### Hospital History Is That Of Growth; Must Not Stop

An idea that snowballed from an intangible need to an 18room hospital is still growing, and gathering speed as it goes. Now it aspires to be a 25-bed hospital unit, a reality in brick and steel, in glass and tile

The Parmer County Community Hospital started out in 1945 as only the germ of an idea; but aggressive, far-sighted individuals, recognizing the need for medical care in the county, responded to the appeals and raised \$45,000 in one year. 



### **Editorial Observations**

BY THE BACK DOOR

The question of just how far government should go in providing medical care for veterans is a recurrent one-and it is also exceedingly controversial and touchy. It provides room for widely divergent yet equally sincere wiewpoints.

The Hoover Commission report on the subject has been aggressively criticized. Some of the criticism may be sound. Yet, by and large, the Commission pointed to abuses which could be eliminated without in any way endangering the benefits of deserving and needy veterans. Care of non-service-connected disabilities is a case in point. While these patients must file statements of inability to pay, the Veterans Administration is prohibited from challenging veracity. A random General Accounting Office sampling of 336 declarations by reterans showed that many had substantial ssets-\$500,000 in one case. The Commission's ecommendation that an inability to pay statement be subject to verification is certainly reasonable.

Most important, in the long pull, is the future picture. We have millions upon millions of veterans and their number will continue to rapidly increase. It is well within the realm of possibility and even probability that all-inclusive government medical care for veterans, regardless of what happened to them while in service, could lead to socialized medicine by the back door. We would get it even though the vast majority of Americans, veterans included, don't want it. This point should be an over-riding consideratin in any appraisal of the issue.

YOU CAN'T WIN 64,000!

The radio-Tv program, "The \$64,000 Question," has received an enormous amount of publicity. And here's a fact that most people may have overlooked-even though a contestant answers all the tough questions, right to the he can't possibly win \$64.000.

He'll get a perfectly good check for that amount, of course. But-assuming he is a single man earning 4,000 a year—the check would have to total \$448,711 before he'd have \$64,000 to keep for himself, free and clear.

Why? The answer is: The federal income tax. It goes up so far and so fast that it becomes virtually confiscatory in upper brackets. A man who does take the long chances and wins the 64,000, actually gets to keep about \$25,000 —well under half.
