



TEXAS LAND VALUES UP 2 PER CENT-\$70.20 AN ACRE

COLLEGE STATION.—Purchase price of Texas farm and ranch land in 1954 was two per cent more than in 1953, or an average of \$70.20 an acre.

Although this slight gain represented a new price level, the number of sales dropped to the lowest level since 1940 and the acreage transferred was the smallest in land market record history.

"Continued drouth, decreases in agricultural prices, acreage allot-ments and 'tight' holdings of land tended to depress land market ac-tivity," William G. Adkins, agricultural economist at Texas A.&M. College, explained. Fewer Veterans Land Board purchases and modifications of that program helped push sales volume down.

Attempts to enlarge units, demand for irrigated acreages, mineral activity and urban and industrial development were factors tending to increase market ac-

Adkins reported that owner-operators were the principle buyers in 1954 and farm size continued to grow. Tenants made only 10 percent of the purchases. "Familytype" farm units continued to be in strong demand, bringing premium

Land price increases were most significant in the Panhandle wheat, High Plains cotton and Lower Rio Grande Valley areas. Price declines were notable in the Upper Rio Grande Valley irrigated area, the Post-Oak country and in the Rolling Plains.
