The Associated Press discovered this scholastic situation from a routine check of Austin news sources, the files of the Texas Education Agency in this instance. Facts were gathered and verified, and the "more than hot" news story was distributed last week via wire and newsletter under the AP credit line. And now, feature syndicates are clamoring for more details. On Monday, Mr. Yoder of the television newscast service, Telenews, called your editor from Dallas, revealing his approaching trip to Friona to make an on-the-spot telecast of the children in the Friona schools.

We have known, of course, of the two to five Negro children being served in our schools for a partial term this year. NEW BULLETIN ON GRAIN STORAGE AVAIBALLE

COLLEGE STATION. - Once farm-stored grain is dried to safe moisture limits, certain practices should be followed to assure quality during storage. This statement keynotes a new bulletin by the Texas Agricultural Extension Serv-

The publication, Maintaining Quality of Farm Dried and Stored Grain, makes these recommendations on insuring the quality of

stored grain: 1. When drying is completed, reverse the fans to pull air down through the grain.

2. Check the grain temperature t least once each week.

3. Check the moisture content of

the grain monthly. 4. Aerate as often as is necessary.
5. Check insect activity at least twice monthly and fumigate when

6. And keep records on grain temperature and moisture content. Copies of the bulletin, L-233, which goes into each of the points in detail, is available from the local county agent's office.




