THE THREE PER CENT STATE SALES TAX

to the recently proposed sales tax at Austin. Whether or not the

tax will be imposed at this session of the legislature, remains to be seen. We have studied the tax in our own way of thinking and

realize that it is necessary for someone to support the state gov-

ernment. This can be done only by taxation. Then what kind of a tax would be the best tax—a tax that would be fair to all alike

If a straight ad valorem tax on real estate and personal property

then the wage earner would escape taxation, if a sales tax only then the property owner would escape taxation, and the wage earner would have to carry the entire burden. This would be class taxation, and as one merchant in Gatesville expressed it makes the rich man richer and the poor man poorer.

In an inserview with one Gatesville merchant, he expressed the fells of the tax on the grounds that the tax would properly

the folly of the tax on the grounds that the tax would pyramid, that is when the manufacturer sold an article, a three per cent tax, when the jobber purchased the article another 3 per cent tax

and by the time the article reached the consumer, there would be at least twelve per cent tax on the article, and the consumer would

Another merchant expressed his opposition on the grounds that it was nothing less than a scheme to get thousands of people employed by the establishing of new bureaus and collectors for dif-

ferent districts and counties of the state. He estimated that the least would be from one to two collectors for each county. With

leading citizen of Gatesville expressed his opinion in the matter of

the three per cent tax. "The matter of three per cent is too small an item to be added to the sales price of many of the small items and the tax expense will necessarily have to be absorbed by the merchant and taken from the profits of the business." Now it is a question if there are many firms making a net profit in excess

of three per cent.

Other express their opposition to the proposed tax on the grounds that the consumer will have to pay the tax, and under present conditions many of them striving to keep the wolf from the door by hard labor, many working at only a few cents per hour, will be compelled to deprive himself or members of his family of many of the necessities of life, that taxes may be paid to maintain the government while the higher-ups or near-do-wells, or the rich man, and the property owners of our state, and in reality those who compose the state go tax free.

We are opposed to the full three per cent sales tax as suggested to the state legislature at present. We believe that it is an unjust tax, nothing short of class taxation. Let the man that owns property and really needs the protection of a state government
