then 19 and playing in France, in 2001.

As the youngest player ever for San Antonio, the team planned to bring him along slowly. Five

#### Taking care of your car makes good sense. Good maintenance means a safer, more reliable and more economical vehicle. Here are a few tips for taking good care of your automobile:

- BRAKES: Brakes should not pull to one side, squeal or feel soft.
- BATTERY: Your battery and charging system should be performance tested before taking on the increased power demands of winter driving. Battery terminals should be free of corrosion.
- BULBS: All lights, including flashers, signals, brake lights and trunk lights, should be functioning properly.
- FILTERS: Air, oil and transmission filters should be checked and, if necessary, replaced.
- FLUIDS: Make sure antifreeze, oil, windshield, radiator, transmission, power steering. battery and brake fluids are filled.
- HEATER: Test your car's heating system before the cold weather arrives.
- HOSES & BELTS: Make sure belts are not too tense and hoses and clamps are not leaking or weak.
- TIRES: Tire pressure, treads and wheel balance should be checked. Also, examine your spare tire for leaks.
- UNDERBODY: Inspect exhaust system for leaks and lubricate steering linkage components.
