Parmer Resident Is Sentenced on Assault

Hiley Lucy, Parmer County resident of the Clay's Corner area, Wednesday was placed in the county jail after an early morning as-sault and battery offense and speedy trial the same day.

County Attorney Sheehan reports that Lucy ran a stop light in Muleshoe at a 2 a.m. hour, with a Muleshoe deputy giving chase, which continued for several miles. Lucy and a companion pulled out into an open field where the deputy accosted them. As the offi-cer was taking license data, etc., Lucy is alleged to have assaulted him, disarming him, then dishing out a severe pummeling that placed the deputy in the hospital.

Lucy, in trial before Judge Smith, was assessed 60 days in the county jail plus a fine of \$100.
