

Finance? State legislators keep educators guessing

Ask Michael Downes, and he will tell you that the Big Spring Independent School District will have a budget in place for the next school year.

Ask him the details of said budget, however, and Downes joins thousands of school administrators in Texas who are currently at a loss for words on the subject.

School districts across the

state are playing a waiting game of sorts as they watch to see what kind of school finance package finally clears the Texas Legislature.

Downes will update BSISD trustees on lawmakers' efforts toward crafting a new school finance bill when they hold their monthly meeting at 5:15 p.m. Thursday in the high school board room.

Educators' uncertainty as to what kind of school reform package will eventually be

adopted is certainly excusable, because in the past 24 hours, the Texas Senate has done a

180-degree turn in their approach to the problem.

The Senate committee bill that was introduced yesterday called for a state property tax to finance public schools in Texas. That approach was ditched, however, and a method adopted closer to what passed the state House earlier this year.

The new Senate financing bill calls for a cut in property taxes, with the difference made up in a combination of taxes on businesses and various goods and

services, such as cigarettes and alcohol.

That does not necessarily mean, however, that Texans' tax bills will be lower.

Despite property tax relief, a legislative study released earlier this week reported that only 10 percent of the highest earning Texans, those who make \$140,000 or more annually, would see a net tax reduction under the proposal. All Texans

Joint law enforcement facility, rationale for large jail debated

As the Howard County commissioners move forward in planning and designing a new joint law enforcement center, the court heard a number of objections from a local resident during its Tuesday morning meeting.

Area resident Frank Parker debated with commissioners and project architect Phil Furqueron on the size and cost of the proposed facility, questioning how wise a 140-plus bed jail is for Howard County.

"A jail isn't the most desirable way to spend money," said Parker. "It's not going to be a place where we're wanting to take people around and show them what a fine jail we have. We want to take them around and show them what a fine school we have. When you commit to \$10 million or \$12 million on this jail, it's going to stop other bond issues and capital expansions from other entities in the county. Once we do this, you stop the prospects

of building schools and doing other things in both the city and the county."

Parker suggested slimming down the jail capacity to 90-plus beds and forgetting about making it a joint law enforcement center, which would house both the Howard County Sheriff's Office and the Big Spring Police Department.

"What if you only built enough jail space to meet the current requirements and forgot about the joint law enforcement center?" said Parker. "It's all a matter of money. You're going to spend a

half-million dollars a year on debt service. Do we save enough to justify that? That's the real question."

Furqueron called the idea "foolish," saying the long-term indications and future costs of building on to the facility more than justify the facility in its current design.

"That would be foolish," said Furqueron. "Over the long term, by reducing the staff, you will save money. Ten years from now, what's going to cost more — paying for bricks and mortar 10 years ago, or paying for 10 years worth of salaries? The salaries will be what's escalating. Any time you can cut personnel over the long term, that's where you're going to save money."

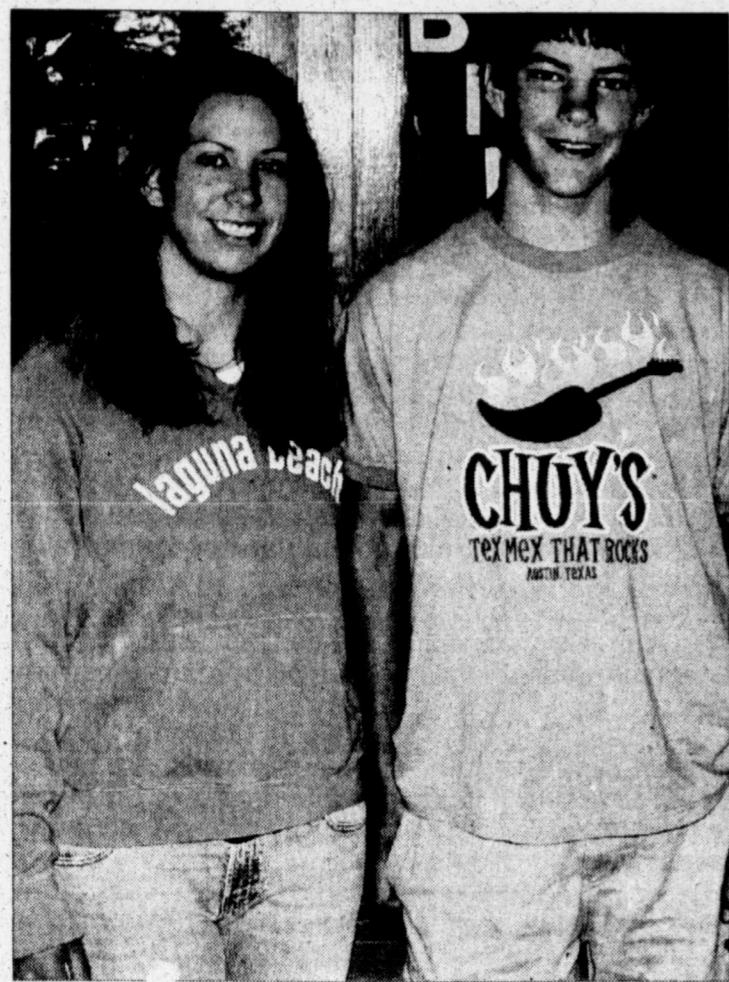

PD investigates senior center burglary

The Big Spring Police Department is investigating a break-in at the Spring City Senior Citizens Center that happened over the weekend. According to Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer for the BSPD, the thieves made away with an undisclosed amount of cash from the center sometime between 11 p.m. on Friday and

noon on Saturday, but not before causing a considerable amount of damage. "They went from room to room," said Everett, "and caused a great deal of criminal mischief throughout the facility. The damage is considerable." According to Yolanda Mendoza, assistant director of the center, the thieves gained access through an exhaust fan located in the rear of the

building. "They busted part of the fan out and crawled in through that area," Mendoza told Howard County commissioners this week. Everett said the burglary is still under investigation, and is being handled by Det. Jim Rider. Crimestoppers is authorized to pay up to \$1,000 cash for information leading to the arrest and indictment of any person

who make less than \$100,000 would see a net tax increase under the measure, according to the report by the Legislative Budget Board. The Senate still has to pass the school reform part of the package, and the differences between its bills and those in the House must be hammered out quickly if the Legislature is to finish its business by the end of the regular session May 30. Which means the uncertainty among school offi-

cials continue. "There's 19 days left in the (regular) session," Downes said. "There's no telling what's going to happen." And any school reform package passed by the Legislature is sure to be eyed closely by the courts. The Legislature is under pressure to revamp school funding after state district Judge John Dietz ordered that if the violations aren't fixed by October 2005, Texas must stop funding public education. Attorneys for the state appealed Dietz's ruling directly to the Texas

Supreme Court, which will hear oral arguments July 6. Regardless of what happens in Austin, however, BSISD has a budget to prepare, and work is proceeding in that regard, Downes said. "We are preparing next year's budget on the assumption that we'll be operating under current law," he said. "And we feel certain that if we start the budget process with that in mind, we'll be safe." Going by a "worst-case" scenario, Downes estimates the district, regardless of financing formula used, will have at least as

much money in the coming school year as it currently has. In other business, trustees will: • Elect new officers. • Consider resignations, retirements and employments. • Hear a report from Downes on district enrollment, plans for a 2005-06 budget workshop and the Summer Leadership Institute. Police accuse father of killing daughter, friend

ZION, Ill. (AP) — When the father of a missing 8-year-old found her bloodied body in a ravine, next to her lifeless best friend, it seemed every parent's worst nightmare. Jerry Hobbs, just out of prison a few weeks, led police to the girls himself. They wanted to know how he found them. They kept asking him questions. Finally, after hours of being interviewed, Hobbs was charged with both murders, a crime that stunned this small city near the Wisconsin line. "I think it's safe to say his reaction to questions piqued the officers' interest to question him further," prosecutor Michael Waller said in announcing the charges Tuesday. Hobbs' 8-year-old daughter, Laura Hobbs, and her friend Krystal Tobias, 9, were found dead Monday. Both girls had been beaten and stabbed multiple times and left to die in the woods. Waller would not discuss possible motives for the killings but said details would come out when Hobbs appeared at a bond hearing Wednesday. He said he couldn't comment on whether Hobbs confessed. "This horrific crime has terrorized and traumatized the Zion community and, I think it's safe to say, people of good will everywhere," Waller said. "There's no rational explanation or reasonable

motive that can be ascribed to an act of horror like this." He told NBC's "Today" on Wednesday that there had been "a minor discipline problem" with Laura, but it had been resolved and was not considered the motive. Hobbs, 34, took authorities to the bodies just off a bike path early Monday, claiming he had spotted them while searching for the girl with Laura's grandfather, Arthur Hollabaugh. Hobbs was questioned through the day Monday and again Tuesday. The county coroner, Richard Keller, said the girls were found side-by-side, facing up and did not appear to have been sexually assaulted. They appeared to have been killed near where they were found, he said. "If it was him, then good thing they brought him down," said Krystal's 15-year-old brother, Alberto Segura. "We never thought a father would do that to a daughter. They were just babies. They didn't do anything wrong." Hobbs has an extensive criminal history dating to 1990 in Texas, including arrests for assault and resisting arrest, according to records kept by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Just last month, he was released from a Texas prison after serving time for an assault in 2001.

Sheriff Dale Walker was quick to point out that any positions lost through the joint effort — including positions in both departments' records, dispatching and booking — would be by attrition only. "No one is going to lose their jobs as a result of this," said Walker. "The positions would be removed as a matter of attrition. In other words, the position wouldn't cease to exist until it became vacant." Commissioner Bill Crooker said there are other capacity considerations on the court's table that aren't yet visible to the public. "We're not at liberty at this point and time to go into detail, but we've begun negotiations to house anywhere from 20 to 30 federal prisoners," said Crooker. Parker voiced concerns over the cost of transporting prisoners from the jail, which is currently across the street from the District Courthouse, if it is moved across town, as well as the space it will free-up at the county courthouse. "What will we do with the space (at the county courthouse) when we move out of it?" asked Parker. "Are we just going to have two floors in this courthouse that are going to be blocked off? What's the city going to do with their building? And if we are going to do

something with them, what's the cost going to be?" Furqueron said the matter of transportation is a moot point when you compare two blocks to two miles. "Unless you can build a jail immediately around the District Court building, you're going to have to have a van," said Furqueron. "Marching them (prisoners) a block or two down the street isn't going to be acceptable. You have to ask whether it's going to cost that much more to go two blocks or two miles. Unless we can tear down the Methodist Church, Allan's Furniture or Drew Mouton's office, we're going to have to look outside of downtown. We would need two blocks, just for the building." Commissioner Jerry Kilgore said he and the rest of the court have scoured the city and beyond for a suitable site, and the current location at the intersection of FM 700 and Martin Luther King Boulevard is by far the best solution. "We've looked all over this town — even outside of town," said Kilgore. "Initially, I wanted to see if we could do a little bit of urban renewal and build it downtown. But

we have problems with flood zones in one part, and the other parts would require purchasing the land, blocking off some streets — in the end it would cost something like \$2 million more just to build it downtown. "The location we have right now, everyone seems to think it would be much cheaper. You can get to all parts of town because the way the highways are situated. It fits DPS, coming off the Interstate, better... You have to take all of that into consideration." Kilgore said he's pleased with the headway the court and project leaders have made over the past several months, but the hardest part lies ahead. "They've been tweaking the requirements between the sheriff and the police chief," said Kilgore. "They have put together an initial set of plans and moved that around. Right now were just working on those two aspects of the project. We haven't really started on the jail portion of the building yet. "We've had to slow down a little bit over the past couple of weeks to look at everything and make changes. But we're moving along at a good pace and we're getting it done. We're right on

schedule." As for the cost of the facility, Kilgore said patience is most certainly a virtue. "We really don't have any idea yet," said Kilgore. "I have a very rough idea, but we really don't know what it's going to be yet. What they're working on right now will be the cheapest part of it. It will be the offices, which is basically just studs and sheet rock. When we get into the jail, it's going to be a lot heavier materials. We're trying to get the square footage down right now and just see what the requirements are going to be."

Entire community becomes victim of latest break-ins

It happened again over the weekend — an agency designed to benefit the citizens of our community targeted by thieves.

This time it was the Spring City Senior Citizens Center, which was burglarized sometime late Friday night or early Saturday morning.

Burglars broke into the Senior Center through an exhaust fan located in the rear of the building before going on what can only be called a "rampage" — moving from room to room and indiscriminately damaging the building and its contents.

The thieves made away with an undisclosed amount of cash, but the damage done will be far more costly to all of us than the slight amount of money taken.

Only a week earlier, a similar burglary occurred at the Victim Services offices where thieves broke through an outer wall before making off with several items, including a laptop computer. It was the second burglary of that office in less than a month.

Investigation continues in all three crimes, but authorities need the community's help.

Crimestoppers is authorized to pay up to \$1,000 cash for information leading to the arrest and indictment of any person or persons involved in criminal activity.

It's time to stop these thieves, because in the long run, they're making us all their victims.

Adventures of a long-time Postman

Butch Hallmark has delivered mail in Crockett for 33 years. He could have retired two years ago, but he sees no reason to quit.

"I love my job," says Butch. "I just don't feel like giving it up. I don't see any reason to. I like the people on my route and we have a good time together."

Butch figures he has walked nearly 70,000 miles during the 25 years he delivered mail on foot. Now he uses a truck. He has had the same route 27 years.

Among the people who went to work at the post office the same time he did, he is the only one left.

"They've either moved or died. I'm the last of the Mohicans."

Butch has a full life. He has been to nearly every state, gave his kids a good education and does things beyond the normal duties of a postman. At Thanksgiving and Christmas he delivers meals to several people on his route. The meals come from food prepared in his house. "We've always got lots of leftovers."

One Christmas Eve he delivered mail to a woman who was sitting on her front porch. She gave Butch a Christmas present: 3 pecans wrapped in a paper napkin and tied with a bow. He considers that the best present he ever got because it was all she had to give. He still has that present.

Butch has scars all over his body where dogs have bitten him. He's had fifteen or twenty encounters with them.

"The most serious was when a German Shepard got me down. If it hadn't been on a leash it would have killed me. He got on top of me and was trying to get my

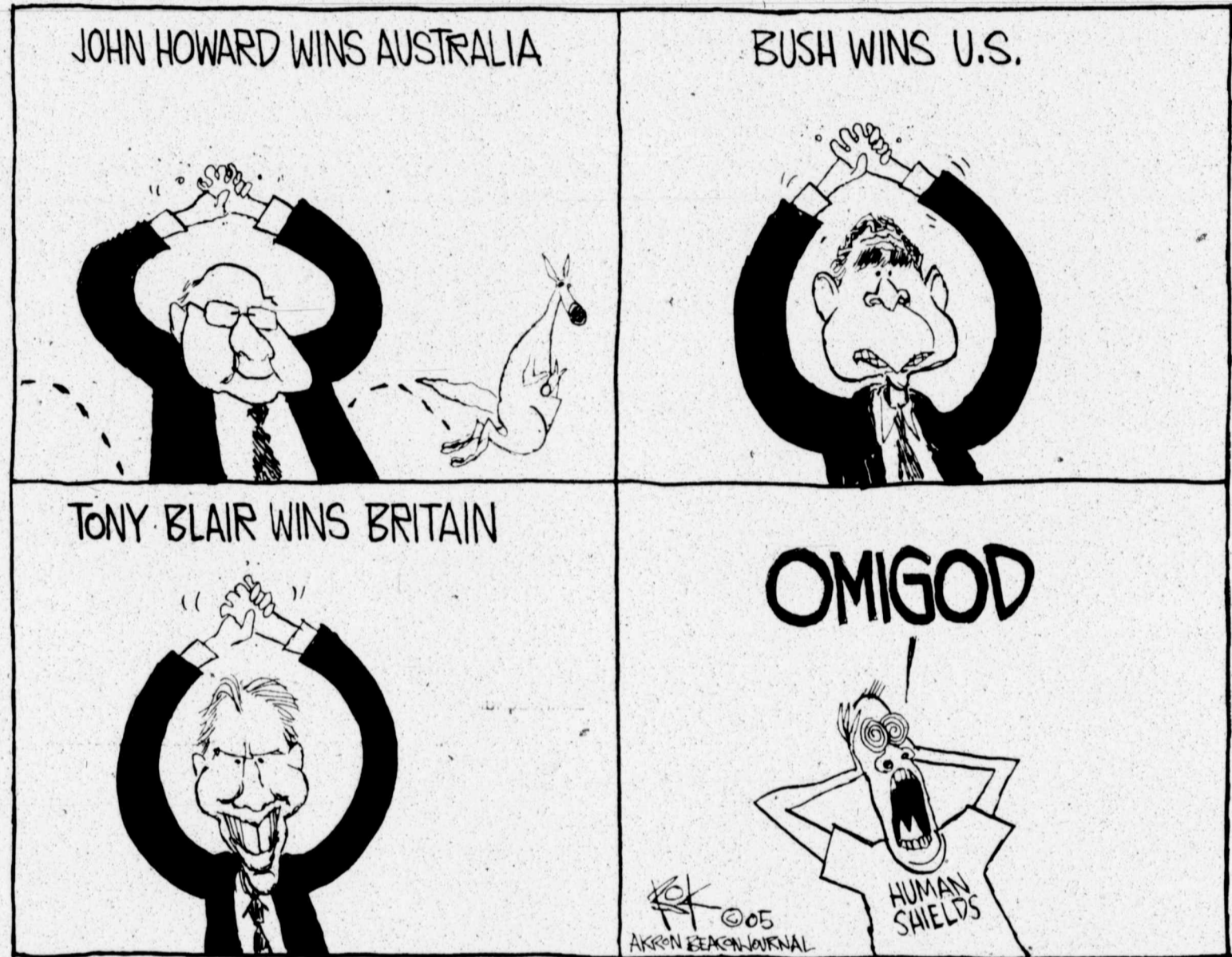
throat. I knocked him off and scooted away, but he grabbed my knee and did some damage. I had to go to the hospital and get sewed up."

He saw a murder once. "A woman came running out of a housing project. Right behind her was another woman with a butcher knife. She stabbed that first woman to death. I was sitting in the truck and watched the whole thing. Police came right after that and took her away. They were fighting over a man."

One of his customers got some false teeth in the mail and asked Butch to help her put them in her mouth.

"It was terrible. She probably hadn't washed her teeth in twenty years. I helped put her uppers in, then when I put the lowers in I had to reach in her mouth and take them out because she hadn't taken her old ones out. I finally got them settled in and went on my way."

Blair takes heat for labor losses

Talk about your tough crowd. Last week, Prime Minister Tony Blair won the Labor Party its first-ever consecutive third term at No. 10 Downing Street, and what does he get for thanks? Calls for him to resign because the Labor lost close to 100 seats, reducing its majority to 66 seats.

"Tony Blair must listen to the voters and step down sooner rather than later," read the subhead of Labor MP Robin Cook's piece in Saturday's Guardian. The usual Labor critics are calling Blair a "liability." Blair's supposed to listen to the voters that gave his party a historic victory — and resign? Doesn't make sense to me.

Meanwhile, Tory leader Michael Howard won 36 seats for his Conservative Party — a real gain — and he did announce his resignation. In another twist, folks in his party are asking Howard to put off his resignation, so that he can use the next year to baste Blair some more.

Blair now finds himself in waters familiar to President George W. Bush. Call that watery territory: You can't win.

Labor has been stewing over Blair's cozy relations with Bush — for which they blame Labor's losses. California Democratic Party bad boy Bob Mulholland — who hates Bush and loves Blair — called me Monday night to note that "Blair didn't go to Moscow" for V-E Day festivities, because he didn't want to be seen standing by Bush.

Even for that, Blair is taking heat. Tuesday's Daily Express

scolded that Blair's decision to send John Prescott was, as its front-page headline read, "shame to Back Row Britain." When he's with Bush, Blair's a poodle. When he's away from Bush, he's a truant.

Gilbert & Sullivan would call the whole thing Topsy Turvy. The city of London is awash in old election signs that call the prime minister, "Tony B Liar."

Still, experts say that Howard didn't win bigger because he called Blair a "liar." (Maybe the left has a trademark on the word, and it only hurts the Tories to use it.)

Oddly too, in this race Howard most resembled Democratic Sen. John Kerry. Kerry, after all, never gained traction in 2004, as he bashed Bush for sending America to a war for which Kerry himself had voted. Kerry seemed opportunistic and dishonest as he hectored Bush not for what he did, but how he did it. For his part, Howard also supported the war, but nipped at how Blair took Britain to Baghdad. He, too, appeared overly opportunistic. No wonder the Tories lost.

You would think that all of Britain opposed taking the country to Iraq, the way the media are piling on Blair. So I checked. In March 2003, the House of Commons voted to use "all means necessary" to disarm Saddam Hussein. The Commons also voted 396 to 217 against a bill that said the case for war "has not been established."

Labor backbenchers who support Blair buddy Gordon Brown, chancellor of the treasury and Labor's heir apparent, talk as if Brown could erase the stain of Iraq. When Brown talks of his support for Blair on Iraq, they don't hear him. They've convinced themselves that Brown says so out of

loyalty. They're like the many American Dems convinced themselves that Kerry didn't really support the war effort, even if he did vote for the war resolution.

I'd love to hear Democrats who bemoan America's Electoral College defend Britain's electoral map. Labor won 35.2 percent of the vote on May 5, the Conservatives garnered 32.3 percent, while Liberal Democrats claimed 22 percent of the vote. As the Sunday Telegraph reported, if districts represented the overall vote, Labor would have won 227 seats, Tories would have won 209 seats and the Lib Dems would have won 142. Instead, that map so favors Labor, as it once favored Conservatives, that Labor won 356 seats, Conservatives won 197 seats and Liberal Democrats won 62 seats. Representative, that isn't.

David Kennard, a San Franciscan with dual U.S./U.K. citizenship, was musing election night at the British Consulate in San Francisco about the solid results of the May 5 vote. He saluted "a great desire in England to give Tony Blair a smacking."

Amazing, Blair won a first-ever third consecutive term for Labor — and half of Fleet Street dismisses it as a loss. Martin Kettle of The Guardian lamented Tuesday morning that calls for Blair to go make it seem "almost as though the election counted for nothing."

The new slogan here could be: Let every vote count — again st the winner.

Bush gets \$82 billion measure for wartime military operations, other programs

WASHINGTON (AP) — When Congress agreed to give President Bush billions of dollars more for the fighting in Afghanistan and Iraq, it also boosted the death benefit for soldiers killed in combat, budgeted nearly \$600 million for a massive new embassy in Baghdad and tightened state driver's license requirements.

Bush, who gained most of what he had sought in the \$82 billion measure, said he would sign the bill into law and praised Congress for showing bipartisan support for the troops and anti-terrorism efforts. The 100-member Senate passed the measure unanimously on Tuesday, and the House approved it overwhelmingly last week.

The bill is the fifth emergency spending package Congress has taken up since the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks. It raises the cost of the global effort to fight terrorism to more than \$300 billion since 2001.

Most of the money — \$75.9 billion — is planned for military operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, while \$4.2 billion goes to foreign aid and other international relations programs.

North Korea says it has completed removing nuclear fuel rods from reactor

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — North Korea said Wednesday it had completed removing spent nuclear fuel rods from a reactor at its main nuclear complex — a move that could allow it to harvest more weapons-grade plutonium — in the communist state's latest provocation amid a deadlock in disarmament talks.

A North Korean Foreign Ministry spokesman said the country had "successfully completed" removing 8,000 fuel rods from the reactor at Yongbyon, according to a statement carried by the North's official Korean Central News Agency.

The step comes after South Korean officials confirmed last month that the Yongbyon reactor was shut down, which would allow the rods to be removed and be reprocessed to extract weapons-grade plutonium. The North didn't specifically say Wednesday it would take such a step.

"We are continuing to take necessary measures to increase (our) nuclear arsenal for self-defense purposes," the unnamed spokesman said.

The spokesman noted North Korea had already announced plans to operate its 5-megawatt reactor at Yongbyon, some 50 miles north of Pyongyang, and resume construction on a bigger reactor because the

United States pulled out of a 1994 deal on the North's nuclear program.

U.S. officials accused the North of running a secret uranium enrichment program in 2002 in violation of the earlier deal made under the Clinton administration, sparking the latest nuclear crisis.

United Airlines faces more labor challenges after pension ruling

CHICAGO (AP) — United Airlines gained a significant financial victory with court approval to dump its four pension plans but faces a tough challenge to win back the support of thousands of angry employees.

While smoothing the path toward a targeted exit from Chapter 11 bankruptcy later this year, Tuesday's ruling in U.S. Bankruptcy Court inflamed United's unions, with some hinting at the possibility of strikes or other disruptive actions.

It also prompted a renewed warning from some members of Congress that taxpayers may someday have to bail out the deficit-riddled government pension agency, which now will assume an additional \$5 billion in pension obligations from United.

"Taxpayers had better buckle up because we will be in for a bumpy ride of bailout after bailout, as more and more corporations dump their pension plan obligations on the PBGC," said U.S. Rep. Jan Schakowsky, D-Ill., referring to the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corp. that already is operating at a more than \$23 billion deficit.

States challenging Pentagon's claim it can shut National Guard bases

WASHINGTON (AP) — States and congressional delegations, fearful the Pentagon will target their military bases for closure, are challenging Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld's claim that he can shutter Army and Air National Guard installations without a governor's consent.

Undeterred, the Pentagon is moving forward with plans to release its list of proposed closures Friday.

The list is being kept under wraps, but defense analysts say they expect more than two dozen National Guard facilities to be tapped for closure or relocation. They suspect the Air National Guard will be hit hard, given that the Pentagon wants to scale back the F-16 fighter jet and other older planes located at domestic Air Guard facilities.

At least one state, Illinois, is threatening to go to court to block Rumsfeld.

"Every state is watching to see what Illinois does," said Paul Hirsch, a Washington lobbyist working on behalf of bases in Florida, California and Virginia. "This is something that could impact every state."

Governors in several states including North Dakota, Delaware and Arizona have weighed in on the issue,

and the New Jersey congressional delegation has asked that the Pentagon cease any attempt to close National Guard bases.

State Department offers additional material on Bolton nomination

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush's embattled nominee for U.N. ambassador, John R. Bolton, has gained momentum despite weeks of intense investigation, with at least one wavering Republican now falling into line with the White House.

Sen. Lincoln Chafee, R-R.I., told The Associated Press on Tuesday he reluctantly would support Bolton when the Senate Foreign Relations Committee votes Thursday on whether to recommend Bolton's confirmation by the full Senate.

Democrats were looking ahead to a close committee vote and said they had not yet decided whether they would filibuster the nomination if it got to the Senate.

Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Del., said Tuesday that Democrats wouldn't stall the committee vote, but said he would push the panel's chairman, Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., to hold off until Democrats received information they'd requested from the State Department and the National Security Agency.

Six bodies found at remote California ranch home after 911 call

GARNER VALLEY, Calif. (AP) — The 911 dispatcher heard only the thud of a telephone hitting the wall and a gunshot — enough to send police to a grisly scene at a sprawling ranch home where six bodies were discovered.

David McGowan, an investigator for the district attorney's office, was found dead Tuesday along with five other people, including his three children, who were all shot to death in their beds in the middle of the night, authorities said.

A handgun was found near McGowan's body and two more in the kitchen. Detectives had not determined a motive, but they were not ruling out a murder-suicide.

McGowan, who turned 44 last week, was found with a gunshot wound to the head near the home's entrance, officials said.

"The beds were undisturbed. The house itself was undisturbed. It did not appear that the house had been ransacked," Sheriff Bob Doyle said. "We are not at this time looking for a suspect."

A 14-year-old boy, two girls — ages 8 and 10 — were found in beds throughout the house, all shot in the head. The school district where the children were enrolled released a letter identifying them as Chase, Paige and Rayne. Two adult women also were found, believed to be McGowan's wife and either her mother or his.

REMEMBERING THE HOLOCAUST

Miramontes brought the most paperclips of the students participating and Moore said the information the students learned provided an opportunity to recall and remember the Holocaust and the importance of World War II. The students linked paperclips together and suspended the chain from the ceiling of their classroom, representing a similar activity from another school. From 1933 until 1945, citizens in Norway, who invented the paperclip, fastened a single paperclip to a cuff or collar to show their opposition to the Nazi party during World War II. Each paperclip collected by the New Hope students represented more than 4,000 deaths during the Holocaust, with a total of 1,500 needed to represent the 6 million lives lost.

When I think of a man giving "romantic" advice on how to get married, I just kind of shake my head and say "bless his heart" (which is always a preface to a "but, you know s/he just doesn't know what s/he is talking about).

Be that as it may, Richard Kirschenbaum and Daniel Rosenberghave written "Closing the Deal: Two Married Guys Take You From Single Miss to Wedded Bliss" (646.77 KIR R). You know what? They just might be on to something.

Like many people, I have been married so long that I really don't remember what it's like to be looking for a mate. However, Richard and Daniel are two happily-married husbands who will reveal the secrets to getting the love of your life to marry you.

In June 2001, Cindi Broaddus was in the passenger seat of a car on the way to the airport. Her life was irrevocably changed when a gallon jar of sulfuric acid was thrown from an overpass and came crashing through the windshield.

Screaming with agony, she was rushed to the hospital where the doctors gave her a 30 percent chance of survival. Survive she did.

"A Random Act" (617.110 BRO C) is riveting, inspirational and her fight to survive is a story of tremendous strength. A side note: she is the sister-in-law of Dr. Phil McGraw. This is a great book.

"Dishing" (641.013 SMI L) is from premier gossip columnist Liz Smith. Reading this memoir is like eating an entire bag of potato chips in one sitting: it's crisp, salty and probably bad for you, but what fun!

The columnist presents food gossip as timeless anecdotes of great meals and great appetites. She loves to eat, and she isn't afraid of butter or bacon grease. Eating can be fattening, Smith concedes, but she proves that "reading about food... setting tables in our minds" can be a guilt-free delight. It is a pretty neat book to read. Don't expect great literature, though.

The next book is a cross between history and a biography of the Grateful Dead. I must have missed out on their music somewhere along the way and cannot even name a single song.

However, Phil Lesh, the bass player for the Grateful Dead, tells the full, true story of his life with Jerry Garcia and the Dead. Phil Lesh first met Jerry Garcia in 1959 in the clubs of East Palo Alto, Calif.

At his suggestion, Lesh learned to play the electric bass, joining him in a new band that blended R&B, country, and rock and roll with an experimental fervor never before heard.

Now, in time for the Grateful Dead's 40th anniversary, Phil Lesh offers the first behind-the-scenes history of the Dead, a story no one will ever know as he does.

Check out "Searching for the Sound: My Life with the Grateful Dead," (787.871 LES P) by Phil Lesh. It will be on the New Book shelf.

A couple of biographies you might find interesting: "The Bradbury Chronicles: the Life of Ray Bradbury," (B BRA R) by Sam Weller. Weller was given unbridled access to Ray's private papers and has spent many hours interviewing friends, colleagues and Ray.

It is an extremely well balanced look at Bradbury's life.

Untimely death deprived science fiction of its reigning comic genius, Douglas Adams (1952-2001), celebrated as the author of "The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy" and its three sequels. Go down to the movies and compare the book to what you see.

After proving its popularity as a 1978 BBC radio series, the Guide became a novel thanks to a commission from Pan Book's editor Nick Webb, who now gives us what is easily the best of several existing Adams biographies.

Drawing on a wealth of Adams' papers and authorized interviews with family members, Webb creates a multifaceted rendering of a complex, charismatic man who was less a writer than idea-spinner with a passionate interest in science.

"Wish You Were Here: The Official Biography of Douglas Adams," (B ADA D) written by Nick

Webb can be found in the biography section.

New Mysteries that have come in: Sharon Kay Penman's character Justin de Quincy returns in "Prince of Darkness," "Two Dollar Bill," by Stuart Woods; and "With No One As Witness," by Elizabeth George.

A sequel (sort of) to "Sky Woman Falling," Kirk Mitchell reprises Emmett Parker in "Dance of the Thunder Dogs." Parker is on convalescent leave back in Oklahoma when he is drawn into tribal matters, the BIA and skull-duggery in the oil fields of Eastern Oklahoma. I have not read this author before, but he sounds like he knows his "bidness."

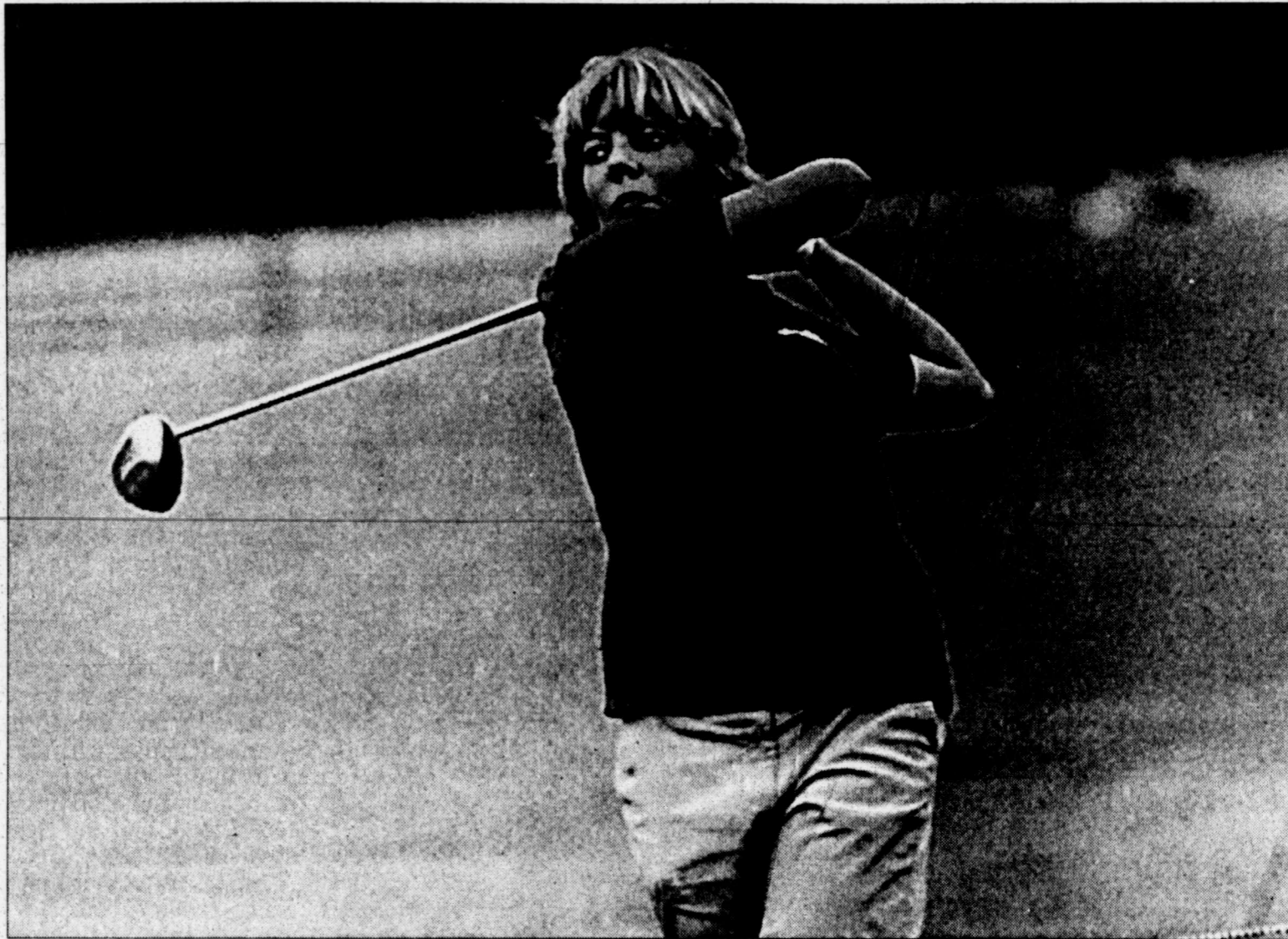
AUSTIN — Coahoma's Sini Laurikkala always seems to save her best scores for the second round.

And Tuesday things weren't any different during second round action at the UIL Class 2A golf championships at Jimmy Clay Golf Course in Austin.

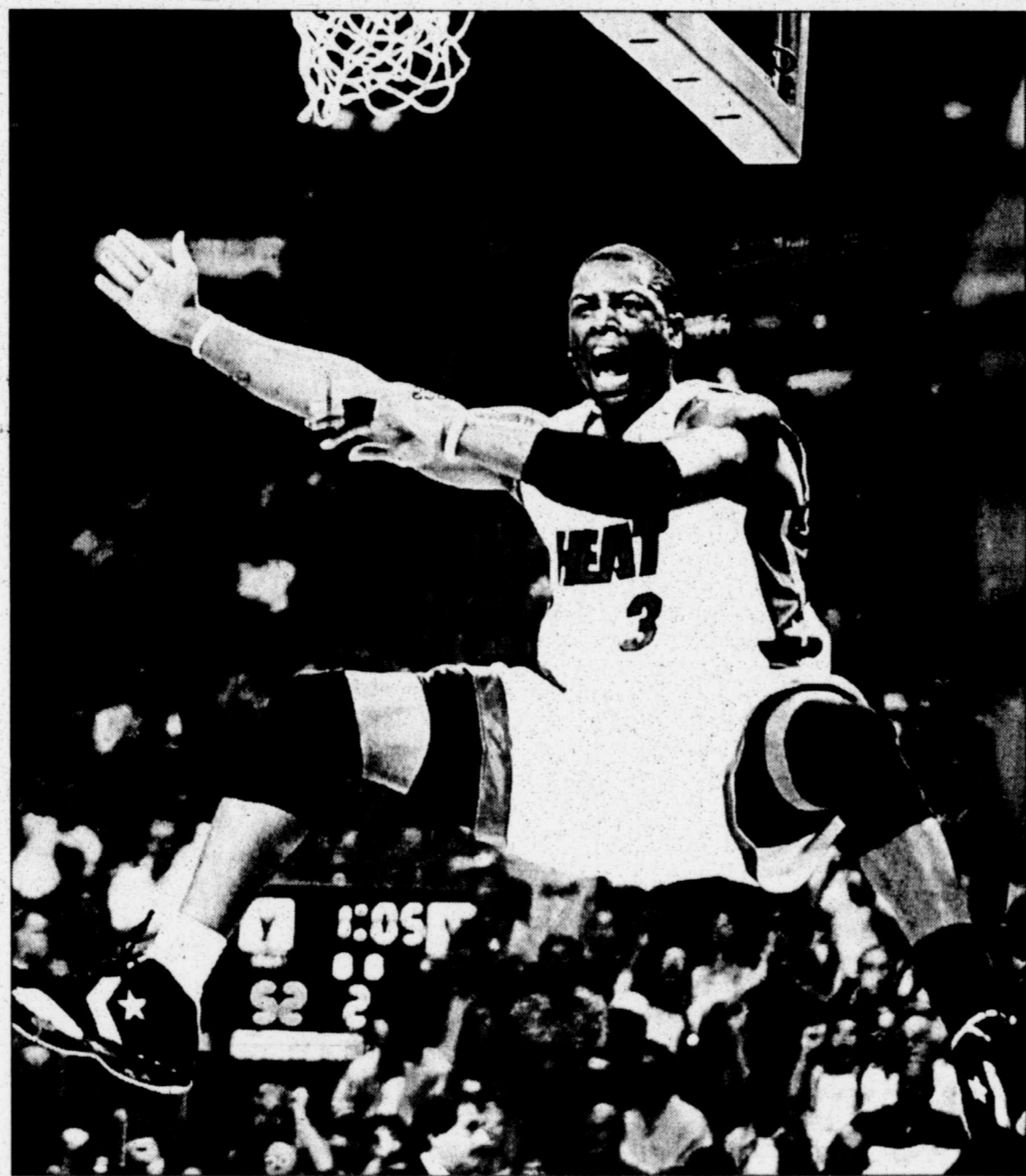
Laurikkala improved her score by five strokes from day one and jumped two spots in the standings, finishing third, but just missed second place by one shot.

Miami continues to dominate playoffs as Wade leads way

• Heat remain undefeated in postseason with win over Wizards

MIAMI (AP) — The way Dwyane Wade sees it, opponents are at his mercy.

If they focus all their defensive attention on him, teammates will reap the rewards by getting open looks. If left open, Wade will shoulder the scoring load himself.

And on Tuesday night, Wade did plenty in both departments. He had 31 points, including a critical three-point play with 1:05 left, and added 15 assists and seven rebounds to lift the Miami Heat to a 108-102 victory over the Washington Wizards in Game 2 of their Eastern Conference semifinal series.

Miami leads the series 2-0, with Thursday's Game 3 at Washington — where the Heat have won 11 times in 14 tries.

"I came in with a different mind-set and I really tried to be a playmaker," Wade said. "I really try to attack and I know that if I attack, they will come to me and I'll get the ball to my teammates."

According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Wade became the fifth player in NBA history with at least 30 points, 15 assists and five rebounds in a playoff game. The others? Magic Johnson, Jerry West, Walt Frazier and Oscar Robertson.

Not bad company. "Wade's the one killing us," Wizards guard Gilbert Arenas said. In the other game Tuesday night, San Antonio routed Seattle 108-91 to take a 2-0 lead in the Western Conference semifinals. On Wednesday night, Indiana is at Detroit and Dallas visits Phoenix. The hosts both lead 1-0.

At Miami, Eddie Jones added 21 points, Shaquille O'Neal scored 16, Damon Jones had 14 and Udonis Haslem had a 14-point, 13-rebound effort for Miami — which won despite 20 turnovers, an 18-7 deficit in offensive rebounds and a 22-for-40 showing at the foul line.

"We didn't take care of anything that we wanted to take care of," Heat coach Stan Van Gundy said. "And we won the game."

Antawn Jamison, playing with tendinitis in his right knee, had a playoff career-high 32 points for Washington. Gilbert Arenas added 28 for the Wizards, but the third member of their high-scoring trio, Larry Hughes, missed his first 11 shots and finished with 15 points on 5-for-17 shooting.

Washington fell into an 0-2 hole in the first round against Chicago, and became the ninth team in NBA history to recover from such a deficit. That's why the mood in the Wizards' locker room was upbeat.

"You've got to get

Spurs take advantage of series

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — From the city of the Alamo, the San Antonio Spurs have a new rallying cry: Remember what happened last year.

OK, so it's not as catchy as the line best associated with their hometown. But the memory of building a 2-0 lead in the second round of the playoffs, then seeing it collapse with four straight losses, could serve the Spurs

well now that they're facing a similar situation.

With Manu Ginobili making nine of 11 shots and scoring 28 points, San Antonio beat the Seattle SuperSonics 109-91 on Tuesday night to take a 2-0 lead in their second-round series. The action shifts to the Pacific Northwest for the next two games, starting Thursday night, and the Spurs won't take anything for granted.

Last May, San Antonio

won the opening two games of the second round against the Lakers, then flew out to Los Angeles for Games 3 and 4 and things were never the same. The Spurs dropped both road games, came back home and lost a heartbreaker on Derek Fisher's buzzer-beating heave, and were eliminated a few days later.

The Spurs have been making the playoffs look

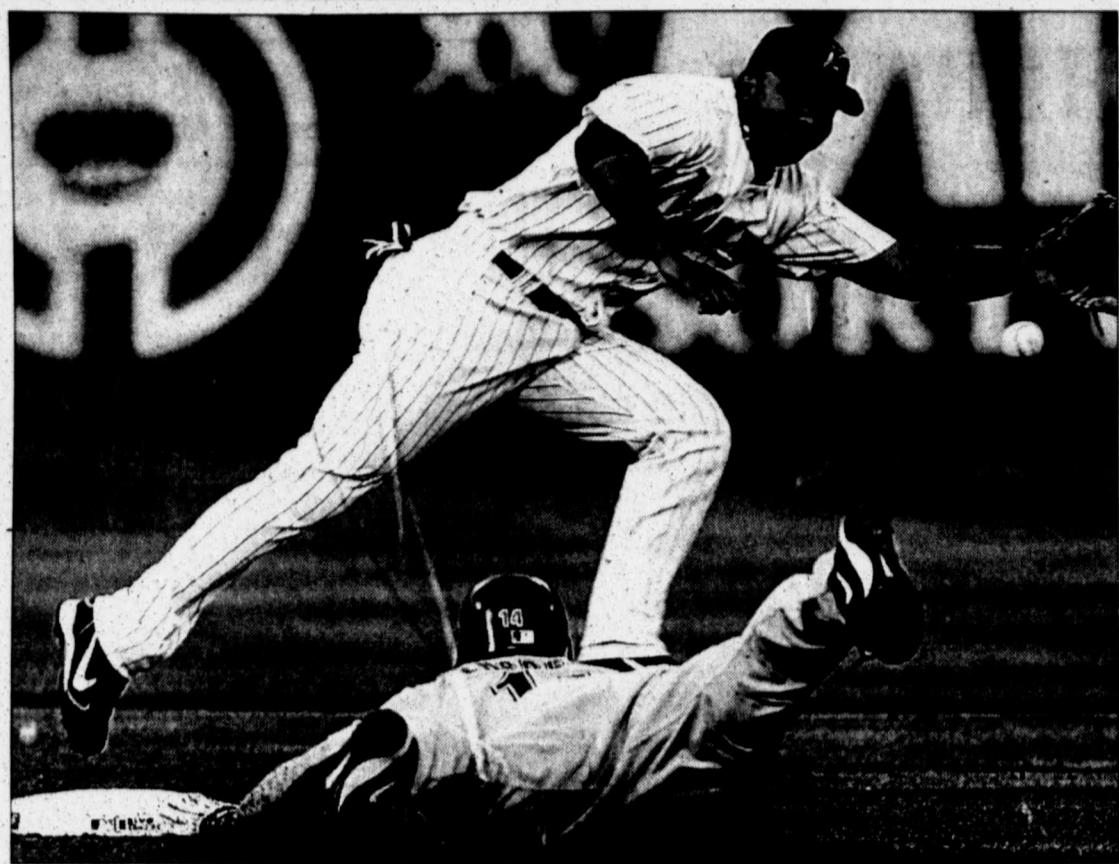

Parker, a layup by Robert Horry off a nice pass from Ginobili and two more foul shots by Parker stretched the lead back to 14.

Seattle's Ray Allen shook off a sprained ankle that knocked him out of the opener and scored 25 points in 42 minutes. Rashard Lewis scored 22. The Sonics even had a stretch of 22 points scored by that duo.
