Hospital Construction Gets Green Light; Materials to Begin Arriving in 30 Days

Construction of a new Parmer County Community Hospital will be underway within 30 days.


That was the disclosure made public by hospital authorities after the Monday night board meeting of this week.

Elmo Jones, Littlefield builder who has supervised a large number of Friona building projects in recent years, was retained on salary basis to superintendent the hospital construction, ordering materials and managing the job.

Rejection of all bids for construction was made in unanimous board action. The recent bids by seven general contractors, six plumbing firms and three electrical contractors were turned down. Lowest of the general bids was over \$190,000, with high bid some \$40,000 greater.

A board member spokesman explained the action of the board by emphasizing belief that greater economy could be effected through the approved plan, and that greater control could be exercised over the actual construction in benefit to the scores of local people who have supported the building program with donations.

Jones has supervised such local jobs as the Friona State Bank, Elk Drive-In Theatre, the Baptist Church units built in recent years, the Wright Williams building now under construction, the Osborn building underway, and other notable projects.

parently can not. The Pennsylvania Turnpike, with a 70-mile-an hour maximum, has three times the accident death rate of the New York Thruway, whose limit is 60 miles an hour. Excessive speed continues to be the principal cause of highway deaths in all analyses of crashes.

We do not imagine, however, that the light blinking is of much concern to the highway patrol. Its mission is to control speeds, and not primarily the hailing of drivers into court. The purpose of highway signs announcing radar con-trol is to induce motorists to drive within legal limits. If the signaling system the drivers are using succeeds in checking high speeds, the police may find it expedient to en-list the aid of a few traffic conscious motorists to drive blinker patrols when no radar is about. false alarm ought to serve as well as a true alarm in slowing traffic down. One determined blinker could mess up the warning system. A hundred or so could frustrate it completely.
