




In July, Friona Wheat Growers completed a million bushel addition to their plant, making total capacity of the elevator 2,130,000 bushels. A work crew involving 211 men worked 3 months on the \$400,000 structure. The new cement storage replaced the old wooden elevator, a Friona landmark which was razed last January by the A. F. Roberts Construction Company, which built the original wooden structure.
