"We've had radar in all the cars, and technically they're hand-me-downs from DPS," said Pritchett. to furnish local DPS with radar, and when they got new ones they would give us their old ones. ## Rosa Parks, civil rights pioneer, dead

DETROIT (AP) - Nearly 50 years ago, Rosa Parks made a simple decision that
sparked a revolution. When a white span demanded she give up her seat on a Montgomery, Ala., bus, the then 42 -year-old seamstress said no. At the time, she couldn't have known it would secure her a revered place in American history. But her one small
act of defiance galvanized a generation of activists, including a young Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.. and earned her
the title "mother of the civil rights the title "mother of the civil rights movement.
Mrs. Parks died Monday evening at her home of natural causes, with close
friends by her side, said Gregory Reed, friends by her side, said Gregory Reed,
an attorney who represented her for the past 15 years. She was 92 .

and private toll-road operators have shown interest leasing Harris County's 83-mile toll system for $\$ 2$ billion to $\$ 7$ attention of county officials.

Police said the infant was in a plastic bag inside the suitcase and may have been dead from two weeks to a month. the baby was carried to almost full term, Sheriff Omar Lucio said. He said Reich's arrest Sunday night was merited by the discovery of a body and "the defendant's statements.

Once the names and gift ideas are collected and put on the trees in the form of cards, area shoppers will have the opportunity to brighten a child's holiday by choosing one and purchasing items for them.
Although the Angel Tree program is a large part of the Salvation Army's holiday spirit, it's by no means the only one. The local corps office staff is also gearing up for the Thanksgiving holiday, as well as the annual canned food drive. ## Who the Dickens?

A look back at the life of the literary giant who wrote 'Oliver Twist'

W
 and Charles Dickens have in comm
Give up? Give up? Both have movies that are in theaters. While Alba sizzles on film in an derwater adventure, it's Dickens' classic images of the lives of the Victoriansic images of the lives of the Victoria era British poor that float across the big, screen in the movie "Olive Twist," an adaptation of his classi
tale directed by Roman Polanski. The new film is not intended for the younger set, rated PG-13 for disturbing images. For those old enough to enjoy it, however, the film serves as another testament to the longevity of Dickens ${ }^{2}$ remarkable literary legacy. His short stories and essays began "appearing in periodicals in 1833 . "Oliver Twist" was published in 1837 - more than 165 years ago. "Oliver Twis" tells the story of the title character, orphaned and
forced to live in a workhouse heade forced to live in a workhouse headed
by the awful Mr. Bumble, who cheats by the awful Mr. Bumble, who cheats
the boys who work there out of thei he boys who work there out of their to the streets of London, where he meets pickpocket played by Sir Ben a pickpocket, played by Sir Ben crime. Kingsley's character Fag becomes Oliver's crime mentor Several of Dickens' works have adapted for film and television, including 2002's "Nicholas Nickleby" and 2000's "David Copperfield." And several versions of "A Christmas Carol" have entertained audiences for years
We thought this would be a good time to take a look at the man behind the words and see what kind of experiences helped shape and influence one of the best-known writers of all time.

What was Dickens childhood like? Dickens was borm Feb. 1812, to John and Elizabeth Dickens. When Dickens was 12, his father was sent to prison for unpaid
debts. As the oldest boy in the family Charles became the head of the household. To help support his family, he quit school and got a job at a bootblacking factory. He hated his job - an experience that would fuel
some of his future $w$ some of his future writ
ing. He once wrot
that he wondered "how I could have been so easilly cata taway a s such hage."
H. woute He wrote about his feelings of alienation nd hetrayal in "David Copperfield" and Great Expectations. After three months, his father was released from prison and Charles was In 1827 , he left school. office boy for a lawyer. This was when he decided to pursue a career when he decided to pursue a career
as a journalist. He found freelance work and published his first piece. A Dinner at Poplar Walk," in 1833. Three years later, he married Catherine Hogarth.
What kinds of topics did he write about? In his novels, Dickens touched on several important issues. He addressed the Poor Law Amendment Act of 1824 in "Oliver Twist"; the French Revolution in
"A Tale of Two Citie"." "A Tale of Two Cities"; and social reform in "Hard Times." One of Dickens' best-known
works is the first Cris works is the first Christmas book he

## Kids get a new diet guide

Can a computer game help kids eat a healthier diet? The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) thinks so. They have made that just one part of their health guideline for kids called, MyPyramid for Kids. The new pro gram is designed to get kids exercising more and eating more nutritious foods.

In the interactive MyPyramid Blast Off game, kids fuel up a rocket ship with exercise and kids fuel up a rocket ship with exercise and
healthy foods in order to take off. If they fuel up healthy foods in order to take off. If they fuel up
with the wrong kind of foods and too little activity, the rocket ship stays on the ground. "This is a fun approach to addressing the very serious problem of childhood obesity," said Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns.
Johanns said the game demonstrates the guidelines of MyPyramid for Kids. Those guide lines suggest eating iewer solid fats, added sugars or sweeteners, and fewer high calorie, high fat products. The plars also recommend more fruits, vegetables, lean proteins like turkey and seafood, and fiber-rich whole grains. In April, the USDA introduced MyPyramid, a similar health guideline for adults.
Johanns said on top of eating right, exercise is a necessary way to stay healthy. In the past 30 years, obesity in kids and teenagers has more than doubled. The USDA said that kids need an our of exercise each day.

## CAN THE GOVERNMENT

 DO MORE?Some people say the government needs to do more to help kids stay healthy. They say the USDA also needs to work to get junk food away from kids.
"If the government really wanted to improve kids' eating habits, it would get junk food out of
